Education	<p>Dialogue “Education Policy: What Works?” This program features David Driscoll, former Massachusetts commissioner of education, and Eric Smith, former commissioner of education for Florida, who talk about the politicalization of education policy and related topics. They discuss whether increased education funding is needed, controversies over the testing of students and teachers, and what data parents should use to help assess their school district.</p> <p>Science Trek “States of Matter” Anything that takes up space and has weight is called matter. Matter can be as small as the tiniest cell in your skin or as large as a whole galaxy. The study of matter and the changes it goes through is part of the science of physics. Host Joan Cartan-Hansen is joined by Kathryn Devine and Christopher Saunders, scientists from the College of Idaho, who answer students’ questions.</p> <p>Science Trek “Astronauts” Host Joan Cartan-Hansen travels to the Johnson Space Center in Texas and meets with astronauts Amy Ross and Duane Ross to answer students’ questions about what it takes to be an astronaut. She also takes viewers on a tour of some of the center’s astronaut training facilities.</p> <p>Science Trek “Earthquakes” Every 30 seconds, somewhere in the world the ground shakes. This special also explores what has been learned since the passage of the landmark legislation, visits two proposed wilderness areas, and examines some of the issues surrounding the concept of wilderness.</p> <p>Outdoor Idaho “Jewel of the North” The water is so clear and the colors so intense that people sometimes mistake photographs of Priest Lake in Idaho’s Panhandle for Hawaii. <p>6. Health</p>	<p>Second Opinion "Teen Depression" Teen depression is a serious medical problem that causes a persistent feeling of sadness and loss of interest in activities. It affects how your teen thinks, feels and behaves, and it can cause emotional, functional and physical problems. Although mood disorders, such as depression, can occur at any time in life, symptoms may be different between teens and adults. Issues such as peer pressure, academic expectations and changing bodies can bring a lot of ups and downs for teens. But for some teens, the lows are more than just temporary feelings — they're a symptom of depression.</p> <p>Dialogue "Pete Earley, Author of 'Crazy'" In conjunction with World Mental Health Day, host Marcia Franklin interviews Pete Earley, a former Washington Post reporter who has also become a mental health advocate. Earley, who has penned numerous "true crime" books, found one of his most difficult books to write to be "Crazy." The book is a memoir about his son, who has a mental illness. "Crazy," a finalist for the Pulitzer Prize in 2007, describes Earley's harrowing attempts to get help for his son, as well as major problems in mental health systems around the country.</p> <p>Second Opinion "Reversing Heart Disease" Coronary artery disease occurs when a substance called plaque builds up in the arteries that supply blood to the heart (called coronary arteries). Plaque is made up of cholesterol deposits, which can accumulate in your arteries. When this happens, your arteries can narrow over time. This process is called atherosclerosis. Plaque buildup can cause angina, the most common symptom of CAD. This condition causes chest pain or discomfort because the heart muscle doesn't get enough blood. Over time, CAD can weaken the heart muscle. This may lead to heart failure, a serious condition where the heart can't pump blood the way that it should. An irregular heartbeat, or arrhythmia, can also develop.</p> <p>Second Opinion "Childhood Cancer" Most childhood cancers fall into one of several specific types. Common adult cancers (lung, breast, colon, and others) rarely occur in children or adolescents. Childhood cancers tend to be more aggressive than adult cancers. Childhood cancers are rare, and only specially-trained doctors have the knowledge and experience to properly treat them. Alzheimer’s disease accounts for 60 to 80 percent of dementia cases. Alzheimer’s is not a normal part of aging, although the greatest known risk factor is increasing age, and the majority of people with Alzheimer’s are 65 and older. But Alzheimer’s is not just a disease of old age. Anisa Mehdi, a veteran reporter of the Hajj, joins the group of Muslim pilgrims from Boston who begin their journey in Medina, the second of Islam’s holy cities.</p> <p>Sacred Journeys With Bruce Feiler “Osun-Osogbo” Feiler travels to Nigeria with a group of African-American pilgrims who are attending an annual festival in honor of the Yoruba goddess Osun. The indigenous African faith, sometimes called Orisa Devotion, was first carried to the Americas during the transatlantic slave trade.
