### **Health**

Sunday, July 1, 2012 – Radio Health Journal 6:30 a.m.

30:00

Host: Reed Pence. Guests: Dr. Raymond Baxter, Senior Vice President for Community Benefit, Research, and Health Policy, Kaiser Permanente; and Dr. Marion Nestle, Professor of Nutrition, Food Studies and Public Health, New York University, and co-author, Why Calories Count.

Mr. Pence discussed with Drs. Baxter and Nestle how obesity is not the result of only poor individual choices. Public policy and economics create an environment conducive to too much food and too little exercise. Drs. Baxter and Nestle explained and showed examples of how cities build roads rather than sidewalks, schools cut physical education for more classroom time, and federal policy encourages overproduction of food.

2nd Segment

Host: Nancy Benson. Guests: Dr. Ramon Franco, Jr., Director, Division of Laryngology, Harvard Medical School; and Dr. Susan Miller, Principal, Voice Trainer, Washington, D.C.

Ms. Benson discussed with Drs. Franco and Miller an unusual "voice strangling" disorder and the toxin that can treat it.

Sunday, July 1, 2012 – Sunday Morning 7:30 a.m.

Host: Mimi Lawson. Guest: Lisa Ross, Pinellas County Schools.

Ms. Lawson discussed with Ms. Ross the results of the recent study by the American Cancer Society on how Pinellas County Schools have changed school menus to a healthier cuisine. Ms. Ross discussed how many positive changes have taken place in the school system in the areas of exercise and use of the gymnasium facilities. The community is now being encouraged to use the existing facilities for after-hours family exercise and team sports. Since the study began, the health statistics in the schools have greatly improved. They have applied for a grant extension to continue the progress made in educating students on how to eat healthy foods and how exercise can cut cancer risks. In closing, Ms. Ross discussed a video that was produced locally which follows a local Pinellas County boy and his journey to lose weight and become more physically active.

Host: Reed Pence. Guests: Dr. Robert Wall Emerson, Professor of Blindness and Low Vision Studies, Western Michigan University; Chris Danielsen, Director of Public Relations, National Federation of the Blind; and Lukas Franck, Senior Consultant for Special Projects, The Seeing Eye, Inc.

The federal government is scheduled to rule this month on whether car manufacturers will be required to add artificial car sounds to hybrid and electric cars. These vehicles are so quiet at low speed that they may endanger pedestrians, especially those with low



vision. Mr. Pence discussed with Dr. Emerson, Mr. Danielsen, and Mr. Franck the unanticipated effects of quiet cars and how various proposed fixes might work.

### 2nd Segment

Host: Nancy Benson. Guests: William Hoffman, University of Minnesota Medical School and co-author, [The Stem Cell Dilemma](http://stemcelldilemma.com) (stemcelldilemma.com); and Dr. Larry Goldstein, Distinguished Professor of Cellular and Molecular Medicine and Neurosciences and Director, Stem Cell Program, University of California San Diego School of Medicine.

Ms. Benson discussed with Mr. Hoffman and Dr. Goldstein the promise of stem cells in treating diseases ranging from cancer, Parkinson's, and Alzheimer's to the repair of spinal cord injuries and severed limbs to even the regeneration of diseased organs. Mr. Hoffman and Dr. Goldstein also discussed whether embryonic stem cells will be needed to meet their full potential or if reprogrammed adult cells will be sufficient.

Parents who grew up amid common teenage drug and alcohol use are now being confronted by their own children's questions on their experience and advice. Mr. Pence discussed with Dr. Lee, Dr. Rosenbaum, and Dr. Seppala the studies urging honesty and communication to keep kids out of trouble.

The creation of personality is little understood. It is formed from natural-born temperament plus experience. Ms. Benson discussed with Dr. Kagan its origins and the extent it can be changed or subverted.

Mr. Greene discussed with Ms. Bell the current appeal to get organ and tissue donors. Whether when renewing their driver's license or during a healthcare event, LifeLink actively tries to get everyone to make the decision that helps save the lives of others in dire need.

Host: Mimi Lawson. Guests: Mary Clements-Fowler, Program Supervisor for the Hillsborough County Parks and Recreation Department, and Joseph Soletti, Program Administrator.

Ms. Lawson discussed with Ms. Clements-Fowler and Mr. Soletti the Hillsborough Parks and Recreation “Senior Games” and the many success stories relating to its involvement. They discussed that the health benefits of participation include better physical condition for seniors and an increase in overall health and nutrition. The positive mental and social benefits that seniors who join in the games get from the experience and why these games are an important part of the Parks and Recreation’s commitment to the older population were also mentioned. In closing, tips were provided on how to stay active and healthy after the age of sixty and why the Parks and Recreation Department remains a part of the Tampa Bay community in helping to address the needs of older citizens.

Mr. Pence discussed with Dr. Mintz and Mr. Karst how the federal government has moved to prevent flexible spending accounts from paying for over the counter drugs and is exploring taking some prescription drugs to a “behind the counter” non-prescription class. These moves could save the government and health system money but would shift drug costs to consumers since insurance does not pay for non-prescription drugs.

Family moves can have a devastating lifelong effect on children if they are unprepared or if the move comes at an inopportune time of life. Ms. Benson discussed with Drs. Gruman and Medway the children at risk and the ways to make moving easier on them.

Host: Reed Pence. Guests: Bill Schmid, Chief Executive Officer and Founder of Halo Innovations, a safe sleep device (halosleep.com); and Dr. Fern Hauck, Professor of Family Medicine, University of Virginia, and member of the American Academy of Pediatrics’ SIDS Task Force (healthychildren.org).

Sudden infant death syndrome has decreased by more than fifty percent in the last twenty years, thanks largely to the “Baby on Back” campaign. However, some cultures are resistant to this message. On the other hand, infant deaths in the bed due to other reasons like suffocation and strangulation are increasing. Mr. Pence discussed with Mr.



Schmid and Dr. Hauck the efforts to clear cribs of bedclothes, blankets and bumpers, and lessen infant bed sharing with adults to reduce this toll.

Host: Nancy Benson. Guest: Dr. Mario Beauregard, Associate Research Professor of Neuroscience, University of Montreal, and author, Brain Wars: The Scientific Battle Over the Existence of the Mind and the Proof that Will Change the Way We Live Our Lives.

Mainstream science holds that thought, belief, and emotion can be explained completely by chemical and electrical processes. Ms. Benson discussed with Dr. Beauregard that evidence is piling up for a second form of consciousness which is currently unmeasurable and which would explain phenomena such as out-of-body and near death experiences.

Scientists have more of an understanding of the chemical processes in the brain that result in drug addiction and relapses and are developing new drugs that can treat these imbalances. Some of these treatments can be prescribed in the privacy of a doctor’s office avoiding the stigma of the previous alternative, methadone. Mr. Pence discussed with Dr. Alem, Dr. Johnson, and the addicted mother of five the options individuals have in these situations.

Summer vacations can be marred by mosquito and tick bites as well as by a poison ivy rash. Home remedies and internet solutions to these summer ailments are not always the best ways to avoid these problems and get relief. Ms. Benson discussed with Mr. Conlon, Dr. Baker, and Dr. Weisman better solutions for relief and protection against these problems.

Methadone treatment for drug addicts works but is loaded with the stigma that lead communities to fight methadone clinics from coming into their towns. Even some medical personnel often look down on methadone as a form of treatment. Mr. Pence discussed with Mr. Bering, Ms. Buff, Dr. Alem, and Dr. Johnson the stigma in drug abuse treatments and the rise of older Americans as the fastest growing group of drug addicts.

Host: Nancy Benson. Guests: Jim Kutsch, President and Chief Executive Officer, The Seeing Eye; Anna Morrison-Ricardati, Founder AMR Law Group, Chicago; and Mike Deathe, certified dog trainer, and owner, Kiss Dog Training, Kansas City.

Guide dogs and their blind owners are vulnerable as they walk and everywhere they go. Ms. Benson discussed with Mr. Kutsch, Ms. Morrison-Ricardati, and Mr. Deathe the increase in attacks on guide dogs by other dogs, the consequences of those attacks, and what might be done to prevent them.

Auto crashes kill more than 35,000 people in the United States each year, but that toll is down dramatically even as speed limits have been going up. Engineers now realize that artificially slow speed limits can be more dangerous than high speeds. Mr. Pence discussed with Mr. Bowman, Mr. Megge, and Dr. Noyce how speed limits should be set and why speed doesn't necessarily kill.

Host: Nancy Benson. Guests: Dr. Susan Matthews, Founder, Shanti School of Internal Martial Arts, and Advisory Board Member, American Tai Chi Association; and Dr. Keith Jeffrey, Founder, EasyTaiChi.com and also an Advisory Board Member of the American Tai Chi Association.

Ms. Benson discussed with Drs. Matthews and Jeffrey the slow movements of tai chi and qigong. They elaborated on how these practices are puzzling to many Westerners, but these Chinese practices have been proven to reduce stress and provide other health benefits.

Mr. Pence discussed with Drs. Blount, Stream, and Saulino, and Ms. Gruttadaro the shortage of mental health professionals, primary care doctors (such as family physicians), internists, and pediatricians who handle much of the treatment of mental illnesses in the U. S.

Host: Nancy Benson. Guests: Dr. Barbara Natterson-Horowitz, cardiologist, UCLA Medical Center, and co-author, Zoobiquity: What Animals Can Teach Us About Health and the Science of Healing; and Kathryn Bowers, co-author of Zoobiquity.

Ms. Benson discussed with Dr. Natterson-Horowitz and Ms. Bowers how humans and animals can share many diseases, and surprisingly, many behavioral disorders as well.

This summer's nationwide drought and heat may be something Florida residents have to get used to. Mr. Pence discussed with Drs. Patz, Holloway, and Francis why extreme weather of all types may increase in years to come as a result of the slowing and stretching of the jet stream. This weather pattern may result in additional deaths, health stress, and strains to the infrastructure.

### 2nd Segment

Host: Nancy Benson. Guest: Dr. Michael Horberg, Director, HIV/AIDS, Kaiser Permanente; Chairman-Elect, HIV Medicine Association, and Member of the President's Advisory Council on HIV/AIDS.

Mr. Benson discussed with Dr. Horberg that public health experts are learning ways to lessen disparities in getting HIV-positive people into treatment. Dr. Horberg discussed that studies now show that retroviral treatment prevents transmission as well as lessens mortality.

### a Psychopath: Do I (Or Someone I Know) Have a Problem with Manipulation and Lack of Empathy.

Mr. Pence discussed with Mr. Silver and Dr. Schouten the fact that almost everyone can be victimized at some point by a “cutthroat” co-worker who lies with ease and feels no remorse. These people may be “almost psychopaths”, people with psychopathic characteristics too subtle to be diagnosed. Mr. Silver and Dr. Schouten explained how these people operate and how the rest of us can avoid being played.

### 2nd Segment

Host: Nancy Benson. Guest: Carissa Phelps, author, Runaway Girl: Escaping Life on the Streets, One Helping Hand at a Time.

More than two million youth may run away from home each year. More than 100,000 of them are forced into the sex trade each year to survive. Ms. Benson discussed with Ms. Phelps how she overcame such a life, how she beat the odds, and what runaways need to have a chance to succeed.

Overweight and obese children suffer psychological as well as physical damage. Mr. Pence and Drs. Jampolis, Davis, and Newmark-Sztainer discussed the bullying these children often endure, the damage and behavior it may produce, how parents may make it even worse, and the best ways to help kids be healthy for life.

Host: Nancy Benson. Guests: Dr. Doug Woods, Professor of Psychology, University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee; and Dr. Martin Franklin, Associate Professor of Psychiatry, University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine.

Trichotillomania, or hair-pulling disorder, may affect three percent of people. It can be very hard to treat if not caught early, yet because of stigma, most people affected take great pains to avoid treatment and hide their bald patches. Ms. Benson discussed with Drs. Woods and Franklin the disorder and new treatments that may help patients.

Ms. Lawson discussed with Ms. Abreu the “Get Your Groove Back” promotion. National medical experts and a panel of local physicians will hold a free symposium to answer questions and provide advice on menopause and conditions that affect self-esteem and body image issues for women over fifty. In closing, Ms. Abreu also discussed the Florida Hospital’s new Heart Screenings and improved technology in identifying heart attacks in women and how women can help keep their hearts healthy and themselves in good physical and mental condition in this decade of their lives.

### Sunday, September 23, 2012 – Radio Health Journal 6:30 a.m.

Guests: Dr. Marty Makary, Associate Professor of Health Policy, Johns Hopkins University, and author, Unaccountable: What Hospitals Won't Tell You and How Transparency Can Revolutionize Health Care; Janet Brown, Director of Content and Outreach, Healthier Hospitals Initiative and Director of Facility Engagement, Practice Greenhealth; and Dr. Yoan Kagoma, McMaster University.

Mr. Pence discussed with Dr. Makary, Ms. Brown, and Dr. Kagoma how hospitals and healthcare facilities are generally the second-largest generators of waste and garbage in most cities. Some is due to the vast increase the last twenty years of disposable devices, spurred by infection fears. Dr. Makary, Ms. Brown, and Dr. Kagoma explained the effort to return to reusable instruments and novel moves such as the collection of unused anesthesia gases.

Ms. Benson discussed with Dr. Epstein the way each era regards childbirth and how it reveals much about how society considers life, death, and sex.

Ms. Coriaty talked about her role as the Public Relations Specialist for Florida Hospital and about her fight with breast cancer. She told the listeners about the “Strike Out Breast Cancer” event this week to benefit women without insurance who need mammography screenings. The event raises money to pay for health screenings for Tampa Bay area women without insurance. They gave the listeners an overview of ways to become involved in the promotion as well as how the corporations can support the effort to get women screened for breast cancer. They also discussed the advances in breast cancer treatment and the new ways doctors can identify a woman’s risk of developing the disease.

Major Pullito told us about World Suicide Prevention Day and efforts by the military to stem the increase in suicides by returning service personnel. He told us about the resources available to active duty service members, members of the National Guard, and military families coping with invisible wounds. They are encouraging help-seeking behavior among members of the military and families through the “Wounded Warriors” campaign. He also talked about his brain injury and how it affected his mental health when he was discharged. They chronicled the changes in perception among the public and members of the military over the years toward these “hidden” wounds and the problems facing returning service personnel after deployment.

Mr. Jones explained how a social media training event was held to teach businesses how to better use Facebook, Twitter, and the web to increase traffic to their shops and businesses. In closing, Mr. Jones explained how the community’s reputation with potential visitors is affected by the positive coverage of media from all over the world attending and covering the convention.

The Recovery Act of Florida is an attempt to recover money from the BP oil spill disaster in the Gulf of Mexico. Ms. Lawson and Mr. Rota discussed how the environment and the reputation of the Gulf States were damaged by the actual spill as well as the coverage by the news media. The actual oil damage to the environment was chronicled with animal deaths, habitat destruction, and water pollution. Mr. Rota discussed the damage to Florida's reputation as a vacation destination by the perception visitors have gotten from the coverage of the events by the national news media. The economic recovery will entail not only cleaning up the residual effects of the spilled oil but restoring the faith in travelers that our food supply is safe. In closing, Mr. Rota discussed how the effects of the spill go beyond the areas where the oil actually showed up because visitors are not savvy as to exactly where the oil was.

Ms. Lawson discussed with Mr. Beckner, Mr. Thurman, and Mr. Cowart how they got involved with the "Save the Trail" movement to keep the historic Gandy Bridge in tact as a park and restoration facility. Mr. Beckner, Mr. Thurman, and Mr. Cowart elaborated on the economic studies done to compare the cost of destroying the old Gandy Bridge as opposed to the cost of making it safe as a county park and recreation facility. They discussed the use of the bridge as an additional evacuation route during a storm as well as the history of why, when, and how the bridge was originally put in place. Commissioner Beckner discussed his continued involvement with the push to return the bridge to use as a park and where the money would come from to do the needed repairs to make it safe for this use. In closing, he explained the results of a study on a similar project in Atlanta, Georgia and the positive economic advantage the park had on the city.

In closing, Mr. Marks discussed the downturn in the American economy and how people close to us can be in a desperate situation and think they have nowhere to turn.

This also improves the environment with cleaner emissions and savings for the local governmental economy.

Ms. Lawson discussed with Dr. Lennard the extensive ballot facing Hillsborough County voters including the presidential election, the many Constitutional Amendment proposals, the local sheriff's race, and school board positions. Dr. Lennard provided examples of where voters can go to learn what each part of the ballot means as well as the language and affects these decisions will have on the individual and the community. He also encouraged the listeners to be informed, responsible voters and warned of the consequences of not being informed about the issues on the ballot before entering the voting booth. Ms. Clark discussed the difference between the Pinellas ballot and Hillsborough's decisions. The unique issues facing Pinellas voters were examined and the challenges voters may encounter as they make their voice heard in Decision 2012 were discussed. Dr. Lennard and Ms. Clark provided websites and information about how the voting process works and different ways we have to cast ballots.

Host: Mimi Lawson. Guest: Chief Karen Davidson, Hillsborough County Fire Rescue. Ms. Lawson discussed with Ms. Davidson how the Florida Department of Emergency Medical Services recognized Hillsborough County Fire Rescue as the "EMS Provider of the Year" for its excellence in EMS Service. The program awards outstanding Florida EMS organizations and individuals who make a positive impact on the local community. The award is presented to providers for quality assurance/improvement, patient care, public access, and medical control. Ms. Davidson explained how the department is in the forefront in the nation in severe heart attack (STEMI), stroke, and triage treatment. Hillsborough Fire Rescue was additionally recognized with the 2011 Heart Safety Community Award for showing creative approaches to improving patient care in coronary care syndromes and sudden cardiac arrest. In closing, Ms. Davidson discussed how citizens should be prepared for any disaster, not just hurricanes that we frequently have here in Florida. Ms. Davidson provided websites to educate listeners on steps to take to be informed and ready to evacuate if we need to leave our homes in an emergency.

Sunday, August 12, 2012 – Sunday Morning 7:30 a.m.

Host: Mimi Lawson. Guest: Suzanne Parker, Program Director of the Guardian Ad Litem program in Hillsborough County.



The GAL Program is an agency that represents children in “the system” of the Department of Children and Families. Ms. Lawson and Ms. Parker discussed how these children desperately need the help of a person not involved in their cases to be an advocate for their rights and welfare. A Guardian Ad Litum is a volunteer who helps the child navigate the process of finding a safe home, getting the education advantages allowed by the State of Florida, and being a protector for the child’s best welfare. They also help the child with everyday emotional, physical, and mental needs that being displaced can throw at them. This is a volunteer position, but there is a lot of training involved to make sure they understand the legal system as well as the special needs of children whose lives have been disrupted in the process of being removed from their families. Ms. Parker explained how this kind of work is important in making sure these kids are represented well and that there is someone specifically designated to watch out for them as they make their way through the system. In closing, Ms. Parker explained that without the GAL program the public welfare system is overwhelmed with the DCF’s caseload and the attorneys who deal with the foster care system.

### Sunday, August 19, 2012 – Sunday Morning 7:30 a.m.

Ms. Lawson discussed with Mr. Lamarre the rules and safety guidelines for surviving storms and lightning strikes. He discussed La Nina/El Nino weather patterns and how they affect the weather here in Florida in relationship to hurricanes and other storms. Mr. Lamarre also discussed how Tampa Bay is the lightning capital of the country and the number of people struck by lightning every year here. He shared specific safety information on how to avoid being struck by lightning and what to do if someone around you gets hit. In closing, Mr. Lamarre discussed the myths about giving aid to lightning strike victims and what steps should be taken to save lives in the event of a strike.

### Sunday, August 26, 2012 – Sunday Morning 7:30 a.m.

Ms. Lawson and Chief Castor discussed the plans Tampa had for security and crowd control for the Republican National Convention in Downtown Tampa. Chief Castor discussed the grants received to train, house, and retain more than 3,500 police officers for the week’s activities. She discussed the different protests and groups planning to voice their opinions on the Republican platform and how police will deal with threats posed to officers and the public. Chief Castor explained how Tampa had brought in special trainers to address the known as well as unknown threats and how they have learned from other cities some special considerations when it comes to crowd control. The Police Department will use bicycles and horses in addition to traditional means to control issues that could arise from unruly protesters and to get to the areas of need faster and with more direct interaction. In closing, Chief Castor also discussed Tampa’s water and river system and how having Central Command and MacDill in our area adds special challenges to security.

Mr. Greene and Mr. Iovino discussed the steps individuals and families should make during hurricane season which lasts until the first of November. They also talked about lessons learned during Tropical Storm Debby and Tropical Storm Issac.

Host: Mimi Lawson. Guest: Laurel Lynch, the Director of the Hope Center for domestic violence in Manatee County.

Ms. Lawson discussed with Ms. Lynch the recent report that identifies Florida as one of the top states for incidents of “Partner Violence”. Not only is physical abuse considered an issue but also verbal, emotional, and financial control. Ms. Lynch chronicled the ways domestic partners use these methods to maintain control and manipulate their spouses. She discussed the services HOPE provides to keep families safe as well as how we can stop the violence and ways to cope with the financial, child care, and personal safety issues when our own safety is threatened. Ms. Lynch explained what kinds of behavior are considered “risky” and what steps women can take to insure the safety of themselves and their children. In closing, she discussed how the HOPE Center and other “safe houses” operate and the many ways the system helps women identify the issues they face when considering leaving an abusive relationship.
