(11.) VA CAREGIVERS PROGRAM STILL TROUBLED -- The VA's caregiver program provides a stipend to family members of disabled vets to provide home health care. NPR revealed numerous VA centers were ejecting hundreds of people from the program. (06:43)

(14.) STATE-SANCTIONED GAMBLING'S COSTS -- David Greene talks to Les Bernal (ber-NAHL) who heads the group Stop Predatory Gambling, about last week's Supreme Court decision threw out a law that prevented most states from legalizing sports betting.

In 1977, ATC expanded to seven days a week with a one-hour show on Saturdays and Sundays, which is hosted by Michel Martin. During each broadcast, stories and reports come to listeners from NPR reporters and correspondents based throughout the United States and the world. The hosts interview newsmakers and contribute their own reporting. Rounding out the mix are the disparate voices of a variety of commentators. *All Things Considered* has earned many of journalism's highest honors, including the George Foster Peabody Award, the Alfred I. duPont-Columbia University Award and the Overseas Press Club Award.

(3.) POMPEO IRAN -- Now that the U.S. is out of the Iran nuclear deal, Secretary of State Mike Pompeo is laying out his next steps. He wants European countries to work with him to pressure Iran on its other bad behavior, but the Europeans are fuming about Trump's decision to walk away from the nuclear deal. (03:43)

(6.) ROGER STONE -- President Trump's adviser Roger Stone says he wouldn't be surprised about a potential indictment from Justice Department special counsel Robert Mueller, but he has called the investigation baseless and faulted what he calls an official campaign to keep him quiet. (03:51)

APRIL 12 - A bill in the state House of Representatives would establish goals for the expansion of electric-vehicle infrastructure. Comments by Noah Garcia, transportation policy analyst with the Natural Resources Defense Council.

APRIL 23 - Lawyers for Earthjustice say the EPA's proposed changes to coal-ash regulations would encourage states to ignore risks to children and allow polluters to delay cleanups. Comments by Lisa Evans, senior administrative counsel at Earthjustice.

APRIL 25 - The Chesapeake Bay Foundation is coordinating a program to plant 10 million trees by 2025 to help reduce pollution in streams and rivers flowing into the bay. Comments by Harry Campbell, executive director of the Chesapeake Bay Foundation in Pennsylvania.

MAY 11 - Gov. Tom Wolf announced Thursday that the \$118 million Pennsylvania is receiving as its share of the settlement for Volkswagen's cheating on emissions testing will be used to help reduce diesel emissions and fund charging stations for electric cars and hydrogen fuel-cell vehicle supply equipment. Comments by Joseph Minott (MY-nit), executive director and chief counsel, Clean Air Council.

MAY 14 - Deferred maintenance at America's national parks has created a backlog of needed repairs that threaten park infrastructure and local economies that depend on tourist dollars. Comments by Stephen McKnight, president and CEO of the Altoona Blair County Development Corp.; and Marcia Argust, director of the Pew Charitable Trusts' Restore America's Parks Campaign.

MAY 16 - This is national Infrastructure Week, and National Park Service sites in Pennsylvania are among those where years of deferred maintenance have created a backlog of necessary repairs. Comments by Chad Forcey, executive director of the

MAY 29 - A Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission administrative law judge has suspended flow of liquid ethane through the Mariner East 1 pipeline and halted construction on Mariner East 2. Comments by Sam Rubin, Eastern Pennsylvania organizer with the group Food and Water Watch.

MAY 31 - The midpoint assessment of progress on implementation of the Chesapeake Bay Clean Water Blueprint shows real progress, but all three states are behind in their commitments to clean up agricultural runoff, with Pennsylvania the farthest behind. Comments by Harry Campbell, executive director of the Pennsylvania office of the Chesapeake Bay Foundation.
