DEMOCRACY AND BLACK WOMEN

"WMBR's Nightly News" aired excerpts, from a panel discussion, about the new book, "Wake Up America: Black Women and the Future of Democracy," which took place on Feb. 29 at the Museum of African American History in Boston, featuring the book's editor, Dr. Keisha Blain. She was joined by two Boston-based contributors, Kim Janey, Renée Graham, and moderated by Zenzile Riddick, a graduate student at Harvard. Janey discussed her experiences as former Boston mayor, and Graham talked about her time as a writer for the Boston Globe. The panel discussed the role of Black women as advocates for democracy and justice throughout society.

They discussed ways in which women have been circumscribed, in their freedom, to make decisions about basic aspects of their lives.

The discussion was about social movements and efforts to construct effective intersectionality. He argues for an understanding of class in terms of power rather than income, and the necessity of crafting movements to shift power while recognizing the divergences among various communities. impact.

He noted the role he played in the response to the trauma of the mass shooting of Dallas Police in 2016. Finally, he talked about the effect of gerrymandering on Texas Congressional districts.

Wade, battles over public health and reproductive justice (including involuntary sterilization) and where the battle for women's and human rights is heading since the overturning of Roe.
