Equality: Is Bisexuality a matter of lifestyle or is it rooted in biology?

Dr. Savin Williams spoke to Bisexual youth for his new book, *Bi – Bisexual, Pansexual, Fluid and Non-Binary Youth*

This episode explores why the 'B' often gets overlooked. He shares that bisexual students do exist and they have completing stories to tell. In this episode of The Best of Our Knowledge, you hear about those stories. He found that many of the students he spoke with, expressed that they do not like the traditional sexuality 'boxes' or 'choices. They find the question of sexuality difficult to answer. The students resent even being asked to declare their sexuality.

Abolishing the Death Penalty

With Good Reason is a weekly, syndicated talk show that explores a wide range of topics with leading scholars. In this episode, host, Sarah McConnell discusses abolishing the death penalty. Earlier this year, Virginia made headlines when it became the latest state to abolish the death penalty.

Virginia leads the U.S. in executions (with 1,300). Virginia's Governor, Ralph Northam, asked the question, "Is it fair"? He spoke about this publicly adding that the death penalty is applied differently based on who you are and where you are from. He concluded that the system has gotten it wrong.

Sabrina Butler-Smith is the first woman to be exonerated from death row. She says wrongful convictions happen all the time and that she is living, breathing proof of why capital punishment should be a thing of the past. Also: Deirdre Enright is probably best known for her work as the founding director of the Innocence Project and her passionate voice on the first season of the hit podcast, Serial. But before all that, she spent decades as a capital defense lawyer. She says she attended one of her clients' executions and it changed her life forever.
