Operation Legend announces arrest

The U.S. Justice Department is highlighting the arrest of a Detroit man as one case that was cracked as a result of Operation Legend. 44-year old Eric Walker was arrested on drug and weapons charges. The feds say Walker was allegedly selling cocaine, fentanyl-laced heroin and pills when he was arrested. Agents also found a loaded gun. Walker has past convictions including second degree murder and assault with intent to murder. Operation Legend started in Detroit in late July as a way to help the city combat an increase in violent crime.

Southfield EMS being sued for \$50 million dollars on behalf of a woman declared dead but was actually alive. City rescue personnel declared Timesha Beauchamp in August, but was discovered breathing by funeral home employees hours later. Attorney Geoffery Fieger filed a federal suit claiming Beauchamp's civil rights had been violated. Four Southfield EMS personnel were put on leave as part of the city's investigation.

More on plot to kidnap the Governor

The kidnapping threat to Gov. Gretchen Whitmer was so serious that authorities moved her family around as law enforcement tracked alleged kidnapping plotters. Michigan Attorney General Dana Nessel joined "CBS This Morning" to talk about the case. Meantime, there are some renewed calls to ban guns in the state capitol after a plot to kidnap Governor Whitmer and storm the capitol building was foiled. State Senator Dayna Polehanki and another senator have introduced a bill to ban guns on the capitol grounds. Senate majority leader Mike Shirkey says that he's "having further conversations" with capitol commissioners about a potential gun ban, but indicated he doesn't think increased security measures could adequately protect against the kind of threat the FBI is alleging.

Drug bust in Wayne County

A months-long investigation into fentanyl trafficking in Wayne County leads to several arrests and dangerous drugs off the street. Michigan State Police served warrants yesterday in Detroit, Hamtramck, Taylor and Inkster. The searches resulted in the seizure of more than 1-point-2 kilograms of fentanyl, 54 grams of cocaine and 32 grams of Mexxy -- a new designer drug similar to PCP. Troopers also seized a pistol and nearly 50-thousand dollars in cash. Charges against the suspect are pending.

Lead contamination crisis in Flint

Officials say Flint is making progress toward resolving the lead contamination crisis that made the Michigan City a symbol of poor drinking water. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency says Flint has used federal and state funds to replace nearly 10-thousand lead service lines, which carry water to homes. Fewer than 500 remain to be checked. Other completed steps include a study of corrosion control treatments and sampling of water from homes that still have lead service lines.

Great Lakes funding approved as part of new US budget

Congress has approved a five-year extension of a program that deals with long-term environmental injuries to the Great Lakes. The U.S. Senate voted unanimously Sunday to continue the restoration initiative, months after it passed the House. President Donald Trump will have to sign the bill before it takes effect. Under the new measure, annual funding for the program will increase from 300-million dollars to 475-million by 2026. The program focuses on long-term problems, such as toxic pollution and invasive species.

The kidnapping threat to Gov. Gretchen Whitmer was so serious that authorities moved her family around as law enforcement tracked alleged kidnapping plotters. Michigan Attorney General Dana Nessel joined "CBS This Morning" to talk about the case. Meantime, there are some renewed calls to ban guns in the state capitol after a plot to kidnap Governor Whitmer and storm the capitol building was foiled. Senate majority leader Mike Shirkey says that he's "having further conversations" with capitol commissioners about a potential gun ban, but indicated he doesn't think increased security measures could adequately protect against the kind of threat the FBI is alleging.
