APRIL 2, 2017 -- Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-Ky.) told "Meet the Press" moderator Chuck Todd that "in the middle of all these other things that are swirling around, there are two things you can depend on: the Senate Intelligence Committee's bipartisan investigation, and of course, the FBI conducting a criminal investigation" -- notably not listing the House Intelligence Committee's investigation which is currently under scrutiny.

"You asked me if I knew anything about alleged wiretapping by the previous president. The answer is no," he added.

Ahead of this week's Senate confirmation of Supreme Court nominee Neil Gorsuch, McConnell said that "Neil Gorsuch will be confirmed this week. How that happens really depends on our Democratic friends, how many of them are willing to oppose cloture on a partisan basis to kill a Supreme Court nominee, never happened before in history, the whole history of the country." Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-N.Y.) exclusively told Todd that "Gorsuch will not reach the 60-vote margin ... Instead of changing the rules, which is up to Mitch McConnell and the Republican majority, why doesn't President Trump, Democrats, and Republicans in the Senate, sit down, and try to come up with a mainstream nominee?" <u>Watch the full interview.</u>

Former FBI agent Clint Watts, now a Robert A. Fox Fellow at the Foreign Policy Research Institute, also joined the show after testifying on Capitol Hill earlier this week about Russian information operations. Watts expanded on the use of Russian propaganda by the Trump campaign: "The synchronization at times, how many times the campaign picked up on lines that were promoted by the Kremlin, or vice versa, created lines that were then the Kremlin promoted back into the U.S. base, was ironic. It was hard to see that with any other campaign."

On if Trump was targeted by the Russians to help spread fake news, Watts said: "They just knew that he was opportunistic during his campaign. So if you put stuff that helps his campaign,

he will likely use it ... But they also pushed for Bernie Sanders at times too. They would go on the left and the right. It's bipartisan." Watch the full interview.

APRIL 9, 2017 -- In an exclusive "Meet the Press" interview this morning, **Sen. Lindsey Graham** (R-S.C.) called on President Trump for action: "Go after Russia through sanctions not only for interfering in our elections, but aiding and abetting the use of chemical weapons by a war criminal, Assad."

"Here's what I think Assad's telling Trump by flying from this base: 'F you,'" said Graham in reference to Syria jets taking off from the base hit by the U.S. airstrike.

The senator also responded to moderator Chuck Todd's interview with **Nikki Haley, U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations,** noting that "regime change is now the policy of the Trump administration." Haley had addressed the administration's "multiple priorities" in Syria: "It's to defeat ISIS. I mean, we've got to do that for peace and stability in the area. It's also to get out the Iranian influence." Watch Graham's full interview.

"You are going to see is pressure on the political solution. That's really what's going to happen," the ambassador said. Watch Haley's full interview.

"I agree with Ambassador Haley that I don't think there's any political solution to the civil war in Syria that doesn't mean that Assad moves aside because he's tearing up the country. But instead of regime change, what we should focus on is humanitarian relief," responded **Senator Tim Kaine (D-Va.)**, who exclusively joined the program.

Kaine told Todd that, in the Senate briefing on Friday, the White House "still presented us with no plan. We don't know if it's limited or whether there's more. And when we asked about the legal authorization, they said they weren't prepared to discuss that." Watch Kaine's full interview.

Sen. Bernie Sanders (I-Vt.) suggested that you encourage Russia to work together by <u>making</u> <u>"them an offer they can't refuse.</u> And that means tightening the screws on them, dealing with sanctions, telling them that we need their help, they have got to come to the table and not maintain this horrific dictator." <u>Watch Sanders' full interview.</u>

APRIL 16, 2017 -- In an exclusive live interview this morning, Sen. John McCain (R-Ariz.), chair of the Senate Armed Services Committee, told "Meet the Press" moderator Chuck Todd that "China is the key" to working with us on North Korea: "They can stop this if they want to because of their control over the North Korean economy ... Whether they're currency manipulators or not, we should expect them to act to prevent what could be a cataclysmic event."

"This may be the first test of this presidency," the senator added. Watch the full exclusive interview with the Arizona senator.

"As Senator McCain indicated, China is key to that strategy," echoed **Sen. Jack Reed (D-R.I.)**, **ranking member of the Senate Armed Services Committee.** President Trump is "getting good military advice from General Mattis and General McMaster, but he needs a much stronger State Department." Also joining the broadcast exclusively was **Gen. John Kelly (Ret.), U.S. Secretary of Homeland Security,** who told Todd that, in response to a threat from North Korea, "We would raise various threat levels in the event that something happened, and we felt as though that there was a possible threat. You always want to come down on the side of caution."

Kelly offered an example of someone who wasn't deported in previous administrations that is being deported now: "Someone, as an example, with multiple DUIs. Even a single DUI, depending on other aspects, would get you into the system." He also called on Congress to fix the country's immigration laws: "We have to straighten this out, and I place that squarely on the United States Congress." APRIL 23, 2017 -- In the face of a potential government shutdown this week, **Reince Priebus**, **chief of staff to President Trump**, exclusively told "Meet the Press" moderator Chuck Todd: "I believe it will" stay open.

On the continuing resolution for government funding, Priebus said that the money for border security will be enough "to move forward with either the construction or the planning, or

enough for us to move forward through the end of September, to get going on the border wall and border security in regard to border patrol."

"We expect money for border security in this bill. And it ought to be," he added.

Priebus said he "would like to have a vote this week" on healthcare, " but again, it's not something that has to happen in order to define our success." Watch the full interview.

House Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi (D-Calif.) also exclusively joined the network's broadcast, telling Todd that, when it comes to the potential government shutdown, "the burden to keep it open is on the Republicans."

On the proposed border wall, Pelosi asserted that it is "expressing a sign of weakness" for the president; she also said that "of course" you can be a Democrat if you're pro-life. Watch the full interview.

Sen. Marco Rubio (R-Fla.) addressed recent reporting that he had been involved in arranging a visit between Trump and two former Colombian presidents at Mar-a-Lago, denying any role whatsoever and telling Todd: "I didn't even know they were in Florida." Watch the full interview.

"The only way to meet obligations that we face in deficits today, or long term obligations in our entitlements, Chuck, is through growth," he said. "If we don't get this economy growing at three percent, or more as the President believes we can, we're never gonna meet the obligations that we've made today."

The vice president also addressed his party's promise to repeal and replace the Affordable Care Act, telling Todd it will be done "through a series of bills -- this first one that we're hopeful there'll be action in the House of Representatives soon -- and through executive action and through further legislation." The timeline? "I hope before the end of the year." Watch the full interview.

Maine Senators Susan Collins (R) and Angus King (I) – two senators from across the aisle -- exclusively joined the network broadcast this morning on set to discuss bipartisanship in Congress. Obstacles in finding common ground include "the rise of ideological-driven groups on both the left and the right," "the divisions in our country," and "the Senate schedule," said the senators. MAY 7, 2017 -- In an interview on this morning's "Meet the Press," Health and Human Services Sec. Tom Price defended criticism that the health care bill passed by the House this week does not cover Americans with pre-existing conditions, telling NBC News' Andrea Mitchell that the 22 organizations disputing this are "not recognizing is that this is a different, and we believe, a

better way to cover an individual with pre-existing illnesses and injuries because it allows for every single person to get the access to the kind of coverage that they want."

<u>Price also addressed</u> the lack of diversity and women in Thursday's Rose Garden celebration, telling Mitchell that those present were "prominent individuals who are leading in this area of health care."

When asked about the elimination of the White House Office of Drug Control in a time of an opioid epidemic, <u>Price responded</u>: "Now whether it's through an office within the White House or whether it's through a department, an agency of government, I don't think the American people care. What they care about is that we are absolutely addressing this opioid crisis in the most aggressive and effective manner possible." Watch the full interview.

Sen. Roy Blunt (R-Mo.) exclusively joined the network broadcast, telling Mitchell that the House health care bill is "not dead on arrival," but that the Senate will be "taking what the House was able to do, looking at that carefully and come up with what the Senate thinks the Senate can do."

<u>Blunt also addressed Russian interference in the election</u> ahead of former top Justice official Sally Yates' testimony tomorrow: "What was particularly wrong was General Flynn not being truthful about the substance of what he said and the campaign was apparently, or the transition rather, was apparently concerned about that early on, and it appears they should have been." <u>Watch the full interview</u>.

Sen. Dianne Feinstein (D-Calif.) exclusively reacted to the House bill coming to the Senate: "I don't know what the leader, McConnell, has in mind. I don't know that the thirteen white men, when you have five Republican women who are excluded from that, that these thirteen men are supposed to sit down and put something together."

MAY 14, 2017 – Sen. Lindsey Graham (R-S.C.) exclusively told "Meet the Press" moderator Chuck Todd this morning that the president's choice for the next F.B.I. director should not be an elected official: "He has a duty and obligation to pick somebody beyond reproach outside the political lane."

"It's now time to pick someone who comes from within the ranks or has such a reputation that has no political background at all that can go into the job on day one," said Graham when asked about his colleague Sen. John Cornyn's interview yesterday for the role.

Sen. Graham also said "the president needs to back off here and let the investigation go forward" when it comes to looking into Russia's interference in the U.S. election. Watch the full interview.

Senate Minority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-N.Y.) told Todd the support for a new F.B.I. director is "very much related" to a special prosecutor for the Russia probe: "If you have an independent special prosecutor, then you really have the ability to get to the bottom of this, so it matters in terms of who the F.B.I. director is." "I don't think there's any question that the Russians were playing around in our electoral processes," **Secretary of State Rex Tillerson** exclusively confirmed to Todd. When asked about this in terms of our relationship with Russia, Tillerson said: "We're not trying to start with a clean slate. I think terms like having a reset are overused. You cannot reset. The secretary also addressed recent reporting that President Trump's son-in-law, White House Senior Adviser Jared Kushner, proposed a secret communication channel with the Kremlin so that discussions before the inauguration could not be detected: "His number one interest, really, is the nation, so you know there's a lot of different ways to communicate, backchannel, publicly with other countries. James Clapper, former director of national intelligence, exclusively told Todd, that as director, when it came to Trump ties with Russia, his <u>"dashboard warning light was clearly on."</u> "I think that was the case with all of us in the intelligence community, very concerned about the nature of these approaches to the Russians," he said.

Clapper reacted to Kelly characterizing the leaking of information as "borderline treason": "I know Secretary Kelly takes this quite seriously and he should. Legal definition of what's treason? I'll leave that to the lawyers. But just from a practitioner's standpoint in the intelligence business, leaks are bad." Watch the full interview.

Sen. Bob Corker (R-Tenn.), chair of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, also responded to recent reporting of Kushner, who is under scrutiny related to the Russia investigations, though not a subject of the investigations: "Jared has said that he's more than willing to answer any and all questions. He added: The "travel ban will be cannon fodder to the recruiters. It's the worst thing we could do. But we do need to do and we do extraordinary screening." Watch the full interview.
