4/5/22, 7:10am – 7:30am Issue: County Firefighters Battle To Keep Residents Safe.

Narrative: Discussed and informed our audience about the continuing efforts of our volunteer firefighters to keep our county residents safe. One of the major fires to affect Coleman and the county occurred in the Glen Cove area. Our guest spoke of the life-saving and home-saving efforts that were employed during the fire, and after it was extinguished. Three families lost their homes in the blaze. The Glen Cove Volunteer Fire Department held a fund-raising fish fry to raise monies and help for the fire victims. KSTA Radio joined in this event, with a donation and public service reminders. 4/7/22, 7:10am – 7:40am Issue: Western Film Festival Shines Spotlight On Local Filmmakers.

Narrative: Discussed and informed our audience about a new event coming to Coleman April 22-23. The Western Film Festival will take place at the Coleman Museum at Heritage Hall. Our guest, a Coleman native, was inspired to hold an event here, to spotlight local independent filmmakers, as well as those from across the state, nation and even foreign countries. The event will also draw tourists, and extensive tourism dollars and interest to help enhance our local tourism industry. Some 60-plus films have, so far, been submitted for consideration to be included in the Film Festival. Guest was John Langley, Coleman resident and Filmmaker.

4/14/22, 7:10am – 7:35am Issue: Coleman Public Library Provides Youth Summer Activities.

Narrative: Detailed for our audience the multiple special summer activities and events that the Coleman Public Library will provide for our youth during the summer months. Along with the annual Summer Reading Program, for students in kindergarten through elementary, the Coleman Public Library has also been awarded several statewide and national grants, through which they are able to offer our students very unique and “hands-on” interactive programs, helping to maintain an excitement level for our young people that is the standard for libraries in this region. Our guests encouraged parents and guardians to get their children registered for these programs, as another way of keeping the learning curve of our students at a high level, in the break between the school terms. 4/22/22, 7:05am – 7:40am Issue: Coleman Recognized For Role In Great Western Trail.

Narrative: Discussed and informed our audience about the statewide recognition that Coleman will receive during this year’s “Great Western Trail Days”, 4/22-25/22 here in Coleman. This will be the third year for this annual event to take place. An Historical Marker will be placed along the east entrance into Coleman, noting the path that was taken as the Great Western Trail made its way though this region during the cattle drives of the 1870’s though the 1890’s. A number of notable Coleman County families had family members who joined the drive as it made its way all the way north into Canada. Our guest detailed the effort of near twenty years that it has taken to properly mark and honor the Great Western Trail for its contribution to our way of life here, and in Texas. The Great Western Trail Days Weekend is held annually, and

has also become a great plus to our local tourism industry and economy.

5/4/22, 7:15am – 7:35am Issue: Local Job Fair Highlights Employment Aid For Students.

Narrative: Detailed for our audience an upcoming Job Fair, taking place at Coleman High School, specifically targeted for employers looking to hire students just out of school, and those youth who may be looking for summer employment. Many local and area businesses are having difficulty maintaining a full staff, and this job fair will offer both parties a chance to meet, in a neutral setting. Our guest noted that attendees should arrive with resumes in hand, and be prepared to interview for positions available immediately. Whether employment is gained or not, the Job Fair will provide students with valuable “real world” experience as they look to enter the job market. The Job Fair is open to all Junior and Senior students across Coleman County.

5/19/22, 7:15am – 7:45am issue: Local Rocketry Team Places 5<sup>th</sup> In The Nation.

Narrative: Discussed and informed our audience about the outstanding accomplishment and recognition gained recently by the Coleman High School Rocketry Team. Consisting of Juniors and Seniors, this group placed 5<sup>th</sup> in the National Rocketry Challenge, contested at The Plains, Virginia, just outside of Washington, D.C. Some 750 teams from across the Country attempted to win an invitation to the national competition, but only approximately 100 advanced forward, with CHS placing 5<sup>th</sup> overall. Our guest detailed the exacting effort required to build, and then successfully launch and land these tubular-type rockets, meeting all required parameters and specifications, including doing so in adverse weather and wind conditions. This was the 2<sup>nd</sup> time that the CHS Rocketry Team has advanced to nationals.

6/6/22, 8:15am – 8:35am Issue: U.S. Representative Hosts Local Town Hall For Residents.

Narrative: Discussed, informed and invited our listeners to attend a Town Hall Meeting today at the Tillman Room of the Coleman Public Library, featuring District 11, U.S. Representative August Pfluger. In advance of the meeting, Rep. Pfluger was our guest, and provided updates on several regional, statewide, national and international issues. Pfluger spoke strongly about the need to re-open and maintain a strong statewide and national oil supply, and being less dependent on foreign oil. Our guest also spoke about legislation to expand broadband internet access to rural areas of the state, as well as other topics of interest. Town Hall meetings are an exceptional way, and opportunity to hear from, and speak to our elected officials.

6/7/22, 7:15am – 7:55am Issue: Community Supports FCA Through Cattle Auction.

Narrative: Discussed, informed and invited our audience to attend and participate in a special benefit auction to support and raise funds for the Brownwood Area Fellowship Of Christian Athletes Organization, of which Coleman Jr. High and Coleman High School are affiliated. The FCA “Cattle Auction” is held each summer at the Coleman Livestock Auction Commission Company. Our guest noted that proceeds from cattle sold, along with a wide range of items are donated to the sale to help raise funds. A major percentage of the monies

raised at the local sale are retained in Coleman to support our local FCA Hubs. Approximately 100 students in the CISD participate in Fellowship Of Christian Athlete activities on a regular basis.

6/28/22, 7:10am – 7:40am Issue: Cornerstone Community Action Agency Serves Residents.

Narrative: Discussed and detailed to our audience the numerous services provided to clients in need. Examples are rental assistance, income tax preparation for senior citizens at no charge, as well as volunteer opportunities for all ages. CCAA, which serves a 13-county area, covering all the counties in the KSTA listening area, has its main office base here in Coleman, and is also a major employer here and across its coverage area. Our guest also highlighted the VITA program, which provides multiple area of assistance to veterans and their families. 6/29/22, 7:15am – 7:30am Issue: Dr. Provides Important Heat-Related Health Safety Information

Narrative: With on-going periods of excessive heat and temperatures blanketing our area and region, our guest, a licensed physician was invited to be our voice to discuss and inform our audience about the signs and symptoms of heat stroke and heat-related illnesses. The most important step to take is to stay properly hydrated. Our guest urged everyone to drink a good quantity of water BEFORE going outside, even in the morning hours. Finding shade, taking breaks, consuming water, and wearing lightweight, loose-fitting and light-colored clothes while outdoors is optimum. Heat stroke is extremely dangerous, and can come on suddenly. Call 911 as soon as symptoms present, either for you, or others. 6 to 8 bottles of water are a good rule of thumb for proper hydration for most individuals.
