Economy: The U.S. economy remains on course for steady growth, something that should help Arizona in the year ahead, The slowing Chinese economy has shaken financial markets here but should not significantly affect what is a relatively healthy labor market, At the same time, Arizona's slower-than-usual recovery from the Great Recovery figures to get incrementally better in 2016. While conditions are significantly better, they remain well behind Arizona's recent past. Spurred by slow but steady employment and housing growth, local and national economists remain cautiously positive about the economic forecast for Arizona.

Fry's opening fourth new Marketplace this year in Chandler. This isn't your grandma's grocery shopping store anymore. Weekly trips to the supermarket have become an experience. Customers order groceries online and pick them up outside the store. According to a news release from Fry's, the \$4.95 service fee for ClickList will be waived for the first three orders. The Saguaro Scottsdale in Old Town gets facelift, adds 15,000 square-foot reception area. It's a new look for an Old Town Scottsdale hotel! The Saguaro Scottsdale, the mid-century style building with the funky colors and quirky decor, underwent a major facelift by adding a huge indoor and outdoor event space and an overhaul of its 194 rooms. The re-launch this month includes a new reception area. "With the addition of the Agave Ballroom and Patio, we now have all the requisites to be event central," said Dennis Park, Director of Sales and Marketing. "We can accommodate social functions and corporate meetings of all sizes, from a reception for up to 500 people overlooking Scottsdale's scenic art destination, Civic Center Park, to a conference for 200 that includes separate dining and cocktail spaces, plus an office or boardroom. Arizona Coyotes expected to announce details of a new arena. The Arizona Coyotes are holding a news conference and are expected to announce a deal for a new arena. It has been well known for months that the Coyotes did not plan on staying at Gila River Arena after their 2018-2019 season when their contract with the City of Glendale expires. In July, the Coyotes announced they secured a location for a new arena, though that location has not been publicly revealed. In October, CEO Anthony LeBlanc elaborated on the issue in an interview with ABC15. "I know there's (people on) social media that joke about me, saying I sound like a contractor: 'It'll be ready in two weeks," LeBlanc said. "I'm not going to sit here and tell you a time, but I can tell people we will have something out on the market very soon." (11am newscast on 11/14, :35 in length)

Groundbreaking on new North Peoria high-end shopping complex expected in early 2017. It seems everywhere you turn in the northwest Valley, something new is popping up. In neighborhoods like Northlands, just east of the Loop 303, there are rows of homes in various stages of construction. Finishing touches are going on the plans to build a 100+ acre community park off Lake Pleasant Parkway behind the New River Dam. A brand new 123,000 square foot Fry's Marketplace on Lake Pleasant just north of Happy Valley is slated to open first quarter of 2017. That's around the same time Scottsdale-based MDC Land Development will be breaking ground on 83 Marketplace, a nine-acre neighborhood retail center. "People who have moved to this area have been waiting for a development like this and they are excited to welcome it," said Vice Mayor Bridget Binsbacher. "These are exactly the kind of projects that Peoria looks for to fill the needs of our residents and offer options to those who are visiting the city." (11am newscast on 11/22, 1:00 in length)

Grand Canyon hits 6 million visitors, setting annual record. FLAGSTAFF, AZ - Grand Canyon National Park has surpassed its visitation record for the second year in a row. The Arizona Dally Sun reports that the park announced Monday that it had received its 6 millionth visitor, a 9 percent increase over the 5,520,736 visitors from 2015. The park believes its traffic is up this year because the National Park Service is celebrating its centennial and has increased marketing for the event. Last year was also record-breaking for the park: 2015 marked the first time more than 5 million people visited the park in a year. The Grand Canyon hit the 4-million-visitor mark in 1992. The 6 millionth visitors were the Johnson family from Las Vegas, who were at the Grand Canyon for the first time. (6am newscast on 12/13, :30 in length)

Employment/Jobs: In metro Phoenix, unemployment stands at 5.7 percent. By contrast, after the two recessions that preceded the Great Recession, unemployment was less than 4 percent. During this recovery, metro Phoenix has gained more than 200,000 jobs. But that's 100,000 fewer than the previous recoveries had at the same point. This is partly due to tepid population growth compared with years past. The Arizona economy is forecasted to grow in the coming year. The state continues to improve by attracting technology and finance jobs, offering a measure of higher incomes and greater diversity to the state's economy.

<u>Several Valley companies looking for workers, seasonal help wanted</u>. If you are currently out of the workforce or looking for a new job, there are hundreds of employers looking for workers in the Valley.

How your employment history can affect your mortgage rate. Buying property is one of the largest purchases and biggest financial commitment that most Americans will make. Arizona votes in favor of Proposition 206, which will increase the state's minimum wage. An increase in the minimum wage is coming to the Grand Canyon State. Arizona voters passed Proposition 206, which will increase the state's minimum wage to \$10 per hour in 2017 and to \$12 per hour by 2020. Prop 206 will also require businesses with 15 or more employees to provide at least 40 hours of annual paid sick time to employees. Businesses with fewer than 15 employees will be required to provide at least 24 hours of paid sick time per year to each employee. Yes on Prop 206 essentially giving a victory speech as they lead the AZ vote to raise minimum wage. Employees and small business owners had differing opinions on how Prop 206 will impact the state.

New Arizona House Speaker J. D. Mesnard considering lawsuit to block minimum wage increase. The incoming speaker of the Arizona House of Representatives said he is considering

whether to file a lawsuit to block an increase to the minimum wage approved by voters last month. Rep. J.D. Mesnard said the increase might run afoul of the state Constitution's requirement that initiatives contain a funding source if they require state outlays. He said he hasn't reached that conclusion and will have Arizona House attorneys analyze the measure before deciding whether to sue. Companies that provide services to the developmentally disabled under state contracts say they may have to pull back or cease operations if the wage increase isn't blocked. The firms run on tight margins and have faced cutbacks in state reimbursements in recent years. The attorney representing backers of Proposition 206 said the initiative exempts the state itself from having to pay the higher wages, so there's no legal issue for contract workers because that's not mandatory state spending that would violate the requirement to identify a funding source.

Arizona to rehire 40 fired Department of Economic Security employees. The State of Arizona is offering to rehire Department of Economic Security employees who were fired by former Director Tim Jeffries. The Arizona Department of Administration announced they have finalized decisions regarding employees who were "improperly separated" from their positions. ADOA said they received 267 emails requesting a review of their cases. Of the 267 cases, the state is offering to rehire 40 employees. The 40 employees will be contacted before the new year with an offer to be rehired into their previous position. Jeffries said that he was forced to resign in November after being on the job less than two years. Additionally, five other DES employees — who were close to Jeffries — also lost their jobs in November. (6pm newscast on 12/23, 1:36 in length)

Family Issues:

Arizona promotes healthy parenting among individuals and in communities raising children. Two reports set the stage for the daunting work facing the state task force charged with reinventing the state's child-welfare agency. They confirm in numbers and trend lines the continued issues confronting child safety in Arizona: an increasing number of reports of child abuse and neglect, a growing number of kids in foster care and a revolving door for a quarter of the children caught.

Phoenix Police: Man kills three pupples after family leaves home in fear. A West Phoenix man has been arrested for killing three Chihuahua pupples that were only two weeks old. Court records show that 27-year-old Blaine Lyle Nez was in the home with five children and was heavily intoxicated. Concerned, the children contacted their mother who instructed them to get out of the home. The oldest teenager got his siblings out of the house when their mother pulled up in her car. Police say they were waiting down the street and contacted police when they saw Nez leave home. They returned to the house to get a few items they needed. When they went inside, they reportedly saw writing on the walls and the three pupples dead in the teen's room, one in a pool of blood. Police say they found and arrested Nez down the street from the home allegedly wearing boots with blood on them. Police say Nez tried to kick officers when they tried to remove the boots from his feet. Court paperwork shows Nez is the husband of the children's mother, but didn't specify if he was their biological father or not. Nez has been charged with aggravated assault and multiple counts of cruelty to animals. (11am newscast on 10/10, 1:13 in length)

Family with foster children fighting to renovate home for kids. They say love makes a house a home, and if that's the case one Valley family must have one of the biggest homes you've ever seen. "Every day I tell myself, this is my own child, I don't care if he's blood related for not, I'm going to love this child as my own," said Virginia Revoir. Revoir has 10 children who range in ages from one to 16. Eight of them are her biological children and she is fostering two of them. Her 11-year-old foster son was the victim of abuse and he needs intense emotional care. He has been in her home for three months and is doing great. "I took him in, they warned me, he's high needs, and I said, 'That's OK I will love him like my own," she said. "I wouldn't give up on my own kid." Her four bedroom house just isn't big enough. Two of her biological sons moved into the garage to make room, but state inspectors said that is not allowed. Revoir is attempting to turn her outdoor patio into a fifth bedroom. She said state inspectors have given her until the end of the month to complete the construction project. If Revoir fails to make the deadline, she says her foster son could be placed somewhere else. The Revoir family is determined to give their foster son the best Christmas present of all, a loving, permanent home. More information on Cook Remodeling efforts can be found here. <u>Crime/Violence</u>: Phoenix police are dealing with a dramatic increase in violent crimes. And, with the department short staffed, the crime outlook does not look good. The caseload is demanding on an already strapped department. Phoenix police have started recruiting and are expected to hire 50 to 60 officers this year, even more officers are expected to retire. The department knows of at least 55 officers scheduled to leave the force by the end of the year. While violent crime numbers are up, property crime numbers are down 3 percent since January. Three hundred officers are expected to be hired within the next three years.

Caught on tape: Brazen thieves steal Valley campaign signs. With a tensions rising ahead of the November election, political candidates and supporters say they are seeing a rise in campaign sign thefts. Arizona state law says stealing, defacing, or knocking down a campaign sign is a class two misdemeanor, punishable by four months in jail or a \$750 fine. "People should care because in local races, signs are the way you introduce yourself to the voter," said Thomas Galvin, a candidate for the Central Arizona Water Conservation District. He says some of his signs have been removed or damaged. The signs disappear from street corners and people's yards. After Donald Trump signs kept disappearing from his property, one Paradise Valley man hired an audio-visual company, Theater X, to set up security cameras. The cameras, hidden in bushes, caught two people jumping out of their cars to swipe signs. "They did it in broad daylight with absolutely no conscience at all," said Theater X owner James May. Suspect in deadly shooting of Show Low officer shot, killed during barricade. Authorities say the man suspected of killing a Show Low officer was shot and killed after a barricade situation. The Arizona Department of Public Safety confirmed the Blue Alert issued for 36-year-old Daniel Erickson had been canceled, as law enforcement had him barricaded inside a cabin in the Pinetop-Lakeside area. According to the City of Show Low, Erickson had a 15-year-old girl who he had taken hostage. After six and a half hours of negotiation, Erickson reportedly sporadically fired a gun at officers and officers returned fire, killing him. The 15-year-old girl was safely located and taken to the hospital for evaluation. DPS says a Show Low officer was shot at the Arby's near Deuce of Clubs and Central Avenue. The officer, later identified as 50-year-old Darrin Reed, was hospitalized in critical condition but later died. Reed leaves behind a wife, son and daughter.

Man seen following children at Arizona Mills Mall. Officials are asking for the public's help to find a person of interest that was seen following children at a Tempe mall. Tempe police said the subject was seen following and talking to children at Arizona Mills Mall. The subject was seen following children entering several stores at the mall. According to police, the man is approximately 25 to 35 years old, average build, with black hair and facial hair. He was last seen wearing a gray button up shirt, white undershirt, jeans, and black shoes with white soles. (11am newscast on 11/09, :45 in length)

Phoenix police arrest man for pointing lasers at Sky Harbor aircraft. The Phoenix Police Department has arrested 57-year-old Lam Tran for several laser strike incidents involving aircraft approaching Sky Harbor and Deer Valley airports. Phoenix police say they worked with Glendale police to track an approximate location where the suspect was pointing the lasers from, and after it happened again, they were able to locate Tran at his home. Tran reportedly admitted he was involved in the laser strikes but didn't give a motive to police. Police say this is a good reminder to the public of the dangers of pointing lasers at any aircraft, and the severity of the crime. (11am newscast on 11/14, :32 in length)

Police arrest teen they believe is responsible for 13 Ahwatukee crimes. Police believe an 18-year-old may be responsible for a series of burglaries in the Ahwatukee area since May. Phoenix police have been investigating burglaries, commercial burglaries, shoplifting, and stolen cars all in the Ahwatukee area where they were all given a similar suspect description. Those descriptions match 18-year-old Samuel Michael Mielke, a man known to police for multiple robberies as a juvenile. His photo was shown to a loss prevention officer at a Safeway store near 40th street and Chandler Boulevard where Mielke allegedly shoplifted some items and then pointed a gun at the officer when he confronted Mielke. <u>Transportation</u>: The number of people killed in vehicle-related crashes on Arizona roads has risen significantly in the last year. The Arizona Department of Transportation reported that preliminary information indicates that roughly 890 died in car crashes in 2015. ADOT officials say the figure far surpasses the 773 deaths recorded in 2014. The agency says factors that contributed to the road-related deaths include speeding, impaired driving and a failure to wear a seat belt. State agencies are urging motorists to consider how they behave when behind the wheel. ADOT officials expect to have a final tally on the number of fatalities in its annual report, which will be released later this year.

PD: 3 dead in apparent street-racing crash along Central Avenue in Phoenix. An apparent street race along a Phoenix road has left three people dead, according to police. Officials confirmed a third person had died following the crash on Central Avenue. Phoenix police have identified the victims as 17-year-old Jesus Aguilar, 22-year-old Jessie Worth, and 18-year-old Marcos Agmayo-Aguilar. Aguilar and Worth were in one of the vehicles, with Agmayo-Aguilar in the second. Police say the two vehicles were reportedly street racing before losing control. One car hit a wall on one side of Central Avenue, and the other slammed into a tree on the opposite side. Rescue crews had to use high-power hydraulic tools to get to one man trapped in his car, Phoenix Fire officials say. Two people were thrown from the car that hit the tree, and that also caught fire. A Phoenix Fire Department spokesperson say the official cause of the crash has not yet been determined by police. "Speed and lack of seat belt usage" appear to be major factors in the deadly nature of the collision, police said Monday. (5pm newscast on 10/10, 1:28 in length)

Mesa holds groundbreaking ceremony for new light rail extension. A groundbreaking ceremony for the light rail extension took place today. Valley Metro and City of Mesa hosted the event along with a fall festival at Stapley Drive and Main Street in celebration. "By breaking ground on the Gilbert Road Extension, we continue to build our Next Mesa," said Mesa Mayor John Giles. The extension will expand rail service an extra 1.9 miles on Main Street from Mesa Drive to Gilbert Road. It is expected to be ready for use in late 2018 or early 2019. ADOT: I-17 traffic fixes would be pricey, challenging. A massive 24-vehicle crash on the I-17 southbound caused a massive backup around Black Canyon City. The crash and traffic delays bring up a problem that the Arizona Department of Transportation has studied and would like to fix, but can't afford. ADOT said the I-17 north of the Valley -- from Black Canyon City to Sunset Point -- is one of the biggest problem spots they have due to narrow roads and limited access. "There's a wide range of options (to help traffic flow) and it starts at \$125 million and goes up from there," said Ryan Harding, an ADOT spokesperson. ADOT has studied that stretch of road a lot. "Studies, designs...each of those phases costs millions of dollars," said Harding. Every time there's a crash in either direction, cars cram together and slow to a near-stop. But the traffic crush isn't exclusive to crashes -- heavy holiday traffic always cause serious delays in both directions. Harding said widening the road with additional lanes is the most obvious solution, but poses plenty of problems" Adding lanes, of course, at that point the elevation rises pretty rapidly as you're going uphill, so that's challenging too," he said. Right now, Harding said ADOT will likely continue conducting studies and drawing up plans, but there's nothing concrete in the works to move forward with a fix. (5pm newscast 10/24, 1:58 in length)

<u>Driver crashes over median wall, causing 5 car crash on Loop 101 southbound near Baseline.</u> TEMPE, AZ - The Arizona Department of Transportation says the Loop 101 was delayed southbound after a serious crash. The Department of Public Services says a vehicle crashed over the median wall and into southbound traffic causing the crash. At least five vehicles were involved. Traffic cameras showed all lanes blocked with traffic only getting by on the shoulder for several minutes. All lanes, however, have since reopened. DPS says there are injuries on the scene, but details have not been released yet. (5pm newscast on 10/24, :35 in length)

<u>US court refuses to block construction of Phoenix freeway</u>. A federal appeals court has refused to issue an emergency order to stop construction of a new Phoenix- freeway. The 9th Circuit U.S. Circuit Court of Appeal's action Monday means construction of the South Mountain Freeway can proceed while the appeals court considers an appeal. The new freeway will

connect with Interstate 10 on opposite sides of Phoenix, providing an alternative to driving on I-10 through central Phoenix. The project is being challenged by opponents who include the Gila River Indian Community and a coalition of environmental and community groups. (11am newscast on 11/22, :30 in length

ADOT: Most winter weather closures lifted, but use extreme caution if traveling Sunday. PHOENIX - Bad weather had drivers on high alert, as travelers made their way across a snowy northern Arizona. The Arizona Department of Transportation said multiple slide-offs were reported on I-17 near Munds Park on Sunday afternoon. Officials said traffic in the area was very slow and asked drivers to plan for delays on the road. The traffic issues in the high country began Saturday after several crashes and snowed-in areas caused closures and delays. The eastbound and westbound lanes of Interstate 40 remained closed overnight. (5pm newscast on 12/24, 1:31 in length)

Education: Teachers have been fleeing Arizona in droves, resulting in such a serious shortage of experienced teachers that state officials are warning of serious consequences if the exodus continues. Over the last five years, thousands of teachers have left the state, according to a 2015 report by the Arizona Department of Education, with this past school year being possibly the worst. Why are so many teachers leaving? Educators say reasons include low pay, insufficient classroom resources, and so many testing requirements and teaching guidelines that they feel they have no flexibility and too little authentic instructional time.

Bankrate study: Millennials cite lack of cash, financial education reasons for not investing. Stream Logistics in Scottsdale is a millennial workplace through and through -- millennial leaders, fresh young faces, and a collaborative work environment. Also, when it comes to enrolling in a retirement plan, not everyone is on the same page. "It's kind of a whirlwind (when you're hired), you have a new job and new responsibilities. That stuff goes out the window a little bit," said Stream Logistics worker Damien Voita. Another aspect, he said, is retirement isn't a subject that teachers or professors spend much time on. The 24-year-old is certainly not alone when it comes to putting off saving. He's actually in the majority of his age group. A recent Bankrate survey showed only 18 percent of Americans between 18 and 25 years old are investing in a retirement account."

Glendale schools closed mid-year for repairs reopen. After weeks of repairs, two Glendale Schools will reopen their campuses. Challenger Middle and Landmark School have been closed since September after engineers found structural damage. Construction and repairs took about three weeks to complete. During that time, more than 1,400 students were displaced between the two schools. During the repairs students attended class at the Alhambra Family Resource Center and at Desert Spirit Elementary School. (10pm newscast on 10/16:59 in length)

Arizona amends education standards, adds cursive requirement. Arizona will require public schools to teach cursive handwriting as one of a number of new education standards approved by the state Board of Education. The move amends the state's current standards, which are based on federal guidelines known as the Common Core. Common Core has become a politicized topic and state Superintendent of Public Instruction Diane Douglas campaigned on a promise to replace it. "We now have new standards that have been worked on by Arizona teachers, parents and been vetted by anti-Common Core experts," said Douglas. In addition to requiring students to have mastered cursive by the fifth grade, the revisions also require lessons about time and money in early grades.

<u>Housing:</u> Housing will be back as force for growth in 2016, Arizona economists say Demographic factors that for years slowed down Arizona's housing industry finally seem to be turning in the state's favor, one of the reasons economic growth should keep chugging along in 2016. Millennials, the generation whose oldest members are in their mid-30s, are marrying, with many becoming first-time homebuyers. Younger members of the generation are leaving their parents' homes and creating strong demand for apartments. As they grow older and marry, life events will create even more demand for more single-family housing. The Phoenix area should have at least 15,000 building permits for single-family houses this year and at least 18,000 next year.

Protest held in north Phoenix to oppose state-operated transitional housing for convicted criminals. Hundreds of people are voicing their displeasure with a transitional housing facility for felons in north Phoenix. A peaceful protest – organized by Together Advocating for a Safe Community – took place by a group of protestors consisting of residents, business owners, kids and teachers, hit the pavement to oppose the opening of the Maricopa Reentry Center in the area. The MRC first opened its doors in July and shares state trust land with Adobe Mountain School, a juvenile correctional facility. The MRC operates as a rehabilitation facility for parole violators and homeless and drug addicted ex-convicts. Other ex-convicts check in with their parole officers who have offices in the center. "We want the homeless offenders taken out of the facility," organizer Julie Read said. "We also want the day reporters taken out. We want to make sure reentry is done the right way." According to a media release, the Arizona Department of Corrections is operating the facility illegally under the Arizona State Land Department commercial lease. The lease states that the facility is only to be used as a rehabilitation center for juvenile prisoners, a TASC spokeswoman said. (5pm newscast on 10/24, 1:33 in length)

PHOENIX - A troubling new report looking at census numbers and home buying trends shows Phoenix ranks toward the bottom of the list, when it comes to millennial population growth. Andrew Woo with Apartment Lists said they looked at the change in the millennial homeownership rate over the past decade, which was driven by wage growth. Highlights from the report indicated that among the 50 largest metropolitan cities, Phoenix ranked #46 in millennial population growth from 2005 to 2015. Nationwide, millennial population growth was correlated with median income. In Phoenix specifically, median income decreased by 4.9 percent. The millennial home ownership rate fell nearly everywhere, but in Phoenix it fell more than the national average, 11.3 percent versus 7.4 percent. (6pm newscast on 11/15, 1:32 in length)

Phoenix area home prices, sales expected to rise in 2017 according to Realtor.com forecast PHOENIX - According to a 2017 housing market forecast by Realtor.com, the Phoenix-Mesa-Scottsdale area is expected to lead the country. Phoenix home prices are forecast to grow by almost six percent, while sales are also expected to grow seven percent. Tucson home prices are expected to grow just over six percent, while sales are likely to grow five-and-a-half percent. Also in the top 10 metro areas around the country are Los Angeles, Boston, Sacramento, Portland and Orlando.

<u>Immigration</u>: High levels of illegal immigration and crimes committed by unauthorized immigrants are among the key rationales cited by some supporters of a tough new immigration law in Arizona. According to our Governor, Jan Brewer; border violence and crime due to illegal immigration are critically important issues to the people of our state. During the year controversial immigration measure SB 1070 passed, Arizona fell from eighth to 18th on the list of states most popular among people moving from other countries, Pollack said. He blames the stigma that came with the law.

Border mass aims to bring attention to immigrants. The representative of Pope Francis in the U.S. will lead a cross-border mass in an effort to bring awareness to the plight of immigrants and refugees. Archbishop Christophe Pierre, the Apostolic Nuncio to the United States, will be the principal celebrant of the mass that will be held in both Nogales, Arizona and Nogales, Mexico. There will be an altar on each side of the border. The mass is the third one along the Arizona-Mexico border this year and is organized by Dioceses Without Borders, a group composed of church leaders from around Arizona and the Mexican border state of Sonora. Diocese of Tucson Bishop Gerald Kicanas says the mass will focus on immigration, a major issue for the church. Pope Francis has been outspoken in favor of immigration reform and humane treatment of migrants. Prayers will also be held for Border Patrol agents and others who work around the border.

<u>Donald Trump's election triggers flood of immigration questions.</u> Immigration hotlines are buzzing. Legal clinics are seeing an influx of clients. Public schools are fielding frantic questions from parents and students. Since the election, Donald Trump's tough talk on immigration has

stirred anxiety nationwide among immigrants regardless of legal status. They are turning to lawyers, schools, advocacy groups and congressional offices for help. The most urgent inquiries have been from young people benefiting from a 2012 federal program started by President Barack Obama's administration that allows immigrants brought to the country illegally as children to avoid deportation and get work permits. About 740,000 people have participated in the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals system.

Valley mother outraged over immigration reform; In May of 2014, a wrong-way driver in the country illegally crashed into and killed popular Mesa Police Officer Brandon Mendoza. The pain is still evident in her face and in her voice. The anger with lawmakers is there too. "They aren't listening to us," she said. "They're voting based on special interests and what is going to make them popular in Washington." Mendoza just returned from Capitol Hill. The man who crashed into Sgt. Mendoza was drunk, on meth and had previous convictions. Mary Ann Mendoza wants a law that forces the deportation of illegal immigrants convicted of crimes. She also wants to make it impossible for them to buy a car and register it in the U.S., like the man who crashed into her son did. "He created a huge void in my life and in the community," she said. A void she's trying to fill by pushing for a change in Brandon's name

Advocates decry another immigration death at Arizona facility. The weekend death of a Guatemalan woman who became ill at a detention center in Arizona with the most in-custody immigrant deaths in the U.S. is another example of inadequate care and poor practices at the privately run site, advocates for immigrants said this week. The 36-year-old woman died at a hospital near the Eloy Detention Center, which is among the largest immigrant lockups in the country and currently has 1,473 detainees, just shy of its capacity of 1,500. U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement announced Monday that Raquel Calderon de Hildago died Sunday after suffering a series of seizures. It was the third in-custody death for the immigration agency nationwide since October 1. Fifteen migrants have died at the Eloy Detention Center since 2004, ICE data shows. This summer, the center became the epicenter of a large measles outbreak after some facility workers refused to get vaccinated. "For us it's disappointing because this death, like the others, could have been prevented. But unfortunately this administration and (the prison operator) are not held accountable and so we see again someone's life being lost," said Carlos Garcia, the executive director of Puente Arizona, an advocacy group for immigrants. Scottsdale family caught in immigration battle after ICE arrest. The immigration battle came right to the doorstep of a Scottsdale couple, after a recent arrest made by the ICE fugitive arrest team. ICE officials said Stuart Bailey was considered a priority for deportation for over-staying his visa and for two DUI arrests on his record; one of them was an extreme DUI. Where ICE officials saw a priority for deportation, those who knew and loved Stuart Bailey saw a husband, father and philanthropist. Bailey was the owner of Pane-E-Vino Italian restaurant in Scottsdale. His wife, Gillian Bailey, reached out to ABC15 after his arrest and wanted to share his side of the story. Gillian said she had met her husband at the restaurant 20 years ago while working there. She was a U.S. citizen, He was from the U.K and had lived in the United States for more than 30 years. Bailey said her husband never applied for citizenship due to "bad advice" they had received from an immigration attorney, who cautioned him to "lay low" because he had overstayed his visa. Stuart had also been arrested for two DUIs. His wife said one of them was seven years ago and the other four years ago. The ICE fugitive arrest team is responsible for arresting illegal immigrants with criminal convictions in the United States. ICE officials said both over-staying his visa and the DUIs on his record made Stuart a priority for deportation. (6pm newscast on 12/26, 1:54 in length)

Organizations who both supported and opposed the proposition spent millions of dollars advertising in the state in the months leading up to the election. City of Peoria: Excessive levels of nitrate found in tap water between November 15 & 17. The City of Peoria issued a release Tuesday that shows a water sample tested recently had an unsafe level of nitrate. The city says a sample from November 15 showed a level of 10.8 mg/L of nitrate. The maximum level that is safe to consume is 10 mg/L. Once the exceeding level was detected, the city says it shut down the area well and the issue was resolved. According to the release: "Infants below the age of six-months-old who drink water containing nitrate in excess of 10 parts per million MCL could become seriously ill and, if untreated, may die. Symptoms include shortness of breath and blue-baby syndrome. If symptoms occur, seek medical attention immediately. Infants cannot process nitrates like adults can" The release also says adults and children over six months old can drink the tap water. However, anyone who is pregnant, or has serious health concerns, may wish to consult a doctor. The city also said that it is always a good idea to give infants under six months old bottled water, and to use bottled water when preparing luice or formula.

Arizona couple sentenced to prison in health care fraud. An Arizona couple who live on the Navajo Indian Reservation has been sentenced to prison and ordered to pay millions of dollars in restitution after pleading guilty to health care fraud involving thousands of medical transports that never occurred. Fort Defiance residents Sylvia Jean Begay and Virgil C. Begay were sentenced to 28 months and 21 months in prison, respectively. The case is the second involving the Arizona Health Care Cost Containment System and multimillion-dollar frauds to come to light in recent years. The U.S. Attorney's Office for Arizona said the Begays each owned a company that made thousands of false claims to Arizona's Medicaid program, known as the Arizona Health Care Cost Containment System, for non-emergency medical transports. The 44-count indictment that charged the couple, listed numerous non-emergency transports made on weekends and holidays.

"We agreed on a rental price, sent a deposit check for half and then he never provided anything after that. He cashed my check and didn't provide a contract or even a receipt that he had received my money," Eaton said. For seven weeks, Eaton says he tried to get Muller to provide him a written contract but it never happened. "I tried to contact him and he said he would sign a paper saying he owed me the money and he'd pay it back and we agreed to meet at a Starbucks." That never happened. Eaton had to rent another place, and sued Muller to get his \$2,150 back. We caught up with Muller just before the hearing where he insisted that the verbal contract with Eaton was enough. Valley Car Salesman Accused of Rolling Back Odometer. The ad says low mileage...the price is great. You buy that used car only to find out later that 79,000 miles is actually 179,000. It happened to Angie Castro and her husband. They bought a 2004 van to transport disabled parents and future foster kids. They spent all they had: \$3,300. But a Carfax report later showed that 100,000 miles vanished. Kenneth Barker was the seller, advertising on Craigslist. Angie says Barker denied the added miles saying she couldn't prove anything. In a letter to investigators with the Arizona Attorney General Office, Barker says "Mrs. Castro was fully aware of what she was buying." And Angie did sign a "not actual miles" statement. It's one of the hurried signatures she says she gave, and admits she was confused. But Barker has been accused before. The Arizona Department of Transportation says Barker was charged with a misdemeanor after three recent odometer complaints. Angie sued Barker and won a judgment, but so far, she hasn't been able to collect. On a judge's advice, she says she gave the van back to Barker. She says she didn't feel safe driving it and felt guilty about selling it anyway. So now, she's without her money, and without a car, still hoping to collect that judgment. Protect yourself when buying a used car:

- Use a Carfax or a similar history report to show mileage concerns.
- · Don't be hurried. Only sign documents you read thoroughly.
- Question older cars with unreasonably low mileage. Count on at least 10,000 miles per year.

Are extended warranties worth the money for laptops, phones. Get ready, here we go again. It's holiday gift-buying season. Laptops and phones will be big. But should you buy those extended warranties that are always being offered? Data Doctors Ken Colburn says yes, and no. In most cases, he says "They cover the least likely things to go wrong with your computer." Many only cover hardware issues, when the real problems are usually malicious software and operating system corruption that are not covered. If they do cover software issues, that might be worth a look. On the other hand, Colburn says more mobile devices like phones and tablets might benefit more from service plans. Again, it depends on the plan. Many don't cover abuse or theft, which are the common phone and tablet issues. But we found a couple of plans on Amazon that covered drops, spills and more. Then you have to decide if it's worth the price. Bottom line, don't let a "great deal" pushed by a salesman lure you in. Research exclusions and shop around for costs, before you sign up.

Let Joe Know: Some banks hold bi-weekly mortgage payments. If you want to pay your mortgage down faster, it seems like it would make sense to pay half the bill every two weeks right? Nancy in Phoenix let Joe know when she signed up to do that, the money was not immediately applied to her account and is kept "in limbo until the second half comes in." But if the partial payment isn't applied until the full payment comes in, how are you saving money? Nick Clements, of Magnifymoney.com, said you may not be saving much. "It's [the money] not earning interest for you and it hasn't reduced your mortgage balance," Clements said. He said that by paying to enroll in some bi-weekly programs, you are actually paying them to pay them! But there is a way around it. Sending half your mortgage every two weeks amounts to paying one extra payment in a year. So, instead of paying the bank to do it for you, Clements said, make that extra payment yourself. "Take that payment, divide it by 12 and every month make an extra principal payment on your own," he said. For example, if your mortgage is \$1,000 per month you would add \$83 to your monthly payment to get a similar benefit to paying bi-weekly. So when time came for Dante', Christina hired the same company called PPG Legal Documents. It is a firm that prepares legal documents and files them with court. She dealt with owner Lisa Perez. "I gave her all the personal information she needed and I expected her to complete the documents and file them in a timely manner," Christina says. She didn't...in fact Christina says Perez did nothing for the \$1,200 she was given and stopped almost all communication once she received payment. "Days went by, I didn't hear from her. I started to worry. I sent her an email. Didn't hear back. A week went by and my gut was telling me something is not right," she explains. Many policies require that you pay the veterinarian directly, then be reimbursed by the insurance company. Find out what exclusions are in the policy. Experts with Embrace Pet Insurance tell me, virtually no companies offer coverage for preexisting conditions. So it makes sense to shop around for the best price while your pet is young and healthy. Remember to shop around for the price and coverage that fit your needs and budget. But you may also want to consider simply open a savings account to put money away specifically for your pet's unexpected illness.

DeVry University agrees to pay \$100 million penalty for misleading ads. Some former DeVry students will get a payday courtesy of the college. DeVry University and its parent company settled a Federal Trade Commission lawsuit for \$100 million, according to a news release from the FTC. The FTC alleged DeVry illegally misled people in its ads by claiming that 90 percent of graduates actively seeking employment landed jobs in their field within six months of graduation. In the filing, the agency claimed the numbers are skewed because many of those jobs are outside of the students' fields. According to the FTC: DeVry will pay \$49.4 million in cash to be distributed to qualifying students who were harmed by the deceptive ads, as well as \$50.6 million in debt relief. Student services and access to federal student loans are not impacted by

the settlement, and at no time has the academic quality of a DeVry University education been questioned. DeVry is headquartered in Illinois, but has a campus in Phoenix. (Joe Ducey reported at 6pm on 12/15, TRT :45)
