Local news reports on 7/6/23 at 1635 and 1835 lasting 27 seconds: Pennsylvania State Police along with more than 3-hundred municipal agencies are cracking down on aggressive driving. According to NEWS8, the enforcement is underway now till August 20th. Police are looking for red light running, driving too fast for conditions, tailgating, heavy truck violations, pedestrian safety and other aggressive actions. Local news on 7/12/23 at 635 and 805 lasting 23 seconds: Police in Cumberland County are searching for a hit-and-run suspect. According to the Upper Allen

The bicyclist was reportedly knocked down and the driver of the vehicle stopped and asked if the person was okay and not injured before leaving the area before anyone could get their information or vehicle information. Local news stories on 7/7/23 at 605 and 735 lasting 29 seconds: PennDOT has announced that an inspection on a bridge spanning Route 15 near the York-Cumberland County border will cause lane restrictions. The bridge being inspected spans Yellow Breeches Creek in Carroll Township and Upper Allen Township. The bridge is located about a mile south of Lisburn Road. PennDOT says that weather permitting, the inspection will be from Tuesday, July 11 to Friday, July 14. The lane restrictions will be for the northbound direction on Tuesday, July 11, and Wednesday, July 12. ABC27.com

Local news stories on 7/11/23 at 605, 705, 805 and noon lasting 34 seconds: Road work at the Centerville Road exit of Route 30 in East Hempfield Township will cause delays at night this evening through Thursday. Drivers are advised to find alternate routes as delays are expected, according to PennDot. Tuesday night, flaggers will be directing traffic on Centerville Road near the on- and off-ramps for Route 30 west starting at 7 p.m. so they can open a new temporary on-ramp. Work will be completed by 6 a.m. Wednesday. The work is part of a \$36.3 million project to widen Centerville Road, including replacing a bridge over Route 30, which is expected to be completed in July 2025. LancasterOnline.com

Local news for 7/12/23 at 1635 and 1835 lasting 36 seconds: New temporary traffic lights are coming to Route 772/West High Street, in Manheim Borough next week for a bridge replacement project. According to LNP, contractors will activate the new signals on or soon after Tuesday. The signals will be in place until spring 2024 so crews can replace a bridge between South Snyder Street and Meadow Lane. The \$3.5 million project to replace the bridge carrying Route 772 over Rife Run is scheduled to be fully completed in August 2024. LANCASTERONLINE.COM.

Local news 7/18/23 1535 1735 lasting 36 seconds PennDot has put in place a weight limit on the Route 462 bridge between Columbia and Wrightsville. The new restriction limits the weight of each vehicle to 10 tons. Tractor trailers and other trucks over 10 tons are banned from the span until further notice. Inspectors discovered deterioration on the beams during a recent routine inspection. The weight limit will reduce strain on the bridge and ensure safe passage until repairs can be made. Local News on 7/19/23 at 735 lasting 30 seconds PennDOT will make repairs today on I-81 after a section was damaged by the intense fire near Carlisle.

Multiple vehicles crashed including three tractor-trailers, causing one of the truck's gas tanks to explode. One person was flown to the hospital and their condition is unknown at this time. PennDOT will make the repairs between 9 a.m. and 2 p.m. Traffic will still be able to get through but the right lane will be closed. During that time, the ramp from South Allen Road to 81 North will be closed. Abc27.com

Local news on 7/24/23 at 1835 lasting 27 seconds - Today PennDOT announced that the Oxford Road (Route 1015) bridge spanning Conewago Creek between Sharrer Mill Road and Plum Run Road in Straban Township, Adams County has reopened to traffic. The bridge had been closed since last December for replacement. There is some minor work that still needs to be completed on the bridge and because of this there may be short-term lane closures on the bridge for the next several weeks. ABC27.com.

Local news on 7/27/23 at 735 and 835 lasting 37 seconds: A weight limit on the Route 462 bridge between Columbia, Lancaster County, and Wrightsville, York County, has gone into effect. PennDOT said it posted signs yesterday that officially implement the 10-ton weight restriction announced July 17. The limit was established after a routine inspection discovered deterioration to the span over the Susquehanna River, according to PennDOT. PennDOT is working toward interim repairs and will re-evaluate the weight restriction while repairs are being made. Approximately 11,548 vehicles use the Route 462 bridge daily. PennDOT estimates about 5% of those vehicles, or 601 trucks, will be affected. Wgal.com

Local News on 7/31/23 at 1535 1735 and 8/1/23 at 605 705 805 noon lasting 35 seconds - PennDOT has announced a road closure planned for this weekend on southbound Interstate 83, including the ramp from I-83 south to Interstate 283 south in Dauphin County. Contractors are working on bridge repairs between Exit 47 and Exit 45. Weather permitting, this work will begin at 8 this Friday night till 6 o'clock Monday, August 7th. Overnight utility work there is happening between 7 p.m. and 6 a.m. through Thursday. Local News on 8/21/23 at 635 805 noon 1635 1835 and 8/22/23 605 705 805 lasting 33 seconds - The Pennsylvania Department of Transportation (PennDOT) has announced that a cable median barrier project will begin this week. According to a press release, the project will span across multiple routes in south central Pennsylvania and include 29 miles of high-tension cable barrier in the median of I-81 in Cumberland, Dauphin, Franklin and Lebanon counties, Route 30 in Lancaster and York counties, and Route 222 in Lancaster County. Work will

start northbound on I-81 in Lebanon County. PennDOT says left shoulder closures should be expected as needed during daytime operations, but all other work will be done inside the median and will not impact traffic. wgl.com for more

Local News on 8/23/23 at 635 805 lasting 28 seconds PennDOT has announced that a bridge preservation project is set to begin on Route 23 in Lancaster County. The work will begin, weather permitting, starting on September 5. The project will be done in phases with temporary traffic signals that will alternate directions of two-way travel. The bridge spans Norfolk Southern railroad tracks between Spring Water Circle/ St. Leo Way and Trolley Avenue in East Hempfield Township. The work is expected to be completed by Dec. 1, 2023. Local News on 8/23/23 at 1535 1735 lasting 32 seconds - PennDOT tells LNP the Gypsy Hill, Long Rifle roadwork will be completed by the end of the week. Township Manager Dee Dee McGuire tells LNP, she is confident the new design will create a safer roadway, but noted only time will tell whether the project is ultimately successful. 80% of crashes on Gypsy Hill Road involve a vehicle hitting a fixed object, which indicates a problem with road alignment or width. Local News on 8/28/23 at 1535 and 8/29/23 at 605 705 805 lasting 20 seconds - For Commuters and anyone traveling to Philly - starting today crews will be doing some new work on that portion of I95 that collapsed back in June after a tanker truck hauling gasoline caught fire. Only two southbound lanes will be open between 9am and 3pm beginning today and then on Thursday only 2 northbound lanes will be open from 9am to 3 pm. Local21news for more.

Local News on 8/28/23 at 1635 1835 and 8/29/23 at 635 735 835 lasting 16 seconds - Penn Dot started their work on 1.5-mile median barrier project on the Route 30 (Wrights Ferry) Bridge over the Susquehanna. Two lanes of traffic will remain open in both directions once construction starts. Traffic will be diverted away from the median to the right lane and shoulder. local21news.com

Local News on 8/30/23 at 605 735 lasting 35 seconds - Beginning Tuesday, Sept. 5, park roads west and north of Gettysburg and the East Cavalry battlefield will be repaved at Gettysburg National Military Park. The three-month project is expected to address road surfaces and parking areas that are at the end of their lifespan. Road closures during this phase of paving will occur at night from 6 p.m. to 6 a.m., Sunday to Thursday. The closures may temporarily interrupt the ability to visit portions of the battlefield while work is underway. No work will be going on during weekends or federal holidays. Local News on 9/1/23 at 635 6:35 835 lasting 27 seconds - ABC27 news reports a resurfacing project on Route 772 (Mount Joy Road) in Rapho Township is set to begin this month. PennDOT states that the work extends 4 miles from the Route 283 interchange to the intersection with Hossler Road in Manheim Borough. PennDOT says work is set to begin Friday, September 15. Local News on 9/18/23 at 1635 1835 lasting 50 seconds - Work on the Route 30/222 interchange begins Sunday to address the traffic jams on 222 south and 30 east that are a part of the daily commute. The project won't be completed until September 2027. Route 222 will get an additional lane in both directions from the interchange to a point 1 mile north, using the existing grass median. Two heavily used exit ramps will also get an additional lane, which will require replacing two bridges over Route 30. For at least the first year of the project, Route 30 eastbound will be reduced to two lanes. Route 222 will remain two lanes in each direction. Local News on 9/21/23 at 605 735 lasting 35 seconds - The Pennsylvania Department of Transportation is ready to begin work Wednesday night on a major overhaul of the Route 222/Route 30 interchange in Manheim Township. Local News on 9/25/23 at 635 805 lasting 42 seconds - Nighttime lane restrictions began Sunday night on Interstate 83 at Queen Street in York County so crews can prepare the damaged Queen Street bridge for a repair project. Weather permitting, lane restrictions will be in place in both northbound and southbound directions on I-83 from 9:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. the nights of Sunday, Sept. 24, through Thursday, Sept. 28, and the following week, Sunday, Oct. 1, through Thursday, Oct. 5. Local news on 7/7/23 at 635, 705, 805 and 835 lasting 33 seconds: Lancaster city will bill water customers monthly starting in August with the intention of providing customers with more frequent updates about water usage and costs. The city currently uses a quarterly billing system. In its announcement, the city said the monthly system will allow customers to “detect potential leaks sooner and better manage monthly expenses.” The change will affect customers living in the city, as well as in surrounding municipalities served by the city’s water system. Those include East Hempfield, East Lampeter, Lancaster, Manor, Pequea, West Hempfield and West Lampeter townships, and Millersville Borough. [lancasteronline.com](#)

Local News on 7/21/23 605 705 735 835 noon lasting 35 seconds - The City of Lancaster on Thursday issued a boil-water advisory for certain residents of Milton Road and Lampeter Road, due to an emergency water main repair. The water main repair may cause an increased risk from microbial contamination due to a drop/loss of water pressure within parts of the distribution system. Affected residents are advised against drinking the water without boiling it first. Customers

should bring all water to a rolling boil, let it boil for one minute, and let it cool before using; or use bottled water, the city said. The city said residents will be informed when the water is safe to drink. FOX43.com has the story

Local News on 8/4/23 at 605 705 lasting 35 seconds - Pennsylvanians who need help paying their water bill can apply for the Low-Income Household Water Assistance Program. The program is meant to help eligible families pay overdue water bills. Crisis grants may be available for those in an emergency situation who are in jeopardy of losing their water service. Recipients can get one crisis grant for drinking water service and one crisis grant for wastewater service, up to \$2,500 each. Crisis situations include: Past-due water bills, Termination of utility service, Danger of having utility service terminated (received a notice that service will be shut off within the next 60 days). Local News on 8/8/23 at 1535 lasting 40 seconds - The City of Lancaster Water Bureau is asking citizens to conserve water after an electrical issue at the Susquehanna Water Treatment plant limited production late Monday. LNP reports, notices went out at 11:30 Monday night asking residents to limit use to only essential needs so it can maintain adequate water pressure for critical operations, like medical facilities. Officials tell LNP, the electrical issue was corrected at 1 a.m. today, but they are keeping the notice active out of an abundance of caution, planning to lift it sometime this afternoon. Local News on 8/9/23 at 605 lasting 25 seconds - Residents and businesses in Shrewsbury, York County, are being asked to conserve water for the next three to five days. In a Facebook post, the borough said several key infrastructures were affected by Monday's storm – including roads, electricity, water, sewer and some cellular services. The extent of the damage is still being assessed. Other area's water may be affected by the storm as well. For more information visit WGAL.com

Local News on 8/9/23 at 635 805 lasting 33 seconds - People in Lancaster and surrounding areas are no longer being asked to conserve water. A plant worker with the city of Lancaster Bureau of Water said there was an electrical issue at the Columbia plant, meaning that water production fell on much smaller plants. The problem was discovered Monday morning, and crews worked on it all day. Out of an abundance of caution, the city decided to issue the conservation request around 11:30 p.m. Authorities said the problem was fixed early Tuesday,

but they didn't lift the order until they were sure the issue was fixed and some reserves had been built up. Details at WGAL.com

Local News on 8/10/23 at 605 705 lasting 32 seconds - The City of Lancaster Bureau of Water said it plans to issue a boil water advisory for some residents on the 1300 block of Glen Moore Circle, starting today. Water pressure will drop within the distribution system due to a valve replacement on the water main, the city said. There's an increased chance of disease-causing organisms that could cause nausea, cramps, or headaches. Young children, the elderly and people with compromised immune systems may have an increased risk. Local News on 8/30/23 at 705 635 805 835 noon lasting 35 seconds - Customers in and around Lancaster city may notice a strange taste or smell to their water, but the city's water provider assures it remains safe to drink. The City of Lancaster Bureau of Water assured customers in the east, southeast and northeast areas of its distribution system their water still meets all regulatory guidelines, even if customers notice an earthy or musty taste and odor in their supply. The bureau attributed the change to algae blooms in the Conestoga River and said the odor and taste could linger for days or weeks, depending on algae blooms and precipitation levels. more information, visit lancasteronline.com

Local News on 9/5/23 at 605 705 805 noon lasting 24 seconds - Residents of a Lebanon County borough are being asked to only use water for emergency purposes until further notice. The request from Richland officials comes after a water main break yesterday morning. The borough is losing a lot of water, and the reservoir is getting low, according to officials. The water is still safe to drink. Crews believe they've narrowed down the area where the break occurred and will now start digging test holes to pinpoint the exact location of the break. WGAL.com

Local News on 9/6/23 at 1635 1835 and 9/7 23 605, 705 735 835 noon lasting 20 seconds - The York Water Company is asking customers to restrict their usage due to reduced water supply. The company tells NEWS8, the hot and dry summer conditions that are extending into September make supply conditions worse. The few storms across the region have largely missed York or have fallen short of expectations. The York Water Company serves more than 2-

hundred- thousand people across Adams, Franklin and York counties. Details at WGAL.COM.

Local News on 9/13/23 605 1835 lasting 31 seconds The York Water Company is asking its customers to do more to restrict nonessential water use in the coming weeks. Earlier this month, the company asked its customers to voluntarily conserve water due to reduced supply in the company's watersheds. Recent rains have not made up for this year's deficit, which is nearly 11 inches. Local News on 9/19/23 at 605, 805 noon lasting 24 seconds York Water Company will continue the non-essential water restrictions in York, Adams and Franklin counties that began on September 15 despite the rainfall this past weekend. Activities like watering grass, washing a car or filling up a pool are prohibited. This is due to near historic lows in water levels at Lake Redman Reservoir The water company plans to constantly reevaluate the restrictions. Local21news.com for more details.

Local News on 9/22/23 at 635 lasting 45 seconds - Residents of one Manor Township neighborhood will need to continue boiling their tap water through Saturday after the fixing of one water main break led to a second. Crews completed the repair of a water main that broke Wednesday on Temple Avenue on the western edge of Lancaster Township, only to see it break again about 5 feet down the line, Lancaster city spokeswoman Amber Strazzo said. Such a scenario is not uncommon given the age of the pipes and infrastructure. Strazzo said the earliest the advisory would be lifted is Saturday, as crews need to finish repairs and test samples of the water to make sure it is safe for consumption. Residents should either use bottled water or bring their tap water to a rolling boil for at least one minute before drinking it, using it for food preparations or cleaning dishes. Local News on 9/26/23 at 605 705 735 835 noon lasted 34 seconds - As the rainy weather continues into today, residents of York County are wondering whether the rain has been enough to end the mandatory water restrictions. The county still says no. The York Water Company reported that the rain only added 1.6 feet to Lake Redman, the company's principal water supply. That means mandatory restrictions on nonessential water use implemented Sept. 15 will continue for the company's more than 200,000 customers in York County, as well

as Adams and Franklin counties. It's unclear how much longer the restrictions will remain in effect, or when the next consistent rain will be. More at WGAL.com

Local News on 9/19/23 at 1535 1735 lasting 17 seconds - The York County Board of Commissioners has voted for another countywide ban on open burning due to the dry weather conditions. The 15-day ban goes into effect this Thursday. Details at FOX43.COM.

Local News on 9/20/23 at 705 835 noon lasting 35 seconds - The York County Commissioners have announced that a 15-day burn ban to go into effect Thursday, September 21 in the county. This move is in response to record low stream levels, low groundwater levels, and dryer than normal temperatures with no significant forecasted rainfall. According to the commissioners, low rainfall in recent weeks has led to a high potential for wildfires in the area. The county-wide burn ban will be in effect for 15 days unless terminated earlier and applies to any and all open burning. The burn ban does not include the use of propane or gas stoves, charcoal briquette grills, or the use of tobacco. Details at ABC27.com

Local News on 9/21/23 at 1535 1735 - A reminder, the York County burn ban went into effect today. County commissioners tells NEWS8, the ban will continue for the next 15 days. Open burning outdoors is not allowed. Also, no fireworks. The use of propane or gas stoves, charcoal grills, or the use of tobacco is permitted. Campfires in designated state, and federal campgrounds are allowed in fire rings that contain the flames. Violators could face a fine of \$100, \$200 for the second offense and \$300 for the third. The company has received 23 reports of the monitors overheating "in Europe, including seven reports of minor injuries. No incidents or injuries have been reported in the United States. "The specific product is described as: Approximately 1.5-lb. plastic tray packages

containing “USDA CHOICE BLACK ANGUS BEEF FROM ALDI, BEEF FOR CARNE PICADA” with a “Use or Freeze by” date of Aug. 22, 2023, The beef item was produced on July 25th, 2023.
