Narrative: Discussed the immediate and long-term value of local radio to the safety and growth in our communities, region and State. Our guest enjoyed a better than 60-year career in the Radio Industry, ranging from "small market" broadcasting to serving as Affiliates Director for the Texas State Network, located in the DFW Metroplex. Joe Short noted the critical need for immediate local reports in times of inclement weather, local news and elections, local promotional activities, sports, and statewide and national events that effect our local area. Narrative: Discussed and detailed for our audience, the increased activity and energy at Coleman Heritage Arts & Preservation Society (C.H.A.P.S.). The Board has recently noted their desire to have the facility truly become a cultural center for Coleman and this region, as it was originally designed to be. To that end, multiple new events have been added to the annual calendar. One of those will be the "Singer Spotlight Series", a quarterly music event that will feature a local or area singer/songwriter who will be given the opportunity to perform and discuss the heart of their music. Coleman ISD is serving right at 800 students in the 2023-24 school year. Continuing facilities maintenance and expansion projects are being eyed, as this continued increased in Coleman is expected to continue over the next several years.
