Natural Disaster	Local News Break	9/6/17	1:00am, 6:45am, 8:15am, 12:00pm, 2:20pm, 4:00pm, 6:15pm, 8:00pm, 10:00pm	60sec	<p>You may have heard that the island nation of Barbuda has been devastated. 90 percent of buildings and vehicles have been destroyed and outside communication has been cut off. Puerto Rico is getting bands of rain and wind. Irma is about 50 miles north of San Juan and moving in a west northwest direction at 16 miles per hour. The storm is still packing maximum sustained winds of 185 miles per hour. So far three lives have been lost in the storm. Right now it looks like it will pass over Cuba weakening to a category 4 and by midday Sunday 9-10 making landfall in south Florida. Storm surges in the Caribbean as high as 30 feet, a foot of rain and risk of mud slides. Irma will move near or over portions of the northern Virgin Islands during the day, and pass near or just north of Puerto Rico this evening. Governor Scott placed a mandatory evacuation order for all tourists in the Keys. He's warning...this storm is extremely dangerous and will cause devastation. He says it's stronger and bigger than Hurricane Andrew and is urging us all to follow evacuation orders. A thousand state National Guard members have been activated. A thousand of Florida's Guardsmen have already been activated in preparation for the storm. Miami Beach police are handing out sandbags to families who are able to show ID at 451 Dade Boulevard and 79th street at Collins. There is a limit of 10 per family. For those who have been ordered to evacuate authorities would like to remind you not to forget your furry family members. Also for those evacuating here are a few things you may want to pack. A gallon of water per person, easy to prepare and non-perishable foods...should be about three days' worth. Those evacuating are encouraged to pack enough supplies for about 3 days for everyone in the family, including your pets. Traffic is building on the overseas highway as locals and tourists get out of the Keys ahead of the evacuation order. The airport at Key West will be closing tonight for commercial flights, but Marathon International will remain open for general aviation until conditions worsen. In Florida, Governor Rick Scott has issued a disaster declaration for all counties. In Miami-Dade, people with disabilities have begun to evacuate ahead of the storm. And in the Keys, the water is calm now, but emergency managers expect Irma to send waves over water that could cover the islands. The hurricane caused major damage in the Caribbean. The latest models from the National Hurricane Center show Irma is on path to hit the Keys by Sunday. It's possible it could turn slightly east from there but it's too early to tell. Monroe County's three hospitals, the Lower Keys Medical Center in Key West, Fishermen's Hospital in Marathon and Mariners Hospital in Tavernier, have begun plans to evacuate their patients. Monroe County's Health Department is also closing Wednesday. Forecasters say some fluctuations in intensity are likely during the next day or two, but Irma is forecast to remain a powerful category 4 or 5 hurricane during the next couple of days. Though it still isn't known exactly if Irma will make a turn toward Florida, it is expected that it will, and likely this weekend. For those heading inland, Gov. Rick Scott has ordered the suspension of road tolls across the state to keep traffic</p>
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				<p>flowing as evacuations take place. Governor Scott has waived tolls on all Florida highways. The Governor also asked governors of Alabama and Georgia to waive trucking regulations so gasoline tankers can get fuel into Florida quickly to ease shortages. Monroe County visitors and residents are also under a mandatory evacuation. All hospitals in Monroe County have started evacuating patients. Miami-Dade County Schools, office buildings and courthouses are closed tomorrow and Friday. As well as the library and any activities and sports at local parks. City of Key West has arranged for bus evacuations to begin tomorrow at noon, and through Friday. Here are some shelters that are accepting pets and people: Philip O'Brien Elementary, Lake Region High School and Alta Vista Elementary. Again, those are: Philip O'Brien Elementary, Lake Region High, and Alta Vista Elementary. As a precaution, the Nuclear Regulatory Commission is preparing to shut down the two Florida nuclear plants that could be in the hurricane's path: Turkey Point plant south of Miami, and the St. Lucie plant on our east coast. The president declared a state of emergency in Florida, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. The governor also issued a disaster declaration for all counties in our state.</p>

Here's some of the current information on the storm. The National Hurricane Center says Irma is now about 55 miles ENE of Great Inagua Island, or about 550 miles from Miami. Irma is moving at 16 mph in a WNW direction with wind speeds of 165 mph, continuing to be a Category 5 storm. Wind from the storm is expected to begin picking up in the Keys as early as Friday evening. Meanwhile, tomorrow she'll spin over the central Bahamas ...also likely to touch the north coast of Cuba. The storm's 'wind force' is <u>400 miles</u> wide. The Keys and Dade County will start to feel those winds by noon on Saturday. NOAA SAYS the Keys, Dade County, and Lake Okeechobee will feel it on Saturday. The unofficial southern White House, President Trump's Mar-a-Lago resort in Palm Beach is in path of the storm. Forecasters say ALL PREPARATIONS should be done by bedtime on Friday. A Storm Surge Warning has been issued to South Florida and the Keys for the next 36-48 hours. Gov. Scott also said he's directed Highway Patrol to escort resupply fuel trucks to gas stations in an aggressive attempt to get more fuel out to those of us already on the road. Bus service to Miami city storm shelters is FREE until 10pm tonight (Thur). If you're driving, be aware: 40% of gas stations in Miami-Fort Lauderdale are already out of gas. Fuel trucks are getting state police escorts to gas stations to restock. Further north, Last flight from Orlando airport will be Saturday, 5pm Eastern. At Kennedy Space Center just essential staff and crew are hunkering down on site to wait out the storm; Most of the Cape Canaveral buildings can stand gusts of 135mph. Irma could top that. You still have a little time before the hurricane hits: have you considered these tips? Download the Red Cross Hurricane App so you can find shelters, or let family know you're okay. Turn your fridge to the coldest setting in case you lose electricity for a few days. Fill a bathtub with water so you can flush and wash with it. Take pictures of your important papers with your cellphone. And if you do leave, turn off the electricity gas and water to your house before you go. The Florida Keys are under a mandatory evacuation, with additional evacuations in Monroe County and parts of Broward County. Governor Scott says if you're still in the keys and need help evacuating, call: 800-955-5504. Governor Deal has ordered Mandatory evacuations that start on Saturday for the Atlantic coast, including Savannah. A total of 4000 National Guardsmen are now activated. Current evacuations are in place for all areas east of I-95, Chatham County and some areas west of I-95 in anticipation of a storm surge from Irma. At 8amm on Saturday I-16 lanes will be converted for evacuation contraflow so all lanes will be heading out west. For a full list of the 30 counties on alert as well as information on how to find your local shelter visit us online. If you're not evacuating, here's a tip from the City of Miami Beach: fill up your bathtub so you can use the water to wash yourself and then transfer the used water into your toilet for flushing later on. Governor Scott is encouraging all Floridians to be prepared to evacuate soon. The highest level of urgency has been placed on that warning. Some forecasters were suggesting Irma could shift into Cuba and get weaker due to the mountains, but it looks like its bypassing Cuba altogether. Florida 7,000 members of the Florida national guard have been activated to help with the evacuation and standby with whatever else they might be needed for. A Storm Surge Warning is already in effect for the Florida Keys extending northward to the Volusia/Brevard County Line and on the west coast up to and including Tampa Bay. Significant dangerous storm surges are anticipated of possibly 8-12 feet. An official Hurricane Warning is now in effect extending northward along the Florida peninsula – the WHOLE peninsula. National Hurricane Center says Irma will remain strong as it moves inland, and up into Georgia and South Carolina. The National Hurricane Center issued hurricane and storm warnings for South Florida. Mandatory evacuations in place for the Florida Keys, for Miami Dade, Broward County, Collier and Monroe Counties. Pinellas, Hillsborough and Pasco Counties ahead. Governor Rick Scott says they are adding a mandatory evacuation this morning for cities surrounding the southern half of Lake Okeechobee. This would include Lake Port to Canal Point in Hendry, Palm Beach and Glades counties. Officials are concerned excessive wind could push water over the dike. In addition, the governor says all schools and state offices will be closed from today through Monday. And the governor says you don't necessarily need to evacuate out of state or hundreds of miles away to be safe. If you're not sure where to go, there is a hotline, and the number is 800-955-5504. The current path of the storm will be bringing it into South Florida late Saturday or early Sunday. It appears the path is now heading right through the center of the state, meaning the Florida Gulf Coast will have stronger effects from the storm. Jackson Health System will be in a state of emergency starting tomorrow morning at 7am. Most flights out of South Florida airports will be coming to a halt later today. No commercial flights are scheduled, no rental cars are available and even Uber has stopped service in most places. Further north, the last flight out of Orlando will be on Saturday at 5 pm, but surprisingly, the three major amusement parks, Walt Disney World, Universal Orlando and Sea World say they have no plans to shut down their parks or alter their normal hours of operation. This may change, and the parks do have refund or rescheduling policies if you don't feel comfortable visiting Orlando this weekend. The biggest issues are wood and fuel.</p>

The Gov. also pleaded for more nurses and volunteers to help the elderly at evacuation shelters. Remember, all road tolls are waved on all Florida highways. If your family's evacuating, be sure to pack enough supplies for about three days for the whole family - and that includes your pets. Florida Emergency Management is urging not to leave pets behind. We've posted a link on our News Page for Pet Friendly shelters. The Miami Lakes Shelter announced that those with pups and cats can take refuge at the Miami Lakes shelter. They added the space because a number of people with dogs, cats, and caged critters refused to leave without their companions, so they made room to get people to safety. Miami International Airport remains open, but all flights have been cancelled in preparation for Hurricane Irma. TENNESSEE: Tropical Storm Irma moves into middle and west Tennessee tonight. Irma's center will be near Dyersburg around 8 a.m., EDT Wednesday. Five shelters remain open shelters in Tennessee. Some Tennessee locations may have winds gust up to 45 mph. CAROLINAS: Nearly 10 feet of water that pushed a mile inland in Charleston was nearly 4 feet above a typical high tide and surpassed the destructive surge caused by Hurricane Matthew last October. Tropical Storm Irma has now knocked out power to around 250,000 customers in South Carolina. More than 150 roads are closed by flooding. Three people in Georgia. A man in South Carolina was outside cleaning up tree limbs when one fell. 8:00pm Officials say nearly 13 million residents, or two-thirds of the state's population, still remain without power. Jeff Nene with our ministry partner, Convoy of Hope, says they're preparing to get ready for Florida operations, however, there are some immediate issues: Everybody's familiar with the map they know Florida is a long peninsula, and its five-six hundred miles from top to bottom. Well if there's no fuel anywhere in the state your trucks can only get so far and they run out of fuel. So, we're having to wait much longer than we'd hoped for. 9:00pm Tropical Depression Irma is about 80 miles south southwest of Atlanta and is moving northwest at 15 mph. The U.S. Coast Guard also busy, focusing on reopening the Ports</p>
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				<p>at Everglades and Tampa critical to getting fuel into the state. Some other signs of life though. Disneyworld will open tomorrow. Universal Orlando also opens all three of its park tomorrow morning. Sea World sent word all their animals are safe. Don't let the downgrade to tropical storm fool you Irma is still a pretty powerful storm. If you see a downed power line, you may want to help, but don't. Just contact the power company and report the situation. President Trump approved the Alabama Emergency Declaration as the dangers of Irma approaches the state. Flooding is expected to continue across the Florida peninsula, southern Georgia and into the southern part of south Carolina with up to 10 inches of rain possible. Parts of Alabama, Mississippi, Tennessee and South Carolina can expect 2 to 4 inches of rain. Of course higher totals are possible in isolated areas. Wind gusts 60 to 80 miles per hour are expected into southern Georgia and southeastern Alabama this afternoon. 300,000 or more people are without power in coastal and southern Georgia. More power outages are expected. Coastal storm surges are also expected. We are reminded not to attempt to move downed power lines. Just contact the power company and report the situation. The American Red Cross has opened five shelters in Tennessee. The Tennessee department of tourism has updated hotel information for those who are evacuated. Two-hundred thousand Floridians are in shelters right now. If you are near the Saint Johns River you need to move to higher ground now. Jacksonville is dealing with record storm surge flooding. And it's under a flash flood warning until 12:45: A river gauge downtown measured 3 feet above flood stage. Clay County says between 400 and 500 homes suffered severe flood damage but there haven't been any serious injuries or deaths. Saint Augustine is closed according to police because of waist deep water and downed power lines. The risk of coastal flooding will peak today in the northeast part of our state as well as South Carolina and Georgia. If you have to go out and you see a flooded area turn around; don't drown. Never drive through flooded areas, even if you are familiar with the roads. What you can't see beneath the water may be washed out or the water may conceal debris, tree branches or even power lines. Firefighters on Hilton Head Island are now staying inside until the worst weather from Tropical Storm Irma passes. Its suspended emergency operations until the winds and storm surge subside. They say they will only go on calls if a supervisor allows them because conditions are too dangerous. The island is under an evacuation order. Forecasters warn wind gusts around 60 mph and storm surge of up to 6 feet are possible later today. Similar storm surge and winds gusts are possible up to coast to Charleston too. The storm has left more than 6 million homes and businesses without power. Over 220,000 of us are huddled in shelters right now. Officials are saying it could take weeks for electricity to be restored. The latest forecast track has the center of Irma moving near the northwestern coast of the Peninsula this morning, crossing the eastern Panhandle into southern Georgia this afternoon, and then moving through southwestern Georgia and eastern Alabama</p>
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				<p>tonight and Tuesday. Jacksonville is dealing with record storm surge flooding, and rescue teams want to be sure you know, if you are in a flooded area and are in need of assistance place a white flag; whether it's a t-shirt or bedsheet or something. Place that somewhere clearly visible and call 630-2489. If you were forced to evacuate or missed work due to Irma, you may want to check out FEMA's Disaster Unemployment Assistance Program. You should be able to access program information at their website. The Navy reports the USS Abraham Lincoln a Nimitz-class carrier is en-route and will drop her anchor off Key West to provide assistance. She has a compliment of two dozen helicopters and her crew is ready eager to help. The USS New York, a San Antonio-class transport built from steel recovered from the wreckage of the World Trade Center after the attacks sixteen years ago...and the Iwo Jima another transport will also conduct relief operations for Florida. The US Army is loaning the Florida Guard two hundred high-water trucks to assist and the Army Corps of Engineers is already figuring out the best way to get rid of all the debris, conduct port surveys, and generally help Florida get back on its feet. A storm surge of 3 feet was measured along the St. Johns River at the Interstate 295 bridge. And a surge of almost 5 and a half feet was reported at the NOS tide gauge at Mayport. Similar storm surge flooding observed during Hurricane Matthew was reported in Flagler County at Marineland Acres. Waist-deep water from rain was seen farther south in Palm Coast and in Daytona Beach east of U.S. 1. A storm surge warning continues from the South Santee River southward to the Jupiter Inlet, and on the peninsula from Cape Sable to the Ochlockonee River, including Tampa Bay. Hurricane warnings extend north of Sebastian Inlet on the east coast to Fernandina Beach and from the Anclote River to Indian Pass on the Gulf Coast. Hurricane warnings are also in effect over much our state's interior north and central. A few counties in south Georgia are under warnings as well. Included in the hurricane warnings are the Tampa/St. Petersburg metro, Orlando, Jacksonville, Tallahassee, Thomasville and Valdosta. A hurricane watch is also in effect for the Georgia coast, northward to Edisto Beach, South Carolina. Damaging winds will spread into parts of Alabama and Tennessee to Georgia and the Carolinas through late Monday. For the first time ever Atlanta is under a tropical storm warning. The risk of coastal flooding will peak today in the northeast part of our state as well as South Carolina and Georgia. There's also a threat of flooding from rain. President Trump approved a major disaster declaration for Florida, which will make federal funding available for affected counties. Residents in Florida are strongly encouraged to stay indoors, let the sun rise before you go outside. And stay off the roads until told otherwise, as emergency workers will need immediate access to them. Tropical Storm warnings are still in place for Southern Florida, as well as the Southern halves of Georgia and South Carolina. In South Florida emergency workers will begin clearing debris once it's safe to do so; no one in Miami should be moving around. And</p>
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				<p>authorities in the Florida Keys say crews will begin house to house searches later today. President Trump approved a major disaster declaration for Florida, which will make federal funding available for affected counties. Airports in Miami, Orlando, Fort Lauderdale AND Tampa are all closed. For the first time ever Atlanta is under a tropical storm warning. 800 flights at Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport have been cancelled but it will still be operational Monday while monitoring storm conditions. Nearly 300,000 customers in coastal and southern Georgia were without power. Good news as the National Weather Service watches Hurricane Jose in the Atlantic. It's moving north at about 9 miles per hour and it's expected to turn northeast tonight. He'll get even slower toward the southeast tomorrow. While over 6.7 million people are without electricity in Florida, Georgia is seeing its own share of outages, with close 750,000 without power. While South Carolina has more than 230,000 left in the dark. And these numbers are only expected to rise as Irma continues. Governor Scott says the damage across the state caused by Hurricane Irma makes it still too dangerous for you to go outside or return from evacuation. He asks for patience and warned that roads are impassable and that there are downed power lines. Officials in the Keys on Sunday warned of a humanitarian crisis due to Irma's winds and storm surge. Irma's eye is currently forecast to hit Georgia by the afternoon. Georgia's Governor expanded the state of emergency to the entire state. South Carolina will feel the effects of the outer bands as well. Even though Irma is losing strength. There is still the possibility of property damage, downed trees, and power outages. Areas of flooding are expected in seven states, Florida, Georgia, North and South Carolina, Mississippi, Alabama, and Louisiana.</p>

More than 21,800 federal personnel are working in response to Irma, including more than 2,100 FEMA staff. FEMA estimates one in four homes in the keys may be completely destroyed. Right now, Hurricane Jose is hovering in the Atlantic, but thankfully does not pose a threat to Florida. More than 25 percent of the homes in the Keys have been destroyed and 65 percent have sustained major damage, and you’re advised to stay away if you’ve evacuated from the area. Power officials say 9.5 million people across the state are still without power. Florida Power &amp; Light says most of the east coast could have power back by Sunday, but for the west coast, it could be 10 days or more before power is restored. Crews coming from as far away as Canada and California are helping to restore power in the state. That means no air conditioning to help cool us off! So be sure to stay hydrated and rest in the shade when possible. Florida Power &amp; Light says most of the east coast could have power back by Sunday, but for the west coast, it may be 10 days or more before power will be restored. More than 20,000 workers are helping to restore power, with crews coming as far away as Canada and California. Jacksonville is still trying to recover from record-breaking storm surge and flooding--the worst in 100 years. Mayor Lenny Curry lifted the city’s mandatory evacuation orders today, but warned there is still serious flooding and road blockages, so there is a big possibility you won’t be able to get to your home. Flash Flood watches are in effect for portions of the southern Appalachians. Flood warnings and advisories are ongoing scattered throughout the southeast. Irma’s remnants will affect Florida, Georgia, and Alabama for a few more days. South Carolina, Alabama and Georgia can expect 3 to 6 inches of rain. Mississippi, Tennessee and North Carolina will get 2 to 4 inches of rain. In GEORGIA heavy rainfall and Irma's storm surge led to flooding. Water was waist deep on Tybee Island east of Savannah. One point three million people are without power. Downed trees and power lines cut off dozens of metro Atlanta roads. Glynn County is closed until further notice with Saint Simons island cut off from the mainland because of flooding. About 140 flights have been</p>
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cancelled at Atlanta Hartsfeild. In ALABAMA...President Trump declared a state of emergency. That allows FEMA to get involved, providing money and equipment. Irma's center will cross over into Alabama later today. Some schools have delayed openings or are closed all together. Additional river flooding is possible across eastern Alabama but it looks like the worst from the storm is over. Irma evacuees from Florida and Georgia can use food stamps in Alabama. In TENNESSEE: The State Emergency Operations Center in Nashville was activated at State of Emergency status and then deactivated at 1am. Irma's center is expected to be near Dyersburg around 8 a.m. tomorrow. IN South Carolina more than 150 roads are closed due to flooding. Irma knocked out power to around 250,000 customers. Many schools are closed or are opening on a delayed schedule. At least 40 people lost their lives during the Hurricane, including 12 in Florida and 3 people in Georgia. It's not safe outside until the storm has passed and cleanup is done. Officials are slowly piecing together the extent of Irma's path of destruction across the state. The fate of the Florida Keys remains largely a question mark. We do know there is no water, power or cell service on the islands. The Keys highway remains closed, and must be checked for safety before travel will be allowed back onto the islands. It's believed about 10,000 of us rode out the storm in the Keys, and could require evacuation. Officials warn us to please don't try to return to the Keys until you get an official okay. Police are warning of scams in the aftermath of Hurricane Irma. In Boynton Beach, two men posing as power company workers stole nearly \$13,000 in jewelry from a 95-year-old woman. Police say there is no reason for anyone with a power company to enter individual homes at this time. Any power company officials will be credentialed and most will be driving vehicles marked with company signage. Gov. Rick Scott has called the damage from Hurricane Irma "devastating" after flying over the Keys yesterday. The governor described overturned mobile homes, washed-ashore boats and rampant flood damage. He also says the Navy has deployed three ships, including the aircraft carrier Abraham Lincoln, to help provide emergency services, in the Keys. Scott also flew over the west coast and said the damage was not as bad as he thought it would be. Cleanup in the Keys is focused on the roads and the airports. They will be very important in getting rescuers and supplies to people who need it. It's been said the airport runways at the Key West airport are in excellent shape, and crews are working to get the Marathon Airport back up and running. Many airports are operating but on a limited basis. If you do have a flight at any of the airports in the state call ahead and make sure your flight is on schedule. Recovery efforts are underway. Some stores and restaurants have begun to open in some areas, which make it seem just a little bit more normal for some of us. Some evacuation orders were lifted for about 90-thouand of us living in Miami and the Keys. Officials say if you go home, it's probably not a good idea to stay there yet. In Jacksonville, officials say they've had some of the worst flooding in 100 years. Jacksonville Sheriff Mike Williams

				<p>says they're still assessing damage to the beach bridges, and they'll let us know when it's safe to return. In general, travel will be difficult, and it's not really safe to move around just yet. The best bet is to check with <a href="http://floridadisaster.org">floridadisaster.org</a> to find what roadways are open, and which are closed. You also may find information on where gas may be available. Miami International is expected to open today as is Orlando's airport. Speaking of Orlando, most of the parks will be re-opening today, which is good news. KLOVE and Air1 have partnered with Convoy of Hope to provide resources in the greatest areas of need distributing food, water and hygiene kits. They began helping in Houston, Texas and now they're in Daytona and Fort Myers here in Florida. Jeff Nene with our ministry partner, Convoy of Hope, says they're preparing to get ready for Florida operations, however, they aren't completely sure when that will begin. We're having to play some of that by ear, the two biggest issues right now in Florida are fuel and infrastructure. So we're having to wait you know much longer than we'd hoped for. Join with us in prayer for all here in Florida, as we've all been impacted by Irma in some form or another. The rescue and recovery will be ongoing for a long time.</p>
