Week of 4/01/14-4/04/14

Ngorongoro Crater (2251)

With its enormous population of zebra and antelope, Jack discovers the crater is one of the world's most unique places for animal viewing. Known for elephants with some of the biggest tusks in Africa, Jack keeps his fingers crossed that he'll find a "Big Tusker". Kathaleen looks at the unusual role reversal in the crater between hyenas and lions.

Back to the Mara (2252)

From his base at Kichwa Tembo, Jack surveys the Masai Mara, Kenya's premier wildlife habitat and home to the greatest concentration of large mammals on earth. And Jack discovers the Mara has some mighty big crocodiles too. Jack lifts off on an early morning balloon safari to check out the animals and the vast landscape.

Little Seen Africa (2253)

Jack takes a look at some of the African wildlife you don't commonly see such as the bush baby and the dik-dik, a tiny antelope. But most importantly, Jack learns about a conservation program to restore the Mountain Bongo population, now considered extinct on the forested slopes of Mt. Kenya. As Jack finds out at the Mt. Kenya Game Ranch, the Mountain Bongo, with its russet red fur, white stripes and ivory tipped horns, is one of the world's most beautiful antelope.

Howling Success (2254)

Jack journeys into the countryside west of Belize City to learn about the successful grass root efforts conserving two of Central America's signature animals: the black howler monkey and green iguana. After observing the inspiring work of "The Community Baboon Sanctuary" and the "Green Iguana Project," Jack is awed by thousands of Blue Morpho butterflies.

Week of 4/07/14-4/11/14

Monkeys and Manatees (2256)

At Monkey River Village in Belize, Central America, Jack meets up with a local river guide named "Rambo" who delights in showing off a jungle that is inhabited by howler monkeys, crocodiles and tarantulas. Jack begins his adventure at Gales Point where researchers from the United States are continuing their study of the West Indian manatee.

Whale Shark (2257)

Off the Caribbean coast of Placencia in Belize, Central America, Jack encounters the whale shark, the world's largest fish, feeding on the spawn of Cabela Snapper aggregating at Gladden Spit. Jack also dives with conservationists working to protect the 400 mile long Meso-American Reef.

Protect and Preserve (2258)

Around the world, thousands of species are on the brink of being lost forever. Though the reasons are varied, the culprit usually turns out to be human encroachment into natural habitats. On this adventure, Jack visits some of his favorite conservation projects focused on saving endangered animals, including the golden lion tamarin in Brazil, the Andean condor in Ecuador and the cheetah in Namibia.

Deep as the Ocean (2259)

Oceans cover about 70 percent of the Earth's surface. From the shoreline to the deepest depths, Jack shows us the underwater realm is home to some of the most diverse life on earth. On this adventure, Jack has face-to-face encounters with sharks and stingrays; and from a deep-diving mini-sub he views living coral growing on a Cayman shipwreck. Off the coast of California, Jack marvels at the Northern elephant seal, a marine mammal capable of diving to a depth of nearly one mile.

Creepy Creatures (2260)

Simply because of their appearance, some animals give people the creeps. At the top of the list: Bats, Bugs and Snakes! On this adventure, Jack shares some of his favorite creepy encounters from around the world. Come along and eat green ants in Australia, venture into a Puerto Rican cave filled with 300,000 bats and face a deadly cobra in Thailand. Jack also points out "creepy creatures" are essential to maintaining a healthy environment.

Stops on his itinerary include the blue-footed boobies in the Galapagos Islands, Arctic puffins in Norway and Panama's Canopy Tower, the world's most unique observation platform for viewing tropical birds.

Behind the Scenes (2264)

Jack ventures behind the scenes at Busch Gardens, Tampa Bay to hide treats for the chimpanzees, weigh an elephant and visit the park's African animals, including a baby rhino. While preparing a special diet in the zoo kitchen, Jack chows down on some mealworms.

Down Below (2265)

To get a first hand look at marine creatures in their natural habitat; Jack goes down below in the Bahamas, Jack dives in the open ocean with Atlantic Bottlenose Dolphins, in the Sea of Cortez the waters beneath a rocky sea lion rookery are an underwater ballet; and in South Africa, Jack meets a Great White Shark face to face.

From the introduction of just 8 animals in the 1920's, the population of the loveable, tree dwelling marsupial has soared to more than 27,000.

Crocodylus, Kakadu and Hope (2271)

After the capture of a big saltwater crocodile in Australia's Northern Territory, Jack collects plaque samples for an important research project. At Kakadu National Park, Jack catches up with a colorful but sacred grasshopper. Jack also meets two kids with amazing childhoods that include growing up around animals from Africa to Australia.

Cruis'n with Crocs (2272)

On the Adelaide River in Australia's Northern Territory, Jack comes face-to-face with an 18-foot saltwater crocodile. From the world's largest reptile, Jack then turns his interest to the out of the water antics of a small fish, the mudskipper. Jack also catches a File snake and then pays a visit to the colorful proprietor of Goat Island.

Week of 4/28/14-5/02/14

Along the Island Coast (2274)

On Kangaroo Island, Jack explores the coastline for New Zealand fur seals and rare Australian sea lions. At Backstairs Passage, Jack snorkels into a powerful tidal surge to get a first-hand look at the agile swimming ability of pinnipeds. At night, Jack observes the Little penguin, the world's smallest penguin species.

Deadly Snakes in the Grass (2275)

In Australia's Northern Territory, Jack gets an up-close look at some of the world's most deadly snakes including the Inland Taipan, the Brown snake, the Coastal Taipan and the Tiger snake. At the Territory Wildlife Park, Jack is amazed by a host of birds, especially an owl that barks like a dog.

Thorny Devils, Camels and "Dinky" (2276)

Jack journeys to the Outback of Central Australia to learn about desert reptiles including Thorny Devils, a Shingleback lizard and a Perentie, a large monitor lizard. After a camel safari, Jack stops by a roadhouse at Stuarts Well where he's entertained by "Dinky," the singing dingo.

Where the Bears Are (2277)

Come along to some of Jack's favorite bear places. The Katmai Peninsula in Alaska is THE place for brown bears, and Brooks Falls is his favorite location to "bear watch". Then Jack heads to the isolated Knight Inlet to find grizzlies! Close by, in the Great Bear Rainforest, Jack sets off in search of the storied Spirit Bear, the rare, white, black bear.

In the Presence of Great Apes (2278)

When few people dared to attempt to film gorillas in the wild, Jack made a historic trip to Uganda to see these amazing primates. Tracking the great apes through the Bwindi Impenetrable Forest is a challenge, but Jack is rewarded with the encounter of a lifetime! Chimpanzees in a hidden gorge and a special sanctuary for orphaned and abused chimps rounds out this primate encounter.

Week of 5/05/14-5/09/14

Cold Blooded Cousins (2280)

Giant Galapagos tortoises and unusual iguanas are Jack's quest today. Finding the lumbering giant tortoise in the wild is harder than he thought, but it's easy to spot the wild-looking Galapagos marine iguanas. And if these iguanas aren't unusual enough, Jack visits their rare blue Caribbean cousins – the endangered blue iguana. Who knew reptiles could be so fascinating?

What's Up Down Under (2281)

Wombats and fruit bats, and Tasmanian Devils – oh, my! What interesting and uncommon animals live down under in Australia. Jack treks all over Australia and its island states to find some of the most unusual animals in the world, and even he is surprised at what he finds, including quolls, cassowaries and delectable green ants that bit with a whallop!

Great African Safaris: Botswana (2282)

On this Animal Adventure, Jack's on safari in Botswana! He finds endangered wild dogs and other wildlife at remote Mombo Camp... then Jack saddles up for a closer view of wildlife on an Okavanga Horse Safari. He gets the most up-close look of all when he joins a walking safari from the secluded island camp of Xigera.

Saving the Wild (2283)

Jack joins conservationists in the field and finds himself belly down on the sand in the dark to learn more about nesting sea turtles. Then, hunting hibernating bears is harder than Jack anticipates, but he finds a special reward at the end of the trail. Next Jack helps whooping cranes get a stay from extinction.

More Than Companions (2284)

In many ways, animals are more than companions to humans. On this adventure, Jack finds some amazing animal assistants! He discovers the special skills of search dogs in training, and then is totally amazed when he tries to outwit some unusual port patrol teams. His last stop is a busy air force base with an unusually low-tech solution to a high tech problem.

Week of 5/12/14-5/16/14

Entertaining Arks (2286)

Today, Jack's off to see how zoos and aquariums around the world are helping to save the world's wildlife. He starts with unusual stingrays and amazing jellies at the New Orleans Aquarium of the Americas, then Jack meets two special groups of primates – in

England no less! Next, he's off to Africa to find red pandas at the Johannesburg Zoo, and then he heads to the Rio Zoo to see rehabilitation in action.

Great African Safaris: Tanzania (2287)

On this Animal Adventure, Jack's on safari in Tanzania! He finds hungry crocodiles and herds of hippos at the Grumeti River, then has a face-to-face encounter with the great Serengeti migration and a charging elephant! A quest for big tuskers draws him to the Ngorongoro, one of the world's largest craters.

Extraordinary People, Extraordinary Acts (2288)

Sometimes it's just ordinary people who are led to do extraordinary things when wildlife needs help. Jack visits with some of these unsung heroes and the unusual creatures they've taken under their wings. He finds a big cat rescue in the middle of a busy city and a turtle hospital in an old hotel. But the most unusual sanctuary he visits may be a safe haven for sloths, tucked away at a bed and breakfast in Costa Rica.

Galloping Splendor & Speed (2289)

Today, Jack's on an equestrian quest to Central Florida. His adventures take him center stage at Arabian Nights' equine extravaganza, then, he's off to learn the fine art of training race horses. After all that work, Jack heads for the rolling hills to find the perfect retirement farm – for horses, that is!

Ssssssssnakessssssss! (2290)

Come along with Jack as he searches out some of the planet's less popular inhabitants – snakes. He fulfills a lifelong dream to see Thailand's most famous snake and gets face-to-face with Africa's most deadly. Then, he finds out just how close is too close to a feisty python in Costa Rica!

Week of 5/19/14-5/23/14

Mush! (2042)

Jack visits Will Steger, Arctic explorer, at Homestead, his training camp outside of Ely, Minnesota. Twenty miles from the Canadian border, Will is training and planning for his latest expedition ... a journey across the Arctic Sea by ski and dog sled, all in one season. In the harsh and dangerous environs in which Will travels, his life is entirely dependent upon his dogs. At Homestead Jack will meet Husky puppies and identify the characteristics which make the perfect sled dog. We'll meet some of Will's furry team members, find out what makes a good team, how to protect a dog from the cold, watch a mush training session, and then ... Jack tries mushing. The expedition will be checking into the Internet on a daily basis so that students around the world can follow its progress. Will's goal is to bring international attention to pollution accumulating in the Arctic.

Some Ruff And Grizzly Characters (2043)

Doug Seus has many animals at his home in Utah where he trains a few of them for movie appearances. His grizzly bears starred in "The Bear". Doug is helping animal conservation efforts by buying up their habitats. Sometimes the land is adjacent to national parks. Much of his support comes from actors who have been involved with Doug and his animals. We'll meet the stars of "The Bear" and experience Doug's special relationship with his charges.

Special People, Special Dogs (2044)

Connie Bombaci of Madison, Connecticut, is a special person. She has adopted two Dalmatians that are deaf and taught them sign language, along with her Black Labrador-Dalmatian cross breed. The dogs can readily interpret simple commands given in American Sign Language. Jack then visits some very special dogs at Fidelco of Bloomfield, Connecticut. Fidelco breeds, raises, and trains its own "breed within a breed" German Shepherd dog guides to be placed with blind men and women. Fidelco is a pioneer in the area of in-community training; the blind person remains in his/her home environment while being trained with a Fidelco dog guide. Jack travels to Los Angeles International Airport to meet Canine Enforcement Officer Ric Robles and his dog Bo. Every day the U.S. Customs Service is faced with the threat of drug smuggling. By teaming up with dogs rescued from humane societies and shelters, the Customs Agents are fighting the war on drugs.

The Wilder Side Of Las Vegas (2045)

When you think of Las Vegas, you might think of the Strip, the casinos, "Sin City". But there's another side to the town, an even *wilder* side that many people never experience. Jack journeys to the Mirage Hotel, where a special group of bottlenose dolphins lives. These marine mammals participate in a unique program that is helping autistic children. After spending time in the water, Jack is ready to be back on dry land. He visits the Desert Tortoise Conservation Center, where these ancient animals have survived despite the rough desert climate. In the Red Rock Canyon area Jack encounters wild burros who roam free in the desert. On this adventure, Jack has found more wildlife in Las Vegas than anyone would think possible.

Elephants Of Amboseli (2046)

Jack spends a day with elephant researcher Cynthia Moss at her camp in Kenya. Surrounded by hundreds of elephants, Jack discovers how researchers study, observe, and identify these magnificent pachyderms. The visit includes a startling attack between an adult elephant and a baby cape buffalo who becomes separated from his herd. Fortunately, there is a happy ending.

Week of 5/26/14-5/30/14

Saving Endangered Species (2048)

At the Sheldrick Wildlife Center in Nairobi, Kenya, Jack is introduced to orphaned baby elephants whose parents were the unlucky victims of poachers. Because the babies haven't learned how to survive in the wild, they are trained by humans to behave like elephants. Jack participates in showing the elephants how to break off branches, roll in the mud, and give themselves dust baths. Jack also travels to the Negre Sergoi Rhino Sanctuary to visit his friends Anna Merz and Samia (a black rhino Anna raised from infancy).

Chimpanzees Of Chambura Gorge (2049)

Travel with Jack to Uganda's Chambura River Gorge to visit a family of forty chimpanzees who make their home in this tropical treasure.... only recently discovered by a Peace Corps worker. After learning how to call and track chimps in the wild, Jack heads into the gorge to observe the chimps in their natural habitat. After enjoying the playful antics of the Chambura chimps, Jack heads to Entebbe and the Uganda Wildlife Education Center, home to orphaned animals including chimpanzees seized from the hands of poachers. Here Jack meets a lovable and mischievous group of chimps and shares information about an exciting pilot program to reintroduce the orphaned chimps to the wild.

Safari Through The Masai Mara (2050)

Jack flies to the Masai Mara Reserve in Kenya, where wildlife abounds! As he steps off the plane, Jack has an up-close encounter with cheetahs. During a walking safari, Jack experiences a variety of adventures while visiting hippos, zebras, rhinos, elephants, giraffe, and wildebeest in their natural habitat. We also learn fascinating facts about plants; including a poisonous variety elephants eat to cure intestinal worms! With the help of guide Ron Beton and his nomadic bush friend Rakita, Jack learns how to survive in the wild. Rakita teaches Jack how to make fire by rubbing sticks together and shows us his poison arrows.

Education Worldwide (2051)

Children are the future in protecting and preventing endangered species, both in America and abroad. Jack shows us how education is the key to accomplishing this goal. We visit a giraffe center in Kenya, where children, some of whom have never seen a giraffe, come to learn all about these unusual animals. With Jack's help, the children even feed the giraffes! Later Jack introduces us to children at a Masai school. These children are learning about rhinos and conservation while making clay models. Jack also explores an innovative educational opportunity for kids in America.

The Game Warden (2052)

Arriving at the game warden headquarters in Kenya, Jack discusses the importance of the job, conservation, and survival of elephants. The head game warden talks about poachers and shows Jack some of the rifles that have been confiscated. While on patrol they discover an elephant carcass, but are unable to determine if its death was caused by poachers or natural causes. The warden removes the tusks to prevent the ivory from being taken by poachers.

Week of 6/02/14-6/06/14

Uganda Gorillas, Part 1 (2054)

With the Mountain Gorilla population nearing extinction, Jack heads to the Bwindi Impenetrable Rain Forest. Upon arriving in Uganda, Jack is quickly introduced to the African culture, with several amusing roadside detours. While traveling to camp, Jack and his crew use ingenuity to overcome obstacles including foot-deep mud and a rock being thrown through their windshield. Once at camp, Jack gives the grand tour and settles in to enjoy the campfire. The following day Jack begins his quest in earnest as his guide, Gongo, takes him deep into the African jungle in search of the Mountain Gorilla.

Uganda Gorillas, Part 2 (2055)

Tracking gorillas in Uganda's Impenetrable Rain Forest is quite a challenge. Through steep inclines and thick brush, Jack perseveres until he finally steps into the temporary home of a Mountain Gorilla and his family. With a viewing distance of just fifteen feet from the gorillas, Jack gets an intimate look at this primate's habitat and experiences some tense moments as a giant silverback gorilla charges him and his crew. We learn from the people on the front line what needs to be done to help preserve this dying species. In addition, the Ugandan culture is highlighted as Jack tries an authentic African lunch and talks to his guides about how they track barefoot in the jungle.

Arctic Expedition (2056)

With the icy Arctic landscape as a backdrop, Jack embarks on an adventure in search of polar bears. His journey takes him through remote towns where he introduces us to the Inuit people, their lifestyle, and the unique character of Arctic Bay. As he searches for the elusive polar bears, he braves the frozen terrain, sleeps in an igloo, and eats sardines and bannick! Jack eventually meets up with Canadian researcher, Glenn Williams who has successfully tracked polar bears and has done extensive research on their habitat. Jack finally comes face-to-face with a polar bear, but in an unpredictable place.

A Special Bond (2057)

Those who work with wildlife — like conservationists, zookeepers, and researchers — share a unique kind of dedication. It's a special bond formed with the animals that are the object of their care and concern. With Jack as our guide this program takes a look at two dedicated animal keepers at the Columbus Zoo who develop a special bond with Bengal Tiger and Clouded Leopard cubs. Jack also visits with Dr. Sarah Boysen, a noted researcher with Ohio State University, who studies the cognitive intelligence of chimps. Through her studies she is hoping to gain a better understanding of early man.

Swimming With The Manatees (2058)

Jack visits Crystal River in Florida, the birthplace of manatee research ... and the only place where you can swim face-to-face with the great manatee in the wild. Jack learns about the plight of the manatee and what's being done to save this endangered animal. He goes on patrol with the U.S. Fish & Wildlife to see firsthand how the manatees are being protected from boaters and divers.

Week of 6/09/14-6/13/14

Miami Serpentarium (2060)

The Miami Serpentarium is a former tourist attraction that has recently moved from Miami to Punta Gorda on the west coast of Florida. The serpentarium is dedicated to snake research and anti-venom serum production. They supply the snake venom to the only U.S. Company involved in the production of anti-venom. And the serpentarium also provides venom to other American pharmaceutical companies that use the venom in treatment research for various diseases. The Miami Serpentarium is located on 80 acres and houses about 400 venomous snakes, representing thirty different species. Jack learns how these snakes are cared for and how venom is extracted. We see what it takes to construct the first compound ever created for captive-bred rattlesnakes.

Dolphin Research Center (2061)

Jack visits the Florida Keys for an animal adventure of the aquatic kind! In Marathon, he visits a dolphin research center where he swims with the dolphins and learns about the unique social behavior of this fascinating and graceful mammal. The setting for this adventure is a virtual paradise where locals enjoy beautiful sunsets. Jack gives us a taste of the local flavor of this paradise in the sun.

Cayman Encounter (2062)

Jack travels to the Cayman Islands where he takes a boat ride into the heart of Sting Ray City for an encounter with one of nature's most unusual fish. Jack dives with the rays for a close-up look at how they play, feed, swim, and interact with people. Jack also tracks the island's Blue Iguana and visits a turtle farm. To round out this adventure, Jack takes a deep dive into the blue waters of the Caymans in a submarine, descending to a depth of one thousand feet to see the shipwreck of the Kirk Pride.

Hands on University (2063)

Moorpark College in Moorpark, California features a unique program in animal handling and management. More than one hundred animals assist in teaching, ranging from large cats to baboons to birds. Jack sits in as a student for the day and goes into the field to work with some of the animals. He also interviews some of the students and is amazed at the hard work, love for animals and dedication that is required to excel in this strenuous program.

Wildlife Waystation (2064)

Martine Colette's waystation is often the only alternative for thousands of wild and exotic animals who have nowhere else to turn. Jack visits her collection of rescued animals, which number in the thousands over the past years. Most recently, she has taken in a number of lions and two young grizzly bears. She has also built a new research facility for chimps.

Week of 6/16/14-6/20/14

Friends Of A Feather (2066)

It started as a childhood hobby for Joe Carvalho. Joe is now an internationally acclaimed bird trainer. After being serenaded by a talking parrot named "Echo", Jack helps Joe free-fly colorful macaws and Andean Condors from the hillside of an unlikely San Francisco home.

Rescue Dogs (2067)

What does it take to create a rescue dog? Jack visits one of the most successful training programs in the country located in San Bernardino, California. These are the same dogs that were instrumental in the search and rescue efforts of the Oklahoma City bombing disaster. Jack takes part in demonstrations which exhibit the incredible skill these dogs possess. We meet Walt Harrison and his dog Misty. Walt and Misty are the top rescue team in the U.S. This show is scheduled to honor the first anniversary of the Oklahoma City bombing.

World Of Birds (2068)

Jack travels to Capetown to visit the World of Birds. The third largest bird park in the world features 3000 birds representing 400 species. Many of the birds are rare and endangered. Walter Mangold, founder of the park, collected these birds from around the globe. We also travel to the very tip of Africa for an ostrich encounter at the legendary Cape of Good Hope. Jack rounds out his feathered adventure at Boulder Beach with a close up look at the endangered African penguin.

The Elusive Cheetah (2069)

North of Johannesburg Jack visits the world-renowned DeWildt Cheetah Center founded by conservationist Anne Van Dyk. A great deal is now known about the social and breeding behaviors of the elusive cheetah thanks to Van Dyk and the Center. In fact, the Center's captive breeding program is largely responsible for taking the cheetah off the endangered species list. Jack meets Jillian, a cheetah "hand raised" by Van Dyk and learns that the animal is wild, the setting is wild, but Jillian is as docile as any house cat. Jack is also introduced to the endangered Wild Dog and the Brown Hyena. This encounter is most memorable.

Operation Rhino (2070)

A concerted effort is underway to save the endangered black rhino at the hluhluwe-Umfolozi Park in South Africa. Jack tracks the park's rhino only to encounter a charging bull elephant! The adventure continues across a rain-swollen, crocodile infested Umfolozi River for a safari encounter with lions, giraffes and elephants. We meet world-renowned conservationist, Ian Player who was instrumental in creating a program that literally rescued the African rhinos from the brink of extinction with his relocation program.

Week of 6/23/14-6/27/14

Westward Bound (2072)

With the incredible scenic landscape of the "Big Sky Country" of Montana as a backdrop, Jack discovers the spirit of the Old West as he travels by wagon train to learn how early settlers depended on their animals to get them to their destinations. Also featured are the wild mustangs that freely roam the Pryor Mountains in Wyoming.

Save the Eagles (2073)

Join Jack as he follows three American bald eagles from early life to their first flight, as a team of zookeepers and conservationists from Ohio to Tennessee work to secure the survival of this threatened species. Jack visits a center in Tennessee where hundreds of eagles have been rescued, rehabilitated, bred and released back to the wild. Jack experiences first hand the extraordinary power of this bird of prey as he free flies with an eagle named Challenger. This story of survival and strength culminates with the maiden flight of three young eaglets as they begin their bold journey into the wild.

Fair Fun (2074)

Jack visits with animals at the Ohio State Fair. From chickens to horses, adults and children share their love for animals during this special annual event. Jack follows one young girl who hopes to bring home a blue ribbon with her beloved horse...will they make it?

Picture Perfect (2075)

Kalispell, Montana is the home of the Triple D Game Farm where wildlife photographers snap close-up views of many elusive North American predators. What does it take to get the perfect picture? And what can be learned about animal behavior through the lens? Jack also gets the scare of his life, when he's chased up a tree by a grizzly bear!

The Wilds (2076)

Discovering a piece of wild Africa right in his own backyard, Jack visits The Wilds in Cumberland, Ohio. The Wilds is a working preserve on ninety-one hundred acres where more than a dozen species roam. At The Wilds, breeding research is the focus, including reproductive studies of the white rhino. Jack also helps in a risky operation on a giraffe.

Week of 6/30/14-6/30/14

Pet Project (2078)

Jack travels to the English countryside to visit the Waltham Center in Leicestershire, England. The center is home to hundreds of dogs and cats, which are lovingly cared for in purpose, built facilities. Waltham is recognized worldwide for its research into nutritional requirements of pets, husbandry and pet care and the human-pet relationship. Jack gets a first hand look behind the Waltham walls to find out what it takes to raise a healthy and happy Fido or Fluffy.

Episode #133 (4/01/14)

This week on Wild About Animals we head to the Midwest prairie and study it's inhabitants with some students from Iowa State University. We also check out the efforts of the San Diego Zoo's conservation program to save the California Condor.

Episode #134 (4/08/14)

This week we head to the tropical paradise of Hawaii. Things start off on the rooftop of a popular Maui resort that has created a home for 300,000 bees. Then we go below the surface to see a family run sailing company's commitment to clean up local coral reefs. After that it's over to the Garden Island of Kauai chasing down the story about thousands of wild chickens that run free after a hurricane wiped away many of the chicken coups. We finish back on Maui learning about a program designed to help the Hawaiian Green Sea Turtle.

Episode #135 (4/15/14)

This week on Wild About Animals we visit a donkey rescue in Texas and learn about this misunderstood animal. We then head over to New Jersey where a group of dogs is helping service men and woman get back to life post-war. Lastly we stop by the town of Punxsutawney and meet their biggest star.

Episode #136 (4/22/14)

This week on Wild About Animals we see how one Giraffe united an entire staff together. We visit primates in Texas, who were raised by humans and now must learn what it means to be a monkey. Then we stop by the Santa Barbara Zoo where one penguin really knows how to accessorize. Finally we follow one couple on their noble journey of dog adoption.

Episode #137 (4/29/14)

This week we travel to the land down under: Australia. Rob Ambrose rescues snakes for a living so we follow him around on a typical day that includes a call from a local high school that spotted a venomous snake living in the building wall. It's Rob's job to get it out. After that we head north to spotlight another risky profession - what it's like to be a crocodile handler in Darwin. And finally, Tasmanian Devils are seeing their population numbers decrease rapidly because of disease. But there is a solution - Devil Ark, where healthy Tasmanian devils live, ensuring the species can survive.

Sculptor Bruce Gray uses wood, metal and paint to create his works of art, which can take up to a month to finish. Some of his sculptures have been used in TV shows and movies. He feels his best asset is the junk he finds and his constant flow of his creative ideas. Stained glass artist Simon Simonian was educated in Iran as a painter and architect. He follows his passion and love for stained glass by designing his work on a computer then filling in with color using glass as the paint. He shares, 'stain glass works with lighting, it creates a great mood in you--excitement and happiness'. Ceramic artist Jennifer Joyce's talent of working with clay to make pottery, plaques, murals and monuments has developed over time. In the show she demonstrates how she uses her equipment to make her creative pieces of art that she sells at her studio. She claims that this is the most fun and therapeutic job she has had.
