Economy: The U.S. economy remains on course for steady growth, something that should help Arizona in the year ahead, The slowing Chinese economy has shaken financial markets here but should not significantly affect what is a relatively healthy labor market, At the same time, Arizona's slower-than-usual recovery from the Great Recovery figures to get incrementally better in 2016. While conditions are significantly better, they remain well behind Arizona's recent past. Spurred by slow but steady employment and housing growth, local and national economists remain cautiously positive about the economic forecast for Arizona.

Phoenix budget meetings in the Valley to discuss tax increases, police body cameras. Phoenix residents will have a chance to sound off at a meeting at Cesar Chavez High School. There's a push to raise taxes for next year's budget, but that's not all that's on the table. The city is also considering property tax increases and buying body cameras for Phoenix police. Mayor Greg Stanton is a big supporter of the plan. If approved, the department would put 2,000 body cams, which would also require hiring additional staff to manage and process the video. If property tax increases are approved, it would cost the average Phoenix homeowner about \$4.25 more per month, or \$51 per year, according to the city.

A grocery store is coming to downtown Phoenix. It's been a wish-list item for a lot of people who live downtown. City officials and RED Development announced that Fry's Food Stores would open a full-service grocery store blocks away from Chase Field, CityScape, Talking Stick Resort and downtown's historic neighborhoods. The 55,000-square-foot store will be a part of a "proposed mixed-use project" between Washington Street and Jefferson Avenue. Currently, the site is a surfaced parking lot. "This just made it a lot easier to move to downtown Phoenix" "This just made it a lot easier to move to downtown Phoenix," said Phoenix Mayor Greg Stanton in a news release.

Budget deal between Arizona House, Senate set for debate. Members of the Arizona House and Senate returned to the Capitol and appear to have finalized a budget agreement after a frustrating week of false starts. House Majority Leader Steve Montenegro, appropriations Chairman Justin Olson and members of a group that had been pushing for more school funding said late in the day that they were drafting final bill language and preparing to vote on the budget package. The House members seeking more K-12 school were trying to prevent cuts to smaller schools, district-sponsored charter schools and those with declining enrollment. They also wanted more money for school construction items. The plan also adds \$96 million in new highway construction money, \$30 million to counties and the rest for major highway projects,

including widening Interstate 10 between Phoenix and Tucson and new roadway near the Nogales Port of Entry. Ducey's new Border Security Strike Force also gets \$22.6 million in general fund money plus \$4 million from other funds. That's about \$5 million less than the governor wanted for the new program. The force is budgeted to get \$8 million a year in each upcoming year for operations. Other issues include \$35 million in extra funding for the Department of Child Safety in the current year and a \$24 million boost next year (10pm newscast on 5/2, 2:11 in length)

APS seeks rate boost, solar changes. Arizona's largest electric utility wants to increase residential electricity rates by about 8 percent and move most customers to a billing plan that charges them more if their power use surges during peak hours. Arizona Public Service Co. also wants to end solar power buyback plans it says don't fairly cover the costs of providing power to homes with solar panels starting in mid-2017. Existing rooftop solar customers will keep their current rates for 20 years after they are connected. (4pm newscast on 6/1, 1:00 in length)

Attesa Motorsports Complex: Brand new race track coming to Pinal County. A brand new race track is coming to the desert. Darrick Builders announced they are developing Attesa, a motorsports complex south of Casa Grande. Attesa will have two separate 2.8 mile road courses, a karting track, driver experience center, multi-surface racing and event center. In addition to the racing, there will be a private airport with a 6,000 foot runway. The area will also include a hotel, convention center and an entertainment district with dining and shopping. "Our model is incomparable to any other development in the United States. We'll combine speed, luxury experiences and motorsports opportunities for individuals from all walks of life," said Dan Erickson, principal of Darrick Builders. Employment/Jobs: In metro Phoenix, unemployment stands at 5.7 percent. By contrast, after the two recessions that preceded the Great Recession, unemployment was less than 4 percent. During this recovery, metro Phoenix has gained more than 200,000 jobs. But that's 100,000 fewer than the previous recoveries had at the same point. This is partly due to tepid population growth compared with years past. The Arizona economy is forecasted to grow in the coming year. The state continues to improve by attracting technology and finance jobs, offering a measure of higher incomes and greater diversity to the state's economy.

Two Valley cities rank among best nationwide to get a gig. Got the skills to pay the bills? Arizona may just have the job. Two Valley cities rank in the top 20 places nationwide to find work in 2016, according to a recent study by WalletHub. Scottsdale ranked No. 16 and Chandler took the No. 20 spot. Gilbert, Phoenix and Mesa made the top 50 at No. 28, No. 47 and No. 50 respectively. To come up with those numbers, WalletHub compared the 150 most populated cities across two key dimensions: job market and socio-economic environment. Analysts then compiled 17 factors including income, job opportunity and employment growth and gave them a value between 0 and 100, 100 being the best value and 0 the worst. Administrative support, food service adding most jobs in Arizona through 2017. Looking to change careers? The Arizona Department of Administration recently released the list of occupational groups adding the most jobs. Office and administrative support tops it, with more than 25,000 more positions through 2017. The food service industry ranks second. Jobs added in Arizona by 2017

1. Office and administrative support (+25,249)
2. Food preparation and serving related (+18,327)
3. Sales and related (+16,018)
4. Construction and extraction (+12,992)
5. Healthcare practitioners and technical (+9,570)

The list is in line with another finding by the ADA; jobs which don't require a high school diploma make up the fastest growing sector for the state. Many clerical, restaurant, and construction jobs do not require the worker to have completed high school. Jobs requiring a high school diploma at minimum comes in second.

Employment Numbers Take a Surprising Fall. In the midst of accumulating signs of economic growth, the May jobs report from the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) arrived like the skunk at the garden party. Analysts predicted that 164,000 jobs had been created in May, with bets hedged a bit lower because of a strike at Verizon that dropped payrolls by 35,000 jobs. The BLS reported only 38,000 jobs created, leading shocked pundits to speculate jokingly about a missing digit. If the number 38,000 withstands the next two monthly revisions, it will be the worst jobs number since the loss of 54,000 jobs in September 2010. The May unemployment rate fell from 5.0% to 4.7%, the lowest mark since November 2007.

Zenefits eliminating Tempe sales operation, cutting jobs, paying workers to quit. It's been one year to the month that Zenefits announced it was expanding into Tempe and bringing hundreds of new jobs by the end of 2015. Now, for the second time this year, Zenefits announced layoffs. A total of 250 employees were let go in February. Of those workers, 160 were from the Tempe office. A memo went out to all Zenefits employees regarding the elimination of another 106 jobs, which includes 80 jobs from the Tempe office, according to a company spokesperson. The sales operation in Tempe will be eliminated. As part of the changes, some current employees are also being offered buyouts. All of Zenefits' sales operations will be streamlined into the San Francisco office. The move resulted in a reduction of 9 percent of the workforce.

Family Issues:

Arizona promotes healthy parenting among individuals and in communities raising children. Two reports set the stage for the daunting work facing the state task force charged with reinventing the state's child-welfare agency. They confirm in numbers and trend lines the continued issues confronting child safety in Arizona: an increasing number of reports of child abuse and neglect, a growing number of kids in foster care and a revolving door for a quarter of the children caught.

Baby reportedly left in car for 30 minutes in Ahwatukee. A baby has been transported to the hospital after it was left inside an Ahwatukee car. Officials responded to a report of a baby that was left in the car for almost 30 minutes. Phoenix fire said the baby was transported to an area hospital for precautionary reasons. According to fire, the baby was not showing any signs of distress but due to the time in the car they decided to evaluate the baby at the hospital. There is no word why the child was left in the car.

PD: Roaches found covering Glendale home, mom arrested. A woman has been arrested after her home was apparently filled with cockroaches. According to court paperwork, officers responded to an apartment complex for a report of a family fight. When officers responded to the scene they found 26-year-old Treola Jimison inside the apartment with three of her children under the age of 6 years old. Court paperwork indicated crying and screaming could be heard inside the apartment before officers knocked down the door. When officers entered the house they found cockroaches all over the house. They said there was no edible food in the apartment and mold was growing on dishes. Court paperwork indicated all three children were well nourished. One of the children had diaper rash. The children are now in custody of DCS. While officers spoke to Jimison she appeared to be under the influence and was slow to respond to questions. Jimison later admitted her house was unlivable and she thought it was dangerous for the three children to be living in the home. She also admitted to smoking marijuana and told police she would bring the children to a neighbor's house so she can smoke. Jimison has been charged with three counts of child abuse.

Mom uses son's forehead cut to turn him into Harry Potter. One mom turned her son's forehead cut -- which he found so embarrassing that he didn't want to leave home -- into a cool, Harry Potter-themed costume. Brittaney Benesh, a fan of the hit Harry Potter series, told ABC News her 4-year-old son Ayden Benesh-Lastrella accidentally hit his head after jumping into a huge pile of laundry. "The next morning, as we are getting ready to leave, Ayden is crying about leaving because he doesn't like the big cut on his forehead, and that's when the idea came to me," the Vallejo, California woman, said. Benesh turned Benesh-Lastrella's forehead scar into Harry Potter's famous lightning bolt-shaped scar using a red marker. She completed Benesh-Lastrella's look with a pair of round glasses. Benesh said she didn't expect the photos to go viral

when she posted them on the image-sharing social network Imgur with the caption, "It's okay, mommy can fix this..."

Phoenix child living in home filled with bugs and rats. Court records show that the living conditions an 8-year-old child was forced to live in were so bad Department of Child services' workers were, "immediately overwhelmed by the conditions inside." Police responded to the home of 28-year-old Vernia Elizabeth Livingston and 32-year-old Gilbert Martinez, on May 27. The landlord went inside the home to spray for bugs and found the home, "in an overwhelming state of filth and was completely infested with bed bugs, cockroaches and rats." Authorities reportedly found dogs and cats chasing and eating rats at the home. "The furniture, walls, ceilings and floors were so highly infested with bed bugs that in some places, the ceilings appeared to be black." In addition, there were animals and bug feces throughout the house including the areas where the boy would eat and sleep. They also found prescription drugs and weapons right next to the child's toys. Police say the boy was well spoken, telling them he usually feeds himself, but did not have any lunch or dinner that day. He said he didn't want DCS to be called because he likes living with his mother.

Police investigating north Phoenix triple homicide; mother suspected of killing three sons. Phoenix Police say a mother is suspected of killing her three sons before harming herself in a north Phoenix home overnight. A man reportedly called police after he returned home to find his 29-year-old sister talking irrationally in the garage. She proceeded to lock him out of the house before locking herself in a bathroom, police say. The brother forced his way in and found her suffering from multiple serious, self-inflicted stab wounds to her neck and stomach. She had also reportedly tried to drown herself. The woman, who police say may also be currently pregnant, was taken to the hospital in critical condition. She is expected to survive at this point. Police say they were alerted that the woman had three sons, who police later found dead inside the home. Two boys, ages 8 and 5, were found in a closet. A 2-month-old boy was found inside a case of some type, police say. All had suffered multiple stab wounds.

Glendale man arrested for stabbing wife after she refuses to sleep in closet. A Glendale man, who demanded that his wife sleep in a closet, stabbed her when she refused to do what he said. Police were called to a home where a woman had been stabbed by her husband. Police report that 53-year-old Juan Vargas Rodriguez thought his wife was cheating on him after she came home late from work. He reportedly demanded that she sleep in the closet that night as punishment. When she refused, he allegedly pulled out an 8-inch serrated knife and grabbed the woman by the throat and said, "I'm going to kill you." He swung the knife and stabbed her in the arm. When the woman screamed, another woman came into the room and pulled Rodriguez off of her, allowing his wife to escape. When questioned by police, Rodriguez reportedly told them that he "kind of blacked out with rage." Rodriguez is facing an aggravated assault charge.

Two boys found after Amber Alert issued, suspect at large. An Amber Alert which had been issued in Utah, New Mexico and in Arizona for two Arizona boys who were taken by their step-father has been canceled. The boys were located, the suspect remains at large. According to officials, the children may have been headed towards New Mexico in a white 2000 Alero Oldsmobile. The step-father threatened to leave the children in the desert. Lyric Gray, 5, and Kerwin Gray, 7, were located shortly before noon in Gallup, New Mexico in the area of the Manuelito Canyon. The boys went missing from Wheatfield, Arizona. Officials believe they were being taken to Mentmore, New Mexico by suspect Clinton Johnson, 26. Officials say there are no weapons on the man, but he is considered dangerous.

PD: Man shoots brother over NBA Finals game bet. Court records show that on June 13, after game five of the NBA Finals, a man shot his brother when an argument erupted over a \$5 wager between the victim and the shooter's son. Police reported that 42-year-old John Smith shot his brother in the chest with a .45 caliber handgun. The game where the Cleveland Cavaliers beat the Golden State Warriors 112 to 97. The victim told police that his brother's family was staying at his apartment for a few days before moving to Las Vegas. The victim made a \$5 wager on the game with his nephew but a heated argument ensued after his nephew lost the bet. The

suspect took his son into the bathroom to talk with him and when they exited the bathroom, Smith reportedly told the victim to not to talk to his "son in that manner." Smith then took a gun out of his waistband and shot his brother one time in the chest. Police say the victim is expected to survive. Smith has been charged with aggravated assault resulting in serious injuries. (10pm newscast on 6/20, 30 in length)

Crime/Violence: Phoenix police are dealing with a dramatic increase in violent crimes. And, with the department short staffed, the crime outlook does not look good. The caseload is demanding on an already strapped department. Phoenix police have started recruiting and are expected to hire 50 to 60 officers this year, even more officers are expected to retire. The department knows of at least 55 officers scheduled to leave the force by the end of the year. While violent crime numbers are up, property crime numbers are down 3 percent since January. Three hundred officers are expected to be hired within the next three years.

PD: Random shots fired hit woman standing outside of Phoenix apartment complex. Police are investigating after a man shot a woman standing outside of a Phoenix apartment complex. Officials responded to the apartment complex after receiving the call for help. According to information on scene, it appears that a man was shooting randomly into the air off of a second-floor breezeway. A woman in her twenties was standing outside smoking at the time and was struck in the leg and chest. She suffered critical injuries. ABC15 saw someone in handcuffs at the scene, but it appears that person was only being questioned. Police have not yet said if they have identified a person of interest or any suspects. (6am newscast on 5/3, 1:30 in length)

Phoenix police officer killed in shootout identified as David Glasser. Authorities have identified the officer who died after a shooting in southwest Phoenix as Officer David Glasser. Glasser, 35, had been with the Phoenix Police Department for 12 years. He worked in the Maryvale precinct and served in the unit's Neighborhood Enforcement Team, which responds to specific issues within a neighborhood. Chief Joseph Yahner said members of the team are called for a wide variety of issues, from plain clothes investigations to big events. Glasser was shot responding to a burglary in progress. Police say the suspect started shooting from a van when officers arrived. Police returned fire, killing the suspect. Glasser was rushed to the hospital in extremely critical condition. Woman arrested for practicing dentistry without license in Phoenix apartment. A Woman has been arrested for practicing dentistry without a license from an apartment in west Phoenix. Court records show that the unlicensed dentist was using the apartment as her office for the past two years. Police became aware that a 54-year-old was practicing dentistry without a license from an apartment. Authorities say the owner of the Lynnwood apartment complex contacted them saying he had found out the former office manager referred an employee to the "dentist," known to tenants as "Mama Eida." He went for a consultation two years ago but never had any actual work done. The owner also learned that other tenants were getting dental and orthodontic work done. Gunman captured after shootings north of Phoenix. A gunman armed with a rifle, body armor and extra ammunition opened fire at cars on a highway in the Phoenix outskirts, leaving at least two people injured before police captured him near a stolen car that crashed into a ditch. Arizona Department of Public Safety officials identified the suspect as James David Walker, 36, of San Tan Valley. They said Walker was being booked into the downtown Phoenix jail on suspicion of attempted homicide, aggravated assault, endangerment, armed robbery, theft of means of transportation and possession of dangerous drugs with additional charges pending. Family of Angela Russo shares heartbreak as caution when meeting people online. Angela Russo's family is sharing their heartbreak as a cautionary tale when it comes to online dating. It's been a living nightmare for the Maricopa family after their daughter was killed during a blind date and the truth remained hidden with her body for more than a month. Angela's mother Diana Schalow says Lashawn Johnson used a fake name in his dating profile. He told her daughter that he was in the military -- complete with a picture in army fatigues -- and that he was trustworthy and single. They've since learned it was all lies and in fact he had a live-in girlfriend

and an estranged wife. According to court documents, when Russo went to meet him at his Maryvale apartment for their first date, at some point he attacked and cornered her before allegedly killing her. Authorities believe he tried to hide the evidence by burning her car and burying her body in the desert near Tonopah.

Transportation: The number of people killed in vehicle-related crashes on Arizona roads has risen significantly in the last year. The Arizona Department of Transportation reported that preliminary information indicates that roughly 890 died in car crashes in 2015. ADOT officials say the figure far surpasses the 773 deaths recorded in 2014. The agency says factors that contributed to the road-related deaths include speeding, impaired driving and a failure to wear a seat belt. State agencies are urging motorists to consider how they behave when behind the wheel. ADOT officials expect to have a final tally on the number of fatalities in its annual report, which will be released later this year.

Arizona eyes federal funding to accelerate highway projects. Arizona transportation officials are trying to accelerate several key highway projects. The state Department of Transportation is applying for a total of \$110 million of federal grants to improve Interstate 10 between Phoenix and Tucson, rehabilitate an Interstate 15 bridge in northwestern Arizona and upgrade a highway serving a major border crossing in Nogales. ADOT plans several steps to improve I-10, including widening two stretches in Pinal County and enhancing technology such as remote sensors that provide early warning of dust storms. The agency wants to upgrade State Route 189 in Nogales with a raised median and improved ramps connecting with Interstate 19. The Interstate 15 project involves an 850-foot-long bridge over the Virgin River. ADOT says the bridge was built in 1964 and has never undergone a major rehabilitation.

TSA replaces head of security operations. A House committee said Monday that the head of security operations at the Transportation Security Administration has been replaced. "Kelly Hoggan has been removed from his position as head of security at TSA," the House Committee on Oversight and Government Reform posted on Twitter. Meanwhile, The Associated Press obtained a memo sent by TSA Administrator Peter Neffenger that does not mention Hoggan but names a temporary replacement. "Darby LaJoye will serve as the Acting Assistant Administrator of the Office of Security Operations," Neffenger wrote in the memo addressed to TSA senior leaders. "Darby LaJoye is an experienced Federal Security Director with successful leadership tours at two of the nation's largest airports, Los Angeles International Airport in California and John F. Kennedy International Airport in New York." The oversight committee said Hoggan received more than \$90,000 in bonuses over a period from late 2013 to late 2014.

Teen crashes spike during "100 Deadliest Days" of driving. Phoenix is now in the "100 Deadliest Days" for driving according to AAA, which usually leads to a spike in deadly crashes involving teens. Memorial Day is the start of this trend which lasts until Labor Day, and during this time ten people die every day in crashes with a teen driver. A new AAA study reveals pretty alarming teen driving statistics. 60 percent of teen crashes involve distracted driving. Of those crashes, 15 percent involve teens talking to passengers, and 12 percent involve teens talking or texting on their phone. 11 percent of teen crashes are from the driver looking at or for something inside the vehicle. AAA says parents can help keep cell phones away from teen drivers, and have a conversation with kids about the dangers of distracted driving.

AAA increasing roadside fleet for hot weekend; drivers urged to check vehicles, fluids and fuel. When it's this warm outside, the last place you want to find yourself is stranded on the side of the steaming-hot road. AAA Arizona is reminding drivers to do vehicle safety checks and check all fluids -- including fuel -- before each trip. Just in case you do need help along your drive, AAA will be increasing their fleet by 20 percent amid the possibly record-breaking temperatures.

Education: Teachers have been fleeing Arizona in droves, resulting in such a serious shortage of experienced teachers that state officials are warning of serious consequences if the exodus continues. Over the last five years, thousands of teachers have left the state, according to a 2015 report by the Arizona Department of Education, with this past school year being possibly

the worst. Why are so many teachers leaving? Educators say reasons include low pay, insufficient classroom resources, and so many testing requirements and teaching guidelines that they feel they have no flexibility and too little authentic instructional time.

ABC15 investigates charter school's meetings Confusion exists over whether a Valley charter school operator's board meetings should be open to the public. Edkey, Inc. operates charter schools in several Valley cities. ABC15 has checked once per week every week in 2016, but has not seen any board meeting agendas posted online since 2015 ended. ABC15 was barred from entering a 2015 meeting of Edkey's corporate board. However, an opinion from the Arizona Attorney General states that corporate board meetings are indeed public if "a quorum of the charter school governing board is present, and... there is discussion about matters that could foreseeably come to a vote before the charter school governing board." Edkey has little reason for existence other than the administration of the charter schools, tax documents show. Several controversies have embroiled Edkey schools over the last year.

Some districts add in special clauses to teacher contracts ahead of Prop 123 vote. Some Arizona school districts, not knowing whether Proposition 123 would pass, wrote special clauses in teacher contracts for next school year. Proposition 123 would use \$3.5 billion from the state land trust over 10 years for increased school funding. Teacher contracts are generally negotiated in early spring, making it impossible to wait until the May 17 election. As teachers and administrators in the Phoenix Union High School District celebrated graduations, they delayed any celebration about Prop 123. With a 7,600-vote gap between "yes" and "no" votes, the race is too close to call. The Secretary of State's office indicates as many as 100,000 ballots have not been counted yet. In the Phoenix Union district, administrators say teachers will receive a .5 percent pay increase if the proposition fails. If it passes, they will receive a 1.5 to 2.5 percent increase to base pay, plus a 3 percent "bump" this summer. Some returning teachers will receive additional pay enhancements.

Gov. Doug Ducey addresses passage of Prop 123 "Arizona got better today." Those were the words Gov. Doug Ducey said at a press conference where he declared victory on the expected passage of Prop 123. A measure that would boost education funding by tapping the state's land trust is surging closer to a victory with new vote tallies. The Republican governor said Thursday evening that "the result is clear" and called the results a huge victory for public education in Arizona. The addition of more than 92,000 votes brought the lead from about 7,600 votes on Wednesday to more than 16,700 out of more than 1 million counted. Several counties still have ballots to count, but the chances of a major turnaround appear highly unlikely. The measure taps the state land trust to fund more than half of \$3.5 billion in new school spending over 10 years.

Housing: Housing will be back as force for growth in 2016, Arizona economists say Demographic factors that for years slowed down Arizona's housing industry finally seem to be turning in the state's favor, one of the reasons economic growth should keep chugging along in 2016. Millennials, the generation whose oldest members are in their mid-30s, are marrying, with many becoming first-time homebuyers. Younger members of the generation are leaving their parents' homes and creating strong demand for apartments. As they grow older and marry, life events will create even more demand for more single-family housing. The Phoenix area should have at least 15,000 building permits for single-family houses this year and at least 18,000 next year.

Phoenix foreclosure turnaround among best in nation. The greater Phoenix area has made great strides in its foreclosure rate since the quarterly peak of foreclosure filings in the second quarter of 2009. In fact, the Valley is doing better than most of the nation according to RealtyTrac, a real estate foreclosure research company. In the first quarter of 2016, foreclosure filings were 93 percent below the peak. The national average is 69 percent below. The only metro area in the nation faring better is Merced, California, which is 95 percent below the quarterly peak.

Tempe officials talk about permanent housing for homeless. A ban on sitting along the sidewalk of a major road takes effect. The ordinance would mean no sitting or sleeping on sidewalks

along Mill Avenue. Council members adopted the ordinance after complaints from dozens of businesses along the busy street who said the presence of homeless people was driving customers away. The city has faced some criticism from homeless advocates in the community after the move. Some felt the city was pushing the homeless off the sidewalks, but not doing anything to help them. There are no permanent shelters to house the homeless in Tempe. (6pm newscast on 5/7, 1:20 in length)

Some Valley homeowners have two property tax bills. Most homeowners pay a single property tax to the county every year. But one Valley woman warns that if you live in a house like hers, you could get two separate bills. That would be one for the land and one for the house. For years, Janet Zupet only paid one of the bills. Then she got a notice from the county saying she had some very old unpaid bills and that they were going to take action if she didn't pay them. She'd always thought paying the one bill took care of everything. But Janet lives in a manufactured home. In that case, the land and house are taxed separately. That is unless you have something called an Affidavit of Affixture. This combined the land and the house, which would mean one property tax. When Janet couldn't get help, she let me know. The Assistance League of Phoenix volunteer team took her complaint. And they made calls. They contacted Janet's title company and found they should have taken care of this when Janet bought the house. The title company agreed. They gave Janet back more than \$500 that she paid in overdue taxes. And they took care of the Affidavit of Affixture as well. So Janet shouldn't have the problem again. US home sales growth driven mostly by Midwest. Sales jumped 12.1 percent in the Midwest, generally the most affordable region for housing. Purchases increased slightly in the Northeast but fell in the South and West. A shortage of sales listings are pushing up home values, creating affordability pressures for some potential buyers. The number of listings has fallen 3.6 percent over the past 12 months. Prices have climbed so substantially in the West that sales volumes have actually declined from a year ago, evidence that buyers are priced out of the market where home values have constantly eclipsed wage gains. The median home sales price was \$232,500 in April, a 6.3 percent increase from a year ago. But sales have been strong enough so far this year that the Realtors expect total sales to rise 3 percent from 2015, revising an initial forecast of nearly flat sales in 2016. Immigration: High levels of illegal immigration and crimes committed by unauthorized immigrants are among the key rationales cited by some supporters of a tough new immigration law in Arizona. According to our Governor, Jan Brewer; border violence and crime due to illegal immigration are critically important issues to the people of our state. During the year controversial immigration measure SB 1070 passed, Arizona fell from eighth to 18th on the list of states most popular among people moving from other countries, Pollack said. He blames the stigma that came with the law.

Arizona bill would require undocumented immigrants to serve full sentences. A proposal barring judges from giving sentencing breaks to immigrants in the country illegally and making them ineligible for parole is set for a hearing in the Arizona Senate. Republican Sen. Steve Smith says his proposal is designed to ensure that people who already broke immigration laws are penalized if they violate state laws. Senate Bill 1377 requires that judges sentence people to the presumptive term in jail or prison for new crimes when they've already violated immigration laws. Another bill by the Maricopa lawmaker would take state shared revenue from any municipality that enacts "sanctuary city" policies benefiting immigrants. That's already illegal in Arizona, but Smith wants penalties and put them in Senate Bill 1378. Both are set for hearings Wednesday before a Senate committee Smith chairs. Union claims immigrant labor abuse, protesting outside of Tesla shop in Scottsdale. Maybe you've seen them, men sitting or standing behind a large white sign that reads: IMMIGRANT LABOR ABUSE at TESLA. Their dispute isn't with the Tesla shop in Arizona as much as it is with the contractor hired to work on the Tesla Motors' gigafactory that is being built in Nevada. "It's not a union issue. It's an immigrant-abuse issue. I can't stress that enough," Mike Witt, special representative for Carpenters Local 971 Southwest Regional Council, said over the phone. Witt said Brycon Corporation, which is headquartered in New Mexico but has an office in

Chandler, is not paying everyone area-standard wages at the battery manufacturing worksite. "It could be a \$15 to \$20 difference than area standards," Witt said. Brycon Corp. Chief Financial Officer Phil Casaus said he can't offer specifics about the project and scope of work at the facility, but said the accusations by the Local 971 have no merit. "Union construction workers walked off the job in February claiming Brycon Corp. hired a large number of out-of-state workers and was not complying with state requirements. According to the Associated Press, approximately 350 plumbers, carpenters, electricians, painters and others walked away from the construction site. Witt said the banner-holders are paid to stand with the sign for approximately 6 hours a day. He said they have been in the Phoenix-area for nearly two months and don't have a timetable for ending their protest.

Immigrant advocates plan rally outside Arpaio's office. Immigrant rights advocates are planning a rally outside Sheriff Joe Arpaio's office to call for a judge to bring criminal contempt-of-court charges against the lawman. Organizer Salvador Reza says Arpaio opponents believe a criminal contempt case is warranted against the sheriff for his disobedience of court orders in a racial profiling case. Earlier this month, Arpaio was found to be in civil contempt for violating his orders, such as letting officers conduct immigration patrols 18 months after the judge barred them. The decision brings Arpaio to a possible criminal contempt case that could expose him to fines and even jail time. Arpaio says the protest organizers have held demonstrations against him in the past. He says he hopes protesters behave themselves as they exercise their free-speech rights.

New Prescott College fee will fund undocumented student scholarship. A new, mandatory fee at an Arizona college will pay for a scholarship for undocumented immigrants. The \$30 fee at Prescott College will be required this fall for all students attending class on its campus about 100 miles northwest of Phoenix. More than 50 percent of students at the private school signed a petition supporting the proposal, according to the organizer of the effort, Miriel Manning. "It's a challenging conversation sometimes with students," Manning, a graduate student, said when asked whether there was any campus opposition to the effort. "Overall, I'm really impressed by the way we've come together," Manning said. This is only the second such fee at a college nationwide, according to a news release from the school. The money from the fee, plus additional support from the school, will provide one full-tuition scholarship for an undocumented student beginning with the 2016-17 academic year.

Supreme Court immigration decision sparks Phoenix protest, 4 arrested. PHOENIX - Protesters gathered outside the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement building in Phoenix to voice their dismay at a Supreme Court decision blocking President Barack Obama's plan to shield millions living in the U.S. illegally from deportation. More than 60 activists blocked parts of Central Avenue, a major thoroughfare, just north of downtown just before noon. They were carrying signs in sweltering heat and chanting in Spanish and English. About two dozen more stood on the sidewalk in the shade. Phoenix police officers were monitoring the scene. Air15 video showed two women and two men apparently being arrested after refusing to leave the street. The action came hours after the nation's high court deadlocked on an Obama administration appeal of a lower court decision that blocks his 2014 plan. Texas led Arizona and other Republican-dominated states in challenging the Obama program.

The state Department of Health Services says a tick-borne disease similar to Rocky Mountain spotted fever has been identified in Arizona. The department says the cases involve two people bitten by ticks in mountainous areas of southern Arizona. According to the department, there have only been 40 cases of the disease in the United States since it was first recognized in 2004 and the tick that carries the disease was hardly known in Arizona. Symptoms of the disease include fever, headache, joint and muscle pain, rash, and a dark scab at the site of the tick bite.

Arizona measles outbreak could have exposed thousands. State health officials are watching 20 people who were likely exposed to measles since the outbreak began. The Arizona Department of Health Services says the 11 confirmed cases will almost certainly go up, as more time passes since the initial case. State health officials say the number of exposed people could reach into the thousands. Right now is the time to act, they say. People who chose not to get vaccinated or have children who are older than six months and are not vaccinated, now is the time to get the shot. Measles can be deadly and it's highly contagious. "Anytime we see measles cases in this state, we are very alarmed, just because the disease is so contagious," said Jessica Rigler from the Arizona Department of Health Services.

Glendale firefighters say majority of 75 medical calls were for heat-related illness. The heat got dangerous for some as soccer fans braved the extreme temperatures at the Copa America match at University of Phoenix Stadium. With 65,000 people attending the event, first responders were ready with their mini ambulances on standby to be able to maneuver through the crowds. The extreme heat didn't keep fans away, though many saying it was scary at times. Many fans said watching the event was worth waiting out in the heat. Glendale fire crews say many fans weren't prepared, including wearing the wrong clothing for the extreme heat or drinking energy drinks and alcohol instead of water.

There have been 13 confirmed cases in Pinal County.

Sedona residents air concerns over smoke from managed fires. Forest officials will address concerns over a trio of lightning caused-wildfires that were allowed to burn for weeks in northern Arizona. The Coconino National Forest managed the fires to cut down on heavy fuels on the forest floor. Work on at least one was cut short over complaints about the smoke. The lead photo in the Sedona newspaper over the weekend showed a smoke-filled landscape. Above it read: "A Bowlful of Smoke for Breakfast." Forest officials will explain how they decide whether to let fires burn or suppress them.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Symptoms usually appear between a week and two weeks after a person is infected. Gives several chances to fix defective cars Joe Ducey reports on 4/01 at 6pm TRT 1:27 It's one of the most confusing topics we tackle -- what do you do when you buy a lemon? Unfortunately, cars are not like clothes, you can't just return them; even when they are defective. But you do have a few protections described in the Lemon Law. For used cars: The Lemon Law kicks in when a major component breaks down within 15 days or 500 miles of the purchase, whichever is sooner. The dealer gets two chances to fix it, but can charge you up to \$25 each time. If the problem is not fixed after the second attempt, you are entitled to a refund of the purchase price. For new cars: Everything is on the manufacturer, and they get a lot of time to figure it out. If the car has major problem within two years or 24 months of purchase, you are covered. That means the manufacturer gets four attempts to fix the car. But, the car cannot be out of service for more than 30 days. If it's not fixed in that time, the manufacturer has to accept the return of the car or replace it with a new one. Can't get the dealer or manufacturer to follow the law? File a complaint with the Arizona Attorney General's Office and the Arizona Department of Financial Institutions because it's their job to enforce the rules.

FBI: AZ businesses falling for CEO scam Joe Ducey reports on 4/04 at 6pm TRT: 1:22 Scammers are successfully posing as company CEO's through email, bilking hundreds of thousands of dollars from Valley businesses according to the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). The agency says scammers find their victims by finding out who makes the financial decisions for the company. Then monitoring them on social media, learning their mannerisms and how they write. "It's somebody that has done social engineering and has done a significant amount of work examining social accounts such as LinkedIn, your Facebook, your Twitter account," says Special Agent Mark Cwynar. Then they spoof the email. "They get in and make it look like a legit email from the CEO to the CFO," he says. The fake CEO email instructs the money handlers to wire money for an urgent matter. "They are following up with vulgar language," Cwynar says. "Do you want your job? I told you to get this done. It's not done so obviously you don't like working here very much." Since October 2015, ten Arizona businesses lost between \$25,000 and \$75,000 each, and consumers may well be picking up the tab. Cwynar says a simple phone call between employees could stop it. But if it does happen, your best chance of getting that money back is to act quickly. "If you can get to your financial institution within hours it's standard, they can stop the transaction," he says. Bottom line--don't trust anyone, not even your boss. And question everything. The FBI also suggests that businesses come up with a word of the day as an extra layer of security. That way if you get a questionable email from another employee, and they don't know the code word--you know that there is a problem.

You always hear that location is important. But there are other things that can give you an edge too. Realtor Paula Serven says if your house is on the market, start packing your stuff now. "You want people to be able to see what they'll have to use," she says. That means clearing clutter from counters, keeping minimal furniture in the house and removing pictures from walls. "If you keep things kind of organized during the time that it's on the market, it makes a big difference to people," Serven says. She would know. Serven's been a realtor in the Valley for 24 years, currently serves as President of the Arizona Association of Realtors , and says pictures are important too. And because most buyers start searching online they better be good. Serven says it takes at least 1,000 views before a potential buyer comes to check out the house. Unless you're priced under \$175,000. "There's multiple offers on the lower end of affordable housing," she says. There are a lot fewer of those homes on the market. So if you're looking to buy expect some serious competition and be financial prepared to pay full closing costs. Things become more negotiable in the \$220 to \$600,000 range. Anything over that amount, Serven says, "you'll spend more time on the higher end on the market." But that can mean more wiggle room for buyers.

The owner says his business name was stolen and used for other scams in California and Oregon. Scammers can go by various names, but the warning signs are usually the same: 1. Landlords who will not meet with you 2. Deposits you have to send by wire transfers and 3. Rent prices that are far below others in the same area. Before renting, look up the owner of the property with the county and deal only with them. If it's a property management company, check them out online. Call the person or company to make sure they are real, and never send money blindly to someone you don't know.

Scammer leads woman across Valley, steals thousands of dollars. Joe Ducey reports on 5/17 at 6pm TRT: 2:12. Those are the impressions I got when I first met Mary. That's not her real name. She wants to keep her identity secret right now. You'll understand why when you hear about her journey across the Valley. It started with a couple of calls. Her caller ID showed Scottsdale Police and the IRS. The caller said there was a warrant out for her arrest from a long overdue, unpaid debt. "If I didn't show up within 30 minutes there would be a cop car to take me down in handcuffs in jail," Mary says. But the caller had another plan. A plan that would send Mary across the Valley. She got in her car, with her phone, and the caller gave her driving instructions. "The phone became a robot, hypnotic, telling you where to drive," she says. Mary was led to stores like Fry's, Safeway and Best Buy. She would spend \$2,000 at one place, \$2,500 at another. She cashed a bond, tapped into savings--anything to make this terrible thing go away. "In the way your mind copes with the worst situations ever and if you are compliant, you can get to the end," she says. Each time, at each store, she was buying iTunes cards and then coming back to the car and reading numbers over the phone. The Federal Trade Commission says iTunes, Amazon and other gift cards are the new way scammers get their money. They get the numbers and it's like cash in their pocket. In the end, Mary drove for nearly five hours. And she spent more than \$15,000.

They say their HOA, the Anthem Parkside Community Association, isn't listening to them, and that what could be allowed to happen would "destroy the flavor of Anthem." It involves a house in a residential neighborhood. The LDS Church wants to use it for a seminary. The house is adjacent to Boulder Creek High School where students would be able to walk back and forth. Plans call for 120 students daily to use the home, but they would only come in groups of 30 at a time. No parking or drop offs at the house would be allowed, and it could only take place while the high school is in session. Homeowners say it will still mean congestion and set a precedent for other organizations moving into other houses. Besides, they say a school can't be placed there by law. HOA Board President Doug Sutherland calls it a seminary, and that it is allowed with a variance. The board voted 3-2 in favor of moving forward with the idea, but homeowners say that too was unfair. One of the board members at the time voting for the variance is an LDS church member. The owners say he should have excused himself from voting, but Sutherland says there was no conflict of interest because there was no monetary gain.

Photo radar cameras are back up, but there's still a lot of confusion about what to do if you get a ticket. Viewer Rashard in Avondale tells me he got a ticket from one of the cameras in Paradise Valley and asks, "What is the rule and should I pay the ticket?" Sharon in Peoria says, "Are the photo radar tickets from El Mirage legal?" The short answer is yes, the tickets are legal. But attorney Robert Gruler of R&R Law Group says, that doesn't mean you have to pay immediately. "Your first line of defense is definitely to wait it out," he says. "Make them do their job. Don't make it any easier on them." State law says if you do not respond to the mailed ticket, it must be served, in person within 90 days of the date it was filed with the court. Within that 90-day period cities have the option to use a process server to fulfill their obligation or ask a court for alternative service. Once granted, alternative service no longer requires that you be served in person. "They go to the post office mail it certified mail and then a process server will physically come to the house and tape it to the door," Gruler says. He says that rarely happens, with a couple of exceptions. "The City of Scottsdale is going to be very aggressive, the City of Mesa as well. They serve almost every single ticket," he says. If you do get served, that's when you are legally obligated to respond. "You need to do something otherwise if you just continue to ignore it then they're going to suspend your license and enter a default judgment against you," Gruler says.

Beware of online car warranty companies. Joe Ducey reports on 5/26 at 6pm TRT: 1:37 A Valley man is fighting to get money he says he is owed from an online car warranty company. Ali Othman, of Glendale, says he spent nearly \$8000 on a three year plan with DirectBuyAutoWarranty.com. A year into the contract he was ready to sell the car, and get his prorated refund. "I was at least expecting back at least \$5000," he says. But Ali says he couldn't get anyone to call him back. "I called over 200 times," and he says eventually he outsmarted the system. "I would trick the system to say I'm trying to buy a warranty versus talking about my existing warranty and they answered very fast," he says. Finally, they agreed to a \$2000 refund in 7 to 10 days. Six months later Ali says he is still waiting. A check online would have shown the New Jersey based company had been in trouble for years. Allegations range from illegally selling plans in Washington State, operating without a license in Oklahoma to fraud in its own state of New Jersey. The Better Business Bureau tells me it's received 13 complaints from Arizonans. Just this month the Arizona Department of Insurance issued a cease and desist order. It says Direct Buy Auto Warranty, and its executive director Albert Hakim, had no business operating in the state in the first place. The company now appears out of business.

Haveibeenpwned.com might be able to tell you. It's a database of over nearly 1 billion stolen profiles that was founded and maintained by cyber security expert Troy Hunt. It's easy to use.
