**PROGRAM 1: COLLUSION**

The first program covers the question of "collusion" -- whether or not President Trump's campaign coordinated with Russia in its efforts to disrupt and influence the election.

**PROGRAM 2: OBSTRUCTION**

The second program covers the question of "obstruction." This second major thread of Mueller's probe asks whether the Trump team sought to impede the investigation of contacts with Russia.
