Three of six people arrested during an Albemarle County School Board meeting that descended into chaos were convicted in Albemarle General District Court on Tuesday.

A meeting on August 23 was cut short when interrupted by protesters demanding Confederate images be banned in county schools.

Protesters showed up at the meeting on August 31, as well, with some inside Lane Auditorium and others gathered outside.

Sabre Lyon and Andrea Massey, who were charged with trespassing, were given 30 days suspended with 2 years of good behavior for failing to leave Lane Auditorium as directed.

Francis Richards had his trespassing charge dropped, but was given 60 days suspended with 2 years of good behavior for obstructing justice by interfering in an an arrest in the melee outside Lane Auditorium.

The attorney for Lyon and Massey says her clients may appeal.

Samantha Wren Cadwalder Peacoe had been charged, as well, but opted for a plea agreement in which she was sentenced to 30 days suspended for obstructing justice.

Lara Harrison's trespassing charge was dropped due to conflicting testimony between a county official and an Albemarle County police officer.

Michael "Myk" Reid, a teacher's assistant who was taken to the hospital after his arrest, faces trial in June for assaulting an officer, which is a felony.

A federal judge in Charlottesville has sentenced a Georgia man to 12 months and one-day in federal prison after he posted threatening messages last year against Charlottesville-area schools. 48-year-old Michael Anthony Townes of Atlanta pleaded guilty in late August to a felony charge of making internet threats to injure someone via interstate commerce.

Townes' posts on the internet site "Yahoo News" characterizes as threatening communications that terrified students, parents, and teachers in the Charlottesville area. The affected schools were under a modified lockdown on October 11th and 12th of last year.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency sent an alert on Wednesday aimed at tens of millions of mobile phones to test a previously unused presidential alert system to warn the public in the event of a national emergency.

The test message was originally scheduled for September but pushed back to 2:18 p.m. EDT on Wednesday with phones making a loud tone and a special vibration.

The message read: "THIS IS A TEST of the National Wireless Emergency Alert System. No action is needed." A separate alert on television and radios was issued at 2:20 p.m. EDT.

Federal officials said Trump was not personally involved in sending the alert, which would be sent in the event of a pending missile attack or other national emergency. U.S. cellphone users are not able opt out of presidential alerts.

He's already gotten reports on the street of some prices already below \$2... one person, for example, showing him \$1.93-a-gallon at a station in Ashland — just north of Richmond.

He says there's a lot of speculation about why the stock market is doing what it's doing, and no one really knows for sure. He says all we can do is wait-and-see.

On Saturday, October 27, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. the Albemarle County Police Department and the U. S. Drug Enforcement Administration are partnering to provide the community with the opportunity to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs. The service is free and anonymous, no questions asked.

Last spring Americans turned in nearly 475 tons (949,046 pounds) of prescription drugs at more than 5,800 sites operated by the DEA and almost 4,700 of its state and local law enforcement partners. Overall, in its 15 previous Take Back events, DEA and its partners have taken in almost 10 million pounds—nearly 5,000 tons—of pills.

This year's open enrollment for health insurance under the Affordable Care Act has begun, with sign-ups getting underway at HealthCare.gov yesterday (November 1st). This is the sixth sign-up season since the ACA became law, with the website serving people in 39 states, and the rest of the states and Washington, D.C., having their own sign-up websites. Average premiums for 2019 insurance plans under the ACA are going up only by low single-digit percentages, and insurers are also expanding their participation. Open enrollment for coverage starting on January 1st will end on December 15th.

Life expectancy in the U.S. fell in 2017 for the third year in a row, according to data released today (November 29th) by the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, with the increase driven by suicides and drug overdoses. The average American born in 2017 could expect to live to 78.6 years old, down from 78.7 years old in 2016, and also the third consecutive decline, the first time since the early 1960s that there was a multi-year fall in life expectancy. Increases in deaths from suicide and drugs are behind the trend, as they, along with upticks in deaths from conditions including Alzheimer's disease, stroke, flu and pneumonia, are outpacing reductions in deaths from heart disease and cancer, which are the nation's two leading causes of death.

The latest in twice-monthly testing occurring September 27 and didn't show any toxic elements, but the lake was closed Monday after the dog's death out of an abundance of caution. The dog swam in the lake Sunday before its deathly illness.

Water samples taken October 1 were sent to two laboratories for testing for harmful algae and cyanobacteria. Test results showed algae levels well-below the threshold the state health department considers dangerous, and showed no cyanobacteria. The water was reopened at 9 yesterday morning.

Some environmentalists are upset with Governor Northam's decision to replace two members of the Virginia Air Pollution Control Board. That panel is facing a vote next month on whether to allow a natural gas compressor station in Buckingham County.

Environmental groups, including the Friends of Nelson, fear Northam is re-shuffling the board to help Dominion Energy build the Atlantic Coast Pipeline.

The Governor's office says the terms of the two replaced expired over the summer, and their departures were unrelated to the controversy over the compressor station.

Earlier this month, the board issued a delay on the request. The new vote is set for December 10th.

The world's largest pork company is teaming up with a major energy company to turn pig manure into renewable natural gas.

Smithfield Foods and Dominion Energy announced a joint venture partnership Tuesday to trap methane from hog waste and convert it into power for heating homes and generating electricity.

Smithfield previously announced that its company-owned and contract farms over the next decade will cover waste-treatment pits to capture the gas and keep out rainwater. The gas will be channeled to processing centers and converted into natural gas.

The joint venture with Dominion will operate initially in North Carolina, Virginia and Utah. The first projects are scheduled to be operating by late 2019.

The University of Virginia has a record of nearly 25,000 early action applications — up almost 16-percent over last year. Admissions dean Greg Roberts says they're pleased the number of minority and first-generation applications are also up — 18.6-percent and 24-percent respectively.

Early applications are increasingly popular as students are notified of a decision by January 1, and they can either rid themselves of the stress of not knowing until the end of their senior year — or they can take a longer time making decisions or considering financial aid.

The successful applicant will have a strong academic record regarding grades and classes taken. Then admissions employees look at the whole person in regard to characteristics displayed through recommendations or essays.

Virginia Gov. Ralph Northam outlined parts of his upcoming state budget proposal earlier this week that — if passed — would include a historic pay boost for state teachers.

Northam wants to spend \$88 million to boost a 3 percent pay raise for teachers scheduled to take effect July 1, kicking it up to 5 percent. The governor said Virginia is lagging the national average for teach pay by about \$9,000 a year and is paying for it with high teacher turnover.

Northam will introduce his full budget plan next week and it's almost certain to undergo significant changes by the Republican-held General Assembly next year.

Election Day is tomorrow but judging by the early voting numbers it's going to be a record-breaker at least in terms of voter turnout. More than 30 million Americans have taken advantage of early voting to cast their ballots, a record number for a midterm election. Nearly five million Texans in the state's 30 biggest counties voted Friday's early-voting deadline, more than the entire statewide turnout for the last midterm election in 2014. Florida voters were headed for a record, too, with about four million votes cast by late last week. Enormous numbers have been recorded in Tennessee, Nevada and Georgia.

Nobody knows which way those votes are going, but the final pre-election polls indicate a deeply divided electorate.

Nelson County businessman Denver Riggleman has won a hard-fought contest for the 5th District seat in the House of Representatives. The 48-year-old Riggleman defeated 66 year old Leslie Cockburn of Rappahannock County in Tuesday's election. He will succeed the GOP's Tom Garrett in early January as the congressman for the region that includes Albemarle County and Charlottesville.

Riggleman was helped by his victories in places such as Madison, Greene, Bedford, Franklin, Fauquier, and Spotsylvania.

Incumbent Democrat Tim Kaine gets to keep his seat in the U.S. Senate. The 60-year-old Kaine is a former Richmond Mayor who served as Virginia's Governor from January 2006 to January 2010. He won his first term in the Senate six years ago.

Kaine defeated Corey Stewart, the 50-year-old chairman of the Prince William County Board of Supervisors.
