Topic: Book “Hard Rain” (About America in the 1960s)

Guest: Frye Gaillard, Author

Mr. Gaillard is a Writer in Residence at the University of South Alabama. He said Bob Dillon’s song “Hard Rain Is Going to Fall” fits the title of his book that captures the spirit of the 60s. These were hard times of tragedy, violence, and division but also a time of great hope. People felt they could make our great country an even greater country. Young people demonstrated for Civil Rights, young women raised the issue of gender equality, and we had a handsome young President names John Kennedy making us believe we could it to the moon, or start a Peach Corp. The 60s included so much history in the 10 year period, and was an amazing time to come of age. We saw so many things, social movements, the space race, environmental consciousness that arose during that time. Musical history was made at that time also, and is a common thread in the book. Elvis, a white man loved black music; Sam Cook, a black man loved country music. Music became a way of crossing some of the divides in the book. Viet Nam is another thread in the book. A lot of tragedy centers around Viet Nam which was such a source of division in the country. Political activism and violence are other threads. There were assignations, bombings, 1,000 armed white people that didn’t want James Meredith to integrate a college in Mississippi; 4 little girls killed in a bombing in Birmingham, Kennedy, Malcom X and King assassinated; riots every summer in urban areas. These were turbulent times, disturbing times, violent times. Alabama was Ground Zero for events happening in the 60s.

Topic: Book “One More Day”

Guest: Kym Klass, Author

Kym turned a grim topic into positive message writing about her sister’s suicide. She never felt guilt but there were and still are a lot of questions of why. Could she have made a difference if she had moved to where her sister lived? They are left with so many unanswered questions. Her sister left a journal and she thought about the impact that taking her life would make. She thought about her husband, her family, her daughter. The only comfort they found is that her sister wouldn’t have killed herself if mental illness hadn’t taken over her mind. Kym has lived in Montgomery for 11 years, and found that people don’t want to talk about suicide. You don’t put it out on social media, and the family agreed that they wouldn’t talk about it. However, after they put it out,

Kym couldn't stop talking about mental illness and suicide publically. Mental illness was a lot of work for her sister, counseling helped when she went, but she didn't always want to go. Her book can be found on Amazon and at Barnes and Nobles.

Topic: Rural Health
Guests: Farrell Turner, President Rural Health

Mr. Turner discussed rural hospitals and told the viewers about the services they provide and the estimated costs of these services. He talked about the challenges of small rural hospitals, rural clinics, and other providers. They include a high percentage of poor, often unhealthy patients; high percentage of Medicaid that pays below the cost of providing the service; high percentages of Medicare that pays fairly well; and costs of complying with constantly changing and complex rules that are unilaterally imposed by insurance companies. County Health Rankings and Roadmaps (CHRR) rates Alabama at significantly poorer health compared to the United States, with the best Alabama Counties at or near the US average. They indicate that factors that lead to better health are led by education, employment, health insurance, safe housing, access to fresh food, and exercise opportunities. He said rural hospitals are important tools in attracting physicians to a rural community. They provide relatively high-paying jobs and helping to maintain other health-related businesses such as pharmacies. Rural hospitals are typically one of the largest employers in their county. Almost 90% of Alabama Rural Hospitals experience an operating loss. The high costs of healthcare in the United States are passed on to insurance companies, then employers, and then to individuals

Topic: Scale Back Alabama
Guest: Rosemary Blackmon, Alabama Hospital Association

This is the 13th year of Scale Back Alabama. It began with the Alabama Hospital Association, Al. Department of Public Health, and Blue Cross Blue Shield as a way to help address Alabama's obesity challenge. All of the organizations were working on health initiatives on their own, and this seemed to be a great way to harness the collective power and bring focus and fun. It worked! The first year they had about 5,000 people participate, and last year, they had 18,000. The contest is totally free for participants. Blue Cross covers prize money, and Alabama Hospital Association and ADPH provide in-kind services to help organize and keep things going. Ms. Blackmon shared results from last year's contest: Number of local coordinators – 459; 9,190 teams participated; the number of individuals participating was 18,380; there were 901 teams where each member lost 10 pounds; and 6,136 individuals lost weight. Total pounds lost were 60,99. There's also a good bit more on the website – www.scalebackalabama.com.

Rev Handy and Ms. Gilmer told the viewers about this year's MLK Day activities at the church. The theme for this year's celebration is "Standing Strong: A Community Celebration of Living The Dream. This is the 44th year of Martin Luther King Day, and this will be a celebration of his 90th birthday. The celebration will take place tomorrow at the church from 9 A.M. – 12 Noon. The guest speaker will be Rev. Dr. James E. Shannon who is the Pastor of Peoples Community Church in Glen Ellyn, IL. The parade will be held after the worship services, and there will be a special unveiling of the bust of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. There will be a birthday cake and Blue Bell is providing ice cream for this year's guests again. On tomorrow, both the church and the parsonage will conduct tours on the hour from 1 P.M. until 4 P.M. The special discount price for the day is \$5.50 per person. The church will open its doors at 8:00 A.M. for event seating and souvenirs. They discussed the impact the EJI and Memorial have had on tourism at the church. Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc.

Delta Sigma Theta and the Mid-Alabama Homeless Coalition are teaming up to collect coats, sweaters, blankets, and warm clothing for the River Region's homeless in honor of tomorrow's Martin Luther King Day of Service. Last year, their efforts were very successful with over 300 coats, jackets, and other items that were collected. This is the 2nd year of the partnership of Delta and MACH to provide these needed items for the area's homeless citizens. Delta's do this because economic development and improving the mental and physical health of underserved communities are both major programmatic thrusts of their national organization. Homelessness is a growing problem in our community, and MACH does an annual "point in time count" of the city's homeless. Last year they recorded 24 chronically homeless, 120 with a severe mental illness, 46 victims of domestic violence, 40 veterans, 108 families with dependent children, 38 chronic substance abusers, and 3 who live with HIV/AIDS. Delta and MACH work with community leaders to find solutions to the lack of affordable housing, job training, and improving health services which exacerbate the problems of homelessness.

Ms. Fitzpatrick returned today to give an overall view of the 2nd Blanket Drive for the Mid-Alabama Coalition for the Homeless (MACH) that Delta Sigma Theta hosted on MLK's Day of Service last Monday. She said that it was a success as she knew it would be, and they are thankful for those who donated to the area's homeless population. She also discussed the Annual Point-It-Time Count that was held last Tuesday, and will come back at a later time when the results of the count have been studied. She wants the viewers to know how desperately the agency needs human and financial resources to eradicate homelessness in Montgomery and the surrounding areas. In addition to coats, sweaters, jackets, gloves, socks, and other warm clothing they also need toiletries. A comb, brush, mirror, bandages, etc., would also be helpful. Her plan for this year is to more visible, and to let the community in on what is happening at the agency. They have volunteers but can never have enough, and they are very appreciative of any time and/or financial assistance that residents of the River Region can provide.

Topic: Montgomery County Elder Abuse Taskforce

The Elder Abuse Task Force is a community-based team of organizations and individuals committed to increasing public safety; providing public education and resources to prevent and respond to abuse, neglect, sexual assaults and financial exploitation of elders 60 years of age and older; and to identify strategies to respond to possible elder abuse. They meet every second Wednesday in the month, and will be hosting quarterly town hall meetings across the city to discuss important topics surrounding our elders in the community. They will have "C.A.R.E Day" in June collecting supplies/donations to help local agencies that service elders in the community. They explained the meaning of C.A.R.E. which stands for **Community About Resourcing it Elders**. They talked about elders that are taken advantage of, how many are targets of scams, and are physically, verbally, emotionally, and financially abused by their own families. They gave out contact information, and how those in the river Region can help to make this Taskforce a success.

Topic: Habitat ReStore

Guest: Nick Mielke, Director, Habitat For The Humanity

Mr. Mielke's main points today were telling the viewers about the Habitat For The Humanity Restore that is located on the East South Blvd in the city. They've had the store for about 10 – 11 years. It has primarily home goods – furniture, appliances, and building materials. They do not have clothing, baby items, or mattresses. These are donated items that they sell. Everything they sell is tax free and the paint and rugs are brand new. He said it is a good place for low income families to shop. The store is open Monday – Friday from 8 A.M. to 4 P.M.; and on Sunday from 8 A.M. to 3 P.M. Mr. Mielke said they recently presented the 90 home in Montgomery in their Home Ownership Program. Contrary to what people think, these homes are not free. Habitat provides a 0% interest mortgage which allows the person to purchase the home, and they have about two pay-offs each year. The homes are newly constructed, or rehabilitated. They need financial, physical, at-store, and administration volunteers. Topic: History and Black History Month

Guests: Richard Bailey, PhD, Historian

Dr. Bailey made his annual trip to our show today to once again talk about Alabama's History, Black History, Montgomery's History, and History in general. He said it is very important that everyone should know *his* own *story*, since what happened in the past affects everyone in one way or another. He said that the State, and Montgomery in particular has played a very important part in World History. Birmingham, and Selma as well are steep in movements that made life better for those living in those areas. If Montgomery is mentioned anywhere outside of the south, people immediately connects it to the Civil Right Movement, that got its start here, or the Civil War. It's disappointing to him that today's youth don't know as much about their state, and their history as they should. He said that one way to make it interesting to them is to talk about it, and to be honest about the roles everyone, each race, had in it. He talked about the new EJI Museum and the Lynching Memorial that has brought thousands to the city since it's opening last year. It has also caused an interest in other Civil Rights museums and areas in the City. Dr. Bailey gave an overview of the History of Dexter Avenue, and said that each street in downtown Montgomery have a wealth of history/information behind it. He will tell us more the next time he comes on.

Topic: Academy Awards – Oscars Sunday

Guest: Toneya "Tommie" Steward, PhD, Dean, College of Visual and Performing Arts, Alabama State University

When it comes to movies, Dr. Steward walks the walk, and talks the talk. She is a college professor as well as an actress. She starred in a television series, and several movies including "A Time To Kill" with Samuel L. Jackson and Matthew McConaughey in "A Time To Kill". She has acting camps each summer at Alabama State University - Theater Artist Performing School "TAPS" where several of her students have gone on to appear in television and the entertainment business. Dr. Steward talked about tonight's Awards programs, and gave her view on each of the nominated pictures and spoke about the actors and the roles they played. She talked about Alabamians, and those from Montgomery that are up for nominations. She is one of the actors that gets to vote for the winners, and she takes it very seriously. She wished Octavia Spencer and Mr. Brown good luck and wants the best for them because they are local, but otherwise wouldn't say who she voted for. She also told the viewers what they need to do, and how to go about getting into the movies. She also told Tim about many of her former students, what they are doing now, and how she feels when they come back to visit her.

Topic: The Middle East

Guest: Mr. Lewis Ware, Retired Professor, Historian

Mr. Ware said that he started off in European History but moved into Middle East History in 1966. He is a Historian and doesn't think military personnel have a proper understanding of the Middle East. To the military, nothing is safe, and they have learned a lot more about the instruments of power, but when you have a hammer everything looks like a nail. He and Tim discussed 911, and said Saudi Arabia have to accept their share of the blame for creating political Islam today as well as terrorism. Mr. Ware thinks they have a great deal to do with the problems in the broad perspective that caused 911. Saudi wasn't called a country after the 1930s when it entered the International World as a Nation State. They discussed sanctions, and whether they work. Sanctions and the military force work to a certain extent when applied together and in the right degree and they are interconnected. Diplomacy, economy, information, military pressure, and military coercion are tools (like sanctions) that are used to get the upper hand; and are an advantage during conflicts. Mr. Ware said we have to have a military presence in certain countries to help our allies maintain stability against their internal enemies and sometimes ours as well. They talked about military efforts made in the Middle East today, and said the Middle East is interconnected with our International and domestic policies for many reasons. Two of them are (1) the creation of the State of Israel, and (2) the resources that are represented by oil. It's part of our life blood and we can't withdraw from it, even though it's an option, and we cannot do 'nothing' about it even though doing nothing could be a strategic option. We are just a part of it and it doesn't seem to be any way around it. The U.S. was strongly involved in creating a Zionist State in the Middle East. Mr. Ware gave his thoughts on the Trump Administration being friends with former enemies, and making enemies of former friends. Mr. Ware said there is no real policy in the Middle East. They also discussed China, an economic powerhouse that is spreading their physical presence in the South China Sea. China, he said, is our greatest competitor for economic power.

Topic: National Kidney Month

**Guest: Shannon Morrell, Regional Director, Middle Alabama Area,
Alabama Kidney Foundation**

Ms. Morrell was today's only guest and told the viewers some very important facts about her organization. She said that they have four other Regional offices including the State office. Kidney disease is a real problem in Alabama, and we rank #1 per population, and 5th overall in the United States. It is the 9th leading cause of death in Alabama; Approximately 400,000 Alabamians have chronic kidney disease; and approximately 12,000 are on dialysis. The Alabama Kidney Foundation's Annual Walk is coming up, and they raise money to help kidney patients who fall within certain income guidelines with daily living needs (example: utility bills, medicines) and also transportation cost reimbursement as well as reimbursement with family and friends who take them to their treatment. They have great education programs and provide a Christmas gift to over 12,000 dialysis patients across the state with their Christmas Program "Kidney Klaus". A patient has to have dialysis three times each week for at least three hours per treatment. Once a patient has reached chronic kidney failure, their body's only hope for survival is dialysis, unless they receive a kidney transplant. Ms. Morrell said that patients in rural areas tend to have a harder time with treatments than those who live in the city or urban areas. She listed several symptoms of kidney disease, as well as several causes. Like most things, she said that diet plays a very important role in preventing the disease. Tim asked about dialysis at home, and if Kidney patients are able to hold down a full time job. Ms. Morrell said at-home dialysis is possible but she hasn't met anyone who does this yet, and working full time is possible, and many do, but she imagines it can be very stressful. She also discussed donors, and the impact surgery has on the donor's body. She will come back on to promote their fundraising walk. She gave contact information for anyone who needs more information or wants to contact her.

Not only does donation impact the recipients, it impacts their family, friends, colleagues, etc. Donation can provide hope to donor families that their loved one has left a legacy.
