ISSUE:

What is being done to ensure on-campus housing is safe?

Discussion of Issue:

Ensuring the safety of students on campus is one of the university's priorities. Since the closure of Belmont Hall, the dorms have seen more people living in the new housing options on campus. The resident assistants live on-campus and monitor residence life and are involved in the safety operations in the dorms.

Programming: KTSC-FM addressed this issue through several different kinds of programs, including public affairs discussions, news stories, and PSA'S. The following are illustrative examples of such programming:

a. T-Wolf Talk 02/07/16 7:30 a.m. – 7:45 a.m.

Quatisha Franklin, the director of the Health Education and Prevention program on campus discussed the most commonly abused drugs in the community. She explained how her office is responsible for helping students who are addicted to drugs and/or alcohol. Additionally, she provided information about available resources to help individuals struggling with their addiction and what support groups are available on campus to help students be accountable and stay on a clean path. (Local).

ISSUE:

How do local Girl Scout Troops benefit their community?

Discussion of Issue:

Most notably, Girl Scouts are known for their annual cookie sales. What is not as well known, is how the organization trains and prepares young women for leadership roles in their community and how the proceeds from the sales go back into the community.

Programming: KTSC-FM addressed this issue through a public affairs discussion. The following is an illustrative example of such programming:

Local media star for the Pueblo Girl Scout chapter, Diana, discussed how cookie sales were going this year, the badges that can be earned while in Girl Scouts and how her Troop serves the community. (Local).

ISSUE:

What is CSU-Pueblo's procedure for students to report sexual assaults?

can seek help reporting sexual assault on campus. (Local).

Discussion of Issue:

There has been a noticeable increase in the number of sexual assaults that happen on campuses across the nation. Stories about sexual harassment and rape have made headlines. The university is required to follow Title IX and provide assistance for students who have been survivors of sexual assault.

Programming: KTSC-FM addressed this issue through a public affairs discussion. The following is an illustrative example of such programming:

a. T-Wolf Talk 02/28/16 7:30 a.m. – 7:59 a.m. Roosevelt Wilson, the Title IX Director for CSU-Pueblo explained the provisions provided by Title IX and equal opportunity assistance. He also explained how students

c. News Programming

Throughout the past three months KTSC-FM News Department covered important events relating to a variety of local community issues broadcast in our daily five-minute news brief airing at 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. (Local). Duration 25 minutes per week, totaling 250 minutes of news programming for the quarter.

d. Remote Broadcasts

On March 11, KTSC-FM broadcasted live on campus for the Holi Festival from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. This event was done in partnership with the Colorado International Student Association. Interviews were conducted during the broadcast with students and members of CISA to discuss the Hindu festival and cultural pluralism, diversity and awareness. Live reads about this event were also broadcasted for two-weeks leading up to this event. Duration: 2 hours.

On March 12, KTSC-FM broadcasted live for CSU Pueblo Discover Day from 7 a.m. to 9 a.m. This event is designed to reach first generation, non-traditional and freshman students as well as transfer students interested in attending CSU Pueblo. Interviews were conducted with CSU Pueblo Admissions staff to discuss higher education, affordability, financial aid options and scholarship opportunities. Live reads about this event were also broadcasted for two-weeks leading up to this event.

Total duration: 2 hours.

On March 17, KTSC-FM broadcasted live from 10 a.m. until 1 p.m. in partnership with the Alcohol and Other Drug Program and the Pueblo County Sheriff's Office for a mock DUI checkpoint. This event was designed to inform students of the dangers of impaired driving. Interviews an on-air announcements included the dangers of impaired driving, what the legal blood alcohol content levels are, and the importance of designating a driver, and the differences between DUIs and DWAIs as well as the average cost of a DUI in Colorado. Live reads about this event, including the talking points about the dangers of impaired driving were also broadcasted for two-weeks leading up to this event. Duration: 3 hours.
