Ms. Mann's conversation focus was on how the report shares two competing narratives. On the one hand, Alabama is improving the well-being of its children. The state made small improvements in many of the indicators the Annie E. Casey Foundation measures. However, on the other hand, Alabama's position relative to other states is falling. This is true with the state's overall ranking and in many of the individual indicators as well. Rhonda shared what we should take away from these narratives. OICES will release the Alabama Kids Count Data Book later this year. The Alabama data book will include a county-by-county comparison. Glenn asked, and Rhonda answered the following questions: What is VOICES for Alabama's Children? What is the Annie E. Casey KIDS COUNT Data Book? How did Alabama do in this report? Can you explain a little more about the difference in the rates and the rankings? Were there any surprises in this year's Data Book? Ms. Mann will be back when the VOICES book comes out.

The Health, Wellness, and Social Services Ministry Members of the Mount Gillard Missionary Baptist Church, and Healthy Connections Members will hold its Healthy Connections Health Promotion Event on Saturday, July 27, 2019 from 8 A.M. – 12 P.M. at Mt. Gilliard Missionary Baptist Church located at 3323 Day Street in Montgomery, AL. They put on this event each year to educate members of the community, particularly the West Side, leading to the reduction of obesity, diabetes, heart disease, cancer and poverty. They canvass the neighborhood with health literature, and hold a health panel discussion at the church. There will be outdoor children's activities, presentations regarding physical, mental, education, employment and financial health as well as various giveaways for children and adults. She said that most illness that these residents suffer have a connection with the foods that they eat. They are encouraged to eat fresh fruits and vegetables, but have noticed that there are fast food restaurants, but no accessible grocery stores in a lot of these neighborhoods. This makes it difficult for people without transportation to shop for wholesome, healthy foods.

Ms. Davis and Mandy talked about "Parenting Forward", Gift of Life's new parenting program. The first orientation will be held on July 13th t 10 A.M. the library downtown. Parenting Forward gives pregnant and parenting teen moms and dads the education, support, and connection to community resources that they need to become a great parent and plan for a successful future at no cost! The program includes monthly parenting classes offered at local high schools, individual and group sessions lead by a licensed social worker or counselor, the option to receive services at home should the person enroll in Gift of Life, interactive parenting presentations and fun activities, connecting to health, pregnancy, and parenting resources for the young lady and her baby, and help with goal setting, building life skills, and planning for the future. GOF plans to serve up to 75 young people through this program.

The Montgomery Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta is gearing up its Rollin' to the Polls Initiative and will be hosting a series of free, community forums that will give the community an opportunity to talk to the various candidates for mayor and the city council. Topic: Brantwood Children's Home

Guest: Gerald Jones, Executive Director, Brantwood Children's Home

Mr. Jones gave a history of Brantwood Children's home that was founded in 1917 by the Women's Federation. He also gave a detail of all of the services that they provide, the ages of children that live there, and the different programs that they have. He always takes pleasure in talking about the kids, and telling everyone about all of their success stories. There is a school on-site, but the students are permitted to participate in sports activities at other schools in the area. He told about many of the students that age out while at Brantwood, and how they go on to live active, productive, lives. It is always special times when they come back and mentor those that currently live at Brantwood. Mr. Jones discussed their funding sources, and the urgent need for the public's support. They always need volunteers, and he told the viewers what they need to do to become volunteers, and how they can donate financially to the home. He talked about one of their upcoming fundraisers that will be held on September 12th. He encouraged everyone to register early, to sign up teams, and to come out and have a great time, while supporting a worthy cause. There is nothing more important than our young ones.

Topic: Hope Inspired Ministries

Guest: Jo Ann Johnson, Executive Director, Hope Inspired Ministries

Hope Inspired Ministries (HIM) serves low-skilled, poorly educated, and chronically unemployed adult men and women by preparing them to obtain and maintain employment. Ms. Johnson said their nine-week job training and life skills program develops individual worth, encourages personal responsibility, and promotes the value and honor of a hard day's work. It is this is their intention to lift people out of the cycle of poverty and equip them with the skills to become self-sufficient, productive citizens in their communities. Their adult students, approximately 180 per year, primarily consist of those determined to be "high-risk" due to living lives of poverty, crime, violence, addiction, prison, and chronic unemployment. The students typically have few job and life skills, little to no coping skills, no dependable structure, and very little education. Upon completion of six weeks of classroom instruction, students' skills and abilities are assessed and the student is then matched with a local business where they put their new training to use during a 120 hour, unpaid internship. In many cases, the local business hires the student upon internship completion. We currently have between 80-85% of our graduates in the workforce. We also have a 3% recidivism rate compared to the current recidivism rate in Montgomery of 35%. This serves to prove that, given the chance, many in our society will choose the path of becoming a productive citizen rather than remain in a life of poverty, dependence, and crime.

Mr. King discussed the mission of The King's Canvas, and why this a need. He told the viewers what his experiences as an artist were before he founded The King's Canvas, and how the art community has changed since The King's Canvas began. He talked about some of the art entities that he has partnered with, and some that he hopes to partner with in the future. He explained how his artists have benefitted from the services provided by The King's Canvas this year, and how King's Canvas has benefited by the artists. He also told the viewers how The King's Canvas can bring about an economic change in West Montgomery as he works with business owners in the area, and things that he needs that would help in the future growth and success of The King's Canvas. He has seen so many of the youth in the area that are gifted in art, and he wants the community's help in seeing that they get the instruction, motivation, and encouragement that they need in order to become as successful as they can be.

Topic: The Salvation Army

Lieutenant Farrington said the Salvation Army, an international movement, is an evangelical part of the universal Christian Church. Its message is based on the Bible. Its ministry is motivated by the love of God. Its mission is to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ and to meet human needs in His name without discrimination. He talked about his Vision for Montgomery's Center of Hope and their programs – The Emergency Shelter where people come and get hot meals, a warm bed and roofs over their heads; The Market Place, their Community Food Pantry through which they assist neighbors with groceries for their families; Utility Assistance Program provides utility assistance to members of the community struggling, or on he brink of homelessness; Computer Training Course that connects the homeless or those at risk of homelessness with job training and placement; The Pathway of Hope seeks to address the root causes of poverty in addition to the Army's history of compassionate service; Reveal-Reveal is a six month discipleship program; Kingdom Recreation, a youth centered intramural athletics program; R.E.S.T., an extension of their Emergency Disaster Ministry Program; Life Skills Training aims to promote self-sufficiency; and the Volunteer Facilitated Youth Tutorial Service recruits retired teachers, college students, and college professors to help shape the minds of Montgomery's youth through tutoring and mentoring.

Topic: Jacob Lawrence Exhibition At Montgomery Museum of Fine Arts

Ms. Jankauskas gave a brief overview of the exhibition, a background of the artist, programs scheduled around the exhibition at the Museum, and why this exhibition was brought to Montgomery. She said that it is an exciting exhibition depicting the African-American experiences. The traveling exhibition *History, Labor, Life: The Prints of Jacob Lawrence* provides a comprehensive overview of influential American Artist Jacob Lawrence's (1917-2000) printmaking collection, featuring more than 90 works that were produced from 1963-2000. It explores three major themes that occupied his graphic works, and is opened to the public from August 3rd until October 27th. She told the viewers about upcoming related exhibitions, general information about the museum, and related programs. Topic: Children's Center of Montgomery

Guest: Cynthia McCaghren, Executive Director

Ms. McCaghren's focus today was CCAP – the Children Center's Adult Program. Montgomery Children's Center is a very unique school that serves severely disabled students in grades K-12 in Montgomery County. Most of the students are multi-disabled, non-verbal and in wheelchairs. Other disabilities represented are severe intellectually disabled, autism and traumatic brain injury. McCaghren gave a history of how CCAP was initiated and how the staff is an important addition to the students lives. She described a typical day at CCAP; the CCAP garden; their collaborative creative CCAP boutique; their association with the Civitan Club; and their very successful 5K fundraiser in the spring. She told the viewers how they can help support CCAP, and gave contact information. The school, faculty and staff are funded by the Montgomery County Board of Education. Additional funding comes from the State Department of Education. The Children's Center of Montgomery, Inc. obtains funding from the River Region United Way, grants, contributions from civic clubs and individuals. Children's Center School is supported by the non-profit organization and its Board of Directors. The Center's programs begin at birth and extend through age twenty-one. The public-school program begins at age three and extends through age 21.

Ms. Landers wanted to highlight five very important points on today's show. They are, why immunizations are important to the health of both children and adults; what the immunization the Alabama in and why certain vaccine reportable diseases are investigated by the State Health Department. She also gave Mandy some examples of recent investigations, and told the viewers why the public should be concerned about vaccine refusal or vaccine hesitancy on the part of some parents. This hesitancy affects not the children involved, but the public as well. Ms. Landers talked about this year's measles outbreak, and the affect it had n those that were infected.

Topic: AID To Inmate Mothers

Guest: Carol Potok, Executive Director, Aide To Inmate Mothers

Shanna Rainey, Program Participant

AIM was founded 32 years ago to reunite mothers in prison with their children. Many of the children couldn't visit because they lacked transportation. The program works with a network of churches across the state to provide drivers and vans to transport the children. The visit is child-friendly: children enter through a side gate to avoid bars, toys and activities are provided, as well as photos and a meal. Carol discussed their programs: (1) their Storybook program allows mothers to read a bedtime story on video for their children and they send the DVD and books to the children. Almost 1400 children were served last year. (2) Parenting classes help women learn about positive parenting, nurturing and how to parent from prison. (3) Project Reconnect help women with reentry preparation including self-esteem classes, budgeting mock job interviews, workplace etiquette, and resume writing. (4) Genesis House: A transitional home for women leaving prison provides them with structure and intensive case management when first released from prison. Short- and long-term goals are set, residents must abide by a curfew and are randomly drug tested. 20 women were served through this program in 2018. Shanna told the viewers about her experiences with the house. To help with all of this, AIM's "All That Jazz" Celebration and Fundraiser will be held on September 24th at the Sanctuary in downtown Montgomery. This year's theme is "Community Interventions to Combating Infant Mortality". Here to tell us all about what will happen is Dr. Regina Traylor, Gift of Life's new Executive Director, and Ms. Smiley, with the Alabama Department of Public Health. Today's focus will be on community strategies that can be used to raise awareness of infant mortality among those who are most at-risk. How organizations can better address the social determinates of health (poverty, access to care, education, violence, environmental, mental health) that impact infant mortality; and explore what organizations are doing across our state and nation to improve birth outcomes and the health of vulnerable women and children. They also discussed GOL's programs and how they are designed to meet the needs of those that they serve. Dr. Traylor said that all of the programs are voluntary and there is no cost for them.

It is a job training and placement program for low-income people age 55 or older; it is authorized as part of the Older American Acts and administered by the U.S. Department of Labor's Employment and Training Administration. It was created more than 40 years ago, and nearly 100,000 participants receive job training annually; more then 25,000 are placed annually, and it provides nearly 49 million community service hours yearly. Their goals are to foster individual economic self-sufficiency and promote useful opportunities in community service activities for unemployed low-income persons who are 55 years old or older, and to increase the number of persons who may enjoy the benefits of unsubsidized employment in both the public and private sectors. Varina gave the viewers their location and contact information, the requirements for enrollment, and preferences given (to Veterans, the homeless, those with valid disabilities, those 75 years old or older). She also discussed some of their success stories, and services that are provided to participants, reasons, and benefits to partner with SCSEP, and the 13 counties that are served by this program.

You can compare pricing between Original Medicare, Medicare prescription drug plans, Medicare Advantage plans, and Medicare Supplement Insurance (Medigap) policies; compare coverage options on their smartphones and tablets; compare up to three drug plans or three Medicare Advantage plans side-by-side; get plan costs and benefits, including which Medicare Advantage plans offer extra benefits; build a personal drug list and find Medicare Part D prescription drug coverage that best meets their needs.
