Each day in the United States, 43 children are diagnosed with cancer. It's the number one cause of death by disease in children in this country, but with major treatment advances, more than 85 percent of children diagnosed with cancer survive five years or more. This is a huge improvement from the mid-1970s, when the 5-year survival rate was about 58%. □

The American Hospital Association (AHA) released a new report that details the extraordinary financial pressures continuing to affect hospitals and health systems and jeopardizing access to patient care. The report found hospital expenses across the board saw double-digit increases in 2022 compared to pre-pandemic levels, including for workforce, drugs, medical supplies, and equipment, as well as other essential operational services like IT, sanitation, facilities management, and food and nutrition services.

Aaron Wesolowski, Vice President for Policy Research and Analytics at the American Hospital Association (AHA), discussed the details of the report, and how these circumstances are impacting hospitals and patient care.

Communities in Schools (CIS) serves more than 87,000 students statewide, of which more than 72,000 reside in Southern Nevada, or 1 in 5 of the Clark County School District's schools. Between the 2021-2022 and 2022-2023 school year, CIS has increased the number of students served statewide from 75,680 to 87,653 and the number of schools from 81 to 92. CIS is on track to move from serving 1 in 5 Title 1 schools in Nevada, to 1 in 3 Title 1, or 120 schools by 2024.

For the 2021-22 school year, CIS' statewide graduation rate was 94 percent. This compelling data point bolsters the case to expand the CIS program into more schools and the metric speaks volumes about the effectiveness of the CIS methodology to close opportunity gaps for Nevada's students and who are prone to dropping out. Tami Hance-Lehr, CEO and state director for Communities in Schools of Nevada, discussed the organization's work in local schools and their annual Graduation Campaign to help high school seniors get the resources they need to graduate successfully.

Amy Meyer, manager of primate experimentation campaigns for People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA), revealed their investigation into animal testing being done at taxpayer supported labs to raise public awareness on some inhumane experiments their tax money is supporting.

Newborns exposed to opioids during pregnancy are at risk for a condition called neonatal opioid withdrawal syndrome (NOWS). A newer care approach called "Eat, Sleep, Console" (ESC) was found to be more effective than the traditional method used that can overestimate the need to give infants opioid medications after birth. ESC prioritizes non-medication approaches and a quiet, low-light environment, including swaddling, skin-to-skin contact, and breastfeeding when possible. The findings for ESC come from a clinical trial funded by the National Institutes of Health, which has been published in the New England Journal of Medicine.

Dr. Diana W. Bianchi, M.D., the director of the Eunice Kennedy Shriver National Institute of Child Health, discussed their research on newborn opioid withdrawal and effective ways to treat the symptoms without having to administer more drugs.

Roughly 56% of pregnant women work full time during pregnancy, and 73% return to work within 6 months after giving birth. The Pregnant Workers Fairness Act (PWFA) is a new federal law that requires covered employers to provide reasonable accommodations to a worker's known limitations related to pregnancy, childbirth or related medical conditions, unless the accommodation will cause the employer an "undue hardship." This law goes into effect beginning on June 27, 2023.

Charlotte A. Burrows, Chair for the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC), discussed the new Pregnant Workers Fairness Act and the regulations in place to protect pregnant employees and new mothers in the workforce. The EEOC seeks to help employers avoid illegal practices at work and help employees when their rights are violated.

The country's lack of affordable and accessible childcare short-changes children, costs the American economy billions of dollars a year and cripples women professionally. This year's 2023 Kids Count Data Book, released June 14 by the Annie E. Casey Foundation, found many parents struggling to find childcare compatible with work schedules and commutes. The average annual national cost of childcare for one child in 2021 was \$10,600, a tenth of a married couple's median income and more than one-third of a single parent's income.

Lisa Hamilton, President and CEO of the Annie E. Casey Foundation, discussed the organization's latest Kids Count Data Book on child wellbeing, and called out certain data points that community members should be aware of.
