


Public Affairs For KINA-AM

Part 1: To many Kansans, Medicaid is just another welfare program. But it's really much more than that. Yes, it provides health coverage for low-income mothers and children. But it also serves as a safety net for elderly Kansans. And it's critical to keeping disabled Kansans in their communities and out of more expensive state hospitals. But the Kansas Medicaid program is undergoing big changes. The state has hired three for-profit companies to manage Medicaid as part of Governor Sam Brownback's KanCare initiative. Part 2: Medicaid is the second largest program the State of Kansas operates. Only education consumes more dollars in the state budget. And Medicaid costs have been growing at a faster pace than most other programs. A desire to control costs and improve care is why officials in Gov.
