1. Shadows And Spirits, The Legislature's Size	Capitol Report	October 6, 2019 30 Minutes	Two Senators appeared to discuss separate, but significant proposals they have to alter how the Legislature is structured: Scott Jensen (R-Chaska) suggests a Constitutional amendment to shrink the Legislature by 25 percent; while John Marty (DFL-Roseville) offers a different amendment to switch from a bicameral, to a unicameral body. Brian Pease of the Minnesota Historical Society also spoke to the annual dramatic reenactments held in the Capitol, with certain historical figures telling the early history of the Complex.
2. Youth Education	Minnesota 4-H: Growing True Leaders	October 10, 2019 30 Minutes	Host Libby Montreuil visits with 4-H youth at the State Engineering Design Challenge in Saint Cloud, learns about the Llama encampment at the Minnesota State Fair, and chats with accomplished grade school students statewide.
3. Future Of Minnesota Driving	Capitol Report	October 13, 2019 30 Minutes	Hosted by Shannon Loehrke, Senator Scott Dibble (DFL-Minneapolis) spoke about recent plans by the Walz Administration to impose emission standards on automobiles sold in Minnesota. Senator John Jasinski (R-Faribault) weighed in on regulations on and legislative oversight of self-driving vehicles.
4. Legislative Oversight Of Insulin Manufacturing	Capitol Report	October 20, 2019 30 Minutes	Today's focus: Counterproposals by Senator Eric Pratt (R-Prior Lake) and Representative Michael Howard (DFL-Richfield) towards insulin-making. The cause: Governor Tim Walz's hopes for a Special Session before February 2020.
5. Medicaid And Pictures	Capitol Report	October 27, 2019 30 Minutes	This fall, hearings were held on Medicaid waivers, and challenges faced by families caring for disabled loved ones. Senators John Hoffman (DFL-Champlin) and Jim Abeler (R-Anoka) spoke to their concerns over the current county-by-county system.

MNLARS, Opioids, Missing And Murdered Indigenous Women	Capitol Report	<p>November 3, 2019</p> <p>30 Minutes</p>	<p>Two legislative task forces had their work spotlighted: Mary Kiffmeyer (R-Big Lake) focused on the State's vehicle registration system, and Patricia Torres-Ray (DFL-Minneapolis) called for greater attention towards violence against Native women.</p> <p>Moreover, Jim Nobles reported to the Legislative Audit Commission. This document alleged \$29 million in improper payments to the White Earth Nation and the Leech Lake Band of Ojibwe, based on self-administered medications.</p>
7. Relevance Of Prohibition, 100 Years Later	Almanac	<p>November 15, 2019</p> <p>60 Minutes</p>	<p>An MPCA representative spoke to recent water quality news, State lawmakers toured two potential bonding projects along the Twin Cities riverfront, and the Indian Women's Resource Center was awarded new grant funding. Locally, the show featured Andrew Volstead, with interviews from the Granite Falls Historical Society and Bluenose Gopher Public House.</p>

Nicotine Addiction, Collegiate Athletics, State Overpayments	Capitol Report	<p>November 17, 2019</p> <p>30 Minutes</p>	<p>Senator Carla Nelson's (R-Rochester) proposals on tobacco purchasing age, and vaping flavor regulation were on the docket. Senator Roger Chamberlain (R-Lino Lakes) also discussed regulating profits from the work of student-athletes.</p>
9. Legislative Leadership	Almanac	<p>November 22, 2019</p> <p>60 Minutes</p>	<p>Governor Walz and several Caucus heads debated insulin legislation, plus the likelihood of a Special Session happening before February 2020, followed by the First Annual Side Dish Showdown.</p> <p>Later, Paul Douglas analyzed early winter weather patterns, and the political science panel dissected the latest impeachment proceedings.</p>
10. E-Cigarettes And Listening Sessions	Capitol Report	<p>November 24, 2019</p> <p>30 Minutes</p>	<p>Chair Michelle Benson (R-Ham Lake) recounted several recent statewide visits she wanted to highlight current drug prices, how Minnesotans were managing their prescription needs, and ways the Legislature could intervene.</p> <p>Separately, Senator Matt Klein (DFL-Mendota Heights) discussed his own proposals on prescription drugs costs, as well as the rise of teenage vaping.</p>
