"We were told that severe consequences would be put in place." the child was suspended, according to Vasquez. She was thinking that would be the last time Ruben and the student would be in the same classroom together given the history of bullying. But just a few days later. "He let us know the kid was back in class after a three-day suspension. "The school sent us a statement saying they investigated the altercation and immediately administered appropriate consequences. But Ruben's parents don't feel that way. "I'm not saying throw the book at him, but I would think a little more than three days." "This child used a physical object and cut our child's eye open. That's not a three-day suspension. "Now they say their son doesn't feel safe in his own classroom. "He said, I'm scared to go back to my classroom." wanting the school to take further action.
