NEW ANIMAL WELFARE LEAGUE OPENS -Ribbon Cutting Set for June 6

VIENNA—A ribbon cutting ceremony has been set for Friday, June 6 at 11 a.m. for the unveiling of the new Animal Welfare League (AWL) complex at 812 Youngstown-Kingsville Rd. in Vienna. A grand opening for the adoption center, dog park and retail store is planned and will be open from noon to 6 p.m. that day for tours.

The building and grounds were purchased in 2012, with renovations taking place during 2013 and the first quarter of 2014. The new AWL facility is a comprehensive service facility enabling the AWL to meet the ever-growing needs of the animal population with a variety of pet-related programs and services promoting responsible pet ownership.

“This is a day we have waited for a long time,” said Jeff Williams, DVM, president of the board of directors for the AWL and president of Countryside Veterinary Services, Inc. “Our volunteers and the community have given us such great support not only monetarily, but also through their countless hours of volunteer work. This project would never have turned into a reality without everyone’s support.”

In partnership with the Trumbull County Community Foundation, the Animal Welfare League Board of Directors successfully conducted a \$5 million capital campaign to renovate and equip the new state-of-the-art center. The AWL is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization supported by private donations, memberships and other funding activities. Ongoing fund raising will continue to meet the day-to-day expenses of housing and caring for the animals.

In addition to the dog and puppy kennels, cat towers and cat colony rooms, space has been created for treatment, grooming, education and family pet bonding. The center also houses an indoor dog and puppy play yard and training center.

The AWL outdoor “Bark Park,” is an exciting and fun playground where an owner can spend time with their dog, giving them off leash areas to play and exercise in a controlled environment under the supervision of their owners. Access to the AWL Bark Park is by an annual membership supporting the AWL.

The retail area, the Marjorie Hartman “Have a Hart♥ Pet Store” is open to the public and is operated by volunteers with all proceeds benefiting the shelter’s daily operations and the vital programs of the AWL.

“Also a part of the new facility are the education programs that will help all pet owners strengthen the bond between them and their animals,” explained Kerry Pettit, executive director of the AWL. Pettit said that this will in turn help reduce the number of animals that are relinquished to shelters or abandoned, Puppy training, basic obedience and “Kid’s Kindness” classes will also be offered promoting responsible pet ownership.

Students of the two-year veterinary technician program through Kent State University have been utilizing the new facility since this past January. With the completion of the center, students now have hands-on experience and training, positioning them for jobs in the veterinary field.

Pettit Named AWL Executive Director

(Warren, OH)-Kerry S. Pettit was recently named executive director for the Animal Welfare League of Trumbull County (AWL), according to Board President Dr. Jeff Williams.

Pettit comes to the AWL with 24 years of experience working in the animal field. A native of the Mahoning Valley, Pettit most recently served as animal control operations supervisor for the City of Henderson Police Dept., Henderson, Nev., where she supervised its daily operations and was responsible for animal adoptions and redemptions. Prior to that, she served as an animal control officer within the same department.

"Kerry brings such great strengths to this position and the Animal Welfare League," said Williams. "Her background, knowledge and experience are invaluable as we enter into the next stage of opening the new shelter."

Previously, Pettit worked in various positions including an animal handler for Lion Photo Studios in Las Vegas, where she cared, fed and handled African lions and cubs. She formerly worked as a water quality diver/education narrator for Sea World of Ohio, maintaining marine mammal habitats and exhibits and assisted with the animal care and training staff. Pettit also was the animal trainer for Joel Slaven's Professional Animals in St. Cloud, Fla., where she trained domestic animals and performed in shows with them at both Sea World Ohio and Florida parks.

Pettit holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Youngstown State University and has completed the Nevada Peace Officers' Standards and Training (POST) first line supervisor program. She was instrumental in rewriting the City of Henderson, Nevada's municipal code, which addressed issues such as mandatory spay/neuter laws, defining shelter/housing needs for animals kept outdoors and permits required to run animal-related businesses. She has also received the "Distinguished Service Award" from the Henderson Police Dept.

In addition, Pettit served as a committee member tasked to develop the Clark's County Southern Nevada Region's emergency disaster plan in compliance with the Federal PETS Act. As one of the first areas in the U.S. to develop such a plan, it now serves as an example for other cities.

"I'm so excited about being a part of the new shelter," Pettit said. "My priorities are to let the public know about what we offer at the shelter, update our policies and procedures,

and provide the best care for our animals, while educating the public about their care. I also would like to start a 'Bite Prevention' program. I look forward to working with other rescue groups as it is a "win-win" proposition in building better relationships."
