48 HOURS MYSTERY: LIVE TO TELL: "Kidnap on Highway 1" - In November 2007, Chris and Debra Hall, and their children, Tyler and Divinia, were driving back to California from Mexico, when they were pulled over a few miles from the U.S. border by what they thought were police. A man in a military uniform approached and suddenly put a gun to Chris' head. Moments later the family was ambushed by a second car of gunmen. As the kidnappers drove them onto a dirt road in the mountains outside Tijuana, they began asking about a race car. While in Mexico, Chris and Tyler worked as part of a pit crew at the Baja 1000. When Chris explained that there was no race car, the men ransacked the family's trailer and then took them farther into the mountains. The gunmen put the family in a ditch and threw sleeping bags over them. As the Hall family lay hugging in the ditch, the men drove away. Ultimately the Halls crawled through the brush in the night to a house where a woman took them in and called police for help. Despite her assurances that they could trust these officers, the family could not help but fear they were in danger all over again. The authorities rushed them to the border. For the moment they were safe, but with the gunmen in possession of their drivers' licenses and their address, they will carry the memory of that traumatic night with them. Mexican authorities never investigated the kidnapping, and the Halls still don't know who their assailants were. Drug gangs in Mexico are known to wear police uniforms as a way to trap their victims. In December 1991, four teenage girls were found murdered in an Austin, Texas yogurt shop. The girls had been tied up, stripped down, at least one was raped, shot in the head and their naked bodies were stacked in a corner then set on fire. In the weeks after the murders, authorities received countless tips, many false confessions and even interrogated teenagers Maurice Pierce, Michael Scott, Robert Springsteen and Forrest Welborn. With no solid evidence, they were released. There were no developments in the investigation until 1999, when new detectives assigned to the case made the announcement that they had made four arrests: the same four suspects, whom police had interrogated to eight years earlier. The charges against Welborn and Pierce were dropped. Scott and Springsteen each stood trial for murder. Both were convicted, with Springsteen sentenced to death and Scott sentenced to life in prison. On appeal, the convictions were overturned when DNA evidence did not match any of the suspects. It was from an unknown male. The Travis County District Attorney, Rosemary Lehmberg, says there is no statute of limitations for murder, and they will continue the investigation until the person(s) responsible for these murders are brought to justice. For now Scott and Springsteen are free; and the girls' families are still dealing with the deaths of their daughters. 48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Buried Secrets of Las Vegas" - a report on the death of gaming tycoon Ted Binion, who was found dead in his Las Vegas home more than a decade ago. The son of legendary gambling impresario Benny Binion, Ted was a brilliant casino operator himself. Paranoid about his wealth, he stashed millions of dollars worth of silver in a hidden vault in Pahrump, Nevada. Ted was also addicted to smoking heroin. Prior to his death, he became involved with Sandy Murphy, and it was she who told police in September 1998 that she had found him dead of an apparent drug overdose. However Binion's sister, Becky Binion Behnen, insisted to police that this was no drug overdose and demanded an investigation. Police discovered that Sandy was having an affair with Rick Tabish, and theorized that they were trying to steal Ted's buried treasure. Both were charged with his murder and both were found guilty of murder in the first degree. While imprisoned, Sandy contacted Alan Dershowitz, who agreed to take on her appeal. The Nevada Supreme Court agreed with Dershowitz's arguments and overturned both convictions. After the second trial, both Murphy and Tabish were found not guilty of murder, but were found guilty of stealing Binion's buried silver from the Pahrump vault. Many believe that much of Binion's money is still missing. 48 HOURS retained ground sonar experts to search the Binion estate, which had remained empty since his death; nothing was found. Tabish remains in prison because of a prior record; Murphy returned to California where she married an art dealer. Tabish's latest bid for parole is under consideration. Murphy is suing the state of Nevada, alleging false imprisonment and malicious prosecution. 48 HOURS MYSTERY: "The Secret" - a report on the March 2007 disappearance of 911 operator Theresa Parker of LaFayette, Georgia. Theresa had recently separated from police officer husband Sam Parker, whom she had married in 1993. One night, after visiting her sister Christina Hall, Theresa vanished. Police found her car at Theresa and Sam's house, but there was no sign of her and no obvious signs of foul play. Police investigation revealed that Sam was an abusive husband with a drinking problem. When investigators found vacuum marks, Theresa's blood and Sam Parker's DNA in the back of Theresa's SUV, he was arrested and charged with his wife's murder. Prosecutors believed that Sam had murdered Theresa, drove off and disposed of her body. Parker insisted he had not killed his wife and suspected that she had run off to Mexico. The jurors said the task of deciding Sam Parker's fate was particularly daunting because they had an overwhelming amount of circumstantial evidence, but not much else. After three days of deliberation, the jurors seemed hopelessly deadlocked. The judge urged them to give it one more try. After a closer look at cell phone records, the jury found him guilty of first-degree murder. He was immediately sentenced to life in prison. Theresa's family believes that Parker may be the only one who holds the key to finding Theresa's body, but he still insists that he did not kill her and does not know where she is. "Thou Shalt Not Kill" - a report on the November 1994 murder of Farah Fratta, whose body was discovered in the garage of her Humble, Texas home. She had been shot twice in the head. At the time of her death, Farah was in the midst of a divorce. To the outside world, her husband Bob Fratta was an upstanding citizen, who worked in public safety as both a police officer and a fireman. But divorce documents were about to make his dark side public, revealing his strange sexual requests that not only embarrassed Farah, but also sickened her. Bob Fratta seemed the likeliest suspect in his wife's murder, but he had a seemingly airtight alibi: he was at church with their three children as his wife was being murdered. Investigators worked to build their case against Fratta, and four months later they got an unexpected break. Tracing his phone records from the night of his wife's murder led them to a mysterious woman, Mary Gipp, who claimed that she could have prevented Farah's murder. She knew that her boyfriend had been hired by Fratta to kill his wife. Informed by police that she would be charged with murder, she made a deal and was given immunity for her testimony. Her boyfriend, Joe Prystash, had been hired by Fratta to arrange the murder and Prystash had hired Howard Guidry to be the trigger man. Guidry and Prystash were arrested and confessed. Fratta was arrested and charged with murdering his wife. After the trial, it took less than one hour to convict him. He was sentenced to death, along with Prystash and Guidry. Thirteen years after the murder, a federal judge threw out Fratta's conviction and ordered a new trial because the judge said there was testimony linking Fratta to the murder that should never have been admitted. At the new trial, after two days of jury deliberation, Fratta was found guilty of capital murder. The jury decided to send Fratta back to death row. He now plans to appeal his conviction. 48 HOURS MYSTERY: "A Time To Kill" - A report on the September 12, 2001 disappearance of Michele Harris. a resident of Tioga County, New York. Michele, a mother of four, was involved in a bitter divorce with her husband. Cal Harris. He claimed she did not return home on the evening of September 11, 2001; her empty van was discovered at the end of their driveway the next morning. Cal denied any involvement and when no evidence was found during a search of the Harris home, he suggested to investigators that they take a closer look at Michele's personal life. Investigators uncovered that Michele was involved with two different men, both of whom had seen Michele the night she disappeared. Two days after the initial search, a forensic specialist was sent to the Harris home and found tiny specks of blood on a kitchen doorway, something that had been overlooked during the initial investigation. With the discovery of a possible crime scene, as well as Cal's refusal to take a polygraph, focus was placed on Cal, who began a relationship with a former girlfriend just eighteen days after Michele's disappearance. On September 30, 2005, Cal Harris was arrested and charged with murder. The trial began on May 21, 2007 and ultimately, he was found guilty of second degree murder. Just days before Cal Harris was to be sentenced, a new witness came forward and claimed to have driven past the Harris driveway around dawn on September 12, 2001 and had seen a man and a woman, who appeared to be arguing. According to this new eyewitness, the woman resembled Michele, but the man did not look like Cal. With this new information, the judge threw out Cal's conviction for the murder of his wife and ordered a new trial. It will be at least a year before Cal Harris is tried again. Update for this second rebroadcast: In July of 2009, Cal Harris once again went on trial. After a three-week trial, the jury found him guilty again. Harris was sentenced to twenty-five years to life in prison. He plans to appeal for a third trial. The search for Michele's body continues. (C: Erin Moriarty - P: Lisa Freed, Marc B. After an afternoon of errands with Evan, David returned home to what appeared to be forced entry and found Belinda in the couple's bedroom closet, shot in the head. Homicide detectives believed that the crime scene had been staged -- nothing was stolen from the home and the way the pieces of glass fell from the broken back door of the Temple's home seemed unusual, as if the glass was broken with the door already opened. Detectives were also troubled when they learned that David was having an affair with a fellow teacher, Heather Scott, who eventually became his second wife. Three months after the crime, a grand jury was convened, but nobody was indicted. With no DNA evidence, no eyewitnesses, no murder weapon, and no incriminating fingerprints linking David Temple to the crime, years passed until 2004, when Scott Peterson was convicted of killing his pregnant wife in a trial that captured the nation's attention. The similarities in both murders gave authorities a renewed confidence in their circumstantial case against David. Prosecutor Kelly Siegler finally got some forensic evidence, when after years of laboratory snafus and delays, a critical FBI report came back and indicated traces of gunshot residue on David's jacket. On November 29th, 2004, David was arrested for the murder of his wife, Belinda. After a contentious trial with David's attorney, Dick DeGuerin, David was found guilty and sentenced to life in prison. He will be eligible for parole in 2037, when he will be 69 years old. David Temple has appealed his conviction. He is waiting for the decision. 48 HOURS MYSTERY: "A Cry for Innocence" - A report on Damien Echols, who has been on death row in Arkansas for the past 16 years, convicted of murdering three eight-year-old boys: Stevie Branch, Chris Byers and Michael Moore. At the time, amidst a country-wide media-fueled hysteria about Satanic cults, Damien, because of his affinity for long hair and dressing in black became a prime suspect, along with friends Jason Baldwin and Jesse Misskelley. The trio, known as the West Memphis Three, were convicted of triple-murder: Misskelley and Baldwin sentenced to life in prison, while Damien Echols received the death penalty. The police had no evidence linking Echols to the crime until Misskelley, whose lawyer says he has the mental capabilities of a five-year-old and barely knew Echols, confessed to helping him and Jason Baldwin commit the murders -- although many of the facts he recounted about the crime were incorrect. Misskelley was tried first, convicted and sentenced. Echols and Baldwin went on trial together: Misskelley refused to testify against them, and by law his confession could not be used against them. Still, they were convicted. As word of this case spread, so did the outrage over what many believed was a grave injustice. Members of the entertainment community, including actor Johnny Depp and musicians Natalie Maines and Eddie Vedder, came to their support. An HBO documentary, "Paradise Lost", and a book by Mara Leveritt entitled "Devil's Knot", detailed flaws in the case and now, forensic scientists have challenged the causes of the wounds inflicted on the victims, and sworn affidavits have revealed possible jury misconduct and new DNA evidence points away from the three convicted men and towards someone unexpected -- Terry Hobbs, Steve Branch's step-father at the time of the murders. As Echols prepares to take his case to federal court, he has some unexpected support from the parents of two of the victims: Mark Byers and Pam Branch, who now agree that justice has not been served. His trial began on July 13, 2009. The District Attorney stated that Roseboro's obsession with Angela Funk was his motive for killing his wife. He was found guilty and sentenced to life in prison. Police questioned Lawless' boyfriend, Leon Lamb, but could find nothing to tie him to the crime, and he passed a polygraph. Four months into the investigation, investigators got a break: 17-year-old Joshua Kezer had been held briefly in the county jail on assault charges, where, according to several inmates, he confessed to killing Lawless. Then Mark Abbott identified Kezer from a photo lineup as the driver of the white car he had seen near the crime scene. Police then charged Kezer with first-degree murder. During the trial, a young woman, Chantelle Crider, identified Kezer as having been at a party where he had words with Mischelle. However, no DNA. fingerprints or murder weapon linked Kezer to the scene. Nevertheless, Kezer was convicted and sentenced to 60 years in prison. The case haunted Rick Walter and in 2005, now sheriff, he re-opened the case. Soon the foundation on which Kezer's conviction was built began to crumble, as witnesses admitted to lying and evidence was questioned. Judge Richard Callahan agreed to review the case and was so disturbed by what he saw that instead of ordering a new trial, he declared Josh Kezer an innocent man. But someone killed Mischelle and high on the list of suspects is that local man, Mark Abbott, who was once a star witness for the prosecution. In fact, there are two Abbotts, Mark and his identical twin Matt. To this day, Walters is not sure which Abbott brother came in to report finding Mischelle, and two people in the office say that it was his brother Matt. Leon Lamb also remains a suspect. With the help of forensics experts at a "crime farm" in the Netherlands, who have examined DNA evidence. Walters hopes further investigation will allow him to bring the case to a grand jury. Using her cell phone records, police began carefully looking at all of her clients and eventually honed in on one man, Lester Ralph Jones, an ex-con who had served time for kidnapping and assault. Authorities searched his home, but will not discuss what evidence they uncovered. Search dogs led investigators from Paige's car to an RV shop where Jones worked as a mechanic. Although authorities have zeroed in on Lester Ralph Jones, no charges have been filed and he denies any involvement. The lack of a body, coupled with Paige's secret life, have made it that much harder to prove anything beyond a reasonable doubt. Her friends and family continue their search. Jennifer, a 39-year-old divorced single parent, was a successful bond trader, who provided Noura with a generous lifestyle. Due to the brutality of her murder, police initially considered a possible link between Jennifer's death and the unsolved shooting death of her estranged husband, Nazmi Hassanieh, seventeen months prior; they also focused on Jennifer's ex-boyfriend, Mark Irvin, a minister, who had an alibi. Although there was a lack of physical evidence at the crime scene, Noura's conflicting accounts of her activities in the hours before she called 911, a gap in her cell phone usage, and an early morning trip to Walgreen's to purchase first aid supplies for a cut on her hand, caused police to focus on her as a suspect. While none of the DNA at the crime scene matched Noura's, she was eventually charged with her mother's murder. Four years later, at her trial, prosecutors alleged that the seemingly good relationship between mother and daughter was strained due to Jennifer's criticism of Noura's hard-partying lifestyle and charged that this was the motive for the crime. The jury found Noura guilty of seconddegree murder -- she still maintains her innocence. Onscreen graphics: Noura Jackson was sentenced to 20 years in prison. In January 2007, Cynthia Sommer was convicted of murdering her Marine Sgt. husband Todd in February 2002 with a lethal dose of arsenic. But ten months after her conviction, she was granted a new trial because of questions about the validity of the lab tests that found arsenic in some of Todd Sommer's tissue samples but not in others. His tissue samples were now sent to another lab to be tested for arsenic -- and none was found. Because of this, the prosecution concluded that there was a reasonable doubt; murder charges against Cynthia Sommer were dropped, and the case was dismissed. However, Todd Sommer's death is still officially listed as a homicide, and the court left open the possibility that Cynthia Sommer could be charged again. His victims included 19-year-old Kaysi McLeod, a recovering drug user, who left home in August 2003 after a confrontation with her mother, Lori. When Kaysi didn't show up for work two days later, and police wouldn't allow a missing persons report to be filed (Kaysi was over eighteen and there was no evidence of foul play), Lori turned to her boyfriend and eventual husband, Scott Kimball, who claimed to work for the FBI. Kaysi never was found. Seven months before Kaysi disappeared, Howard Emry's 24-year-old daughter, LeAnn, had also vanished. LeAnn had been in a relationship with an inmate named Steven Holley. Jennifer Marcum, too, vanished shortly after visiting her prison boyfriend, Steve Ennis. Family members of both women also went to authorities, but leads in the investigation went nowhere. Then an FBI agent contacted Jennifer's family and told them that Jennifer had been killed by her boyfriend's drug associates. This information came from the agent's informant, Hannibal, a.k.a. Scott Kimball. In the fall of 2006, Rob McLeod, Kaysi's father, learned of Jennifer Marcum's disappearance through a newspaper article. Both Rob McLeod and Bob Marcum learned of a connection to Scott Kimball. Together, both fathers went to the FBI and revealed their suspicions. After a lengthy investigation, it was determined that Kimball was responsible for the deaths of the three women and that of his uncle, Terry Kimball, who had visited Kimball and mysteriously disappeared. In 2008, a skull was recovered by the FBI from a national forest, where it had been held for months after its discovery by a hunter during the winter. DNA analysis identified it as the skull of Kaysi McLeod. With Kimball sentenced to 48 years for his recent non-violent crimes, prosecutors wanted him to be convicted for his murders, so a deal was offered -- no charges of first-degree murder -- if he would lead authorities to the remaining bodies of his victims. The bodies of LeAnn Emry and his Uncle Terry were recovered: Jennifer Marcum's body has never been found. In October 2009, Kimball pleaded guilty to all of the murders and was sentenced to seventy years. Tondia Colvin. Kirk and Jennifer still maintained a lucrative horse farm, but Jennifer had filed for divorce and also brought an alienation of affection suit against Tondia. Their separation also divided the family: daughter Wendy sided with her mother and son Richie chose to live with his father. Jennifer refused Kirk's requests to drop the lawsuit against Tondja and the separation soon became acrimonious. Jennifer feared for her life. On the night of September 12th. Greg Smithson, a family friend who had also done work at the horse farm, asked Jennifer if he could pick up some equipment and bring Kirk along to help. Jennifer agreed. All three of them went to a shed on the property to load equipment. When the conversation between Jennifer and Kirk became personal, Greg excused himself. Soon after. Greg heard screams from the shed. He found Kirk stabbed in the leg by a seven-foot-long decorative spear and Jennifer motionless on the floor. 911 instructed Greg to perform CPR on Jennifer, but she died, having been nearly decapitated. Prosecutors believed that Kirk intended to kill Jennifer and staged the spear attack. Kirk claimed that Jennifer became enraged when he presented an affidavit from her ex-husband, claiming that her first marriage nearly twenty-five years earlier had failed because of her obsessive love of horses and alleging that she had been unfaithful --- and used his pocket knife to defend himself only after she attacked. He was put on trial for first degree murder, with Smithson's testimony playing a key role for both sides. Prosecutors rebuked his testimony and doubted that he had performed CPR on Jennifer. After testimony from a forensic scientist and Kirk himself, the jury found Kirk Turner not guilty by reason of self defense. Wendy still maintains her father's guilt. Onscreen text graphic: Jennifer's sister filed a wrongful death lawsuit against Kirk Turner, which was settled out of court. Wendy and Richie are the beneficiaries. 48 HOURS MYSTERY - "Shelley's Last Breath" - an investigation into the 1999 scuba diving death of Shelley Tyre while on vacation on the Caribbean isle of Tortola. Police questioned her husband and dive partner David Swain about every detail of the dive; autopsy results were inconclusive. Shelley, a school principal who, in the early 1990s, had met and married David Swain, a divorced father of two, who ran a dive shop, was an adventurous woman who couldn't care less about money. Her parents insisted on a pre-nuptial agreement and David Swain agreed he would receive no money if they divorced. With her death, he collected more than \$600,000 from her estate. What her parents could not understand was Swain's lack of emotion regarding Shelley's death. He explained that he didn't know had happened to Shelley during the dive. Although divers are supposed to swim in pairs, she was diving alone - he had gone elsewhere in the water. One year after her death, her parents hired an attorney and sent him and his team of experts to Tortola to investigate. After several months, they uncovered evidence which they believed proved David Swain was lying. 48 HOURS hired an underwater forensic expert to examine the evidence; he also concluded that it was much more than a diving accident. Her parents believed that Shelley's decision to change jobs and take a substantial pay cut may have been the motive for murder. In 2006, they sued David Swain in civil court for wrongful death and won. Armed with this, the Tyres persuaded the authorities in Tortola to re-open the case; island prosecutors charged Swain with the murder of his wife. Ten years after Shelley's death and after two years in a Tortola prison, the trial began. Certain information about David Swain became public during the trial - his father had been convicted of sexual abuse and sent to prison. His mother was bludgeoned to death by his brother, Richard. This information, along with testimony from his children and ex-wife was used to explain his behavior. In the end, David Swain was found guilty of murder and sentenced to life in prison. 48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Betting Her Life" - a followup to 'Right or Wrong" (OAD: 04/24/04, updated 01/01/08) - the story of Susan Wright, a 27-year-old stay-at-home mother from Houston, Texas who stabbed her husband, Jeff. 193 times. She claims she was a victim of domestic abuse and that on January 13, 2003, her husband attacked her with a knife and she fought back in self-defense. Prosecutors charged that she was a cold blooded killer who lured her husband to bed with the promise of sex, tied him up and then brutally murdered him. A jury found Susan Wright guilty of murder and sentenced her to 25 years in prison. Six years have passed and now, attorney Brian Wice has taken on her case, believing Susan Wright deserves a new sentencing hearing, because, he argues, prosecutor Kelly Siegler chose to inflame rather than inform the jury, and that Wright's original lawyers should have called more witnesses, including experts on battered women. He also has a new witness - Misty McMichael, ex-wife of former NFL star Steve McMichael, and who herself, was once engaged to Jeff Wright. Though she and Susan have never met, her story is very similar: both were topless dancers, she says she was abused by Jeff Wright, but she filed a police report and left him. Misty McMichael testifies and is a difficult witness on the stand but Judge Wallace orders a new sentencing hearing. This is not to determine Susan's guilt, but to see if she might be given a sentence other than the 25 years she is now serving. The hearing is expected to be held in the fall of 2010. 48 HOURS MYSTERY - "Deep Secret" (9:00-10:00p) - On June 21, 1977, eighteen-year-old Jeffrey Klee of Coral Springs, Florida, went out drinking with his best friend, David Cusanelli -- and never returned home. When police questioned Cusanelli, he told them that Jeff had dropped him off and then had headed home himself that night. Eventually investigators assumed that Jeff had run away. Thirty years passed. Then, in 2008, Klee's van was discovered in a Coral Springs canal which was being dredged for stolen vehicles. It contained Klee's skeletal remains and some personal possessions. Just two weeks prior to this discovery, Danna Holmes, a Coral Springs resident, told police that, in the year 2000, an inebriated man in a Coral Springs bar told her that he had accidentally killed his best friend. When she was shown a photo lineup to identify that man, she picked out David Cusanelli, Police interrogation of Cusanelli and his brother Carl eventually elicited the admission that David Cusanelli had gotten into a fight with Klee over Ginny Healy Spence, and that Klee had sustained an accidental injury to his head and died -- after which the Cusanellis pushed the van, containing Klee's body, into the canal. Because there is no evidence to suggest homicide, no charges were made against the Cusanellis. Also, according to 1977 Florida law, there was then a three year statute of limitations for manslaughter charges. The Klees cannot even sue in civil court for wrongful death -- the statute of limitations has also run out on that. The Florida legislature recently defeated a proposal to eliminate the statute of limitations in wrongful death cases. Onscreen graphic update: Last week Florida enacted the Jeffrey Klee Memorial Act, a law eliminating the statute of limitations for wrongful death claims. The Klee family cannot sue anyone for wrongful death because the new law is not retroactive. Police pursued a robbery motive, even though the only things missing were her car and her marriage certificate. For more than two decades, her father, Nels Rasmussen, has been on a frustrating quest to find out the truth about his daughter's murder. Believing that Sherri's husband, John Ruetten, was not involved, he says he has tried many times to get the police to focus on John's ex-girlfriend Stephanie Lazarus. Sherri had told her family that Stephanie was still obsessed with John and believed that Sherri had stolen John away from her, Recently, the LAPD cold case squad quietly re-opened the case. A piece of evidence -- a saliva sample taken from a bite mark on Sherri's arm -- was sent to a DNA lab. The results indicated that it belonged to a woman, and led police to suspect one of their own: Stephanie Lazarus. Finally Nels Rasmussen felt that police where listening to him. Detectives trailed Stephanie Lazarus to obtain a DNA sample and the results were stunning; the DNA from Sherri's bite mark and that of Stephanie Lazarus matched. In a covert operation, a team planned her arrest and in June 2009, Lazarus was charged with first-degree murder. Her trial is expect to begin shortly. When police were called to White's lakeside mansion, they found his body, which had been brutally beaten. with an extension cord wrapped around his neck several times. By first impression, White was a very likeable person, but as police investigated his murder, a darker image of White emerged -- one of a cruel man with a dangerous mean streak sharpened by arrogance, alcohol, and women. With an unbridled passion for the fairer sex, White bedded and rated the sexual prowess of over a thousand women, including strippers, prostitutes, and even the girlfriends of his own son Darin, who Charlie used to pick up women to fulfill his needs. As the murder investigation unfolded, police focused on the troubled relationship between father and son and soon settled on Darin as the main suspect. When Darin voluntarily came in for questioning, he admitted to being with Charlie the night he died. Darin claimed that after a trip to Wal-Mart, they returned home, where he and his father got into an argument that turned dangerously violent -- Darin believed that his father was going to kill him. After Darin beat and choked his father, he went upstairs to bed and the next morning, drove to his mother's house in New Mexico. But the Texas Rangers didn't buy Darin's story and found no evidence to show that 73-year-old Charlie put up a fight at all. Arrested for his father's murder, prosecutors maintained that it was a case of premeditated murder. But Darin's attorney, Eddie Shell, maintained that it was a misdemeanor murder and a crime of sudden passion, which carries a much lighter sentence. Shell believed that Darin exploded and killed his father in a fit of rage -- one that was brought on by years of torment and physical abuse. In the end, the jury sentenced Darin White to twenty years confinement in the Texas Department of Criminal Justice Institutional Division for the murder of his father, Charlie White. There, according to Doug, Faylene thought she had a vision of Jesus in the clouds and fell off a cliff while trying to get a better look. She survived, but three days later was found drowned in her bathtub, her blood full of the muscle relaxants and sleeping medication (Ambien) that had been prescribed after her fall. As a precaution against Faylene taking both drugs together, the physician's assistant had told Doug not to fill the Ambien prescription without calling him first -- but Doug had done so anyway. In the journal that Faylene had kept, she seemed to suggest that it was God's will that she die "to fulfill a mission on the other side of the veil." And, in letters to Hilary Dewitt, Faylene had written that she wanted Hilary to marry Doug after she died -- which he did, just weeks after Faylene's death. Although Faylene's death was initially ruled an accident, pressure from her family made the police eventually take a closer look at Doug Grant. He had never called 911 upon discovering Faylene in the tub. Because of this, and because of incriminating information provided by Jim McElyea, an old friend of Doug, police arrested Doug in the summer of 2005 for the murder of his wife, Faylene. In mid-November 2008, his trial began; in March 2009, he was convicted of manslaughter. Concluding onscreen graphics: Jenna is suing Doug Grant for the wrongful death of her mother. Police investigation also revealed the involvement of Deleon's wife, Jennifer, in the murder plot. Deleon was found guilty of murder and sentenced to death. Machain, who made a full confession, has not been tried; he's hoping for leniency. Friends and family claim that he was not suicidal and would never have killed himself. De la Plaza's father, Francois, a French citizen, hired an independent private investigator, John Murphy, and was also able to call in French authorities to conduct their own investigation. Murphy and the French investigators independently concluded that Hugues de la Plaza was a homicide victim. In addition, an outside review of the case, commissioned by the San Francisco Police Department, concluded that de la Plaza's death was a homicide. Despite these several independent findings, San Francisco authorities still classify the cause of de la Plaza's death as "undetermined." She told police that a masked gunman had broken in and committed the murder, but had left her alive. However, further police interrogation of Hansen led to her arrest as a suspect; and she also implicated her brother, Nathan Gann, in the murder. Both suspects confessed separately to participation in plotting the murder of their stepfather, but each accused the other of being the instigator. They were both charged with first degree murder by means of lying in wait -- a special circumstance that carries a mandatory life sentence. Nathan went on trial in November 2008; it resulted in a hung jury. Prosecutors then made the decision to try the siblings at the same time, in the same courtroom, but with two separate juries. Both Hansen and Gann were found guilty by their respective juries. They will both be sentenced on June 19 (2009). He claimed she did not return home on the evening of September 11, 2001; her empty van was discovered at the end of their driveway the next morning. Cal denied any involvement and when no evidence was found during a search of the Harris home, he suggested to investigators that they take a closer look at Michele's personal life. Investigators uncovered that Michele was involved with two different men, both of whom had seen Michele the night she disappeared. Two days after the initial search, a forensic specialist was sent to the Harris home and found tiny specks of blood on a kitchen doorway, something that had been overlooked during the initial investigation. With the discovery of a possible crime scene, as well as Cal's refusal to take a polygraph, focus was placed on Cal, who began a relationship with a former girlfriend just eighteen days after Michele's disappearance. On September 30, 2005, Cal Harris was arrested and charged with murder. The trial began on May 21, 2007 and ultimately, he was found guilty of second degree murder. Just days before Cal Harris was to be sentenced, a new witness came forward and claimed to have driven past the Harris driveway around dawn on September 12, 2001 and had seen a man and a woman, who appeared to be arguing. According to this new eyewitness, the woman resembled Michele, but the man did not look like Cal. With this new information, the judge threw out Cal's conviction for the murder of his wife and ordered a new trial. It will be at least a year before Cal Harris is tried again. Update for the 02/13/10 (second) rebroadcast: In July of 2009, Cal Harris once again went on trial. After a three-week trial, the jury found him guilty again. The families believe that evidence that might have implicated her was lost or destroyed in the initial police investigation of the crime scene. In 2007, an independent analysis of the evidence, done by retired New York Lieutenant Commander Vernon Geberth, concluded that Dana Chandler was "the one and only person who had the motive, means, and opportunity to commit these murders". In January 2009, Topeka got a new district attorney, Chad Taylor, who says that the Harkness-Sisco case is now a priority. Gammon then revealed how Ann admitted to Derril Willard that she had injected a substance into Eric's IV bag...and Willard had told Gammon that he himself had never tried to kill Eric. Ann Miller was charged with Eric's murder. Because the District Attorney and the Miller family had misgivings about the outcome of a trial, Ann was offered a plea bargain: twenty-five years in prison for Eric's murder. She accepted. 48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Show Me The Money" - In November 2000, bank manager and single mother Michelle Renee was in her Vista, California home with her seven-year-old daughter Breea, when three masked gunmen broke into the house. The gunmen held them captive overnight, and in the morning strapped dynamite onto their backs. Breea was shoved into a closet, while Michelle was ordered to rob the bank where she worked. If she didn't comply, the gunmen said they would detonate the dynamite. She obeyed, and the next morning she cleaned out the bank vault and gave the gunmen a duffel bag containing \$360,000, Police and FBI investigation soon apprehended four suspects: Christopher Butler, Lisa Ramirez, Christopher Huggins, and Robert Ortiz. But investigators were suspicious that Michelle had been involved in the robbery -- the dynamite had turned out to be fake; she had claimed that she had recognized one of the masked robbers as a customer, even though he had been in her bank only once; and she herself had filed for bankruptcy - for the second time - only a month before the robbery. However, no proof was ever discovered to confirm this suspicion. Eighteen months later, Butler and Ramirez went on trial, Ramirez's confession was ruled inadmissible because it implicated Butler, who had admitted to nothing. Finally, Ramirez was found innocent, and Butler guilty only of kidnapping Renee's daughter and roommate. Kimbra: he was not convicted of kidnapping Michelle Renee. Two months later, Huggins and Ortiz went on trial, and were found guilty of all charges, including the kidnapping of Michelle Renee. At the time, amidst a country-wide media-fueled hysteria about Satanic cults, Damien, because of his affinity for long hair and dressing in black became a prime suspect, along with friends Jason Baldwin and Jesse Misskelley. The trio, known as the West Memphis Three, were convicted of triple-murder: Misskelley and Baldwin sentenced to life in prison, while Damien Echols received the death penalty. The police had no evidence linking Echols to the crime until Misskelley, whose lawyer says he has the mental capabilities of a five-year-old and barely knew Echols, confessed to helping him and Jason Baldwin commit the murders -- although many of the facts he recounted about the crime were incorrect. Misskelley was tried first, convicted and sentenced. Echols and Baldwin went on trial together: Misskelley refused to testify against them, and by law his confession could not be used against them. Still, they were convicted. As word of this case spread, so did the outrage over what many believed was a grave injustice. Members of the entertainment community, including actor Johnny Depp and musicians Natalie Maines and Eddie Vedder, came to their support. An HBO documentary, "Paradise Lost", and a book by Mara Leveritt entitled "Devil's Knot", detailed flaws in the case and now, forensic scientists have challenged the causes of the wounds inflicted on the victims, and sworn affidavits have revealed possible jury misconduct and new DNA evidence points away from the three convicted men and towards someone unexpected -- Terry Hobbs, Steve Branch's step-father at the time of the murders. As Echols prepares to take his case to federal court, he has some unexpected support from the parents of two of the victims: Mark Byers and Pam Branch, who now agree that justice has not been served. 48 HOURS MYSTERY: LIVE TO TELL: "Kidnap on Highway 1" - In November 2007, Chris and Debra Hall, and their children. Tyler and Divinia, were driving back to California from Mexico, when they were pulled over a few miles from the U.S. border by what they thought were police. A man in a military uniform approached and suddenly put a gun to Chris' head. Moments later the family was ambushed by a second car of gunmen. As the kidnappers drove them onto a dirt road in the mountains outside Tijuana, they began asking about a race car. While in Mexico, Chris and Tyler worked as part of a pit crew at the Baja 1000. When Chris explained that there was no race car, the men ransacked the family's trailer and then took them farther into the mountains. The gunmen put the family in a ditch and threw sleeping bags over them. As the Hall family lay hugging in the ditch, the men drove away. Ultimately the Halls crawled through the brush in the night to a house where a woman took them in and called police for help. Despite her assurances that they could trust these officers, the family could not help but fear they were in danger all over again. The authorities rushed them to the border. For the moment they were safe, but with the gunmen in possession of their drivers' licenses and their address, they will carry the memory of that traumatic night with them. Mexican authorities never investigated the kidnapping, and the Halls still don't know who their assailants were. Drug gangs in Mexico are known to wear police uniforms as a way to trap their victims. On September 8, 2004, Jay was driving home from a business trip to Florida. He spoke to his mother on his cell phone, but then was never heard from again. Six weeks later, on October 23, 2004, his torso was found in a plastic container, just miles from his home. A police search warrant of the Orbin home discovered Jay's credit cards and business checkbook, which he always took with him on business trips -- evidence that he had arrived home, but never actually left on another trip -- as Marjorie had claimed. Further police investigation -- including the discovery of a hardware store surveillance tape showing Marjorie buying two plastic containers exactly like the one Jay's torso was found in -- pointed to Marjorie as the murderer, and she was arrested and charged on December 6, 2004. On September 14, 2009, a jury found her guilty of murder; she was sentenced to life in prison. Marjorie, however, now claims that Larry Weisberg, with whom she had been having an affair, murdered Jay when Weisberg and Jay had a confrontation in Jay's home, after Jay had returned earlier than expected from his Florida trip and found out about the affair. She says that she had never revealed this for five years, because Weisberg had threatened to kill her son if she went to the police. Marjorie is serving a life sentence in Phoenix, Arizona. Police investigation of the Floyd's home revealed small amounts of blood and Mike Golub's DNA on the unpainted underside of their newly repainted front deck. Other circumstantial evidence also made police suspicious of the Floyds. In 2006, Shannon and Chad Floyd were arrested and charged with Mike's murder; Chad's father posted their \$2 million bond bail. In 2007, they were tried -- but the jury declared itself deadlocked after two days of deliberations. Prosecutors re-filed the charges, and in April 2008, there was a second trial -- and, once again, the jury declared itself deadlocked, after two days of deliberations. Prosecutors ultimately decided against a third trial. fearing another hung jury. The Floyds went free, and Mike Golub is officially still missing. When investigators found vacuum marks, Theresa's blood and Sam Parker's DNA in the back of Theresa's SUV, he was arrested and charged with his wife's murder. Prosecutors believed that Sam had murdered Theresa, drove off and disposed of her body. Parker insisted he had not killed his wife and suspected that she had run off to Mexico. The jurors said the task of deciding Sam Parker's fate was particularly daunting because they had an overwhelming amount of circumstantial evidence. but not much else. After three days of deliberation, the jurors seemed hopelessly deadlocked. The judge urged them to give it one more try. After a closer look at cell phone records, the jury found him guilty of first-degree murder. He was immediately sentenced to life in prison. Theresa's family believes that Parker may be the only one who holds the key to finding Theresa's body, but he still insists that he did not kill her and does not know where she is. When police arrived at the Franklin, Tennessee apartment of Lesa Buchanan on the Fourth of July weekend in 2005, they were surprised by what they found in her home: a cache of prescription drugs and sex toys. Lesa and her boyfriend, Dr. Christ Koulis, had spent most of that final weekend in her bedroom, having sex. Koulis, a plastic surgeon, had called 911 when she stopped breathing, and said he performed CPR, but that there was no pulse. When Lesa was rushed to the emergency room, the doctors trying to save her life said Dr. Koulis told them nothing about the drugs she had been using -- information that could have been crucial in saving her life. With Lesa dead, investigators quickly focused on drugs. At her apartment, detectives discovered used syringes with traces of oxycodone -- a powerful narcotic used to kill pain and available only from a prescribing physician. After a five month investigation, Dr. Koulis was arrested on four charges -- ranging from simple assault to second degree murder. At the trial, prosecutors alleged Dr. Koulis had injected Lesa with oxycodone during the course of the weekend. which eventually led to her death. But the defense claimed Lesa injected herself, and that she had a drug problem - a claim her family and investigators disputed. Ultimately, Dr. Koulis was found guilty of criminally negligent homicide. He will likely remain free until 2009, pending his appeal. 08/21/10 Update: Five years after Lesa Buchanan's death, and with his appeal still pending. Christ Koulis was found dead at a friend's apartment. Toxicology reports state the cause of death as bronchial pneumonia due to opiate intoxication, a drug overdose. Because his case was in appeal, his attorney David Raybin was able get his 2007 conviction dropped by the state's Court of Criminal Appeals. However, the attorney general's office is fighting to have that conviction reinstated. Koulis' attorney feels the conviction should be vacated. The update also includes brief commentary from attorney Raybin and Lesa's sister, Tara Bentley. Kaylene died... Krystal not only survived the attack but was able to help a police sketch artist draw an image that led to the arrest of her attacker, Tommy Lynn Sells. After his arrest Sells confessed to the crime and revealed that he had been traveling across the country killing men, women and children for twenty years and had never in the past left a witness alive. Krystal Surles testified during Sells' trial for the December 1999 murder of Kaylene Harris, which ended in his being sentenced to death. In December 1991, four teenage girls were found murdered in an Austin, Texas yogurt shop. The girls had been tied up, stripped down, at least one was raped, shot in the head and their naked bodies were stacked in a corner then set on fire. In the weeks after the murders, authorities received countless tips, many false confessions and even interrogated teenagers Maurice Pierce, Michael Scott, Robert Springsteen and Forrest Welborn. With no solid evidence, they were released. There were no developments in the investigation until 1999, when new detectives assigned to the case made the announcement that they had made four arrests: the same four suspects, whom police had interrogated to eight years earlier. The charges against Welborn and Pierce were dropped. Scott and Springsteen each stood trial for murder. Both were convicted, with Springsteen sentenced to death and Scott sentenced to life in prison. On appeal, the convictions were overturned when DNA evidence did not match any of the suspects. It was from an unknown male. The Travis County District Attorney, Rosemary Lehmberg, says there is no statute of limitations for murder, and they will continue the investigation until the person(s) responsible for these murders are brought to justice. For now Scott and Springsteen are free; and the girls' families are still dealing with the deaths of their daughters. 48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Vegas Heat" (9:00-10:00pm) - a report on the December 14, 2005 discovery of the charred corpse of a young woman, found in a burned-out car on a Las Vegas, Nevada desert road. The car was registered to Kelly Ryan, a fitness champion who is married to Craig Titus, a Mr. Olympia competitor. Both were stars of the body building world and also hard partiers, known for using illegal drugs and pain killers. The unrecognizable body was initially thought to be Ryan, but authorities were stunned when they arrived at the couple's house only to be greeted by her at the door. When asked about the car, Craig and Kelly claimed that it had been taken the day before by Melissa James, their 31-year-old live-in assistant and a dancer, who was headed to New Jersey to spend Christmas with her mother. Melissa never made it to New Jersey and when pressed. Craig and Kelly accused her of theft -- that she stole the Jaguar and used Kelly's debit card to steal from them. Detectives were lucky and discovered that Kelly's debit card was last used at Wal-Mart by Kelly, who purchased seven bottles of lighter fluid. Panicked by the police visit, Craig and Kelly confided in Megan Foley, Kelly's friend, that a fight between Kelly and Melissa had spiraled out of control -- Kelly tased Melissa, injected her with narcotics and that it ended when Craig choked her. Megan's attorney contacted the police. Armed with that information, police issued a warrant for their arrest. Eventually, the FBI tracked the couple to Boston, where they were charged with murder and arson. Twenty-one days after the body was found, it was officially identified as Melissa James. But because the body was so badly burned, the coroner could not say for sure how Melissa died or if it was even murder. Craig had a different story and in an interview, told 48 HOURS that Melissa had attacked Kelly and that he interceded on his wife's behalf. Enraged, Melissa ran upstairs to her room and when Craig checked on her, she was dead. Craig also claimed that he, Melissa, and Kelly had been using drugs for days leading up to the fight and that her death was an overdose. High on drugs, they panicked and disposed of her body in the desert. As the trial was about to begin, Craig and Kelly each accepted a plea deal -- Craig for second-degree murder, kidnapping, and arson; Kelly for battery and arson. After further courtroom dramatics, Craig Titus was sentenced to 21 to 55 years and Kelly Ryan to six to 17 years in prison. Craig has filed a motion to reduce his sentence. Kelly says her marriage to Craig is over. Graphic update for the 07/14/09 rebroadcast: Craig Titus' request to reduce his sentence or let him stand trial was denied. The son of legendary gambling impresario Benny Binion, Ted was a brilliant casino operator himself. Paranoid about his wealth, he stashed millions of dollars worth of silver in a hidden vault in Pahrump, Nevada. Ted was also addicted to smoking heroin. Prior to his death, he became involved with Sandy Murphy, and it was she who told police in September 1998 that she had found him dead of an apparent drug overdose. However Binion's sister, Becky Binion Behnen, insisted to police that this was no drug overdose and demanded an investigation. Police discovered that Sandy was having an affair with Rick Tabish, and theorized that they were trying to steal Ted's buried treasure. Both were charged with his murder and both were found guilty of murder in the first degree. While imprisoned, Sandy contacted Alan Dershowitz, who agreed to take on her appeal. The Nevada Supreme Court agreed with Dershowitz's arguments and overturned both convictions. After the second trial, both Murphy and Tabish were found not guilty of murder, but were found guilty of stealing Binjon's burjed silver from the Pahrump yault. Many believe that much of Binion's money is still missing, 48 HOURS retained ground sonar experts to search the Binion estate, which had remained empty since his death; nothing was found. Tabish remains in prison because of a prior record; Murphy returned to California where she married an art dealer. Tabish's latest bid for parole is under consideration. Murphy is suing the state of Nevada, alleging false imprisonment and malicious prosecution. 48 HOURS MYSTERY: "The Killing Game" - a report on the California criminal justice system's 40-year pursuit of Rodney James Alcala, from his 1968 abduction, rape and attempted murder of 8-year old Tali Shapiro in Los Angeles, to his 2010 conviction --with the help of advances in DNA technology -- for the kidnapping, rape and murder of five California women. Although he had been initially apprehended in New York in 1971, the prosecution at that time had no choice but to enter into a plea agreement with Alcala: Tali Shapiro's parents had moved out of the country after the incident, and Tali was unavailable for trial. He pleaded guilty to a lesser charge of child molestation and was ultimately convicted -- but released by a parole board after thirty-four months in prison. In 1979, Alcala abducted and murdered 12-year-old Robin Samson. With the help of her friend, Bridget Wilvurt, police identified Alcala as a suspect. He was arrested for Robin Samson's murder. Police discovered a storage facility he had rented in Seattle, which contained photographs he had taken of more than one hundred young women, including photos which placed him near the scene of Robin Samson's abduction. It and also contained jewelry worn by Robin, and identified as such by her mother. In February 1980, Alcala went on trial; he was convicted, and sentenced to death. In 1984, the California State Supreme Court then ruled that he had not received a fair trial. He was tried and convicted a second time...and again the verdict was overturned. In 2003, DNA technology enabled Los Angeles Deputy District Attorney Gina Satriano to link Alcala to three other unsolved murders: Jill Barcomb, Georgia Wixted, and Charlotte Lamb, all of whom had been killed between November 1977 and June 1978. Evidence also linked Alcala to the 1979 murder of another Los Angeles woman, Jill Parenteau. In January 2010, Alcala went on trial for all of these murders -- and was found guilty and sentenced to death. Weeks later, tests of the calcium tablets proved that she had died of cyanide poisoning. Police went to charge Essa, but he had fled from the U.S. to Canada and eventually to Beirut, Lebanon, where he hid, knowing that he could not be extradited back to the U.S. In October 2006, he went to Cyprus, a country that does have an extradition treaty with the U.S. Interpol and the FBI alerted the Cyprus police that Essa was traveling under an alias; he was apprehended at the Larnaca airport and brought in for questioning and fingerprinting. His true identity was established, and he was arrested for using a doctored passport and held in a Cyprus prison. He fought extradition for two years but was returned to the U.S. In January 2010 his trial began. His protector in the Middle East and Essa's brother, Firas, both testified that Essa had told them that he had killed his wife by putting cyanide in her calcium pills. He was found guilty of aggravated murder and sentenced to life in prison with the possibility of parole in twenty years. After the trial, the children were told that their father killed their mother. They haven't asked about him since. 48 HOURS MYSTERY: "The Whole Truth" - a report on the 26-year effort of Bruce Lisker to overturn his conviction for the 1983 murder of his mother. In March 1983, 17-year-old Bruce Lisker hysterically called 911 to tell Los Angeles police that he had found his mother, Dorka Lisker, beaten severely and stabbed in her Sherman Oaks home. Police arrived to find him hysterical and on drugs. They arrested him, and a young detective, Andrew Monsue, proceeded to build a case against Bruce. Bruce's father believed that his son was innocent, and urged police to investigate Bruce's friend Mike Ryan, a 15-year-old with a criminal record, who had gone to the house to see Bruce's mother the day before. But Monsue focused on Bruce, and presented what he maintained was evidence that Bruce was guilty. Bruce was tried as an adult; the jury found him guilty and he was sentenced to 16 years to life. In 1999, Bruce, still in prison, hired ex-cop-turned-private-investigator Paul Ingels to help him overturn his conviction. With the aid of then-Sgt. Jim Gavin of the Los Angeles Police Department, Ingels discovered that the evidence against Bruce had apparently been fabricated. Ingels and Gavin gave their findings to the LA Times, and on May 22, 2005, the newspaper ran an article questioning the evidence that had put Lisker behind bars. Two months later, a federal judge granted a hearing to consider new evidence in the case. Four years passed, and in August 2009 a federal judge ruled that Lisker had been convicted on false evidence and must be retried or set free. On August 17, 2009, he was set free on bail. Six weeks later, he went back to court, at which time the prosecutor said that too much time has passed to retry the case and they had no choice but to dismiss the charges. One year later, the state asked the court to return Lisker to prison based on a technicality arguing that Lisker was late filing his petition for release. A judge rejected that motion. Between 1986 and 1996, Andrew Urdiales attacked, tortured and killed eight women, first in California and then in Illinois. His first victim was Robbin Brandley of Mission Viejo, California. In 1992, he charmed 19-year-old Jennifer Asbenson, potentially his ninth victim, who accepted a ride from a seemingly kind stranger and was then driven into the California desert, where she was tortured, made to perform sexual acts and strangled, then put in the trunk of his car. Summoning all the strength she had, she escaped and found safety when a passing truck stopped and rescued her. Urdiales disappeared. In 1997, Chicago police were interested when they received a tip from a prostitute that a client had wanted to tie her up, place her in the trunk of his car, and then drive her out to Wolf Lake. Prior to the tip, the bodies of three other women had been discovered in the lake, all killed with the same gun. The client turned out to be Andrew Urdiales and the gun used in the murders belonged to him. Chicago police brought him in for questioning and Urdiales matter-of-factly confessed to eight unsolved murders in Illinois and California. including Robbin Brandley's and the attack on Jennifer Asbenson. Fifteen years after her attack, Jennifer Asbenson faced Urdiales in a Chicago courtroom; a jury convicted Urdiales and sentenced him to death. California authorities must wait until the appeals process is completed in Illinois, before they can begin their proceedings against him. Paramedics arrived within minutes, but it was too late. Based on the note, the empty bottle of sleeping pills, and the fact that Kari was described as still struggling with the loss of her daughter Kassidy seven years ago. police ruled it a suicide. In a county with no medical examiner, police described the case over the phone to a justice of the peace, who determined that no autopsy was needed. Kari's parents, Jim and Linda Dulin, had no choice but to believe Matt. However, Linda's sisters, Nancy, Kay, and Jennifer, and niece Lindsey believed otherwise. Dubbed "Charlie's Angels", they began their own investigation. After uncovering a possible motive, Linda hired Bill Johnston, a dogged former federal prosecutor, had her daughter's body exhumed and autopsied, and filed a wrongful death suit against Matt. Five months after Kari's death, the justice of the peace declared that her death was no longer classified as a suicide and police subsequently arrested and charged Matt with murder. Believing Matt would be tried in criminal court, Linda dropped her wrongful death suit. After six months, the district attorney still hadn't taken Matt's case to a grand jury -- a requirement under Texas law. Linda eventually refiled the wrongful death suit, shortly before attorney Guy James Gray filed a successful motion to dismiss Matt's criminal case, as a grand jury indictment had not been returned within 180 days. Matt Baker is no longer charged with any crime, though the district attorney continues to investigate and could refile criminal charges. There is no statute of limitations for murder. Unwilling to give up, Linda Dulin decided to again sue Matt for wrongful death. Bill Johnston, assistant district attorney Long and prosecutor Susan Shafer continued to investigate. Armed with new information and damning testimony provided to the grand jury by Vanessa Bulls, a woman long suspected of having an affair with Matt before Kari's death, prosecutors were able to arrest Matt and charge him with murder. At the trial, it was revealed that Matt told Vanessa how he planned to murder Kari, the reason why, and even the exact date, but Vanessa chose not to notify the authorities. After seven hours of deliberation, the jury found Matt Baker guilty of first-degree murder. He was sentenced to 65 years with the possibility of parole. Matt still insists he did not kill his wife. The Bakers' daughters live with Matt's parents, where they want to stay. Kari's parents are now fighting for custody of the girls. Initially, with no clues as to her whereabouts, investigators began to look at her mother Carrie McGonigle's live-in boyfriend, Dave Cave as a person of interest. Carrie herself and Amber's father, Moe Dubois, soon began believing that Cave was responsible for Amber's disappearance. Almost a year later, another teenage girl, Chelsea King, went missing. Chelsea had been running just ten miles from where Amber disappeared. Police quickly found Chelsea's underwear with DNA evidence that would lead them to the arrest of convicted sex offender John Gardner, who was out on parole. Gardner was then also identified by another woman, Candice Moncayo, as the man who attacked her on the same jogging trail just two months earlier. Then police found Chelsea's body and Gardner was charged with her murder and the attack against Moncayo. Under interrogation and facing the death penalty for the murder of Chelsea, Gardner agreed to lead police to Amber's body in exchange for avoiding the death penalty. John Gardner was convicted of both Amber's and Chelsea's murders and sentenced to life in prison without the possibility of parole. In his exclusive interview with 48 HOURS MYSTERY, he recounted the day he murdered Amber and admitted he is the most dangerous type of sexual predator. He said he needs to be locked up forever. 48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Chasing the Barefoot Bandit" - A report on Colton Harris-Moore, also known as the "Barefoot Bandit," because of his habit of committing crimes barefoot and leaving chalk outlines of his feet; and whose criminal exploits included stealing planes, guns, yachts, and even escaping to foreign countries. His exploits reminded many of legendary outlaws like Jesse James, and as news of his crimes spread beyond the Pacific Northwest, his popularity grew, even spawning Facebook fan pages. Born on Camano Island, Washington, Harris-Moore was an unpopular teen, physically neglected and mentally abused by his mother, Pam Kohler. He wanted to become a pilot, but instead turned to a life of crime at age 10, stealing laptops, cell phones, and jewelry. He was arrested and sent to a halfway house, but escaped custody and continued breaking into vacation homes and leaving his mark. He even ordered a DVD on learning to fly a plane with a stolen credit card. In 2008, he stole his first plane, crashing it 250 miles away from where he stole it, and simply walked away. He then worked in Las Vegas, then went to Canada and stole guns. In 2009, he stole his second plane, and the legend of Colton Harris-Moore was born. After stealing his third plane, the Department of Homeland Security joined in the hunt; but he still avoided capture. In 2010, he stole an airplane in Bloomington, Indiana and flew it to Abaco Island in the Bahamas, where he continued to commit break-ins. While 48 HOURS was on his trail in the Bahamas, he allegedly stole a yacht and escaped to the nearby Bahamian island of Eleuthera. He was spotted by some local teens who, knowing about the \$10,000 reward offered for his capture, chased him by boat. Police joined in the hunt, and Harris-Moore was finally captured. Deported from the Bahamas, he is was returned to the U.S., where he was indicted on federal charges for stealing two planes, guns, a boat and flying without a license. He faces ten years behind bars. Onscreen graphics: Colton Harris-Moore will be arraigned Thursday in federal court. He faces additional charges in several states. Colton and his mother have not seen each other since his arrest. She's had offers to buy Colton's story and has hired a wellknown entertainment lawyer. 

Afterwards, when Teddy had left and John and Juliette had gone to a movie, John and Susan retired to separate bedrooms -- Susan often slept in the second room because John snored. Sometime later in the evening, a gunman entered their bedrooms and shot both of them several times. Susan was killed, but John survived. Nothing was taken from the house - not money, nor jewelry. There was no doubt that this was a premeditated effort to make sure that they were dead. Police interrogation of Teddy Montoto revealed that he had been having an affair with Susan, but further investigation eliminated him as a suspect. Interviews with some of John's closest friends suggested that the Suttons' son, Christopher, should be investigated as a suspect. He had been sent to a behavioral program, Paradise Cove, on the Polynesian islands of Samoa, when he was 16. He claims he was abused there and tried to tell his parents about it, but they didn't believe him, and he was kept there until he was 19. He became the prime suspect. After checking his cell phone records, authorities noticed more than 300 calls to his friend Garrett Kopp, who had been arrested less than 24 hours after the Suttons shooting for attacking someone else with a gun. That turned out to be the same gun that was used to shoot the Suttons. Kopp told police that he was hired by his friend Christopher Sutton to kill his parents. Christopher's then-fiancée Juliette Driscoll told the police that Christopher had a deep-seated resentment towards his parents for sending him to Samoa. She said he often spoke of how great their lives would be if his parents were dead. Garrett Kopp and Juliette Driscoll testified against Christopher in court. Christopher claimed that Kopp had gone to the Suttons' house to steal marijuana and that Driscoll testified against him because she had been threatened by police. After a day and a half of deliberations, the jury found Christopher Sutton guilty of first-degree murder as charged. He was sentenced to life in prison with no possibility of parole. Charlene claimed that their seemingly happy life together was all a facade and that she shot him in self-defense, as Danny came at her after an argument. Charlene's years of suffering physical abuse from Danny was well documented by police reports and hospital visits. Their children -- sons Jeremy (from a previous marriage), Joby, and daughter Jamie -- even admitted that their father, Danny, was abusive, but that he had mellowed after he and their mother had survived a near-fatal motorcycle accident in August 2003 and that their mother had often instigated the arguments, leaving Danny with no choice but to react the way he did. Arrested for her husband's murder, Charlene faced life in prison. Months before the trial began, her son, Joby, committed suicide on the eye of his 27th birthday. Joby was supposed to be a witness for the prosecution, but according to his brother Jeremy, dreaded the thought of testifying. At the trial, prosecutors questioned Charlene's claim of self-defense and claimed that the multi-million dollar estate was the motive. Defense attorney George Parnham believed that her children's desire to gain control of the family fortune drove them to testify against their mother and was able to get Jeremy to reveal that a million dollars Charlene had transferred to him for safekeeping was withdrawn and split with his siblings to pay off debts -- all without his mother's knowledge. The jury deliberated for two days, before the judge declared a mistrial due to the lone juror who believed in Charlene's innocence. In addition to the criminal trial, Charlene also faced a wrongful death lawsuit from Jeremy, Jamie and Danny's mother, Barbara Graham. 48 HOURS MYSTERY: LIVE TO TELL: "Full Moon" - On the night of August 28, 1996, Yvette Rodier and her friend, Zach Snarr, went up to the mountains outside of Salt Lake City, Utah for their first date. Their special plans to take pictures of the full moon were interrupted when a stranger drove up, pulled out a gun and opened fire, emptying every bullet out of his gun. Zach was killed. Yvette, who was shot four times, survived by pretending to be dead. Within days of the shootings, authorities caught 19-year-old Jorge Benvenuto, whose reason for the attack was for the thrill of watching them die. He expressed disappointment when he found out one of his victims had lived. It took Yvette three years and five operations to repair her physical injuries that still left her with permanent nerve damage. She faced her attacker in court. Prosecutors had planned to request the death penalty. Benvenuto asked for a plea bargain and, upon consideration, Zach's family agreed to this in exchange for a life sentence in prison without parole. Afterwards, Benvenuto filed several appeals, saying he had been depressed when he agreed to the plea bargain. He lost these several appeals. Yvette became a lawyer so she could help other victims. His trial started in May of 2000 in Houston; he was found guilty of capital murder. Holly testified in the penalty phase of the trial and identified Resendiz in court. The jury decided he was a future danger to society and the judge sentenced him to death. He was executed in June of 2006. Holly chose not to attend the execution. She has dedicated her life to helping other victims and founded Holly's House, a child and adult advocacy center in Evansville, Indiana. Authorities learned he killed a teenage couple in Florida, just months before he attacked Chris and Holly. At his own trial, Pitonyak implied that Hall took part in the dismemberment of Jennifer Cave's body after her death. Put on trial for this crime, and for helping Pitonyak escape, she was found guilty and sentenced to five years in prison. However, after 17 months in jail, Laura Hall was released because a court ruled that her sentencing hearing wasn't fair. Her conviction was upheld and she is out on bond while prosecutors fight to put her back in jail. She could be sentenced to more time or released. And Pitonyak's new lawyer, says that they have new evidence and that Hall is also responsible for the murder. At Hall's new hearing, the judge rules against her: she's going back to jail. Her sentencing is set for May 2010, where she faces up to ten years in prison. Unless he wins a new trial, Pitonyak will be eligible for parole in 2033. Update for the 12/18/10 rebroadcast: In June 2010 Laura Hall was sentenced to confinement in the Texas Department of Criminal Justice for a period of ten years.
