These machines can do work too dangerous for humans, help around the house, or can be used just for fun.</p> <p>Science Trek “Water”            Water is everywhere: in our bodies, the food we eat, and the ground upon which we walk. All living things need water to survive.</p> <p>Science Trek “Volcanoes”            A volcano can be described as part of Earth’s plumbing system. Magma, or molten rock from under the earth, pushes upward through a sort of natural pipe and sometimes explodes lava out of the ground. Volcanoes created many of Idaho’s mountains and plains. Scientists study volcanoes to learn more about Earth and to protect the millions of people who live near these fascinating geological features.</p> <p>Science Trek “Television”            Television re-envision how we see our world. <p>3. Outdoor Adventures</p>	<p>Outdoor Idaho "Beyond the White Clouds" It's some of the most dazzlingly diverse country in the West, deserving of the gold standard of protection. In this hourlong special, the Outdoor Idaho crew visits the three new wilderness areas in the center of Idaho - the White Clouds, the Hemingway-Boulders, and the Jim McClure-Jerry Peak Wilderness - to tell the fascinating 50-year story of how the threat of an open-pit molybdenum mine eventually led to a unanimous vote for Wilderness in Congress. This program also examines some of the major battles yet to be decided.</p> <p>Outdoor Idaho "Where the Road Ends" Far from the population centers of the state, where the roads seemingly end, one can find stories of Idahoans who choose to be closer to nature than civilization. We profile a handful of these places - Big Creek, Paradise, Bayview, Chesterfield, Castle Peak, the Joyce Ranch, Atlanta - where independence and self-sufficiency are embraced by the hearty souls who call these out-of-the-way places home.</p> <p>Outdoor Idaho "Owyhee Adventures" On first glance the Owyhee Desert is a desolate, lonely and forbidding place. But beyond the sage and endless horizon are hidden gems: narrow canyons, creeks and rivers, which hold immense beauty.</p> <p>Outdoor Idaho "Idaho's Middle Earth" Caves were home to our ancestors, providing shelter from the elements. Today, we're still drawn to the dark, the unknown, and even the beauty of what lies beneath our feet. A journalist who became a media mogul with an outspoken, cantankerous editorial voice and two bestselling newspapers, Joseph Pulitzer championed what he regarded as the sacred role of the free press in a democracy.</p> <p>American Experience “Amelia Earhart” Explore the life of the trailblazing pilot who broke records but then mysteriously disappeared over the Pacific Ocean on a solo flight around the world. An enduring American hero, Earhart was the first woman to fly solo across the Atlantic.</p> <p>D-Day At Pointe-Du-Hoc The remarkable story of the U.S. Army's 2nd Ranger battalion, led by Lt. Col. James Earl Rudder, which scaled the 100-foot cliffs of Pointe-du-Hoc in Normandy on June 6, 1944, to destroy six German cannons thought to be located there. The 155mm guns, situated halfway between Omaha and Utah Beaches and within firing range of the planned allied assault, needed to be taken out for Operation Overlord to succeed. The documentary chronicles the dangerous and daring mission, including what happened after the Rangers fought through machine gun fire, cut rope ladders and lobbed grenades to find that the six artillery guns had been moved from the Pointe in the days prior.</p> <p>Day of Days June 6, 1944 The 70th anniversary of D-Day recognizes the struggle to land on Omaha Beach. Nine out of 10 people who experience sudden cardiac arrest, die from it.</p> <p>Second Opinion “Preventive Cancer Screening” More than half a million people die of cancer each year in the U.S., so it’s no wonder we want to do what we can to catch and treat cancer early. For some cancers, we have preventive cancer screenings that are readily available. But who should be screened?</p> <p>Second Opinion “Pancreatic Cancer” A diagnosis of pancreatic cancer is devastating for the patient and his/her family. Often the cancer is caught when it is at an advanced stage, and survival rates are lower than many cancers.</p> <p>Second Opinion “CPR in America” This program sets out to do something no television show has ever done - teach as many people as possible the life-saving skill of Hands-Only CPR. 90% of people who suffer out-of-hospital cardiac arrests die. Receiving immediate CPR can double or triple a person’s chance of survival. But 70% of Americans feel helpless because they don’t know CPR or they’re afraid of hurting the victim. Local Community Interest</p>	<p>Outdoor Idaho “50 Years of Wilderness” For the 50th anniversary of the Wilderness Act, we visit each of Idaho’s designated wilderness areas - the Selway Bitterroot, Craters of the Moon, Sawtooth, Hells Canyon, Gospel Hump, Frank Church River of No Return, and Owyhee Canyonlands - to explore what we’ve learned since the passage of this landmark legislation. And we also visit two proposed wilderness areas: the Boulder-White Clouds of central Idaho and north Idaho’s Scotchman Peaks.</p> <p>Idaho Experience “Idaho’s Mail-Order Messiah” After a revelation from God, Frank B.
