As far as whether she supports a nationwide ban on abortion, Hodges said she thinks it should be a state-to-state decision, but did say if there was a further ban, it needs to be through a constitutional amendment. And while Mark now needs his dad's permission to sign a contract, and he can't drive, the court order specifically states Mark can get married and vote. But Phelps County Clerk Pam Grow disagreed. She told the Phelps County Commission in late May that she planned to remove all voters from the rolls who had guardians appointed to them. Her argument was that the state constitution requires such a move, citing Article VIII, Section 2.
