Jack visits Chipangali, a wildlife orphanage in Zimbabwe. This wildlife way station rescues injured and abandoned animals, rehabilitates them and then releases them back to the wild. Jack follows the release of a bush baby, a small nocturnal primate.

Okavango Delta (2097)

Our adventure takes us to the Okavango Delta for a tour of the native wildlife, people and culture of this rich landscape. Jack travels the delta on the traditional boats which have navigated these waters for years. Using special night-scope equipment, Jack gets a unique glimpse of unsuspecting creatures in the cloak of the night.

Top Dog! (2098)

It's a world of pampered pooches and best of breed, as Jack travels to Puerto Rico for the *World Dog Show*. What does it take to raise a winner? The judges reveal their canine criteria. Jack takes us for a whimsical tour behind the scenes for the primping, pampering and last minute jitters of the competition. It's a blue ribbon adventure.

Wild At Woodland (2099)

The Woodland Park Zoo in Seattle has been at the forefront of habitat design. Their animal habitats replicate nature's true landscapes...grizzlies reside by streams, gorillas forage in lush landscape and sun bears scoop honey from a tree. Jack takes us for a behind the scene tour at the Woodland Park Zoo to meet some amazing animals, their keepers and one very special pachyderm with a most unusual artistic talent.

Alaskan Adventure (2100)

The lakes and bays off the southeastern Alaska coastline are abundant with wildlife. On this Alaskan adventure Jack travels by float plane, boat and helicopter to get to the best vantage point for adventurous encounters with eagles, killer whales, harbor seals and otters. Jack's expedition takes him to new heights as he goes dog sledding with a team of huskies atop the Norris Glacier near Juneau. And in keeping in the true pioneer spirit, Jack pans for gold in the pristine streams of Juneau.

Bats and Boas (2102)

Jack takes us deep into the dark caves of Puerto Rico's lush rain forest. In this clandestine and nocturnal world, hundreds of boa constrictors lay in wait on woody vines for their prey...hundreds of thousands of bats which fly directly into the jaws of the snakes and certain demise. The cave is primeval, but new information about its inhabitants are helping researchers unlock some of the behavioral mysteries of the boa.

Norwegian Adventure (2103)

Inside the Arctic Circle to northern Norway Jack ventures in search of the sperm whale, the largest of the toothed whales. At a small Norwegian fishing village, we learn about the research and whale watching activities at the Andenes Whale Center. Jack also goes ashore to a bird island in the Norwegian Sea, where nesting puffins make their home.

Hippos of Kings Pool (2104)

Travel to Africa with Jack for an encounter with the "river horses" of Botswana's Kings Pool, a watering hole once visited by royalty and now inhabited by hundreds of hippos. On this adventure, discover what hippos do at night when they come out of their protective watery domain. the beauty of this rugged place and the people who cast a musical spell over the countryside are an extra special treat!

Alaskan Whales (2105)

Jack travels on icy waters and through the frozen outback of Alaska for an adventure in this barely touched frontier. Join marine experts from Sea World on an old inspirational voyage through Alaska's Glacier Bay. Jack and company come face-to-face with the ocean's top predator, the killer whale.

An African Encore (2106)

While traveling through South Africa, Jack encounters African fish eagles hard at work on the Okavango River near Jebibe. Meet up with a group of travelers who share their African safari experiences, and on a remote airstrip in the Delta, a veteran bush pilot talks about landing with lions on the runway.

Thundering Smoke (2108)

On his travels through Africa, Jack ventures to Victoria Falls, one of the world's most spectacular natural wonders. Along the Zambize River in Zimbabwe, Jack encounters hippo, crocodile and leopard. Jack also goes up in an ultra light for a bird's eye view of Victoria Falls.

Three by Sea (2109)

On Florida's West Coast Jack learns about the value of community aquariums. In his travels, Jack joins curators collecting fish from a Florida river, shoves off on an educational boat cruise, and visits a program benefiting handicapped children through interaction with dolphin and sting rays.

Wildlife in the Big City (2110)

What happens when Jack and his animal friends take on New York City? From Late Night with David Letterman to early hours of Good Morning America, Jack travels the T.V. circuit with his company of critters in tow. You get a behind the scenes look at what it takes to keep everyone happy while on the road and on the air.

Crossing the Finish Line (2111)

Jack visits a Florida horse farm where the focus is training champion thoroughbreds, then he travels to a unique horse retirement center run by a remarkable couple.

Mystery at the Audubon (2112)

In New Orleans, Jack introduces us to Dr. Betsy Dresser, whose work in genetic cryogenics may hold the key to saving endangered species.

Texas Livestock (2115)

Jack gets a taste of the old west when he visits the nation's longest running indoor rodeo and livestock show in Fort Worth, Texas. From a calf scramble to milking a prized cow, Jack experiences the flavor and tradition of the pioneer spirit and learns what it really takes to be a cowboy.

Fossil Rim (2116)

Jack discovers a world of animals at Fossil Rim, an animal safari adventure right in the heart of Texas. Along with encountering an impressive array of African animals within reach from his safari truck, Jack discovers how researchers here are involved in groundbreaking studies about rhino reproduction and breeding.

Black Beauty Ranch (2117)

Jack takes us to Black Beauty Ranch for an intimate profile of this unique ranch and the man who inspired its being, author Cleveland Amory. In this sanctuary for injured, unwanted and homeless animals, Jack learns the touching story of how this ranch came to be and how it is thriving. Jack meets some beautiful animals whose stories of survival are remarkable.

Zoo Texas (2118)

Have you ever seen an okapi? Chances are you haven't. This rare animal from Zaire, Africa is one of the last major animals discovered at the turn of the century. It is the cousin of the giraffe and is one of the unique animals Jack encounters during his visit at the Dallas-Ft. Worth Zoo.

Week of 8/18/14-8/22/14

Bearly Asleep (2120)

Jack takes us to the snowy mountains of New Mexico in search of the black bear. Along with a team of researchers, Jack makes the trek deep into the mountains and right into a sleeping bear's den to study the American black bears hibernation habits. Jack then returns in the spring to catch up with the bear and her cub and report on their progress for survival.

To The Rescue (2121)

In this adventure, Jack Hanna sets out for southern California where a record number of sea lions pups have beached themselves along the rugged coastline. Could it be El Nino at work? Jack joins a group of animal care experts from Sea World on a rescue mission along the San Diego shoreline where malnourished pups are saved from certain death. The pups are brought to Sea World for recovery, rehabilitation and ultimately released. Jack helps in the return of eight sea lions back to their wild habitat in the Pacific Ocean.

Air Buddy (2122)

Buddy was a dog like no other, an athlete, a movie star and man's best friend. After his untimely death, the legacy of Buddy still lives on. Jack reminisces about Buddy's accomplishments and travels to southern California to meet the next generation in the Buddy lineage of superstars.

J.J.'s Release (2123)

When a baby gray whale beached herself on the California coastline, her rescue made headlines. When she was released a year later, her return to the wild created a national whale watch. Jack takes us behind the scenes of J.J., the whale's early days of rehabilitation at Sea World to her final seconds before her dramatic release in the Pacific waters.

Hoof'n It (2124)

Because the landscape is so vast and largely inaccessible, spotting Alaskan wildlife is easier said than done. However, while hoof'n it in South Central Alaska, Jack gets a close up view of moose and elk at Big Game Alaska, and later encounters a shaggy legacy from the Ice Age at the world's only Musk Ox farm.

Wings 'N Wolves (2133)

In St. Louis, Jack visits three unique homes for animals. At the Wild Canid Survival Center, researchers are studying endangered wolves. Then at the World Bird Sanctuary, Jack discovers how raptors are winging an educational program to new heights. While at the St. Louis Zoo, children have a zoo of their very own.

Australia Zoo (2134)

In the Land Down Under, Jack visits the home of Steve Irwin, television's "Crocodile Hunter." Formerly known as the Queensland Reptile and Fauna Park, the Zoo is home to scores of mean and nasty crocodiles and some of the world's most poisonous snakes, including the Brown, Fierce and Tiapan. Jack also feeds "Harriet", a 167 year old Galapagos tortoise collected for scientific research in 1835 by Sir Charles Darwin.

Under Down Under (2135)

Jack ventures into the Coral Sea to scuba dive on Taylor Reef, one of the 2900 reefs that make up Australia's Great Barrier Reef. On his underwater adventure, Jack marvels at corals of all kinds, giant clams and a sea full of tropical fish. Jack journeys to the Great Barrier Reef Aquarium in Townsville to learn more about Australia's underwater wonder from one of the world's leading experts on coral.

Koalas Of The Pilliga (2139)

Jack travels deep into the Pilliga Forest in New South Wales, Australia to take part in a koala tracking project. The project is designed to monitor the health of the koalas in this forested region. Jack helps gather information on the koala's nesting trees and he also assists while some of the koalas are given a medical work-up and then eventually, and carefully released. Jack talks to the people involved in this undertaking and discovers the tenuous future of these Australian native animals.

Making Waves (2140)

From the Bahamas, Jack takes a look at some of his favorite marine adventures, including face-to-face encounters with sharks, dolphins, sea lions and a variety of whales. Jack also reflects on some special children and their special gifts from the sea.

On The Move (2141)

In pursuit of his animal adventures around the world, Jack has relied on just about every mode of transportation imagined. Submarines, helicopters, dog sleds, covered wagons, camels, elephants, horses, jeeps, planes, boats, airboats, and trains are among Jack's choice of travel. Jack has also logged many a mile the old fashioned way; on foot.

Week of 9/08/14-9/12/14

Underwater World (2143)

At the Underwater World Oceanarium at Mooloolaba, Australia, Jack dives in a tank filled with 14 species of shark. Jack also helps out on an open water release of captive-bred sharks and rehabilitated sea turtles. Back on the road, Jack stops by "The Big Pineapple."

Fraser Island (2144)

In Australia, Jack travels to Fraser Island, the world's largest sand island. Among its unique flora and fauna, the island is home to Australia's purest breed of dingoes. Dingoes are wild dogs that crossed the Asian land bridge into Australia thousands of years ago. Jack's visit to Fraser Island also features a whale watch in the offshore waters of the Pacific Ocean.

Atlantis: Lost and Found (2145)

In the Atlantic Ocean off Nassau in the Bahamas, Jack scuba dives to encounter a sunken Coast Guard cutter teaming with Caribbean Reef Sharks. Then, on nearby Paradise Island, Jack makes an underwater exploration of the Atlantis Resort's rendition of the mythical Lost City. While at Atlantis, the world's largest man-made marine habitat, Jack swims with piranhas.

Zoo to the Max (2146)

Jack pays a visit to the Johannesburg Zoo to see Max, the "most famous gorilla in Africa." After apprehending a fleeing robber that jumped into his zoo compound, Max won fame as the crime-fighting gorilla. At the Zoo, Jack also sees red pandas, a pioneering eland breeding program and Africa's only polar bears.

Manatee Move (2147)

Jack accompanies four Florida manatees on a long distance flight from Sea World, Orlando to the Columbus Zoo in Ohio. The opening of the zoo's new "Manatee Coast" exhibit is the culmination of Jack's long-time dream to share the story of Florida's endangered "gentle giants" with the people of the mid-west. Local students see manatees for the very first time
