**Economy:** The U.S. economy remains on course for steady growth, something that should help Arizona in the year ahead, The slowing Chinese economy has shaken financial markets here but should not significantly affect what is a relatively healthy labor market, At the same time, Arizona's slower-than-usual recovery from the Great Recovery figures to get incrementally better in 2016. While conditions are significantly better, they remain well behind Arizona's recent past. Spurred by slow but steady employment and housing growth, local and national economists remain cautiously positive about the economic forecast for Arizona.

**Phoenix ranks in the bottom half of major U.S. cities for money management** Phoenix residents rank low compared to others in major U.S. cities at managing money, according to a recent [CreditCards.com](#) study. The survey looked at the average credit score in the 25 largest U.S. metro areas and found we are the 10th worst in the U.S. at controlling our cash. CreditCards.com generated an expected credit score by local income, age, unemployment and education data to compare the findings to. The study found the average Phoenix-area resident's credit score is 2 points lower than expected. Los Angeles came out on top of the list, while Baltimore was dead last.

**Phoenix City Council: Black Lives Matter protests cost taxpayers nearly \$250,000, diverted officers.** Phoenix City Council says Black Lives Matter protests in July cost taxpayers nearly \$250,000 and diverted needed officers to the events. According to new statistics, the protests that took place on July 8 and July 15 cost more than \$120,000 each. The total number does not include profits lost by local businesses that were affected by the protests. Councilman Sal DiCiccio called the protests a "complete disrespect for the taxpayer and our great police department," according to a statement. Phoenix City Council says Phoenix Police had to call in resources from Glendale police SWAT team to cover a call because Phoenix officers were busy working one of the protests.

**Hillary Clinton commits resources to Georgia, Arizona.** Hillary Clinton is expanding her presidential battleground map to include the traditionally Republican states of Georgia and Arizona -- another sign that Republican Donald Trump's missteps have Democrats contemplating a November landslide that could help the party in down-ballot contests. Party officials in Arizona and Georgia say Clinton campaign lieutenants told them that the Democratic nominee would start spending money on staff in the two states, which combine for 27 electoral votes, a tenth of the total needed to win the presidency.

Delays expected at Sky Harbor in October, north runway to be closed. Traveling in or out of Phoenix Sky Harbor in October? You might experience some delays. Sky Harbor officials announced that they will close the north runway from Thursday, October 6 to Sunday, November 6. The runway will be closed for a month for construction projects involving APS power lines. Officials said travelers could experience arrival and departure delays of up to 30 minutes during peak travel times. Residents living directly east and west of the airport's center and south runways may also notice increased activity on certain flight paths during the closure. (6pm newscast on 9/20, :20 in length)

Ducey to lead economic development delegation on Canada trip. An announcement by Ducey's office says the delegation will visit Toronto Oct. 4-6 and Montreal on Oct. 6-7. The visit to Toronto will include an address by a Ducey to a public affairs forum. The delegation will include executives and leaders of Tucson Electric Power, the Arizona Chamber of Commerce and Industry, the Arizona State Retirement System, Greater Phoenix Economic Council and the Arizona Commerce Authority. According to the announcement, the purpose of the trip is to highlight the state's business climate and lifestyle. The announcement says ties between Arizona and Canada include 18,000 Arizonans working for Canadian-headquartered companies and 25,000 Canadians owning homes in Arizona as well as 1 million visits each year as tourists. Employment/Jobs: In metro Phoenix, unemployment stands at 5.7 percent. By contrast, after the two recessions that preceded the Great Recession, unemployment was less than 4 percent. During this recovery, metro Phoenix has gained more than 200,000 jobs. But that's 100,000 fewer than the previous recoveries had at the same point. This is partly due to tepid population growth compared with years past. The Arizona economy is forecasted to grow in the coming year. The state continues to improve by attracting technology and finance jobs, offering a measure of higher incomes and greater diversity to the state's economy.

Need a job? FAA hiring 1,400 air traffic control specialists. The Federal Aviation Administration is hiring for about 1,400 entry-level air traffic controller positions. The jobs will be posted online from August 8-15, according to the FAA. The specific job title is air traffic control specialist - trainee, according to USAJobs.gov. This specific position has a salary range of \$22,888 to \$28,626 per year but with enough training and experience, advancing through the ranks in this career path can be lucrative. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the mean annual salary of an air traffic controller was \$118,740 in 2015. The median hourly wage was \$59.11. Competition for the jobs will likely be stiff. The FAA expects more than 25,000 applications for the open positions. (6am newscast on 8/8, :30 in length)

Employment Symposium to be held at Sky Harbor August 22. Sky Harbor is looking for workers ages 18 to 24-year-old who are interested in working in food, beverage or retail services. The Employment Symposium at Sky Harbor will run from 8:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. on August 22. It will be held at the Crowne Plaza Phoenix Airport at 4300 E Washington Street in Phoenix. City of Phoenix plans to fill hundreds of positions at 'Get Hired' job fair. Walk in jobless, walk out with a start date. The City of Phoenix is holding a career fair at the Phoenix Convention Center. It's called Get Hired! and many applicants will interview on the spot -- some will even get an offer right away. The city is looking for hundreds of qualified workers for positions in more than a dozen departments. Some of them pay six-figure salaries. Organizers recommend you come dressed to impress with several resumes. (6am newscast on 8/25, :33 in length)

Minimum wage hike foes want state high court to toss measure. Opponents of a voter initiative raising the state's minimum wage from \$8.05 to \$12 an hour by 2020 asked the Arizona Supreme Court to overrule a trial judge's decision that said they filed their challenge too late. Lawyers for the Arizona Restaurant Association said in a court filing that if Maricopa County Superior Court Judge Joshua Rogers' ruling stands, a voter initiative that doesn't have enough signatures will be before voters in November. They argued that Rogers was wrong when he

ruled last week that initiative challenges must be filed within five days of qualifying signatures being filed, including weekends. The opponents say he shouldn't have counted weekend days. Rogers threw out more than 53,000 signatures on backers' petitions but said because opponents filed their challenge too late they'll still count. Without them, Proposition 206 won't have the needed 150,642 signatures needed to make the ballot. The initiative would increase the minimum wage to \$10 next year and then to \$12 by 2020. It also would require large employers to provide five days of sick time a year and small employers three days. The high court is also being briefed on an appeal of another judge's ruling that that threw out a challenge to an initiative an initiative that would legalize recreational marijuana.

#### Family Issues:

Arizona promotes healthy parenting among individuals and in communities raising children. Two reports set the stage for the daunting work facing the state task force charged with reinventing the state's child-welfare agency. They confirm in numbers and trend lines the continued issues confronting child safety in Arizona: an increasing number of reports of child abuse and neglect, a growing number of kids in foster care and a revolving door for a quarter of the children caught.

Boy attacked by family dog while camping near Payson. Officials in Coconino County are investigating after a toddler was attacked by a dog while out camping with his family. According to the Coconino County Sheriff's Office, on Sunday a boy was with his family camping at the Spillway Campground at Woods Canyon Lake when a pitbull attacked him. Officials say the dog was chained to a tree when the boy and his 6-year-old brother were playing with toys. The boys threw a toy near the dog when the toddler was attacked. The boy suffered severe injuries to his scalp and face. He was taken to the Phoenix Children's Hospital in stable condition for treatment of his injuries. Coconino animal control officials are investigating. The dog belonged to the boy's mother's roommate.

Tempe police: Teen girl killed by family member in accidental. Police are investigating after a teenage girl was killed in an accidental shooting. Officers responded to a home near University Avenue and Rural Road when police said a man, a family member, was handling a gun when it fired, hitting 16-year-old Marlen Hernandez in the face. Hernandez was taken to the hospital with life-threatening injuries, police said, but she was later pronounced dead. Tempe police said the investigation revealed the handgun belonged to the victim's brother-in-law, 23-year-old Emmanuel Hilerio. According to police, Hernandez was handling the gun and Hilerio attempted to get the gun from her and accidentally discharged the weapon. Hilerio was arrested and is being charged with manslaughter. Tempe police said all evidence is consistent with being a tragic incident. ABC15 spoke with a classmate at the scene who says Hernandez went to McClintock High School.

Phoenix PD: Mom gives meth to infant, is arrested for murder as child dies from overdose. A Valley mother has been arrested and charged with murder after she reportedly gave methamphetamine to her nearly 2-year-old daughter. Phoenix police report that, Natalie Renne Russell, 30, left a 120-milligram bottle of liquid methadone within reach of her children. They say that her nearly 2-year-old daughter Adalynn was found by her mother unresponsive and not breathing. The bottle of methadone was nearby and empty. Police report that instead of seeking medical attention, Russell did internet searches for information about methadone. A witness reportedly told police that Russell told them that she was going to give to her daughter some methamphetamine to counter the effects of the methadone. This witness says they saw Russell give the child the methamphetamine. The girl was pronounced dead the next day by the Phoenix Fire Department. The Maricopa County Medical Examiner's Office says the autopsy showed that the child was found to have "toxic levels of methadone and methamphetamine in her body."

Family escapes fire with just clothes they have on; several pets killed in Mesa house fire. A Mesa family can't seem to catch a break but desperately needs one. Kira Ruck is a single mom of three, a nine-year-old and twin toddlers. Ruck also helps care for her mother who nearly died from a flesh eating bacteria. Ruck said her mom had just gotten out of the hospital when their house near Southern Avenue and Mesa Drive caught fire. She was making dinner when her

step-dad came out of his room yelling, "There's a fire, fire!" He grabbed my twins and got out the door," said Ruck. The family escaped, but most of Ruck's four cats and two dogs died in the blaze. A firefighter did save one dog, Mickey, a Yorkie. Ruck said he's in bad shape and she fears he won't survive much longer. Ruck says her animals were her best friends; she and her kids are devastated. "I feel like it's my fault, I could've gone in and grabbed them but I didn't, I just froze," she said through tears. The family of six escaped with just the clothes on their backs making it more of a challenge to find some sense of normalcy living in a hotel room their renters' insurance is paying for.

Phoenix woman pleads guilty to child abuse in death of daughter. A Phoenix woman has pleaded guilty to two counts of child abuse in criminal case stemming from the death of her 4-year-old daughter in 2013. Maricopa County Superior Court officials say Melissa Centeno entered the guilty plea. She had been charged with first-degree murder and two counts of child abuse. A change-of-plea hearing is scheduled for co-defendant Sergio Luiz.

Mesa man accused of child abuse; one child left paralyzed, another with multiple fractures. A Mesa mother has been indicted for child abuse and hindering prosecution in connection with a case where her boyfriend abused the brothers breaking one's arm and paralyzing the other. In a new report posted by the Arizona Department of Child Safety, it has been revealed that the mother of the children, 28-year-old Stephanie Berlanga, has been indicted in addition to her boyfriend, Corey Royalty. Royalty reportedly abused his girlfriend's young children, causing one child to suffer several fractures and another to the point of paralysis. Hospital officials reported to police that the child's arm was fractured in three places, and they also found three broken ribs that were "older and healing." Berlanga allegedly told police that the boy fell at the playground on May 31. She brought the child to the hospital on June 2 after his arm swelled up. Police say they found his 5-year-old brother the next day, severely injured. The child had internal bleeding, multiple rib fractures, bruised kidneys and a lacerated liver. The child had suffered a stroke at some point, leaving him paralyzed on his left side.

**Crime/Violence:** Phoenix police are dealing with a dramatic increase in violent crimes. And, with the department short staffed, the crime outlook does not look good. The caseload is demanding on an already strapped department. Phoenix police have started recruiting and are expected to hire 50 to 60 officers this year, even more officers are expected to retire. The department knows of at least 55 officers scheduled to leave the force by the end of the year. While violent crime numbers are up, property crime numbers are down 3 percent since January. Three hundred officers are expected to be hired within the next three years.

Phoenix police: Four more cases, 1 deadly, possibly linked to serial shooter targeting Maryvale area. Phoenix police have identified four more shooting incidents linked to a string of unsolved deadly shootings in Maryvale. Investigators looked into incidents since January 2016 and now believe that a total of eight cases were committed by the same serial shooter or shooters. The Federal Bureau of Investigation said it is helping Phoenix police in solving these homicides.

Suspects sought after string of robberies, including carjacking. Police are searching for suspects who took part in a crime spree in Phoenix and Tempe. A suspect reportedly entered the Whataburger restaurant near, flashed a gun and took off with money. Within the next couple hours, two more people nearby were robbed, including someone who was carjacked by the group of suspects. The group, believed to be around five people, split up in separate vehicles before one of the cars crashed into a moving train near Hardy and University in Tempe. Three suspects from the wrecked car fled on foot, but police quickly apprehended them nearby. Police say they are still searching for two more suspects, possibly still in the vehicle that was stolen during the carjacking.

Police: Phoenix serial shooter fires at vehicle, man and 4-year-old inside. A man and 4-year-old boy were sitting inside a car outside a home when the suspect fired at their car. The victims did not sustain any injuries, but called police to report the incident. According to Phoenix police, the suspect left the area in a dark-colored BMW, but the shooter is known to have access to multiple

vehicles. Police said the suspect may also be driving a white Cadillac or a Lincoln-type vehicle. As a result of this most recent shooting, the reward to catch the serial shooter has been raised from \$30,000 to \$50,000. The FBI has added \$20,000 to the reward amount. Six of the nine shootings have occurred in the Maryvale area of Phoenix. The three other shootings, including the most recent incident, have occurred either in the downtown area or north of Sky Harbor Airport. The Phoenix serial shooter has been targeting victims since March. His first victim, a 16-year-old boy, survived. Nine people have been shot, seven of them have died.

DPS looking for woman who fired bullet into man's pickup truck on I-10. State troopers are looking for a woman believed to have fired a gun at a man's pickup truck while on a Valley freeway. According to the Arizona Department of Public Safety, a woman traveling in a Kia Soul SUV westbound along Interstate 10 near the State Route 51 junction fired a bullet on Saturday around 7:15 p.m. The bed of the man's pickup truck was struck by the bullet. DPS says the woman was driving erratically before the shooting. Detectives are asking anyone with information on the shooting or the suspect to contact DPS.

Man crashes into Phoenix officers: Marc LaQuon Payne fought with officers after intentional crash. ABC15 has learned new details after police say three officers were intentionally hit outside of a Phoenix gas station. The incident occurred at a QuikTrip gas station. Three officers were hurt after 44-year-old Marc LaQuon Payne reportedly drove his vehicle at the group, before hitting a patrol car and the front of the store. Court paperwork indicates after Payne hit the group of officers he went on to fight them. According to the documents, Payne struck an officer, causing the officer to fall onto his back. As the officer was on his back, Payne was seen getting on top of the officer, continuing the fight. Another officer who was thrown over the hood of the vehicle was able to use a Taser on the suspect. Witnesses at the scene said Payne was driving fast in the parking lot and even revved his engine before plowing into the officers. All three officers were transported to St. Joseph's Hospital for treatment. Payne is still in jail and is not-bailable. He will not be released from custody.

Transportation: The number of people killed in vehicle-related crashes on Arizona roads has risen significantly in the last year. The Arizona Department of Transportation reported that preliminary information indicates that roughly 890 died in car crashes in 2015. ADOT officials say the figure far surpasses the 773 deaths recorded in 2014. The agency says factors that contributed to the road-related deaths include speeding, impaired driving and a failure to wear a seat belt. State agencies are urging motorists to consider how they behave when behind the wheel. ADOT officials expect to have a final tally on the number of fatalities in its annual report, which will be released later this year.

Wrong-way driver causes crash on SR-143. The Department of Public Safety says a wrong-way driver caused a multi-vehicle crash on SR-143. Around 10 a.m., a white passenger car was headed northbound in the southbound lanes of traffic near University Drive. DPS says three vehicles were involved in the crash, including a Jeep that rolled over. One person was taken to the hospital for injuries.

Demolition of remnants of old highway bridge set. CHINO VALLEY, AZ - If your weekend plans take you along S.R. 89, expect some delays as ADOT plans to implode an old bridge. The 62-year-old bridge over Hell Canyon no longer met state and federal design for large vehicles, so crews built a brand new bridge in its place. The new Hell Canyon Bridge carries about 3,400 vehicles each day. ADOT began taking apart the old bridge in August, but the next step will be an implosion technique that allows the bridge collapse onto itself. Drivers should expect up to 30 minutes of delays on Saturday from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. To get around the delays, drivers can use I-17 and I-40 through Flagstaff.

Arizona Department of Transportation holding meetings for South Mountain Freeway project. Arizona Department of Transportation is holding several meetings so that the public can weigh in on the Loop 202 expansion. The first of three meetings took place and was aimed at getting the public's input regarding preliminary design plans. The expansion will connect Interstate 10 from Phoenix to Chandler through parts of the South Mountain Preserve. Some of the issues discussed included the freeway's location, profile, as well as interchange and noise barrier locations. ADOT officials also wanted the community to weigh in on landscaping and other visual plans. "We want to listen to all the feedback—whether it's positive or negative, we want to hear from the public," ADOT spokesman Dustin Krugel said. Construction crews have already begun a widening project from Pecos Road near 48th Street to the I-10/Loop 202 interchange. Still, many continue to oppose the project. "We are the biggest stakeholder in all of this," said Andrew Pedro, before joining a prayer run on the Gila River Indian Community. "These are our lives on the line here; our beliefs, our spirituality. That's why we have to project it." Construction on the mainline freeway is expected to start early next year, and the entire South Mountain Freeway project is scheduled to be completed by 2019.

Education: Teachers have been fleeing Arizona in droves, resulting in such a serious shortage of experienced teachers that state officials are warning of serious consequences if the exodus continues. Over the last five years, thousands of teachers have left the state, according to a 2015 report by the Arizona Department of Education, with this past school year being possibly the worst. Why are so many teachers leaving? Educators say reasons include low pay, insufficient classroom resources, and so many testing requirements and teaching guidelines that they feel they have no flexibility and too little authentic instructional time.

Satanist group wants to start after-school club at Tucson elementary school. Religious conversion would not be part of a proposed club at a Tucson elementary school called After School Satan, according to the person who would lead the club. The Satanic Temple requested Monday to charter the club at Roskruge Bilingual School, according to Stu de Haan, spokesman for the Tucson chapter of The Satanic Temple. The school, near downtown Tucson, includes kindergarten through eighth grades. "First thing I think of is evil," said Conrad Duarte, after ABC15 described the club to him. Duarte has a daughter who will be a seventh-grader at Roskruge when school begins this week. De Haan noted that chapters of The Satanic Temple are working to start the clubs at schools around the country, but only at schools that have a chapter of The Good News Club, a Christian-based group. "We're not here to get special privileges, we're here to get equal privileges," de Haan said in an interview Monday night. A local contact for Child Evangelism Fellowship, the organization that runs The Good News Club, declined an interview request. The Satanic Temple tried and failed earlier this year to gain permission to lead invocations at Phoenix and Scottsdale City Council meetings.

Glendale elementary students set to start at new schools after campuses closed for unsafe buildings. Glendale school officials are making the final preparations at temporary campuses for students from two schools suddenly closed for emergency repairs. School officials said the Alhambra Elementary School District will allow an unused school to be used for students from Challenger Middle School. Students will attend classes starting Friday at Alhambra Family Resource Center which is located on 39th Avenue near Glendale Avenue. The building has 26 classrooms and can house the 650 students enrolled in fourth through eighth grade. On Thursday, crews were clearing out rooms, and they were bringing tables and chairs for the Challenger students. They are still working out a bus schedule and start and end times. The Glendale Elementary School District announced they closed two schools after finding that both campuses needed structural repairs to be safe to occupy. District officials received a letter from

its structural engineer warning recent improvement projects at Challenger Middle School and Landmark School uncovered structural deficiencies in the schools' buildings.

ITT Students to get answers about loans, transfers. The Arizona State Board for Private Postsecondary Education (AZPPE) is hosting an informational meeting to update students affected by the closure of ITT Technical Institutes earlier this month. The meeting will address loan forgiveness programs, which schools will accept transfer credits and how access student records. Students who plan on attending the meeting are asked to RSVP.

Parents in Chandler want schools to give the students a break. A community meeting is taking place at Fulton Elementary School in Chandler to discuss giving kids a break—literally. A group of concerned parents showed up, armed with flyers saying "Yes to recess." They are asking the district to give their students more time on the playground in between classes. Right now students in grades third through sixth are getting one 20 minute break in a six-hour school day. But many parents feel that's not enough. "Research has shown that when students have a break from this concentrated instruction and come back, they're able to retain information better, make better decisions, and we feel those minutes become quality instead of just quantity," said Jennifer Ray, a concerned mom with two children at Fulton Elementary School. Parents were equally passionate on the other side of the fence. Principal Amy Kramb said she was hearing arguments from both sides. Other parents felt school was for studies, and students could play outside on their own time outside of school.

Thousands of kids get new school clothes to help them learn. You may know the Assistance League of Phoenix as the Let Joe Know Volunteer problem-solving team. But they've been doing much more. This year, the league is celebrating 30 years of providing clothing to school kids. It's called "Operation School Bell." We were there as volunteers provided clothing to kids from Mountain View Elementary School. It's the first school the league assisted 30 years ago. Back then, 36 kids got new school clothes. This year, "Operation School Bell" will dress more than 8,000 kids across the Valley. ALP's Executive Director Brenda Sperduti said, "We take away the barriers they may have so when they go back to the classroom, they are ready to learn." The kids get shirts, pants, socks, underwear, shoes, a sweatshirt and more.

Housing: Housing will be back as force for growth in 2016, Arizona economists say  
Demographic factors that for years slowed down Arizona's housing industry finally seem to be turning in the state's favor, one of the reasons economic growth should keep chugging along in 2016. Millennials, the generation whose oldest members are in their mid-30s, are marrying, with many becoming first-time homebuyers. Younger members of the generation are leaving their parents' homes and creating strong demand for apartments. As they grow older and marry, life events will create even more demand for more single-family housing. The Phoenix area should have at least 15,000 building permits for single-family houses this year and at least 18,000 next year.

PD: Woman found dead in 113-degree Tempe apartment. Officials are investigating after a woman died in a Tempe apartment. Tempe police said they were called to the Santa Fe Court Apartments near Scottsdale Road and Weber Drive for a welfare check. The victim was not seen or heard from for some time. When police arrived on the scene, they found a 45-year-old woman dead in her apartment. The air conditioning in the apartment reportedly did not work. Tempe Fire told police it was 113 degrees inside the unit. The woman did have medical issues and medical equipment was seen in the apartment. It is currently unknown if the woman died from heat-related issues or an ongoing medical issue. ABC15 has been following the problems at this apartment complex for the past several weeks.

For first time in 11 years, Department of Housing is opening up the wait list for Section 8.  
PHOENIX - For the first time in 11 years, the City of Phoenix has opened up the wait list for Section 8 Housing. Section 8 Housing provides affordable housing to those in need. The wait list closed back in 2005 with more than 30,000 names. Phoenix City Housing Department brought in extra staff for the expected surge in applications. They began taking applications and already

had a line of people waiting to apply. By the end of the day Alejandro Montiel, a spokesman for the city of Phoenix, said they had received more than 11,000 applications. The news was a blessing for many, including single mom Shikura Boatwright. She is one of the many that has been checking in with the housing department for years trying to get on the wait list. Boatwright is hoping this will be a fresh start for her and her 18-month-old daughter. Section 8 provides housing vouchers through the program for those who qualify. The program works with landlords who enroll in Section 8 Housing to allow the tenant to pay 30 percent of the income, with the program paying the rest. "There was a time when Phoenix was pretty affordable, but it's not the situation any longer. People are struggling to pay their rent," said Nicole Ayoola, housing manager for the section 8 program. The city's housing department will then randomly select 10,000 applicants through a lottery system to put on the list.

Sex offenders no longer to be placed in North Phoenix housing. Sex offenders released from prison will no longer be taken to a temporary housing location in a North Phoenix neighborhood. Officials with the Arizona Department of Corrections said they have been in communication with residents in the area who had expressed concerns over the temporary housing location in their neighborhood. Effective Thursday, sex offenders will no longer be taken to the Maricopa Reentry Center off of I-17 and Pinnacle Peak Road. Instead, released sex offenders will participate in other programs and receive assistance that will help them reintegrate into society, according to the department.

Pre-applications soon accepted for section 8 housing in Mesa. Pre-applications for the Housing Choice Voucher Program (section 8) will soon be accepted for those seeking assistance in Mesa. Pre-applications will be accepted online from October 11 to October 13 at 5 p.m. City of Mesa officials said the applications will only be accepted online. Officials said this is the first time the waitlist for Section 8 tenants has opened up since May of 2013. Housing officials with the city will be present at several valley locations to help those who may need assistance submitting applications. Thousands are expected to apply, and if the wait list fills up, it can close earlier. A mother of three knows the struggle of searching for affordable housing. "It was kind of hard, I was in the shelter a couple years back," said Capri Dean, a resident of the La Mesita Apartments in Mesa. Now she's found affordable housing. The La Mesita Apartments focus their help on getting homeless individuals back on their feet, but they also accept section 8 housing. Councilmember Elect Ryan Winkle says there's a great need for more of this type of housing. He was at the La Mesita Apartment complex for a tour on Tuesday. "Quality developments that give someone--basically it's a hand up, it's not a handout," Winkle said.

Immigration: High levels of illegal immigration and crimes committed by unauthorized immigrants are among the key rationales cited by some supporters of a tough new immigration law in Arizona. According to our Governor, Jan Brewer; border violence and crime due to illegal immigration are critically important issues to the people of our state. During the year controversial immigration measure SB 1070 passed, Arizona fell from eighth to 18th on the list of states most popular among people moving from other countries, Pollack said. He blames the stigma that came with the law.

Measles outbreak in Arizona caused in part by immigration workers refusal to get vaccinated. Health officials in Arizona say the largest current measles outbreak in the United States is in part because some workers at a federal immigration detention center refuse to get vaccinated. Authorities have confirmed 22 measles cases in Arizona since late May. They all stem from the Eloy Detention Center, an Immigration and Customs Enforcement facility managed by the Corrections Corporation of America. Pinal County health director Thomas Schryer says the outbreak likely began with a migrant but that detainees have since been vaccinated. He said ICE employees at the large facility have not been as cooperative. The Department told ABC15 120 ICE employees either won't get vaccinated or will not show proof of immunization. Nine of the 22 total cases were facility staff. The outbreak has shut down access to all visitors to reduce the risk of spread and exposure. In a statement, ICE says the agency is working closely with health officials to monitor detainees and employees. Symptoms appear seven to 12 days after exposure, but may take up to 21 days. It begins with fever (101 degrees Fahrenheit or higher), red, watery eyes, cough and runny nose and is followed by a rash that is red, raised, and



blotchy. The rash begins on the face at the hairline and moves down the body. The rash may last five to six days.

Fact-checking Hillary Clinton claims undocumented immigrants pour \$12 billion into Social Security. Democratic presidential nominee Hillary Clinton reiterated her support for immigration reform at a joint convention of black and Hispanic journalists Aug. 5. One of the event's moderators, Telemundo national correspondent Lori Montenegro, asked Clinton how she would do it, since it has not been achieved during President Barack Obama's time in office. Clinton said she would introduce legislation for comprehensive immigration reform in her first 100 days in office and would take a "very hard look" at deportation priorities. "My priority are violent criminals, people suspected of any kind of connection to terrorism," she said, "not hard-working mothers and fathers and people who go to work, help support this economy, pay \$12 billion a year into Social Security." Undocumented immigrant workers "pay \$12 billion a year into Social Security." We decided to truth-check this statement. Clinton's campaign referred us to a note issued by the Social Security Administration in April 2013 outlining the effects of unauthorized immigration on the Social Security Trust Funds.

Fact-checking Donald Trump's Phoenix immigration speech. Donald Trump highlighted a 10-step plan to fix what he called a "broken" immigration system at the Phoenix Convention Center. We truth-checked some of his claims: 1. Hillary and sanctuary cities Trump claimed Hillary Clinton wants sanctuary cities, a claim he made at the Republican National Convention in Cleveland. These cities, such as San Francisco, are generally where local law enforcement are not required to alert federal officials to undocumented immigrants. 2. Clinton and open borders Trump also attacked Clinton on immigration, noting that she does not know what she is doing except open borders and letting "everybody come in." Trump said in a June speech that Clinton would create "totally open borders." PolitiFact found that her plan would make it easier for undocumented immigrants to avoid deportation, but that does not mean a free-for-all when it comes to enforcement. 3. 30 million undocumented immigrants? Trump, while outlining his immigration plans Wednesday, questioned the number of undocumented immigrants currently in the U.S. "Our government has no idea, it could be three million, it could be 30 million, they have no idea what the number is," he said.

SB 1070 settlement allows for immigration checks. A coalition of civil rights groups agreed to end its challenge of Arizona's landmark 2010 immigration law in a deal in which the state issued guidelines on how police officers must enforce the law's most contentious section. The agreement unveiled Thursday ends the last of seven challenges to the law that was criticized for requiring officers, while enforcing other laws, to question the immigration status of people suspected of being in the country illegally. Courts barred enforcement of other sections of the law, but the questioning requirement was ultimately upheld by the U.S. Supreme Court, despite racial profiling concerns raised by critics of the statute. The enforcement guidelines, issued by Arizona Attorney General Mark Brnovich's office, include a requirement that officers document the reasons for their suspicion that a particular person is in the country illegally. The guidelines say local and state officers generally lack the power to detain people for civil immigration violations and forbid officers from prolonging traffic stops and detentions solely for the purpose of verifying a person's immigration status. Officers would have the discretion not to check people's immigration status if doing so prolongs detentions, hinders investigations or isn't practical because of emergencies, the unavailability of backup officers and other factors. Opponents of the law said the changes bring accountability to the enforcement of the statute and said the law is now a watered down version of what it once was.

Arizona to get \$1.8 million grant from CDC to fight Zika virus. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention is set to give Arizona a \$1.8 million grant to fight Zika virus. The organization will be granting \$60 million to cities and states around the country to battle the virus that can cause

serious infections and birth defects. The CDC has already offered \$25 million to fight Zika and will reportedly be granting another \$10 million in August to help affected families. Congress has not yet approved a \$1.9 billion budget proposed by the Obama Administration to fight Zika. Funding is expected to go toward vaccines, diagnostics and treatment, as well as mosquito control.

Public health official report two West Nile virus deaths in Maricopa County. The first West Nile virus-related deaths of the season are being reported in Maricopa County. Maricopa County Public Health officials announced on Thursday that 26 people have been affected by the virus, and two people over 50 years old have died. Symptoms of West Nile virus include fever, body aches and muscle weakness. Life-threatening symptoms include high fever, severe headache, neck stiffness and/or inflammation of the brain. If someone experiences these symptoms it can lead to paralysis or even death. Public health officials are urging residents to use precautions to protect themselves against the infection as part of their "Follow the Bite" campaign. Some suggestions include wearing bug repellent, removing standing water, properly maintaining pools, wearing lightweight clothing and covering arms and legs. In Maricopa County last year, there were 62 cases of West Nile virus, including two deaths.

PD: Woman poses as healthcare worker to steal from senior citizens in Gilbert and Mesa. Gilbert and Mesa police teamed up to arrest a woman who repeatedly scammed senior citizens out of their credit cards. Court records show that a woman and an accomplice posed as healthcare workers to steal credit cards. They offered to save senior citizens money by getting them discounted medical equipment and medication. They used this ruse to get into their homes and allegedly take their credit cards. Stephanie Carol Evans, 38, contacted three senior citizens who lived in senior living homes in Gilbert and Mesa. She reportedly told the victims that her and her accomplice worked for a large healthcare system in the Valley and could save them money on medical equipment and medicine. Evans would assist the victims in getting their identification cards out of their wallets, and while she was doing that, she would allegedly take their credit cards out of the wallet without the victims knowing it.

Report: Phoenix has highest amounts of chromium-6 in water of any city nationwide. Cancer causing toxins are in the water that 200 million Americans drink everyday, according to a study by the Environmental Working Group. Researchers say the City of Phoenix has the highest amounts of chromium-6 of any city over a million people nationwide. Chromium-6 is a metal that can cause cancer when found in high concentrations in public drinking water. Erin Brockovich brought the public health issue to light in the 1990's. Phoenix water officials say chromium-6 is found on the rocks in our region, and well water has elevated levels. However, they say well water is only a small amount of the total water in the system, and their tests show levels are no more than 1.6 parts per billion when the water reaches homes. California, which has the strictest requirements in the nation, allows for up to 10 ppb. "Our customers are seeing a very safe product that we are putting out every day that has been treated and tested - that's well below any limit that anybody has," City of Phoenix Assistant Water Director Troy Hayes said.

Can you get a refund if you have to cancel flights? He booked a trip back home, then he had a medical emergency...on the day of the flight! Robert Opitz thought it would be easy to cancel since his doctor wouldn't let him go, so he contacted Orbitz. But Robert says Orbitz told him he needed to contact the airlines directly -- United would take him one way and American back. He says that didn't work either because he says the airlines told him to contact Orbitz. Finally, he let me know. Before you buy airline tickets, it's important to know airline cancellation policies -- and it's important to know who to go to if you buy from a third-party site. In most cases, refunds are easy to get if a passenger dies, but that's not always the case with a medical condition. Our Assistance League of Phoenix team, and volunteer MJ got involved. In a few months, after MJ got ahold of the right people, Robert got his \$448 refunded to him. Robert says, "I'm very, very happy and it's the best thing I ever did." American Airlines says they're glad they were able to refund Robert's money. United Airlines says "our normal procedure for unplanned emergencies, such as hospitalization, is to extend the use of the value of a non-refundable ticket for one year and waive the change fee with appropriate documentation of the emergency. If a customer meets the criteria for a refund under the airlines' policies, it is the responsibility of the airline to provide the refund. In this specific case, Mr. Opitz did meet the criteria and was refunded by both airline partners.

Arizona Public Interest Research Group (APIRG) says you don't have to pay them. Start by opting out of one of the largest fees: overdraft protection."The bank supposedly is doing you a favor if you go down the street Starbucks and you want to get a Frappuccino and its \$4 and you go to pay but you actually don't have the money to cover you--they cover it for you," she says. "What they do is charge you a fee so that \$4 Frappuccino added on to perhaps a \$35 overdraft fee is now costing you \$39. It's a service the APIRG says you can and should opt out of. You'll get denied if there's no money, but it will save from a big fee. Other ways to lower bank fees: Choose no fee checking and savings, sign up for alerts to let you know where your account stands and link your checking and savings accounts. But since fees and policies for each account differ, Diane says you must shop around. " Another fee you can easily avoid: ATM fees. Some financial institutions offer free ATM within a certain network, but make sure locations are convenient Also, some will even pay the other banks fees if you use their machine. PHOENIX - Sometimes I think after all the stories we've done about scams, we're still not getting through to enough of people. Every week, people who every week still question if the IRS caller threatening them with arrest is real. Or they paid a "Microsoft" computer tech who called wanting to fix a problem they somehow knew about. Then I get an email like one from Rita. Rita says, "I just got an official looking letter saying they'll be calling to complete a health survey." She goes on to say, "I don't like giving personal information to a faceless person who calls, just because they say they are calling from an official office." Rita, those are words to live by. That would have kept \$27 million dollars in the pockets of those scammed by the IRS call alone. Now about this survey, turns out, it is real. But remember the point here... question everything! Yes, the Arizona Department of Health Services (AZDHS) is contacting thousands of Arizonans. They'll ask dozens of health behavior questions. Some are about lifestyle, physical

activity, depression, even questions about prescription drug use and sexual activity. But they say phone numbers are chosen randomly, it's totally anonymous and you don't have to take it. They hope you do because they say it helps guide public health programs. Interviewers must identify themselves as with the department and will never ask questions that could identify you. Wells Fargo employees met sales goals and got more pay by opening 1.5 million bank accounts and a half a million credit cards in customers names, according to the feds. Employees are also accused of created fake emails to sign them up for online banking. And all of it without the customer's knowledge. Feds say Wells Fargo employees would transfer money from real accounts to fund these new ones, creating overdraft fees for customers who didn't know what hit them. Wells Fargo is refunding \$2.6 million to customers and they're taking disciplinary action and terminating employees. Locked out? Don't fall for the locksmith scam. PHOENIX - If you're locked out of your house or car, choosing the first locksmith you see on a Google search is not a good idea. That's because it's usually an ad for \$15 or \$19 "service call" but will end up costing you hundreds. The scheme has been going for years. You call the company with a generic name, and cheap service call price only to have a dispatcher in a completely different state take your call. They can't ever tell how much the service will be--only the "starting prices"--which are always unrealistically low. They will tell you that the price depends on the "security level" of the lock. In the end, they'll end up charging you several hundreds of dollars. Here's the truth: most, if not all house locks are standard dead bolt locks that you can purchase at any home improvement store for less than \$20. Any legitimate locksmith will tell you a true high-security lock is one that you have likely never seen before and are a bit more complicated to open than standard locks. Locksmiths tell me lockout of your home with standard dead bolt locks should cost you no more than \$150. A legitimate locksmith should be able to give you a good estimate of how much their service will be. The problem is, many of us panic and go with the first option that pops up. Insurers to exit Arizona healthcare marketplace. The health marketplace in Arizona is getting smaller. In 2016, eight companies offered insurance plans in our state. As it stands now, that number is expected to drop to three in 2017. Health insurance expert Louise Norris tracks effects and changes in the marketplace with Healthinsurance.org . She says a company's participation in the healthcare marketplace comes down to one thing: "If they aren't making money in that segment of their business it's hard to convince them to stay," Norris said. She says Aetna, United, Humana, Health Choice and Phoenix Health are bowing out. Blue cross Blue Shield of Arizona, Health Net and Cigna are still in. At this point, every county will have at least one carrier with various levels of coverage and price points. But things could change between now and the November 1 beginning of open enrollment. According to Norris, Arizona is not alone. She explained that insurers are leaving exchanges in states all over the country for financial reasons. Another expected change for 2017 is higher premiums.
