- Interview with filmmaker Dee Davis, who produced a documentary film about the historic, devastating flood of 2022 titled Eastern Kentucky Flood. (Aired as part of the "Mountain Talk" program); April 19, 2023; 30 minutes; 6:00PM.
- 2. Interview with a German journalist about the community of Lutzerath, Germany; April 19, 2023; 30 minutes; 6:30PM; Lutzerath, Germany was recently evacuated & destroyed by a coal company to allow for the expansion of a mine. This interview carries a particular local resonance, given our region's deep relationship with coal, and the many Appalachian communities, hollers, and homesteads that have met similar fates in our region over the years. (Aired as part of the "Mountain Talk" program.)
- 3. Benefits for Black Lung; May 4, 2023; 30 minutes; 6:30PM; Clips from a recent roundtable on benefits for black lung disease; a recent study found that these benefits have not kept pace with inflation, and in today's dollars are only a little better than half of what black lung benefits were in 1969. This issue affects many local listeners, both older miners and younger miners, who have seen a resurgence in black lung in Appalachian mines in recent years. (Aired as part of the "Mountain Talk" program.)
- 4. East Kentucky Flood, audio documentary; May 4, 2023; 30 minutes; 6:00PM; Version adapated for radio about "East Kentucky Flood," a documentary film about the historic, devastating flood of 2022. (Aired as part of the "Mountain Talk" program.)
- 5. Eula Hall Highlight; May 11, 2023; 60 minutes; 6:00PM; Program on the life and legacy of longtime local activist and advocate Eula Hall, who founded a non-profit clinic in Floyd County, KY in 1973. The first half of the show featured interviews with health workers at that clinic (now known as the Eula Hall Health Center) from 2022; the second half featured an edited version of an interview with Eula Hall from 2010 that touched on health, history (especially the "War on Poverty"), and Hall's longtime participation in efforts to strengthen the social safety net in Kentucky. (Aired as part of the "Mountain Talk" program.)
