Second Harvest Food bank is currently operating the annual "Harvest for Hunger" campaign. Becky Miller discusses hunger statistics from the local food bank and outlines a variety of events that are underway for generating food and monetary donations. In 2013 the food bank received 743,433 requests for emergency food assistance and 1 in 4 children in the Mahoning Valley struggles with hunger.

2014 Food Bank Stats

Each week, the Food Bank fills more than 15,000 requests for emergency food assistance through our member agencies in Columbiana, Mahoning and Trumbull counties.

1 in 4 children in the Mahoning Valley struggles with hunger.

In 2013, 19% of the people who received food assistance were seniors.

53% of the students in the Mahoning Valley are eligible for free and reduced-price meal programs.

In 2013, the Food Bank distributed 9.2 million pounds of food in the tri-county area.

In 2013, the Food Bank distributed over 2 million pounds of fresh fruits and vegetables.

The Food Bank is a volunteer-dependent organization, and last year volunteers gave more than 13,000 hours of their time.

There were 796,433 requests for emergency food assistance in 2013.

1 in 6 people in the Mahoning Valley faces hunger.

89,000 people in the Mahoning Valley may not know where their next meal comes from.

One-third of the people receiving food assistance are children.

Every month, 40% of the households receiving food assistance must choose between paying for food and paying for utilities.

Every month, 35% of the households receiving food assistance must choose between paying for food and paying for medicine and medical care.

Every month, 37% of the households receiving food assistance must choose between paying for food and paying for transportation or gas for the car.



November is National Adoption Month. Northeast Ohio Adoption Services (NOAS) is a private adoption agency that helps bring children and families together. NOAS services 12-15 counties in Ohio but can reach out to others based on the needs of their children/clients. Cynthia Wallace is the Wendy's Wonderful Kids Recruiter & Family Recruitment and Training Specialist. She walked our audience through the process of foster/adoption and discussed the vetting and training of adoptive families. Cheryl Tarantino is the Executive Director for NOAS and discussed is funding & the NOAS mission to keep sibling children together as a family whenever possible.

Debunking the myths: Facts about foster care adoption

MYTH: There are not enough loving families available who want to adopt children from foster care.

FACT: A national survey commissioned by the Dave Thomas Foundation for Adoption and conducted by Harris Interactive in 2012 reveals that one in five American adults have considered adoption, and of those, 72 percent, or roughly 47 million Americans have considered adoption from foster care – more so than any other form of adoption, including private adoption of an infant or international adoption.

The research indicates that there are many families interested in foster care adoption but that more needs to be done to find ways to connect these families with waiting children. Through National Adoption Day, the Coalition puts a national spotlight on more than 100,000 waiting children in foster care in the hope that more people will take steps to adopt.

MYTH: There's too much red tape and bureaucracy involved in adopting a child from foster care.


FACT: Congress has streamlined the foster care adoption process through enactment of the Adoption and Safe Families Act of 1997. This law stipulates that children in foster care, who cannot be reunited with their birth parents, are freed for adoption and placed with permanent families as quickly as possible.

MYTH: Adopting a child from foster care is expensive.

FACT: Actually, adopting children from foster care can be virtually free. Many agencies do not charge for the services they provide to families who are adopting a child from foster care. In addition, a growing number of companies and government agencies offer adoption assistance as part of their employee benefits packages, including time off for maternity/paternity leave, financial incentives, and other benefits. Congress has also made federal tax credits available for foster care adoptions to help offset required fees, court costs, and legal and travel expenses. In 2014, the maximum federal tax credit for qualifying expenses is \$13,190. These types of benefits enable more families to adopt children from foster care into their homes.

MYTH: Adoptive parents must be a modern version of Ozzie and Harriet.

FACT: Prospective adoptive parents do not have to be rich, married, own a home, or be of a certain race or age to become an adoptive parent (Nearly one-third of adoptions from foster care are by single parents). In fact, families are as diverse as the children who are available for adoption. Patience, a good sense of humor, a love of children and the commitment to be a good parent are the most important characteristics.



Foster care adoption: Facts & figures

Every year, more than 100,000 children in foster care are available for adoption. Many spend more than five years waiting for permanent, loving homes. Between 2000 and 2013, nearly 50,000 children were joined together with their forever families as part of National Adoption Day activities.

Who are these waiting children?

- There are an estimated 402,378 children in foster care in the United States, and more than 100,000 of them are waiting to be adopted.
- Through no fault of their own, these children enter foster care as a result of abuse, neglect and/or abandonment.
- The average child waits for an adoptive family for nearly four years.
- 13 percent spend 5 years or more waiting for a family (13,217 children).
- The average age of children waiting for an adoptive family is 8 years old.

What happens to them?

- 50,608 children are adopted from foster care.
- More than 22,000 children reach the age of 18 without ever finding a forever family.

Who adopts from foster care?

- Children in foster care are adopted by three types of families: former foster parents (58 percent), relatives (31 percent) and non-relatives (26 percent) [note: data missing prior relationship 5%].
- Of the families who adopt children from foster care, 67 percent are married couples, 27 percent are single females, 3 percent are single males, and 3 percent are unmarried couples.
- A national survey in 2013 revealed that 47 million Americans have considered adoption from foster care – more so than any other form of adoption, including private adoption of an infant or international adoption. (National Foster Care Adoption Attitudes Survey, June 2013. Commissioned by the Dave Thomas Foundation for Adoption and conducted by Harris Interactive.)

Keynote Speaker Mr. Bryan Adams



Bryan's mental health story began in Tikrit, Iraq in 2008 when he was shot during an ambush while on patrol. Bryan came back to the U.S. to pursue his college degree as a recipient of a Purple Heart, but nothing could prepare him for how rough the transition would be to campus life and the workforce and his struggles with post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD). Today, Bryan shares his moving story of trauma, stigma, and alcohol abuse to active military, veterans, and civilians alike to reinforce the importance of seeking help. A tireless advocate for veterans rights, Bryan seeks to empower others, and when they cannot speak up for themselves, he hopes that by sharing his story he can speak up for them.

Bryan graduated from Rutgers University with a bachelor's degree in marketing and an impressive résumé of work with Active Minds, Iraq and Afghanistan Veterans of America (IAVA), and Student Veterans of America (SVA). Bryan is currently the Veteran and Military Services Coordinator for the Rutgers University System.

Guest Speakers

Carolyn Givens: Oversees and is responsible for providing strategic leadership, financial development, building statewide alliances with legislative, policy and business leaders, as well as day to day operations of the foundation.

Prior to joining OSPF, Givens, was the Director of the Ohio Department of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services, where she served the cabinet level department in a number of leadership roles throughout her 16 years of public service.

Givens is a graduate of Ohio Dominican University and Harvard University's Program for Senior Executives in State and Local Government.

Thom Craig: Thom Craig is the Director of Mental Health Program for the Margaret Clark Morgan Foundation of Hudson, Ohio. The foundation has a primary purpose of supporting the mental health field, and secondary purpose of supporting education and arts fields. The Margaret Clark Morgan Foundation's mission is to improve the lives of people with serious mental illness by investing in innovative projects in Northeast Ohio having national transformational impact.

Mr. Craig received his bachelor's degree in psychology and philosophy from Borromeo College Seminary in Cleveland and holds a master's in public administration from the University of Akron. He works closely with mental health leaders and individuals with lived experience of mental illness to find ways to promote recovery and healing and empower systems to use impactful methods.

Tracy Plouck: Effective July 1, 2013, Tracy Plouck was appointed director of the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services (OhioMHAS) by Gov. John Kasich, after serving as his director of the Ohio Department of Mental Health (ODMH) since January 2011. She brings strong policy background to her role, having twice held the state Medicaid director position and also serving as a deputy director with the Ohio Department of Developmental Disabilities. Additionally, Plouck has significant fiscal experience from her eight years with the Ohio Office of Budget and Management, most recently as deputy director for budget.
