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Issues/Program Lists for First Quarter of 2023

"Our Faith, Our Diocese" is a regularly scheduled half-hour program that follows a news magazine style format. It includes interviews, coverage of events and ministries, previews of upcoming activities, current issues, and other segments, including how the Catholic Church serves the community through programs that provide assistance to the needy; addresses social issues such as COVID-19, the Pandemic, hunger, homelessness, poverty, addictions, immigration and refugee resettlement, and family challenges. We strive to educate and inform people of all ages and offer spiritual sustenance to the residents of northeastern and north central Pennsylvania. Each program debuts the second week of every month, as is possible, and then airs at additional times during the next few weeks, at various times during the daytime and evening hours. It is also available for viewing on the Diocesan website, www.dioceseofscranton.org.

Due to COVID19, this program has been altered. The length has been changed from one hour to a half hour, but new episodes are now approximately every two weeks instead of every month. We will resume

regular production of Our Faith, Our Diocese once the circumstances allow our crew to go on location and invite guests to safely come into our facilities once again.

The first quarter of 2023 has been easier to do local video productions with regards to the safety and protection of everyone in our area with respect to the COVID19 pandemic and its varying effects on people as regards attending social functions and going to Mass in churches throughout the area, but things are currently improving and we are now more able to have contact with individuals in the community, and to show how their efforts on behalf of the marginalized is having a positive impact on those in most need.

Additionally, the messages regarding our local issues have been brought out and discussed within the context of our Daily Mass broadcasts within the homilies from our priests and our bishop. We also have a very small staff and have lost the ability to do as many programs as we have been doing for years. One of our videographers, which is one fourth of our regular staff, retired, but has now been replaced, with a part time videographer, which is allowing us to resume a more robust schedule of local productions. With this in mind we were able to broadcast the following local productions the first quarter of 2023.

Our local productions include the broadcast of The Daily Mass from Saint Peter's Cathedral in Scranton, PA, which airs every Monday through Friday, live at 12:10pm and airs again at 3:30pm and 7:00 pm. We also broadcast the Sunday Vigil Mass on Saturdays at 4:00 pm, and on Sundays at 10:00 am.

CTV also broadcasts additional Pontifical Masses and Interfaith and Ecumenical services that include members and leaders of other local denominations.

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Local origination programming 2023 Q 1

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On January 4, 2023, more than 100 people attended the Diocesan <u>Memorial Mass</u> <u>for the Eternal Repose of Pope Benedict XVI</u>. The Most Rev. Joseph C. Bambera, Bishop of Scranton, served as principal celebrant and homilist of the Mass. "It's humbling for me to lead this liturgy, knowing that it was Pope Benedict who appointed

me to serve this local church some 13 years ago," Bishop Bambera said in welcoming the faithful to the Cathedral. In beginning the Memorial Mass, the bishop said he had "gratitude for his life, his ministry and for his contribution to the Church and most especially for his service and his selfless love." Bishop Bambera began his homily by quoting Pope Benedict's first encyclical, Deus Caritas Est. The letter was released eight months following the pope's election and set the tone of his pontificate. "Being Christian is not the result of an ethical choice or a lofty idea, but the encounter with an event, a person, which gives life a new horizon and a decisive direction," the bishop quoted. "It is quite fair to say that the essence of Pope Benedict is discovered elsewhere in those simple words ... words rooted in the love and compassion of the God to whom he entrusted his entire being," Bishop Bambera said. This Memorial Mass was carried live on CTV and rebroadcast twice later that day.

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Faithful throughout the Diocese of Scranton joined with members of various Christian congregations of northeastern Pennsylvania for an Ecumenical Celebration of the Word of God on Thursday, Jan. 19, at 12:10 p.m. in the Cathedral of Saint Peter. The event highlights the annual Week of Prayer for Christian Unity — celebrated each January since its inception in 1908 — which was observed this year during Jan. 18-25. The theme for the 2023 celebration is: "Do Good; Seek Justice." (Isaiah 1:17) Most Rev. Joseph C. Bambera, Bishop of Scranton, will serve as leader of prayer for the traditional ecumenical prayer service. Past chairman of the U.S. Bishops' Committee on Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs, Bishop Bambera was elected to reprise the role during the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops fall general assembly when he was voted chairman-elect of the interfaith arm of the Bishops' Conference. Guest homilist for this year's prayer service is Protodeacon Sergei Kapral of the Orthodox Church in America. Well known for his involvement in ecumenical relations, Protodeacon Kapral attended the renowned Bossey Ecumenical Institute in Switzerland and holds membershi p in numerous organizations promoting ecumenism and concern for the environment. The prayer service was broadcast live at 12:10 p.m. on CTV: Catholic Television of the Diocese of Scranton. It was also be made available on the Scranton Diocese website and across all diocesan social media platforms.

According to Monsignor Vince Grimalia, Diocesan Coordinator for Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs, the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity provides not only an opportunity for prayer for Christianity, but a time to learn more about various Christian churches and communities while offering motivation and commitment for participation in ecumenical activities. "It is an opportunity to renew and re-energize our commitment to Christian unity," Monsignor Grimalia said. "In a world with so much disunity, there is a need to overcome divisions and polarization and work to get nations and various ethnic, cultural and language groups to work together." In accord with such strong beliefs for religious unity, the United Nations since 2010 has celebrated the first week of February as "World Interfaith Harmony Week." During the annual observance, an "International Day of Human Fraternity" has been designated by the U.N. for Feb. 4 to promote harmony between all peoples, regardless of their religious affiliation.

Just hours before the annual March for Life took place in Washington, D.C., the faithful of the Diocese of Scranton joined together for a *Mass for Life* at 7 p.m. on Thursday, Jan. 19, 2023, at the Cathedral of Saint Peter in Scranton. The Most Reverend Joseph C. Bambera, Bishop of Scranton, served as principal celebrant and homilist at the Mass, which was being celebrated for a greater respect of all human life, from conception to natural death, and every moment in between. People attending the Vigil Mass for Life are encouraged to bring a new pack of diapers to be donated to either Saint Joseph's Center Baby and Children's Pantry or Shepherd's Maternity House, a facility in East Stroudsburg run by Catholic Social Services that provides educational, emotional and material support to expectant mothers.

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The Most Reverend Joseph C. Bambera, Bishop of Scranton, will celebrate <u>Mass for</u> <u>the 31st World Day of the Sick</u> on Friday, Feb. 10, 2023, at 12:10 p.m. at the Cathedral of Saint Peter in Scranton. The commemoration of the World Day of the Sick not only provides an opportunity to devote special attention to those who are ill, but is also a celebration of God's works of mercy, especially through those who work tirelessly

in the healthcare field. In his message for the World Day of the Sick in 2022, Pope Francis said caring for the sick means not only healing the wounds of the body but also those that afflict the soul.

The World Day of the Sick Mass at the Cathedral of Saint Peter will feature the Liturgy of the Anointing. Any infirmed person who wishes to receive the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick will be invited to approach the bishop/priest with their hands open and palms facing up. The bishop/ priest will anoint both the forehead and hands of the sick person. CTV: Catholic Television of the Diocese of Scranton will provide a live broadcast of the Mass, with encores at 3:30pm and 7pm. 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With just five days left in the anti-hunger cook-off and fundraising marathon known as Rectory, Set, Cook! the 2023 fundraising total was hovering around \$150,000 at press time, with the goal of surpassing last year's total raised – \$171,000 – well within reach. This year's all-digital event showcases 24 teams consisting of at least one – but up to five – collared chefs from across the Diocese cooking (or attempting to cook) a specially selected dish or dishes on video. Each \$10 donation for a video represents one vote for the participating pastor chef or chefs. Each pastor chef has been working hard to get out the votes primarily *for the purpose of fighting local hunger*, given all sponsorship dollars and 50 percent of voting dollars raised will benefit Catholic Social Services' <u>antihunger efforts</u>. The other half of voting dollars raised will stay with the pastor chef's or chefs' parish and can be designated toward a priority project or a charitable cause of the pastor chef's choice. Event director Sandra Snyder of the Diocese of Scranton's Development Office is thrilled with the results so far and notes that there has not been a day without donations since the event launched on Jan. 10. Donations have come in at all hours of the day, every day, with the vast majority of gifts from in state but also – so far – representing 27 states. Bambera**, Bishop of Scranton, to commemorate the diocesan phase of the National Eucharistic Revival. These gatherings will take place in each of the twelve deaneries of the Diocese of Scranton so there is a Holy Hour in your community in which you can join the bishop in praying for a renewal of our devotion to Jesus Christ present in the Eucharist! The goal of the National Eucharistic Revival is to renew the Church by enkindling a living relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist. This Lent, join Bishop Bambera for a Holy Hour in your community. A Holy Hour is a period of time (usually around an hour) spent in prayer before our Lord Jesus Christ present to us sacramentally in the Eucharist. This involves silent personal prayer, meditation, readings from Sacred Scripture, hymns, spoken prayers and litanies, and can even involve popular devotions such as recitation of the Rosary or the Divine Mercy Chaplet. As Catholic Christians, there are many different ways to pray, and a Holy Hour is a great time to be in the very presence of Jesus and to pray in whatever manner is most fruitful for our spirituality. CTV will broadcast the Eucharistic Holy Hour from St. Rose of Lima Church, Carbondale, on Thursday, February 23, at 7:00 pm.

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During Lent, the Cathedral of Saint Peter offers several ways in which the faithful can deepen their relationship with Jesus and come to know Him in a more intimate way. CTV: Catholic Television of the Diocese of Scranton will make many of these opportunities available to the faithful through television broadcasts and livestream opportunities. Every Sunday during Lent, the Cathedral will be hosting *Lenten Evening Prayer* at 6 p.m. Evening Prayer is part of the Liturgy of the Hours, also known as the Divine Office. In the Liturgy of the Hours, the Church fulfills Jesus' command to "pray always." During Lent, CTV plans to broadcast both the Sunday 5 p.m. Mass live as well as the Sunday Evening Prayer that will begin directly thereafter. 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Every Friday during Lent, <u>the Stations of the Cross</u> are prayed following the 12:10 p.m. Mass at the Cathedral. Catholic Television will broadcast the Stations of the Cross each week live with rebroadcasts following the rebroadcast of the Daily Mass at 3:30 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. Accompany our Lord to Calvary and meditate on His suffering. The Rite of Election and the Call to Continuing Conversion is when candidates and catechumens participating in RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) publicly declare their intention to fully enter the Church. CTV: Catholic Television will broadcast the celebration live on the First Sunday of Lent, Feb. 26, at 2:30 p.m.

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Scranton Cathedral to host **Saint Patrick's Parade Day Mass** March 11.

The annual Saint Patrick's Parade Day Mass will be celebrated at 10 a.m. on Saturday, March 11, 2023, at the Cathedral of Saint Peter in Scranton. All are welcome to attend. The liturgy is traditionally held in conjunction with the city of Scranton's annual Saint Patrick's Day Parade. Following the Mass, the Saint Patrick's Parade is expected to take to the streets of the Electric City beginning at 11:45 a.m. The Most Rev. Joseph C. Bambera, Bishop of Scranton, will be the principal celebrant for the Mass. The Mass will

be broadcast live on CTV: Catholic Television of the Diocese of Scranton through the generosity and sponsorship of the Society of Irish Women, with encores on March 14 at 8 pm, and on March 15 at 10:30 am. A livestream of the Parade Day Mass will also be available on the Diocese of Scranton website, YouTube channel and across all Diocesan social media platforms.

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With big smiles on their faces, three men from the community programs of Saint Joseph's Center eagerly handed out programs as people arrived at the Cathedral of Saint Peter for the Diocese of Scranton's annual *Mass for Persons with Disabilities on* **Feb. 12,** 2023, at 10 am, with encores on Feb 14 at 8pm and Feb 15 at 10:30 am. The trio of hospitality ministers – Joe, John and Matt – jumped at the chance to be involved in the special Mass that recognizes and celebrates the gifts that every person contributes to the life of the Church. "They're here. They want to be here. They are so excited about getting out and experiencing this with the Church," Sister Sandy Grieco, I.H.M., Pastoral Care Coordinator with Saint Joseph's Center, said. For the last several years, many residents of Saint Joseph's Center have been unable to attend the Mass for Persons with Disabilities in-person because of health concerns. "They pray together and want to be together. They have a spirit that nobody else has," Sister Sandy added. "They have a goodness in their heart. They may not understand every word but they know the spirit. There is an unconditional love amongst them all." The Most Rev. Joseph C. Bambera, Bishop of Scranton, served as principal celebrant and homilist for the Mass that was attended by more than 200 people. During his homily, the bishop reflected on his trip last year to Ghana, emphasizing how those with disabilities were warmly included in huge outdoor community celebrations of faith.

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After going to church regularly for more than 20 years, Jerry Garner of Lenox Township is now consciously making a decision to join the Catholic faith. "I think it's time right now for me to join the church," he explained. "There has always been an open invitation. I just think it was the right time, the right calling." Like thousands of other catechumens, Garner will receive the Sacraments of Initiation — Baptism, Confirmation and the Holy Communion — during the *Easter Vigil* April 8 at Saint Patrick Parish in Nicholson. He has been participating in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, or RCIA, and feels fully prepared for the faith journey ahead. "I have been able to get more in touch with Jesus and God and really focus," he explained. "The process has been terrific. I'm learning a lot more about the church than what I previously knew and it's been a spiritual journey for me to go through this." Clifford Pinner, who will serve as Garner's godparent, believes there has also been some divine intervention. "I have three sisters who have been saying novenas for years. The ladies of our parish, after Mass, will also always say to him, 'When are you going to do it, When are you going to do it," Pinner joked

Garner is one of 162 people from parishes around the Diocese of Scranton who participated in the *Rite of Election and Call to Continuing Conversion at the Cathedral of Saint Peter in Scranton on Feb. 26, 2023,* the First Sunday in Lent, airing live on CTV at 2:30pm, and encores on Feb. 28 at 8 pm and Feb 29 at 10:30 am.

During the Rite of Election, catechumens – supported by their sponsors, godparents, family members and parish ministers – freely proclaim their desire to receive the Sacraments of Initiation to Bishop Bambera. The individuals who have never been baptized record their names in the Book of the Elect. After the rite, the bishop signs the book as a witness to their faith. The Call to Continuing Conversion is similar for candidates – those who have been baptized in another Christian tradition and seek to enter into full communion with the Catholic Church this Easter. They also publicly profess their intention to receive Communion and confirmation. Cassandra Johnson of Saint Michael Parish in Canton is planning to receive Confirmation this Easter.

Hundreds of people have already taken the opportunity to grow closer to Jesus this Lent at a series of Holy Hours with the Most Reverend Joseph C. Bambera, Bishop of Scranton. As we approach the middle of Lent, nearly half of the 12 Holy Hours have already taken place in communities including Carbondale, Cresco, Montoursville, Towanda and Wilkes-Barre. At least six more Lenten Holy Hours will take place before Holy Week begins. The Lenten Holy Hours are being held to commemorate the diocesan phase of the National Eucharistic Revival, which has the goal of renewing the Church and enkindling a living relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ in the Holy Eucharist. Below is a roundup of some of the Holy Hours that have taken place so far: CARBONDALE The Lenten Holy Hours began in the Carbondale deanery on Thursday, Feb. 23, the day after Ash Wednesday, at Saint Rose of Lima Parish. "This Holy Hour is a great way to start, to begin, the first step, because every journey begins with the first step," Rev. Seth Wasnock, pastor of Saint Rose of Lima and Our Lady of Mount Carmel Parishes, said. "To have our Bishop here is just a wonderful experience," Bernadette Lepre, parishioner of Our Lady of Mount Carmel Parish, explained. Each Holy Hour begins with Solemn Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, followed by a period of silent, personal prayer. "I feel that a Holy Hour is a time for me to have a one-to-one talk with the Lord, to sit and just think of what he wants me to do," Joan Scavo, parishioner of Our Lady of Mount Carmel Parish, added. CRESCO The faithful of the Stroudsburg deanery gathered at Most Holy Trinity Parish in Cresco on Tuesday, Feb. 28. "Anytime the Sacrament is exposed, it is a time to be with Christ and be closer to Christ and it's especially important during Lent," Michael Ziobro, parishioner of Most Holy Trinity Parish, said. "During our Lenten journey, we're supposed to be spending more time in prayer and having more quiet time and getting ourselves together." Many feel the time is well spent. "It's a time of very quiet thought and prayer and this gives our community the opportunity to sit together with these solemn services and pray as we should during Lent," Midge Barron, parishioner of Most Holy Trinity Parish, added. "The silence of it brings us closer to Christ and I think that is what makes it for me." "When the whole deanery is represented and we have multiple congregations joining as one, I think it adds a heightened sense of community to the prayer," Cheryl Lynott, parishioner of

Most Holy Trinity Parish, explained. "It invigorates all of us and I think it's a special way to pay homage to the Lord." MONTOURSVILLE The faithful of Lycoming and Tioga counties joined together on Wednesday, March 8, at Our Lady of Lourdes Parish in Montoursville. "To be here with the Bishop tonight is just so special to me. I've never ever been here with a Bishop," Sharon O'Malley, parishioner of Our Lady of Lourdes Parish, said. As the faithful gazed upon the consecrated host on the altar — many said they prayed about the great mystery of God's love revealed to us in Christ. The Lenten Holy Hours began in the Carbondale deanery on Thursday, Feb. 23, the day after Ash Wednesday, at Saint Rose of Lima Parish. Live on CTV at 6:30 pm. "There are few Masses that take place in this Cathedral throughout the entire year that have this many people," the Most Rev. Joseph C. Bambera, Bishop of Scranton, said in welcoming the students during the first Mass. "It is a testimony to all of you." The honorees and their proud families filled
