State in High Level of Drought

Despite the rain, Oklahoma is in a serious drought right now. A time lapse image shows dry conditions spreading across the state. The image starts at March 31st and goes until June 30th. Statewide, this is the largest drought coverage Oklahoma has seen since August 2018.

Summer Storm Causes Power Outages

Powerful storms overnight left thousands of people in the dark this morning. More than 14,000 customers are waiting for the power to be restored. The Public Service Company of Oklahoma says most of the outages are due to downed trees that took out power lines. The intersection of Apache and Yale is currently a 4-way stop while the traffic signals are out. PSO says last night about 37,000 customers were without power, and now the number is down to about 13,000. The storms started pushing through shortly after 9pm on Saturday night, bringing heavy rain, lightning, and neighbors in Delaware county even reported seeing hail.

Pandemic Forces Cooling Centers to Close

Green Country is headed into its hottest stretch of the year this weekend, but unfortunately due to the ongoing pandemic, several public cooling stations have been forced to close for safety. EMSA is recommending folks check on their close family and friends, and to risk it and have people you are close with come over if they need to, so they don't get overheated. There are still two cooling centers open where people can get AC and water and just camp out for a while. One is at the John 3:16 Mission downtown, and the other is Tulsa county's Social Services Center. EMSA stresses not to hesitate to call 911 for help with heat injuries because you are concerned about being sent to a hospital with COVID patients.

Storm Damage in Mayes County

Strong wind and storms early this morning caused damage for some residents in Mayes county. No one was hurt, and although some things were destroyed, residents are in high spirits. A barn was ripped from its foundation and many trees were snapped in half. Resident Bessie Scheffel says she woke up this morning to the sound of the wind and the electricity was out. She says she was nervous their roof was going to come off, but luckily it stayed intact. Her barn suffered a worse fate and is unable to be fixed, and her trees were snapped, and flowers destroyed. Despite the damage, Scheffel didn't seem upset, saying they've seen many storms while living in this home near Pryor.

Rare Derecho Rips Midwest

Video taken by a business owner shows the terrifying moment that a derecho ripped through the Midwest earlier this month, bringing 100mph winds and flooding. Brendan McCormick, owner of McCormick Painting Services in Iowa was stuck inside his business when the storm struck. McCormick reported seeing a really dark cloud coming from the west and got a call from his friend in Des Moines that a storm was coming. Brendan said that's when he saw street signs bent over and trees bending in the wind, so he decided to stay put instead of trying to drive home. He took cover in the bathroom of the building, shooting video on his phone of his experience. You can see the roof shaking, the garage door cracking, and then a hole being punched in the roof. McCormick says a minute later, the entire roof was ripped off the building. The derecho caused a third of Iowa customers to lose power, and later hit downtown Chicago. The storm caused so much damage it even started fires.

Hurricane Laura Gains Strength

Hurricane Laura is gaining strength and causing mandatory evacuation orders for more than a half-million people along the gulf coast. Nic Hunter, mayor of Lake Charles, Louisiana says the storm surge could be worse than Rita. Residents in Lake Charles have already pulled their boats out of the docks to prepare for the surge. In Houston, evacuation boats and high-water resources are standing by. As a tropical storm, Laura killed at least 9 people in the Caribbean, and may bring storm surges of 7 to 11 feet along the coast.

Task Force Returns After Hurricane

Several Tulsa firefighters are on the task force, including Captain Spencer Gardner who says they searched thousands of homes to see if anyone needed any further assistance and let them know they are there if needed. Captain Matt Shearer is also on the team and says they met some great people, including a man who's family bought the land where he lived in the late 1800s. Gardner says everyone was grateful for their help, and that the team is prepared to pack up and head out again if another hurricane hits the states this season.

Hurricane Sally Slams Gulf Coast

Across southern Alabama and the Florida panhandle, the damage from Hurricane Sally is extensive. The storm's heavy rains means many areas will continue to suffer for days to come. In neighboring Georgia, the rain-soaked ground could no longer hold a large tree, which collapsed on a home and took one person's life. There are power outages across the southeast, with hundreds of thousands of homes and businesses in the dark. With seven more systems brewing out to sea, the coastal states could be

Union Reconsiders Mascot

The Union School Board is moving forward with plans to consider changing their mascot. The board voted to form a committee to focus on whether it's time for the Redskins mascot to go. Dozens of people attended the meeting tonight, many in support of changing the mascot. Only one person was opposed to the name change. 15 people spoke, each person being a student, parent, or alumni of the Union district. The message they all shared was that they are proud to be a part of Union, but they are not proud to be a Redskin, a term which is generally used as a slur. The decision tonight gives the board the ability to form a committee and at the next meeting they will bring the rules forward for the committee, and a timeline. They hope to have a recommendation by December.

Claremore Lays Out Return Plans

Claremore Public Schools laid out their return to school plan today. The first day of school will be August 20th, and it will look a lot different this year. Not all of the 4,000 students will be in the classroom, as there's 3 different options for families. Superintendent Bryan Frazier says students can do traditional school, a 100% online curriculum with Claremore Virtual School, or a combination of both. For kids in the classroom, every Friday will be a virtual learning day. The district spent 1.4 million dollars on devices for every single student, so everyone has the option to learn online if they want to. If you do choose to return to the building, there are several safety protocols in place like temperature checks, enhanced cleanings, and required masks for everyone. The superintendent says that while the school year will look different, it's all about lessening the risk of getting the virus and providing students with a high-quality education.

Bartlesville Plans to Enforce Safety

The Bartlesville Public School district held a virtual meeting tonight to discuss how officials plan to enforce safety precautions in order to avoid a district-wide shut down. Granger Meador, the communication director for the district, helped facilitate and answer questions during the meeting. He says if a student tests positive, the district plans to close that site for 1 to 2 days to deep clean. To try and avoid this scenario, the district is requiring face coverings for the entire school day, as they say social distancing is impossible in most of their classrooms. Teachers also talked about their mental-health options. The district said the deadline to register your child for virtual learning is next Monday. School leaders said to make sure you apply by that date so they can start figuring out where teachers will be needed most for in-person learning.

Tulsa Announces School Plans

The Tulsa Public School Board met tonight to vote on a plan for safely starting the new school year. Tulsa Health director Dr Bruce Dart joined the call and said Tulsa is not showing any signs of slowing down with COVID-19. He said that now is not the time for students to go back in person. The board voted that students will remain in virtual learning for the first nine weeks. Staff will work with health professionals to monitor COVID-19 infection rates in Tulsa during that nine-week period. The superintendent will then submit a new recommendation to the board regarding what's best for students in the second quarter.

Bixby Cuts Ribbon on New Site

After much debate about how to start the school year safely, some students in Bixby will return to a brand-new campus. After nearly 2 years of construction, the West campus is ready for classes to begin. The district celebrated the new site with a ribbon cutting today on the long-awaited West Elementary and Intermediate School. More than 900 pre-k through 6th grade students are zoned to the 155,000 square foot building, which will make space at the crowded Central campus. West's state of the art campus boasts 40+ classrooms, an imagination arts center, three playground areas for different grade levels and two gyms that double as storm shelters. Even before the coronavirus shut down schools in the spring, West was designed with sanitation in mind. Each classroom is equipped with a sink and sanitizer and built in hand washing stations in the cafeteria. When school starts on August 17th, the campus will be at about 70% capacity as the district only allows half of the students on campus at a time for the first two weeks.

STEM Academy Opens in Sand Springs

Some freshman in Sand Springs will get a chance to experience what it takes to process a crime scene at the new Freshman Center and STEM Academy at Charles Page High School. In March 2019, 93% of the Sand Springs community voted in favor of a nearly \$33 million bond package on the center and construction started on the additions to the high school. During the second week of school in Sand Springs, students are already diving into engineering assignments at the STEM center. Some biomedical students are even learning to process a crime scene. Through individual career academic plans. The district gives students academic and career development opportunities, helping them explore careers so they can be successful after graduation.

Owasso Announces In-Person Learning

Despite the ongoing threat of infection, more school districts are deciding to carefully welcome students back into classrooms. Today the superintendent of Owasso Public Schools announced in-class instruction would begin a week from next Thursday, September 17th. When the students go back, they'll be required to follow some guidelines including wearing a face mask during the day. The superintendent said in a letter to parents that they continue to believe the learning experience for a child is best when in the classroom, however it was important to keep all students, teachers, and staff safe while they monitored the pandemic. She says the past couple of weeks have shown either a decline or a stable number of new COVID cases, which is why they felt comfortable making this decision. The

superintendent hopes the couple of weeks will give families the opportunity to make the decision to continue with online learning or to go back to the classroom.

TPS Opens More Meal Sites

The Tulsa Public School District has opened more than 100 meal sites this morning after receiving special USDA approval. Although schools like Peary Elementary aren't welcoming kids back in the building, employees are still showing up daily to deliver meals while keeping safety in mind, wearing masks and gloves. TPS says they are aware of the need and the number of their students who depend on this program every day. The district also says nearly 83% of their students are economically disadvantaged. Peary is one of 60 school sites and more than 100 mobile meal bus stops serving breakfast, lunch, and dinner twice a day, five days a week. TPS says families can stop by sites like Peary from 7-9am and 11-1pm, you don't need to be a TPS student and anyone under 18 can get a meal.

Muskogee Elects New Mayor

A historic election in the city of Muskogee took place this week, with nearly 60% of voters choosing Marlon Coleman for their first Black Mayor. Coleman started at a pastor at Temple of Hope Church, then was elected to city council before his 15-month mayoral bid. Coleman has big plans, which include working with the public-school district to upgrade schools, and making sure small businesses are okay during this pandemic. Coleman says he's also interested in bringing more opportunities to town like nightlife. On being the first Black Mayor, he says that comes with a lot of responsibilities and pressure, but he is up for the task. Coleman will be sworn in outside the Civic Center at 4pm on Monday afternoon.

Broken Arrow Breaks Ground

Broken Arrow city leaders broke ground today on a new 30,000 square foot shopping center. 80% of Tiger Hill Plaza near 71st and Lynn Lane is already rented out with businesses like Tacos for Life and a beauty salon. The city manager Michael Spurgeon says this is the culmination of 5 to 7 years' worth of work and they are excited for all the new revenue the complex will bring in. Spurgeon says the dollars spent at the center will turn into sales tax and sales tax is put back into the community in the form of services provided to the community. The shopping center is expected to open in the spring of 2021.

Mass Grave Search Continues

The search in Tulsa's Oaklawn Cemetery near downtown is now in its second week. An archaeological team has spent 7 days looking for evidence of a possible mass grave from the 1921 Race Massacre. On Monday, a small but important discovery was made about 10 feet down in Trench B to the south: the survey team uncovered a pair of shoes. The state archaeologist says they should be able to figure out when the shoes were made and that will give them a good indication of preservation at that depth. So far in the soil, the team has uncovered wood pieces, metal, a pail, and a medicinal bottle that can be traced back to 1910. Core samples show that the soil continues to the east, so they will continue digging about 10 feet to the east and create Trench C. Trench C is expected to be the final hole at this first excavation site, barring a discovery of any artifacts of interest.

New Fire Station Breaks Ground

It's a big empty field at 41st and 134th now, but by December of 2021 it will be a big fancy new fire station. Station 33 will span 12,000 square feet and will cost about 5.3 million dollars, paid for by the 2006 third penny sales tax. Mayor GT Bynum says the station is something that has been in the works in Tulsa for about 15 years. It will serve two purposes, answering an increased need for services by a

booming population in east Tulsa, and helping to reduce response times so firefighters can get to your house in an emergency faster. The fire station will include four truck bays and room for storage for the fire department. It also falls in line with the department's mission to maintain an ISO-1 rating, which measures public safety and keeps insurance rates low.

New Dam Project Begins

The city of Tulsa is breaking ground on construction of a new dam across the Arkansas river in midtown. The goal behind the new 48-million-dollar dam at 31st and Riverside is to keep water in the river and make way for more recreation along River Parks. The new dam will create a Zink Lake, more than 2 miles long between the dam at 31st and the 1-244 bridge. The old dam, built in 1982, only has three gates and the mayor says it's not in good condition. The new dam is slated to have 15 gates, some as tall as 10 feet high. The mayor also mentioned the dam will be same from a flood control standpoint because the gates can all lay down flat on the riverbed in the middle of a flood event like we had in 2019. The project also includes a 1,000-foot-long recreation flume on the east bank of the river for kayaking, surfing, and tubing. Construction will take 2.5 years to complete.

United Way Day of Caring Underway

The Tulsa Area United Way's annual Day of Caring was reimagined into a day of giving today. The day is usually hands on with landscaping and building projects for area nonprofits, but as with other events, the pandemic is changing things. 15 food drives across Green Country kicked off today in 6 different counties. United Way said they wanted to make it as easy as possible for people to help, so they created a drive-thru and drop off options in bigger cities like Tulsa, Broken Arrow, Owasso, and Jenks, but also smaller areas like Bristow, Okmulgee, and Sapulpa. United Way says the main items they are looking for are peanut butter, canned fruits and meats, and meal kits. If you are unable to make it out to donate, United Way says you can still help by dropping food off to any food bank location or donating to their website.

Zoo Transitions to New Hours

Starting next week, the Tulsa Zoo will fall back to its regular hours. It's been a tough year for the zoo. After being forced to close in the spring due to the pandemic, they were able to reopen in May every day at 8am to help make guests as comfortable as possible, both during the hot temperatures and during the pandemic. The zoo says it makes 10% of its annual revenue during Spring Break, and sees top visitation in April and May, so it was hard to be closed during that time. Now, they're hoping with cooler temperatures on the way that more visitors will come out. The zoo is encouraging people to practice social distancing, and they do require masks while inside any indoor exhibits, restaurants, or bathrooms. Their hours return to 9 to 5 starting Tuesday.

Gathering Place Resumes Special Events

The Gathering Place announced today that they are resuming their special events for families with an emphasis on safety. The park has installed hand sanitizing stations throughout and are ready to welcome families. The park says they took their time to properly understand as much as they could learn about COVID and public gatherings and worked with the CDFC and the City of Tulsa to establish best practices for safety. Starting September 26th, the park will have Pinwheels of Hope, which will feature 10,000 pinwheels through the grounds as a show of gratitude for medical workers. They also plan to have holiday lights in December, with socially spaced zones so the public can safely enjoy them.

Plan to Rezone Brookside Stalled

Developers withdrew their application to build a mixed-use development near 31st and Peoria in midtown, called Brookside 31. The group said in an email that they withdrew their application to conduct more public outreach and establish better lines of communication. The project was envisioned to have eight acres of restaurants, townhouses, retail space, and apartments, and a plaza leading toward Tulsa's famous Brookside district. Right now, the area is a vacant field, but some neighbors think the project would create too much congestion and noise. The Planning Design Group did say they will fill out a new application once they've met with mor people and gained their feedback on the project.

A Broken Arrow woman on probation after serving time for accessory to murder is now facing new charges. Manzer is on probation after witnessing the murder of 18-year-old Jarrett Clark in 2006 and staging evidence. She has since bonded out of jail, with one of the conditions being no alcohol. Manzer is scheduled for court next Tuesday.

Bristow Church Vandalized

Bristow police are investigating a break-in and vandalism at a church overnight. Pastor Kara Calhoun said someone actually broke-in a few nights ago but nothing was damaged or taken. Then it happened again overnight, and surveillance captured two young suspects who pushed a window in and climbed inside. The damage includes paint splattered all over the walls and floors, hymnals scattered everywhere, and bleach poured on the carpet. Bristow police collected fingerprints and gathered evidence throughout the morning and hope to find the young vandals soon, while the church starts cleanup.

Teens Jailed After Crime Spree

Two teenagers are in jail tonight following what police are calling a three-hour violent crime spree yesterday in south tulsa. Police say the two are accused of stealing a car, robbing multiple people, and breaking into cars and a home. Most of the crimes happened between 71st and 81st from Memorial to Mingo early yesterday. Lt. Brian Blair says Dakota Christy and Fernando Aguilar started out from robbing a car and then went on to break into several cars, then one house, and robbed 4 people. One of the most violent robberies happened when the suspects ambushed an elderly couple in their 80s walking down the street, beating them. The woman had to go to the hospital for her injuries. A witness was able to get a good description of the suspect's vehicle, even getting a partial tag. Police say they ditched the vehicle and ran into the Polo Run apartments, officers then spotted them running and took them into custody.

BAPD Arrest Burglars

Three men are in jail today, accused of multiple burglaries in Broken Arrow. Just yesterday, police were called to a home near Tucson and Elm. Officers say a motion alarm went off early in the morning and suspects were spotted stealing from a truck toolbox. They were arrested less than two miles away. Police say the suspects had a bunch of stolen stuff with them. Jeffrey Kowaleski, Jacob Lafarlette, and Jason Currie were taken into custody. Officers say one of the suspects told them about the other burglaries,

and that Lafarlette had meth on him. Since he is a tribal citizen, his case will be handled by the Muscogee Creek Nation per a recent Supreme Court ruling.

Tulsa Police believe two teenagers may be responsible for four car jackings in the past week and a half. All 4 car jackings involved suspects that were described as teenage boys and all 4 victims were women who were alone and trying to get into their cars. Tulsa Police officer Jeannie Piece says they are still trying to determine how many car jackings the suspects were involved with, but they were arrested for one that happened on September 23rd. Officers say they got a call from a female, who said two males had approached her with a gun and taken her Ford Expedition. Later that day, a patrol officer found a maroon Toyota that had been taken in the same way back on September 17th. Then another patrol officer spotted the stolen Expedition and attempted to stop it near 61st and Peoria. At one point, both boys jumped from the car and ran into a neighborhood. A perimeter was set up but they ended up finding both suspects with the help of someone that lived nearby. They are still working to connect the suspects to other car jackings and say this is an example of why you should always file a police report, even if you don't want to press charges or have a great suspect description.

Both the legal teams at Tulsa Health Department and the City will work to draft an ordinance requiring masks to be worn in Tulsa city limits starting sometime next week. Oklahoma Governor Kevin Stitt said yesterday that he would not issue a statewide mask mandate, but he supported a city's right to do so if they felt necessary.

No West Nile for Tulsa... Yet

The Tulsa Health Department says mosquitos and West Nile virus have not been an issue this summer. They're seeing fewer mosquitos than years past and have only had a single trap test positive for West Nile. The low numbers could be because it's been fairly dry this summer, so the less standing water we have the fewer opportunities for mosquitos to breed in that water. Thankfully, no one in Oklahoma has contracted the West Nile virus so far this year. Last year 7 people across the state got the virus, and 18 people in 2018. Most people that get West Nile have mild symptoms like fever and fatigue, but in rare cases it can be deadly. The health department monitors mosquito traps every week and test them for West Nile. Last year they found it in 12 traps throughout the summer. They have a complain line to call if you are concerned about mosquitoes in your area, and they will come and evaluate the situation and treat standing water or spray the area if they decide that's what is best.

First Responders Stress Importance of Hot Cars

OSU Tulsa Installs Air Ionization

Just like most schools in the area, OSU Tulsa is requiring a mask on campus, but new technology connected to the HVAC system is killing any airborne germs. Angelyn Holmes, assistant director of facilities management for the school says the facilities teams have been busy since the campus closed in March getting ready for the fall semester, bringing in sanitation stations, plexiglass partitions, and new signage. OSU Tulsa has taken their COVID safety protocols to another level by installing small needlepoint air ionization devices in all the HVAC units. The devices charge all the particles and create ions in the air, which kill COVID and other germs. Testing shows the device kills 99.4% of the COVID virus in 30 minutes inside the chamber, as well as E.coli and mold spores.

The coronavirus outbreaks started at the end of July, when nearly every inmate inside Eddie Warrior Correctional Center caught the virus. There have been three protests since then, calling on the governor and the DOC to make major changes. Today the state announced mandatory testing for staff members and increased testing for inmates in the vulnerable population. The governor also said they are looking at ways to release some non-violent inmates who are nearing the end of their sentence. Right now, about 1400 inmates across the state have the virus and nine people have died, two staff members and seven inmates. Advocates for inmates have asked the governor to move inmates in hotspots to new safe spaces and for more PPE and medical attention. Former state senator Connie Johnson has organized the protests and said today's announcement falls short of their demands.
