	"The Health of Our Lakes" From the air, northern Idaho's lakes appear as magnificent pools of blue, shimmery water. But if you look at a microscopic level, you'll find signs that Idaho's lakes are in trouble. A microscopic organism threatens the water quality of these lakes, putting the recreation economy of the entire region at risk.
