The eggs came from a farm in NC, but distributed under brand names: Country Daybreak, Crystal Farms, Coburn Farms, Sunshine Farms, Glenview, and Great Value. This is the largest egg recall in nearly a decade!

A majority of heroin addicts typically start with drugs found around the house, and CVS is hoping these kiosks will encourage people to drop any remainders of prescriptions or unused prescriptions in the kiosk to get rid of them safely.

But if you're coming to the airport using highway 21 and Gulfstream Road from Savannah you'll need to find another route. Reports of several swimmers who tried to brave the waters Sunday and had to be rescued so DO stay out of the water for the next day or two for sure. Evacuation orders have been issued for Florida's Barrier Islands of Franklin County. Those along the immediate shoreline and those who live in mobile homes have been advised to seek shelter somewhere else. Forecasters are expecting Alberto to bring as much as 8-10 inches of rain in some areas along its route with flood watches in place for north and central Georgia, the eastern edge of Tennessee and the Carolinas. 4:15am: Steady weakening is forecast after that landfall with Alberto likely to become a subtropical depression by tonight or early tomorrow. Beaches remains closed to swimmers today all along Florida's northwest coast line due to dangerous rip currents – double red flag warnings in effect for some beaches, so the water is NOT the place to be today. Six swimmers had to be rescued yesterday on various beaches who didn't believe that. 7:00am: Sub-tropical storm Alberto, is about 30 miles south southwest of Panama City and moving at about 8 miles per hour North with sustained winds up to 50 miles per hour. Tropical storm warnings have been lifted from Florida to the Alabama/Mississippi border but storm surge watches continue along the east and west gulf coasts. A flood watch has been issued for Middle Tennessee through Tuesday in anticipation of Alberto making Landfall. 1:00pm: A Flash Flood Warning is in effect for South Carolina and Nebraska. While a Flood Watch has also been issued for Middle-Tennessee through Tuesday in anticipation of Alberto making landfall tonight. 2:00pm: Forecasters say the center of Subtropical Storm Alberto has finally made landfall at Laguna Beach on the Florida Panhandle. Heavy rainfall and Flash Flooding is occurring over parts of the Florida right now. That places Alberto about 15 miles North-Northwest of Panama City, moving at 9 miles per hour North with sustained winds up to 45 miles per hour. Tropical Storm Warnings have been lifted from Florida to the Alabama-Mississippi border, but Storm Surge Watches continue along the Eastern and Western</p>
