Unusual Clouds Spotted in Green Country This Summer

FOX23 Meteorologist Michael Grogan explains the different type of clouds, including “asperitas,” “cirrus intortus,” and a “shelf cloud.” Shelf clouds commonly precede severe storms and resemble a shelf. If you see those clouds, expect strong winds, rain, and thunderstorms.

Damage, Flooding Reported in Sequoyah County Following Storms

Hulah Lake Returns to Normal Level for the First Time in a Year

This was one of the main reasons attributed to water restrictions in the city. The water rose four feet due to repeated rounds of heavy rainfall into its basin.

Sunday Marks 6 Years Since EF-2 Tornado Tore Through Tulsa

New Dewpoint Record Set in Oklahoma

FOX23 Meteorologist Michael Grogan explains dewpoints and the rare record that Oklahoma made this week. Abundant heat and moisture allowed the dewpoint temperature in Oilton, which is about 35 miles west of Tulsa, to hit an astonishing high of 84.6 degrees Fahrenheit. This means the air becomes saturated at that temperature, or in other words, the temperature at which dew and fog will form. As a result, the air temperature can never drop below the dewpoint reading.

Lawsuit Filed to Stop America's First Religious Charter School in Oklahoma

Civil liberties and separation of church and state advocates have partnered with multiple Oklahoma families to file a lawsuit to stop the establishment of America's first religious charter school in Oklahoma. The lawsuit was filed in state court Monday on behalf of families from the Oklahoma City and Tulsa metro who had a variety of concerns about not just the use of public funds to establish a religious charter school, but the plaintiffs had individual concerns about St. Isidore of Seville Online Catholic Charter School's application for establishment.

School Resource Officers Gather in Bartlesville for Specialized Training
