Eating a diet of french fries, Pringles and white bread was enough to make one teenage boy lose his sight, according to a case study published in a medical journal. Scientists from the University of Bristol examined the case of a young patient whose extremely picky eating led to blindness, and have warned of the dangers of a poor diet. The unidentified patient told doctors he had only eaten fries from the fish and chip shop, Pringles potato chips, white bread, slices of processed ham and sausage since elementary school, and he avoided foods with certain textures. He first visited a doctor at age 14, complaining of tiredness, according to a case report published in the Annals of Internal Medicine on Monday. He wasn't taking any medication, had a normal BMI and height, and showed no visible signs of malnutrition.

Airports were flooded and roads impassable after the most powerful storm to hit the Bahamas in recorded history parked over Abaco and Grand Bahama islands, pounding them with winds up to 185 mph (295 kph) and torrential rain before finally moving into open waters Tuesday on a course toward Florida. People on the U.S. coast made final preparations for a storm with winds at a still-dangerous 110 mph (175 kph), making it a Category 2 storm.

If confirmed, it would be the second such death reported in the country. An Illinois resident died last month after developing the lung disease linked to using e-cigarettes. The Oregon Health Authority reports the individual had used a vaping device purchased from a cannabis dispensary before becoming ill. The death occurred in July. The person had developed similar symptoms to the 330 other people nationwide with confirmed or suspected cases of life-threatening vaping-related lung diseases. Doctors say patients report vaping either nicotine or THC, the high-inducing ingredient of marijuana, and then progressively getting sicker before arriving at the hospital coughing and with trouble breathing and chest pain.</p>

Officials said Thursday they found extremely high levels of Vitamin E Acetate in nearly all the cannabis-containing vaping products that were analyzed. And at least one vape product containing the chemical has been linked to each person who got sick and submitted a product for testing in the state. Vitamin E Acetate is commonly available as a nutritional supplement. The health officials said it's not known to cause harm when ingested as a vitamin supplement or applied to the skin. But they're investigating its health effects when inhaled -- because its oil-like properties could be associated with the symptoms seen in lung illnesses.</p>

The job gains were lifted by the temporary hiring of 25,000 government workers for the 2020 Census. Excluding all government hiring, businesses added 96,000 jobs, the fewest since May. The Labor Department says the unemployment rate remained 3.7%, near the lowest level in five decades, for the third straight month. The rate was flat for a positive reason: Americans surged into the workforce, lifting the proportion of adults working or looking for work to its highest level since February.</p>

The program -- which allows borrowers who work in the public sector, like teachers and social workers -- to apply for debt cancellation after making 10 years' worth of payments, was signed into law by President George W. Bush in 2007. But the first time anyone would have made enough payments to qualify was the fall of 2017, under the Trump administration.

The Trump administration announced on July 16 a change that denies asylum in the United States to those who pass through other countries without seeking asylum there.

Federal health officials slammed vaping company Juul on Monday for illegally advertising its nicotine pods as a safer alternative to cigarettes, threatening to fine or even seize the company's products if it doesn't correct its marketing. The Food and Drug Administration sent a warning letter to CEO Kevin Burns after reviewing testimony from two days of hearings on Juul in the U.S. House in July. FDA investigators found the company broke the law "by selling or distributing them as modified risk tobacco products without an FDA order in effect that permits such sale or distribution."

Three or more naps a week had no health benefits. There's new evidence that daytime naps may be linked to a lower risk of heart attack or stroke, but only if they're limited to a few times a week. The research, published Monday in the Journal Heart, is based on data collected from nearly 3,500 people living in Switzerland. The frequency of napping varied. More than half (58 percent) said they never took a daytime siesta, while about one in 10 said they nodded off almost daily. About one in five participants hit what the researchers found to be napping sweet spot: one to two times per week. It was that occasional nap frequency that was linked to a 48 percent lowered risk for heart attack, stroke or heart failure.</p>

The Supreme Court is allowing nationwide enforcement of a new Trump administration rule that prevents most Central American immigrants from seeking asylum in the United States. The justices' order late Wednesday temporarily undoes a lower-court ruling that had blocked the new asylum policy in some states along the southern border. The policy is meant to deny asylum to anyone who passes through another country on the way to the U.S. without seeking protection there. Most people crossing the southern border are Central Americans fleeing violence and poverty. They are largely ineligible under the new rule, as are asylum seekers from Africa, Asia and South America who arrive regularly at the southern border. The shift reverses decades of U.S. policy. The administration has said that it wants to close the gap between an initial asylum screening that most people pass and a final decision on asylum that most people do not win.</p>

HEALTH: STUDY DAYTIME NAPS					Daytime naps once or twice a week may be linked to a healthy heart, researchers say. A new study has found that a daytime nap taken once or twice a week could lower the risk of heart attacks or strokes. Researchers from the University Hospital of Lausanne, Switzerland studied the association between napping frequency and duration and the risk of fatal and non-fatal cardiovascular disease complications. Tracking 3,462 people between the ages of 35 and 75 for just over five years, the report authors found that those who indulged in occasional napping -- once or twice a week, for between five minutes to an hour -- were 48% less likely to suffer a heart attack, stroke or heart failure than those who did not nap at all.

The administration’s move comes as health officials across the country investigated more than 450 cases, including six deaths, of lung disease linked to vaping. Many patients have reported using cannabis-related products, but authorities have not ruled out any specific type of vaping. With the picture still murky, critics have seized the moment to press for tougher regulation of conventional e-cigarettes, which come in sweet and fruity flavors that have been favored by many young people.

UAW Vice President Terry Dittes says a strike is the union's last resort because both sides are far apart in bargaining over a new four-year contract, including on issues like health care and fair wages. But GM says it has made substantial offers, including higher wages and \$7 billion worth of factory investments that would create hundreds of new jobs. Bargaining was scheduled to resume at 10 a.m. EDT on Monday.

Cuomo announced the executive action Sunday, citing state health officials' efforts to curb the increasing number of young people using vape products. He also accused e-cigarette makers of marketing flavors that are intended to get children addicted to nicotine.

The proportion of Americans without health insurance grew significantly last year for the first time this decade, even as the economy's strength pushed down the poverty level to its lowest point since 2001, according to federal data released Tuesday. The finding that 27.5 million U.S. residents lacked coverage in 2018, based on a large U.S. Census Bureau survey, reverses the trend that began when the Affordable Care Act expanded opportunities for poor and some middle-income people to get insurance.

Experts say recent attacks on oil fields in Saudi Arabia will lead to consumers paying more at the pump. Oil prices rose above 60 Dollars a barrel following the attacks, but Americans aren't expected to be heavily impacted. Head of petroleum analysis at gasbuddy estimates a hike from 10 to 25 Cents a gallon during the next few weeks. According to AAA, the average price for a gallon of gas nationwide is 2 dollars and 56 cents, down nearly 8 cents from a month ago. The US has become less dependent on Saudi Arabian oil. In the first half of this year, the US imported fewer than half the amount of barrels each day from Saudi Arabia than it did two years ago.

The study, published Monday in the medical journal JAMA Internal Medicine, notes the World Health Organization recognizes forced sexual initiation -- "an unwanted first sexual intercourse that is physically forced or coerced" as a distinct form of sexual violence. The study says that 6.5% of women surveyed had an unwanted first sexual intercourse that was forced or coerced and it "appears to be common." Researchers estimated that 1 in 16 US women.</p>

The researchers concluded that the benefits of aspirin outweigh the harms of bleeding, if you compared the risk of death from one bleeding event compared to the risk of hospitalization or death from a cardiac event. At least 12.1% of men and 2.5% of women without a history of heart problems got a net benefit from five years of aspirin treatment, the study found. The percent benefit increased even more if you compared the risk for two bleeding events to two cardiovascular events.</p>

New York becomes the first state to enact the ban. Michigan approved a ban but rules have not yet been put into place.
