The sightings are part of ongoing population monitoring as well as a large-scale turkey study. The organization will trap the turkeys in order to place leg bands before releasing them. The birds will not be moved from where they are found. Hunters who harvest one of those turkeys, or people who find one dead, are asked to report the band number by either calling the toll-free number or emailing the Game Commission using the email address on the band. A 35 second local **news** segment on January 12 at 635 and 805 reported that Pennsylvania's state veterinarian is recommending that all poultry be maintained indoors to help prevent the spread of the avian flu. Dr. Kevin Brightbill said poultry producers are encouraged to implement strict biosecurity practices and monitor bird health. The other infected sites are a duck farm in East Earl Township, Lancaster County, and a small hobby flock near Allegheny County. The farm with 97,700 broilers is the fourth site in Lancaster County to be infected with the virulent disease this year, according to USDA and the state Ag Department. It is the largest farm to get avian influenza since last May. The other three sites currently quarantined are in northern Lancaster County, meaning most of the county is now under some sort of zone for avian influenza. Lancasteronline reports that Lancaster County is the nation's fourth-largest poultry producer, generating more than \$580 million a year, according to USDA.

Local News 3/17/23 635 805 Pennsylvania has established new guidelines to help stop the spread of avian flu. So far this week, Lancaster County producers lost nearly 19,000 birds to avian flu. The hope is these guidelines will prevent the state from losing additional birds and millions of dollars in the poultry industry.
