BETH HUNT REPORTED ALL OF ARKANSAS' CONGRESSIONAL DELEGATION VOTED *FOR THE FARM BILL EXCEPT REPRESENTATIVE TOM COTTON. COTTON RELEASED A STATEMENT TODAY EXPLAINING WHY HE VOTED AGAINST THE BILL SAYING IN PART: THIS BILL FAILS TO MAKE REAL REFORMS-LACKING EVEN COMMON-SENSE WORK REQUIREMENTS THAT WOULD PROVIDE JOB TRAINING TO ABLE-BODIED ADULTS RECEIVING FOOD STAMPS. "ARKANSAS TAXPAYERS CANNOT CONTINUE TO FOOT THE BILL FOR PRESIDENT OBAMA'S FAILED POLICIES AND ARKANSAS FARMERS SHOULDN'T BE HELD HOSTAGE TO PRESIDENT OBAMA'S RUNAWAY FOOD-STAMP PROGRAM. I WILL CONTINUE TO FIGHT FOR POLICIES THAT SUPPORT ARKANSAS FARMERS AND PROTECT ARKANSAS TAXPAYERS."

JEANNETTE REYES REPORTED BEFORE EVEN CASTING HIS VOTE SENATOR MARK PRYOR TOOK THE OPPORUNITY TODAY TO ANNOUNCE WHERE HE STANDS ON THE CONTROVERSIAL FARM BILL AND, WHILE HE WAS AT IT, HEAVILY CRITICIZED HIS OPPONENT REPRESENTATIVE TOM COTTON...BOTH OF THEM TALKED TO CHANNEL 7 TODAY ON WHY THEIR VOTE IS BEST FOR ARKANSANS. "THE FARM BILL IS WHAT KEEPS FOOD AFFORDABLE AND KEEPS IT AVAILABLE AGAIN FOR PEOPLE ALL OVER ARKANSAS, ALL OVER THE COUNTRY AND ALL OVER THE WORLD." AND THAT'S HOW PRYOR KICKED OFF HIS SPEECH TODAY DEFENDING THE 100-BILLION-DOLLAR A YEAR FARM BILL...BUT HE WASN'T ALONE. SPEAKERS INCLUDED ARKANSAS FARMERS WHO SPOKE PASSIONATELY ABOUT THE MEASURE AND COTTON'S VOTE AGAINST IT ON WEDNESDAY. "HIS ATTITUDE ABOUT THE FARM PROGRAM I THINK IS TOTALLY WRONG AND IT'S RECKLESS." "THIS BILL HELPS THE ENTIRE NATION. IT LITERALLY HELPS EVERY SINGLE PERSON IN THE STATE OF ARKANSAS." WE SAT DOWN WITH COTTON SHORTLY AFTER THE EVENT, HE SAYS THE NEARLY TRILLION-DOLLAR MEASURE IS SENDING AN ALREADY FINANCIALLY TROUBLED COUNTRY FURTHER INTO DEBT. "I GROW UP ON A FARM ON YELL COUNTY. THE BILL WILL BE SIGNED INTO LAW BY PRESIDENT OBAMA IF AND WHEN IT IS PASSED BY THE SENATE.

JUSTIN LEWIS REPORTED PECO FOODS WILL INVEST ONE-HUNDRED AND SIXTY-FIVE MILLION DOLLARS INTO A TWO SITE FACILITY, IN NORTHEAST ARKANSAS.. AN EXPANSION EXPECTED TO ADD 1,000 JOBS, BUT WILL ALSO PROVIDE A BOOST TO LOCAL FARMERS. PECO FOODS, THE EIGHTH LARGEST POULTRY PRODUCER IN THE UNITED STATES, IS SPREADING ITS WINGS FURTHER INTO ARKANSAS WITH PLANS TO BUILD A PROCESSING PLANT, HATCHERY AND FEED MILL IN NEIGHBORING COUNTIES. "WHEN WE CAN TALK ABOUT CORNING AND WE CAN TALK ABOUT POCAHONTAS, WE CAN TALK ABOUT RANDOLPH COUNTY AND CLAY COUNTY AND ALL THOSE OTHER AREAS, THOSE ARE HARD WORKING PEOPLE." WITH ITS ONLY CURRENT ARKANSAS OPERATIONS IN BATESVILLE, PECO SAW AN ADVANTAGE IN THIS RURAL PART OF ARKANSAS. PAY WILL RANGE FROM NEARLY \$11 AN HOUR AT THE PLANT TO \$13 AN HOUR AT THE MILL. "THEY WANTED TO EXPAND, AND BY PECO SAYING WE WANT TO COME HERE MEANS THAT WE'VE GOT THE RIGHT WORK FORCE FOR THIS INDUSTRY, WE KNOW A LITTLE BIT ABOUT THIS INDUSTRY IN THIS STATE." PECO'S PRESIDENT AND CEO, MARK HICKMAN, SAYS ADDING 1,000 JOBS IS JUST THE TIP OF ITS EXPANSION IN AN AREA OF ARKANSAS KNOWN FOR ITS FARMING. "WE WILL NEED APPROXIMATELY 339,000 BUSHELS OF CORN AND 2,400 TONS OF SOY MILL ON A WEEKLY BASIS. IT'S VERY IMPORTANT TO US THAT WE ARE HELPING FARMERS INCREASE THEIR INCOME AND BETTER PROVIDE FOR THEIR FAMILIES PECO ISN'T THE ONLY ONE MAKING AN INVESTMENT HERE, THE STATE OF ARKANSAS PITCHED IN \$4.5 MILLION IN COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT FUNDS. LOCAL GOVERNEMENTS ADDED \$700,000 AND THE DELTRA REGIONAL AUTHORITY GIVING \$230,000.

TYSON'S SAYS THE ACQUISITION IS PART OF THE COMPANY'S PLAN TO EXPAND IT'S DOMESTIC PREPARED FOODS BUSINESS. BOSCO'S, WHICH MAKES A VARIETY OF BREAD STICKS AND FROZEN PIZZAS FOR FOOD SERVICE, EMPLOYEES ABOUT 150-PEOPLE. ALL OF THOSE ARE EXPECTED TO WORK FOR TYSONS.

JUSTIN LEWIS REPORTED UNDER A RECOMMENDATION BY THE DEPARTMENT OF LABOR ALONG WITH PARENT COMPANY HEALTH ADVANTAGE, BLUE CROSS OF ARKANSAS WILL BEGIN A SPECIAL 30-DAY ENROLLMENT FOR GAY COUPLES WHO ARE LEGALLY MARRIED IN ANOTHER STATE. GAY MARRIAGE IS NOT ALLOWED IN THE STATE OF ARKANSAS, BUT UNDER A FUTURE INSURANCE PLAN, BLUE CROSS & BLUE SHIELD OF ARKANSAS WILL ALLOW LEGALLY MARRIED GAY COUPLES TO RECEIVE FAMILY INSURANCE UNDER GROUP PLANS ONLY. "THEY'RE NOT DOING ANYTHING ILLEGAL, BUT IT DOES GO AGAINST THE SPIRIT OF WHAT THE PEOPLE OF ARKANSAS SEEM TO BELIEVE ON THIS ISSUE." JERRY COX WITH ARKANSAS' FAMILY COUNCIL, IS REFERRING TO THE 2004 VOTE WHEN THE MAJORITY OF ARKANSANS DECIDED TO MAKE GAY MARRIAGE ILLEGAL. NOW WITH THE PRIVATE OPTION AT THE FOREFRONT OF ARKANSAS POLITICS, ALL ARKANSANS MAY SOON HAVE THEIR PICK OF INSURANCE OPTIONS. TODAY THE INSURANCE COMMISSION TOLD ME SINCE ALL OF ITS POLICIES ARE INDIVIDUALLY BASED, THAT BLUE CROSS' FAMILY GROUP PLAN WOULD NOT FALL UNDER THE INSURANCE MARKETPLACE. MARINE GLISOVOC REPORTED ARKANSANS HAVE BEEN GETTING PAID THE SAME MINIMUM WAGE FOR THE PAST 8 YEARS BUT GIVE ARKANSAS A RAISE NOW IS HOPING TO CHANGE THIS BY GATHERING ENOUGH SIGNATURES AND LETTING THE PEOPLE DECIDE IF THEY SHOULD BE MAKING MORE. NEARLY 200 PEOPLE ARE HITTING THE STREETS THROUGHOUT THE STATE --- CAMPAIGNING FOR SIGNATURES --- TO HELP RAISE ARKANSAS' MINIMUM WAGE. "WE WANT TO RAISE THE MINIMUM WAGE, THE STATE MINIMUM WAGE TO 8.50 AN HOUR OVER A THREE YEAR PERIOD AND WE'RE DOING THAT THROUGH A BALLOT MEASURE." THE GIVE ARKANSAS A RAISE NOW COALITION WILL NEED TO COLLECT 62-THOUSAND SIGNATURES BY JULY 7TH TO PUT THIS MEASURE ON THE NOVEMBER BALLOT. THE PROPOSED MEASURE WOULD INCREASE THE CURRENT MINIMUM WAGE OF 6. 25 ---- TO 7. 50 BY JANUARY 2015. IN 2016 --- IT WOULD INCREASE TO 8 DOLLARS. THEN BY 2017 --- WORKERS WOULD BE MAKING 8.50 AN HOUR. "FOLKS ARE WORKING HARD THEY'RE PLAYING BY THE RULES, THEY SHARE THE AMERICAN DREAM AND THEY JUST CAN'T MAKE THEIR ENDS MEET SO IT'S TIME FOR IT TO RAISE." 15 PERCENT OF ARKANSAS' WORKFORCE MAKES THE CURRENT MINIMUM WAGE OF 6 DOLLARS AND 25 CENTS ... AND DESPITE WHAT SOME MAY THINK.... IT'S NO LONGER JUST YOUNG ADULTS SUFFERING. AFTER THE LAST RECESSION WE SEE FOLKS THAT ARE EVEN A LITTLE BIT OLDER WORKING AT MINIMUM WAGE AND AS I'VE SAID... IF YOU'RE SPENDING 100 DOLLARS A WEEK ON GROCERIES 300 DOLLARS A WEEK ON RENT, THERE'S NO WAY YOU CAN MAKE IT SO THEN YOU'RE THRUST INTO WORKING TWO JOBS. NOW THERE HAS BEEN SOME OPPOSITION TO RAISING THE MINIMUM WAGE --- SOME IN THE HOSPITALITY INDUSTRY BELIEVE THAT IF IT WERE TO RAISE --- THAT COULD MEAN EITHER LAYING OFF WORKERS - -- OR INCREASING PRICES FOR CONSUMERS. I DID REACH OUT TO THE ARKANSAS HOSPITALITY ASSOCIATION FOR COMMENT --- BUT DID NOT HEAR BACK FROM THEM

CHRISTINA MUNOZ REPORTED TWO TEENAGERS IN TEXARKANA ARE BEHIND BARS ACCUSED OF BREAKING INTO AN ANIMAL SHELTER AND STEALING FIVE PIT BULLS, A CAT, AND ANIMAL SUPPLIES. POLICE SAY DOG FIGHTING COULD HAVE BEEN A MOTIVE IN THE CRIME. THE TEENAGERS WERE CAPTURED ON SURVEILLANCE

VIDEO WALKING THROUGH THE BUILDING AND STEALING THE DOGS. THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF THE SHELTER SAYS THE FACILITY HAS BEEN BROKEN INTO FIVE TIMES IN THE LAST MONTH AND SHE BELIEVES THEY ARE ALL RELATED. A TOTAL OF NINE PIT BULLS HAVE BEEN STOLEN IN THE PAST FIVE MONTHS.

JEANNETTE REYES REPORTED THE LATINO POPULATION IN SOUTHWEST LITTLE ROCK HAS BEEN GROWING RAPIDLY BUT ALONG WITH THAT INCREASE POLICE SAY THEY'RE SEEING A DISTURBING TREND IN ROBBERIES AND LATINOS ARE THE PRIMARY VICTIMS. TONIGHT WAS THE NEIGHBORHOOD QUARTERLY MEETING FOR SOUTHWEST LITTLE ROCK --- CRIME STATISTICS WAS THE MAIN TOPIC OF DISCUSSION. MANY QUESTIONS WERE ASKED BUT WHAT *DIDN'T COME UP WERE NUMBERS THAT CONCERN CAPTAIN TERRY HASTINGS. HIS LATEST DATA SHOWS INDIVIDUAL ROBBERIES IN SOUTHWEST LITTLE ROCK ARE ON THE RISE AND HISPANICS ARE THE VICTIMS OF CHOICE. "THEY SEEM TO BE A TARGET OF SOME FOLKS OF INDIVIDUALS THAT DO ROBBERIES." "HISPANICS MAY NOT PUT THEIR MONEY IN THE BANK, THEY MAY BE HERE ILLEGALLY." WE WEREN'T AWARE OF ANY HISPANICS WHO ATTENDED TONIGHT'S MEETING BUT AT A NEARBY LOCAL STORE LONGTIME EMPLOYEE ROBERTO TORRES KNOWS SEVERAL VICTIMS. "WHEN THEY GO TO THE APARTMENT OR WHEN THEY'RE DRIVING IN THE GAS STATION OR WALMART." TORRES SAYS IT'S SO COMMON AROUND HERE THERE'S A SAYING "THEY SAY THE LATIN PEOPLE IS THE ATM FOR PEOPLE WHO KNEW THAT THEY HAVE CASH ON THEM." HASTINGS SAYS THEY'VE AT LEAST GOTTEN MORE PEOPLE TO REPORT THESE CRIMES BUT HE'D LIKE TO PREVENT THEM ALL TOGETHER. "TRY AND BUILD A REPORE WITH THEM AND GET TO UNDERSTAND THAT PUTTING YOUR MONEY IN THE BANK IS A GOOD THING TO DO." NOW MANY BANKS HAVE STARTED WORKING WITH THE HISPANIC COMMUNITY TO MAKE IT EASIER FOR THEM OPEN A BANK ACCOUNT.

BETH HUNT REPORTED JURORS IN FORMER ARKANSAS TREASURER MARTHA SHOFFNER'S CORRUPTION TRIAL HAVE HEARD A FULL DAY OF TESTIMONY BUT STILL HAVEN'T HEARD FROM THE KEY WITNESS, BOND TRADER STEELE STEPHENS. SHOFFNER IS BEING TRIED ON A 14-COUNT FEDERAL INDICTMENT CHARGING HER WITH BRIBERY AND EXTORTION FOR ALLEGEDLY ACCEPTING \$36,000 FROM STEPHENS IN EXCHANGE FOR GIVING HIM STATE BUSINESS. PROSECUTORS HAVE GIVEN STEPHENS IMMUNITY FROM BEING CHARGED. YESTERDAY THE GOVERNMENT WORKED TO SHOW THAT SHOFFNER ORDERED BONDS TO BE SOLD EARLY, COSTING THE STATE MONEY. THEY ALSO DREW TESTIMONY FROM CURRENT AND FORMER WORKERS, WHO DESCRIBED SHOFFNER AS PRONE TO ANGRY OUTBURSTS. SHOFFNER'S ATTORNEY, CHUCK BANKS, FOCUSED ON ELEMENTS OF THE CASE WHERE NO CRIME WAS COMMITTED AND CLAIMED HIS CLIENT WAS MORE OF A FIGUREHEAD, WITH THE EMPLOYEES MANAGING BOND TRADES.

JEANNETTE REYES REPORTED IT'S A ONCE IN A CENTURY OPPORTUNITY TO REPLACE A BRIDGE THAT WAS DEDICATED TO WORLD WAR VETERANS ON CHRISTMAS DAY 1923. "25 IT HAS SERVED ITS PURPOSE. IT IS SHOWING ITS WEAR AND TEAR. IT'S A CONCRETE STRUCTURE AND IT NEEDS TO BE REPLACED." THE STATE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT AND PULASKI COUNTY WILL TEAR DOWN THE CURRENT BRIDGE AND REPLACE IT WITH WHAT ARCHITECTS CALL A DOUBLE BASKET HAND TIED ARCH...IT'LL COST ROUGHLY 80 MILLION DOLLARS AND WILL SHUT DOWN THE BRIDGE FOR ABOUT TWO YEARS. "MOTORISTS ARE GOING TO HAVE TO GET CREATIVE, EMPLOYERS ARE GOING TO HAVE TO GET CREATIVE. PERHAPS THEY CAN STAGGER WORK TIMES. EVERYBODY DOESN'T HAVE TO COME TO WORK AT THE EXACT SAME TIME. SO YOU KNOW, WE HUMANS, WE ADAPT. IT JUST TAKES US A LITTLE TIME." JUDGE BUDDY VILLINES IS HOPING TO RAISE AN ADDITIONAL 2.5 TO 3 MILLION DOLLARS IN PRIVATE FUNDS FOR AESTHETICS. NAMES OF FALLEN SOLDIERS AND STATES WILL BE ETCHED INTO THE STRUCTURE. "WE WANT TO DO SOMETHING FOR OUR VETERAN AND THOSE WHO'VE WORKED SO HARD FOR FREEDOM AND PEACE. THAT PEOPLE WILL REMEMBER IT. IF YOU'RE GOING TO HAVE THAT OPPORTUNITY, DO IT RIGHT. DO SOMETHING THAT'S MEANINGFUL." THE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT IS HOPING TO PUT OFF ANY CONSTRUCTION THAT WOULD CLOSE THE BRIDGE UNTIL EARLY NEXT YEAR.

BETH HUNT REPORTED THE ARKANSAS NATIONAL GUARD SAYS ONE OF THE SOLDIERS PHOTOGRAPHED IN A CONTROVERSIAL PICTURE THAT WAS POSTED ON SOCIAL MEDIA IS AN ARKANSAS GUARDSMAN, AND HAS BEEN SUSPENDED. THE PHOTOGRAPH WAS TAKEN AT THE NATIONAL GUARD BUREAU'S PROFESSIONAL EDUCATION CENTER EARLIER THIS MONTH AT CAMP ROBINSON. IT SHOWS FOURTEEN SOLDIERS, FROM

VARIOUS STATES, POSING AROUND AN EMPTY, FLAG DRAPED COFFIN. THE PHOTO HAS BEEN WIDELY CRITICIZED BY VETERANS FOR ITS LACK OF SENSITIVITY. THE ARKANSAS GUARD SAYS THE SUSPENDED GUARDSMAN IS NOT BEING IDENTIFIED FOR SAFETY REASONS.

WITH CASES OF PERTUSSIS CONTINUING TO INCREASE ACROSS THE STATE, NEW REQUIREMENTS FOR NEXT SCHOOL YEAR ARE ALREADY BEING ESTABLISHED. FCC Schedule for Closed-Captioning Requirements

The following phase-in schedule applies to the captioning and broadcast of all new programming. It is measured on a calendar-quarter basis and a 20-hour broadcast day, as programming between 2am and 6am does not have to be captioned.

- Between January 1, 2000, and December 31, 2001, program distributors must provide at least 450 hours of captioned programming per calendar quarter, which is approximately five hours per day. If the program distributor provides less than 450 hours of new programming, then 95 percent of its new programming must be captioned.
- Between January 1, 2002, and December 31, 2003, program distributors must provide at least 900 hours of captioned video programming per calendar quarter, or 10 hours per day. If the programming distributor provides less than 900 hours of new programming, then 95 percent of its new programming must be captioned.
- Between January 1, 2004, and December 31, 2005, program distributors must provide at least an average of 1,350 hours of captioned video programming per calendar quarter, or 15 hours per day. If the program distributor provides less than 1,350 hours of new programming, then 95 percent of its new programming must be captioned.

- As of January 1, 2006, and thereafter, 100 percent of the program distributors' new programming must be captioned.
