2. Education	<p>Science Trek “Force and Motion” A force is basically a push or a pull. Forces like gravity, inertia, and momentum affect everything. Sir Isaac Newton developed his laws of motion to explain how these forces act.</p> <p>Science Trek “Horses” Horses play an important role in human history. There are more than 200 breeds worldwide. They come in many sizes, from the Shetland that stands not larger than about four feet tall to the Clydesdale that can be up to six feet in height.</p> <p>Science Trek “Digestive System” Your body needs food for energy, vitamins and minerals. But food needs to be broken down into a substance your body can use. That’s the job of your digestive system. Find out how the digestive system works. Gastro-enterologists Matt Sericati and Brian Story answer students’ questions.</p> <p>Science Trek “Snakes” Snakes have long, scaly bodies with no arms or legs. 3. Outdoor Adventures	<p>Outdoor Idaho "A Middle Fork Journey" Outdoor Idaho explores 100 miles of the free-flowing Middle Fork of the Salmon. Cameras follow rafters, on both guided and independent trips, who meet the challenges of the river, experience the changing scenery, and encounter wildlife. The show also explores the surrounding countryside, considers the effects of fire, and reports on a dramatic logjam.</p> <p>Outdoor Idaho "Home on the Range" The real heyday of the American cowboy has come and gone; but in Idaho, the hard-scrabble hero of so many of our nation's legends can still be found, riding the range on the West's public lands. It seems there will always be a place for cowboys, wherever there are cattle to be rounded up and wild horses to be tamed, and wherever there are people who love the cowboy lifestyle. As cowboy poet Rudy Gonzales reminds us, "People want to be cowboys!"</p> <p>Outdoor Idaho "Summit Idaho" Cameras capture four groups of mountain climbers who reach the summits of four Idaho mountain peaks - Vienna Peak in the Sawtooth National Recreation Area, Gilmore Peak in the Lemhi Mountain Range, He Devil in the Seven Devils Mountains, and Scotchman Peak in Scotchman Peaks of the Panhandle. 5. Local Community Interest	<p>Outdoor Idaho “Hops & Barley”</p> <p>You got it: an entire show on beer! There’s a lot that goes into making a fine glass of stout; and it starts with hops and barley. The goal of Idaho breweries, on the whole, is not to be the next Budweiser, but to be the best neighbor they can be. And with a storefront on just about every block, and a few thirsty people in every neighborhood, the brewmasters in Idaho think the industry is just getting started.</p> <p>Hymns of Thanksgiving</p> <p>This program kicks off our festive holiday programming. Now in its 16th year, this annual musical celebration in Boise features performances by a combined choir and orchestra, along with vocal and instrumental soloists.</p> <p>Outdoor Idaho “Land of the Lost River Range”</p> <p>They may be Idaho’s tallest mountains, but many would be hard pressed to find the Lost River Range on a map. The Outdoor Idaho crew explores the unique formations of the province geologists call Basin and Range, and meets the hardy individuals who live and work and play alongside these 12,000 foot peaks.</p> <p>Outdoor Idaho “Bear Lake, Caribbean of the Rockies”</p> <p>Bear Lake is a brilliant blue beauty on the Idaho-Utah border. Known as the Caribbean of the Rockies, it draws visitors from across the West to camp, fish, and feast on Bear Lake’s famous raspberries. This program examines the challenges faced by those who manage this resource for recreation, irrigation, and generating electrical power.</p> <p>Outdoor Idaho “Hometown Ski Hills”</p> <p>Community ski hills are scattered throughout Idaho, each with its own “field of dreams” story to tell.
