This is the 4th year for this activity, and it will be held on April 27th. The project gives the public the opportunity to explore the taste of wild game. Approximately 40 Wild game Chiefs will present many different recipes for preparing wild game, in addition persons will be able to sample such wild game as deer, raccoon, opossum, turtle, wild hogs, rabbits, squirrels, rattle snake, alligator, turkey, quails, and others as found in Macon county. Not only will they be able to taste these items, but explore the many ways they can be prepared. The project is further designed to teach about hunting safety, the safe way to handle wild game, and to encourage the public to appreciate the wild game around us. Each year, the Alabama Wild Life and Game Commission present a variety of activities, such as a display of the Wild Life available in the county (Stuff Wild Life Game) and a bow and arrow display demonstration. This activity has attracted citizens from all over the State of Alabama, and each year it has grown in attendance. They activity starts at 10 A.M. – 2 P.M., and is open and free to the public.

Topic: The City of Montgomery

Guest: Todd Strange, Mayor, Montgomery, AL

Today is Tim's last show. He will be retiring next Tuesday on the 50th anniversary of the day he started in broadcasting. For ten years here at Alabama News Network, interviewing Mayor Todd Strange has been one constant for him, so he wanted to end his tenure with Mayor Strange as his last guest. They talked about the "Gang of 5" – the Mayors of 5 big cities in Alabama. They met recently and had some complaints about what is going on in the Alabama Legislature. Members of the Legislature are trying to dictate to the cities unfunded mandates. This includes trying to override city ordinances on fireworks. The Mayors also agreed on the Internet Sales Tax. The numbers are going up, but the money coming in to the cities is dwindling. There is a fight over money and the cities want to get their fair share. The State gets theirs, the Counties get theirs, and the cities want to get theirs. The Mayors took issue, too, with the Legislature wanting to do away with the need for a concealed permit. They are against this. Mayor Strange and Tim discussed celebratory gunfire. There is an ordinance now that can make an arrest over celebratory gunfire, and a minimum of jail time will be served if an arrest is made. Mayor Strange said that 89% of guns that are stolen come from unlocked cars, so he encouraged everyone to lock their cars. Over 1,500 residents have volunteered to let police watch their security cameras if they need to. Mayor Strange is not running for reelection this year, but he hopes those that are will have vigorous debates, and the media and citizens will not let candidates off with platitudes. He is not endorsing any candidate, and said he has a high degree of confidence in the Montgomery electorate. He is leaving his office on November 12th, and will be happy to assist whoever is elected. The Mayor is trying to eliminate the minor "Me" ticket, like they are trying to do in Birmingham. He said it's time to focus on important crime, and just give those stopped for these crimes tickets to appear. The County can do this now, but the cities can't. He thinks we are moving in the right direction in this area. Birmingham calls this the "Big" ticket. Mayor Strange said we need approximately 515-525 police officers in the City but we have 480 at this time. We have the budget for the number that we need, and grants for more. A recurring theme he hears when talking to citizens is education, celebratory gunfire, weeds, dilapidation, paving, etc. He said the process takes a long time when spending State and Federal dollars to get these things done. The Mayor talked about the \$7 million South Court Street project, and the Zelda Road project. He also talked about what he will do when he retires – he won't get into full time employment, but will teach some courses if asked. He is Chairman of the Board of the University of Montevallo, and will go back on a couple of boards he had to get off. He said one of his biggest regrets as he leaves office is Education, and the funding (or lack of funding) for education.

The Alabama Department of Mental Health serves more than 200,000 Alabama citizens with mental illness, intellectual disabilities, and substance use disorders. The Department strives to serve, empower, and offer support to create awareness with promoting the health and well-being of Alabamians. The Department is celebrating Mental Health Awareness Month in May to showcase efforts of the Department, local providers, community partners, and individuals all over the State as they continue to make progress decreasing stigma surrounding mental illness and increasing care to those in need. They are discussing a number of topics they and their partners are involved in, and Ms. Beshear discussed special events that they are hosting. Children's Mental Health Week, May 5-11 shines a national spotlight on the importance of caring for every child's mental health and reinforces that positive mental health is essential to a child's healthy development. She talked about the number of children with serious emotional disturbances that receive services from ADMH and their partners (32,000); school systems (60) with mental clinicians in schools for those in need of mental health; Capitol Showcase where those that they serve have their abilities showcased during a consumer art show; and the primary goals of National Prevention Week.

Mr. Sloan discussed the Montgomery Armed Forces Communication and Electronics Association Chapter – Education Foundation, and its mission. It is to support the development of engineers and technical personnel through selective motivational awards, prizes, scholarships, and grants for educational activities of unique and high value and professional educational programs. He discussed their single fundraising event, the Golf Tournament on Monday, May 20th at Wynlakes and their 12 annual programs that include a high school summer internship program (ITIP), “Education for Industry” College Scholarships; STEM graduate scholarships; robotics donations to local schools; Camp-IT Support; science teaching tools; at AFITC High School Education Day. They have local partnerships with Troy Montgomery, AUM, ASU, and the Montgomery and Macon County Public schools. During 2018 they raised approximately \$150,000 from its annual fundraiser; awarded \$30,000 in scholarships to local area college rising seniors; \$7,500 to high school seniors via the high school technology internship program; sponsored 3 interns at local DoD IT companies providing grants for future educational needs; supported IT Academy at Lee High School; field trips, guest speakers, Job shadow day and Camp IT over \$5,000. Mr. Sloan shared this information with the viewer so they will see how important it is to support their only fundraising event this year on May 20th. So please come out so they can continue to support education in the area.

Ms. Thornton came on today to stress the importance of preparing before the storm, CERT training, and spent the remainder of the program talking about and demonstrating the new Montgomery EMA APP. She and Jalea discussed all of the bad storms and tornadoes that we've had recently and the importance of preparing and having everything in place before bad weather hits. The tornadoes in Elmore County were devastating for the area, then the tornado in Lee County hit and was worst, causing 23 deaths. Clean-up is still being done in those areas. The most recent tornado was in Troy, Alabama . . . There were 37 recorded tornadoes in the state before the start of spring. Ms. Thornton, said it's important to have an emergency plan in place with legal papers, medicine, batteries, flash lights, water, and food on hand well before a warning is issued. Also, make sure your pet is taken care of as well. It is a good thing to know where local shelters are, and if pets are welcome there. She and Jalea demonstrated the features on EMA's new App. She advised everyone to search Montgomery County EMA and to download their new APP today. Weather radios are important to have too. Viewers can call the EMA office for information on safety classes that they offer.

Through generous donations from individual and corporate donors, the foundation provides over \$5 million in grants and scholarships each year that meet diverse community needs, supporting programs and projects in education, human services, health, culture arts and other civic concerns. She said their mission is to create a better quality of life for those who live and work in the River Region. CACF serves several counties including Autauga, Coffee, Dale, Elmore, Geneva, Henry, Houston, Lowndes, Macon and Montgomery. On May 30th they awarded over \$123,482.10 in Family Wellness Grants to 22 Wiregrass nonprofits that provide family, food, and medical programs in 10 counties. The applications were submitted from January until February 20th and the grants were approved by CACF's Board of Directors in April.

Topic: Summer Feeding Program

Guest: Sharon Sanders, Nutritionist, MPS Summer Feeding Program

Ms. Sanders told the viewers why the Summer Food Service Program is important to the community, how it operates, how long it has been in existence, who is eligible to get meals, the number of meals per day a child can receive, where the sites are located in the community, and how the viewers can help if they want to. This program is sponsored by the Montgomery Public Schools. Children need healthy food all year long. During the school year they are provided with free breakfast and lunch through the National School Breakfast lunch Programs. When school lets out, many of these children are at risk of hunger. Lack of nutrition during the summer months may set up a cycle for poor performance once school begins again, and may make children more prone to illness and other health issues. The Summer Meals Program is designed to fill that nutrition gap and make sure can get the nutritious meals they need. Ms. Sanders said that any child in Montgomery can go to one of the participating schools and get the meals. They are provided Monday - Thursday, June 3 through July 16. Breakfast is from 7:30-8:15 A.M., Lunch from 11:30-12:30 P.M.

Mr. Sentell said the tourism industry is one of the fastest growing segments of the state's economy. As Gov. Ivey recently announced, last year tourists spent \$15.5 billion or an increase of 8.5 percent or \$1.2 billion. For the first time, more than one million more tourists came to our state for a total of 26 million visitors. The communities of Birmingham, Mobile and Huntsville grew by 10 percent. Montgomery County, driven by 400,000 visitors touring the Lynching Memorial and Museum increased by 15 percent, the largest increase ever for the state capital area. Dozens of motor-coach groups daily visit the sites created by the Equal Justice Initiative. The state's number one destination, the beaches of Gulf Shores and Orange Beach, grew by 7 percent. The beach accounts for 30 percent of the state's tourism industry. Alabama's Bicentennial year will conclude on Dec. 14 with the unveiling of a display of 16 bronze panels with historical highlights of our past 200 years. A parade, concerts and dance performances will fill the afternoon. A light show projected on the Attorney General's building will conclude the festivities.
