Title: [The City of Buffalo isn't complying with disability civil rights law](#)

Description: An investigative report on the City of Buffalo's failure to comply with Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act. Our investigation revealed that the city lacks an ADA coordinator and updated documentation/public notices that are required under the law. The violations leave people with disabilities without access to their city and city government, and leave the city vulnerable to lawsuits.

Description: Buffalo's Deputy Mayor sits down with WBFO as a result of our ADA investigation and responds to what we found. The City of Buffalo commits to updating its documentation and public notices as a result of the investigation and commits to further transparency as they seek to hire a full-time ADA coordinator. The ADA only requires a current employee to be

designated as the ADA coordinator.

Program/Title: Ontario lifts 5-day isolation rule in time for new school year, yet experts warn of 8th COVID wave

Description: As children head back to school, Ontario has lifted the mandatory 5-day isolation rule for people with COVID-19. However, at least one infectious disease expert is predicting a massive eighth wave of the virus. The province's chief medical officer of health, Dr. Kieran Moore, said last week that people who don't feel well should isolate themselves while they show symptoms and return to work or school about 24 hours after those symptoms end.
