Weather

Flooding Problems in Bartlesville

Shards of stained glass litter the ground in front of the Fellowship Community Church in Bartlesville, after a lightning hit it on Thursday morning. Pastor Mark Weeter says no one was in the church at the time of the strike. Weeter said "about 9 o clock you get a call you don't want to get as a pastor, that lightning has struck your church and it's on fire and they need a key to get in". Bobby Beam who lives near the church said "it's lightning everywhere and all of a sudden I here the fire trucks in the neighborhood and I look outside and say oh man they're going right next door". FOX23 found pieces of shingle laying all around the church and firefighters say that was because the lightning actually blew a hole in the roof and started a fire in the attic. Weeter said "we've had some leaks around the steeple but this is a little bit more than that". Firefighters told FOX23 that they had to rip down part of this wall to keep the fire from spreading through the attic. Weeter said the damage will cost about 25 thousand dollars to fix, but with more storms headed towards Bartlesville, he is just happy it is all covered up. The Washington County Emergency Manager says lightning was also the cause of a garage fire in the Northeast part of the County.

Groundbreaking East Tulsa School

It is more than 10 thousand square feet for sports like basketball and tennis. Chevaun Etier, Principal of Town and Country School said "they are really excited to have basketball games here. Play sports indoors". But for students at Town and Country School, the Sports Education Center will also keep them protected when storms rip through green country. FOX23 was there on Friday morning as school leaders broke ground on the new facility. The school helps students Grades 1st through 12th get special instruction for a number of disabilities. The new sports complex help them even more. Etier said "opportunities they did not have at the public schools". Students we talked to are excited for the new center which should be opened by the middle of February. Jacob Bolin, a student at Town and Country School said "it's really exciting that I get to see it being built and I'll get to come back years over and just get to experience the gym". There will be a FEMA approved tornado shelter in each of the 4 pods of the improved gym and with storm season always nearby, it will be a vital tool for students during the year.

Foggy Weather in Green Country

We had the dense fog advisory that lifted at 10 o'clock but at some points this morning there was visibility less than a quarter of mile while others you could see at least half a mile down the road. This is the third time in a week we have seen a dense fog advisory—twice last week and once this week. Last Thursday, foggy conditions started early on and stuck around past noon in some places. Thankfully the fog green country saw this morning was clearing by 8 am in some locations. Fog forms when temperatures and dew points are within a few degrees of each other and there are calm winds. Those

types of conditions were present this morning causing visibility problems early on before the sun rose. Once the sun was above the horizon, the fog started to clear out and started to lift off the roadway allowing drivers to have more visibility as they head to work. Sometimes fog can form when a warm air blows over a cool surface and this morning we saw the fog lingering a little bit on the fields and that is because some of those fields had dew like this leaf and stayed on the ground leaving the fog in some of those locations just a little while longer.

Porum Fire Department volunteers have trying to keep this grass fire under control. Someone was trying to burn brush Thursday morning. Trampas Tripp with Porum Fire Chief said "It's not the smartest decision when you have 30 mile an hour winds with 30 percent humidity. That's not the best time to be burning, for sure." Tayler Reasnor works the Ranchland where the fire spread to and says this land burns now and then. He said "generally all over this area there's at least one or two big fires that happen". Even so he was watching this fire closely and he was grateful for these volunteers. He also said "It's amazing, I was hoping they'd show up at some point. I didn't know how far it was going to come to us but I'm very thankful they were able to make it out here and help us out". Fire crews say they will have to stay through the night to keep an eye on what is still burning because it is in canyons and they cannot get their equipment to. But the overnight weather should help keep it from spreading. Tripp said "we're hoping it stays down like this so our guys can get a little bit of rest just in case tomorrow when the winds do shift we have to come back out".

As Green Country prepares for a big chill, Stan Whiteford with PSO said "it's generally not the kind of weather that causes major electrical problems". He also said that PSO has hundreds of workers and contractors that will be ready to handle any problems or outages. Whiteford said "we always have people on call and we have people ready to respond to any outages". They are not expecting to see widespread outages like they normally see with a severe storm. Whiteford said "it's going to be cold, so we're definitely concerned about any minor outages that would occur on any other day". Workers will be in every corner of the sooner state as the cold temperatures hit. Whiteford also said "those plans are always in place, just in case something were to change". Whiteford warned people to be careful when using space heaters, generators and other devices to keep warm. He knows that people will be cranking up the thermostat but not to record levels. He said "even at its peak, a winter load does not come close to the amount of electricity of people use air conditioners in the summer".

Winter Weather Preparation in the City Of Muskogee

There is no denying winter weather is slowly moving into Green Country. People we talked to say they did not see much of a transition period this year when it comes to temperatures changing from hot to cold. Most say the winter weather just kind of snuck up on us. Luckily the Muskogee Streets Department has been prepared since the beginning of November. David Garner, Muskogee Street Superintendent said "the plow trucks are set up, the sanders are set up, and the brine trucks are set up". The City of Muskogee is prepared what you see right here 3-400 tons of salt and over here is 1000 tons of salt and sand mix ready to go at any given moment. Garner said "we're hoping that we don't have no problems tonight but we're ready if we do". FOX23 found people also hoping bad weather stays clear of Muskogee but their plan if the weather does come is slightly different. Officials said they take care of both the streets and the bridges in the City. They also said because last year was so mild they did not have as much activity, so they are also keeping that in mind. Garner said "we didn't pout much salt and sand out last year so yea there is a bit of a learning curve this year to get ready to go again".

Grass Fire in North Tulsa

These large flames next to Highway 11 between 98th Street North and Elgin kept the highway closed, for over two hours. Sperry firefighters had to call other departments for help, because the flames threatened a couple of homes at one point. Another big concern was the wind, sending embers raining, over the area. This was the scene earlier in North Tulsa, about five miles away, near 56th Street North and MLK Junior Boulevard. Captain Howard Whitehill with the Tulsa Fire Department said "we had a strong south breeze that kept slowing down and picking up and at times moving the fire fairly quickly". Here, firefighters said large flames came dangerously close to Antioch Baptist Church, a house, and a couple of barns. Penny Rademacher was on her way to the grocery store, when these flames caught her attention. She said "flames everywhere...probably 60 feet high. I was afraid it was going to get to the house where we live at". Firefighters put them out, before they could burn any structures.

Meth Arrest in Bixby

A concerned driver called 911 to report a man driving recklessly and who later appeared to be passed out in his vehicle. When Bixby police arrived, they found a man, Richard Washburn disoriented and confused. After doing a field sobriety test he was arrested, and they found 3.3 grams of crystal meth on him. It happened here along 131st between Mingo and Memorial. The news was extremely concerning for Paula Sheridan. She says her family knows firsthand what drugs can do to you. Sheridan said "they see the effects because they are all adopted and their biological father is in prison and their biological brother whom I've adopted is in a rehab right now". She says their brother struggled with meth and it is important her children learn how devastating it can be. Sheridan said ""my kids see the effect and when they hear about crystal meth and people driving around and stuff like that I'm hoping they are learning from what they see and not just what I say". She says she hopes her children can learn from other's mistakes. Sheridan said "hopefully, not only what i say but what they see and hear and having extended family being affected by it, all kinds of drugs but especially the meth, hopefully they learn and don't even try it".

Burglary Homicide Victim in East Tulsa

FOX23 was at the Autumn Ridge Apartment Complex near 17th and Memorial as maintenance workers secured the door for the second time just a couple of hours. Tulsa police said that two men broke in around 7:15 and then one came back around mid-morning. Officers said the place belonged to Wilmur Flores who was shot and killed in Mohawk Park on Wednesday over a stolen car that he knew nothing about. Gloria Nixon lived right next door to Flores said "he always spoke always said hello....always said how you doing today. Something like this....you just ask why?" On Thursday, police arrested Alejandro Guzman, Jose Flores and Jennifer Lopez in connection with the murder. Police think the thieves could be associated with the group. They got away with a television, a laptop, a game system and some bags.

Murder in South Tulsa

Police has released a poster of 26-year-old Markees Johnson who they are calling a person of interest in Wednesday's double shooting. Homicide Sergeant Dave Walker said "he gets mad at you he's going to shoot you he's going to kill you so we need to probably find him". He allegedly killed a 41-year-old and wounded a 32-year-old man at the Savanna Landing Apartments in South Tulsa. Walker said "he just shot a bunch of rounds at a bunch of people, so he's dangerous today, he'll be dangerous tomorrow". Investigators said it all started with a fight. Walker stated "he didn't give any consideration to what was behind him". The most disturbing thing was police said Johnson fired more than 10-gun shot at a time when several kids played outside. Walker said "If he would do that then I think he's a danger to anybody in and around him". But he is not a stranger to the area, so police hope it is only a matter of time before they put him where they say he belongs...behind bars. Walker said "so if he thinks he thinks he's got friends that are going to hide him out his world just got a little bit smaller".

Theft Arrest in Tulsa

Sergeant Brian Bryden said the investigation started in early October. Since then reports show Daryl Sanders has hit at least 9 times. Bryden said Sanders has stolen not only cigarettes but also other tobacco products and beer from Walgreens, Kum and Go and mostly Quiktrips with an estimated 3 thousand dollars in loot. Reports show that the suspect who showed signs of violence often ran behind store counters to get what he wanted. Bryden said officers caught Sanders early Thursday morning when he was walking around outside the Quiktrip near Admiral and Sheridan.

Stolen Guns in North Tulsa

Michael Sager owns the Gateway Building near 1st and Admiral, and over the weekend he said that someone victimized him and his tenants. Sager said "he walked right out of the building with two parcels under his arms and he dropped one on the ground...so it's as brazen as it can be". Video from Tulsa police showed the suspect backed his car in and got out to snap pictures of the building. All before making his move. Sager said "workers were here at 4:30 in the afternoon loading some stuff into the building. He snuck around and snuck in a doorway". That's when video---shows him stealing the guns. Sager believed that the suspect at that point also unlocked an exterior door.

And 12 hours later. Sager said the thief returned; ransacking the entire warehouse including the Tulsa Tough Headquarters, and a newly opened shop named Post. Co-owner, Case Morton said the suspect stole thousands of dollars worth of expensive and rare jewelry as well as electronics and clothes. Case said "to be open just a few days and to have somebody come in and just destroy what we were working towards...he didn't derail us completely but it was a big hiccup".

Homicide in North Tulsa

One man is dead and another is on the run. Tulsa police believe Andre Miles is the man who shot and killed Antwan Hampton on Sunday Night in early November. Detectives say early on that they knew two had gang ties but they also knew it was not the motive for the murder because both victim and suspect are a part of the same gang. Police say both Miles and Hampton were at a party at the Townsquare Apartments when the shooting happened and through investigation detectives say they realized that PCP could be the culprit. They will only know for certain when they get Miles in custody Court records show that Miles was convicted of assault and battery back in 2012. Police say he has ties to Okmulgee and he is wanted in that county right now for probation violation.

Home Invasion in South Tulsa

Constructions in Owasso

With more than 2,400 new homes and more slated to be built in the Stone Canyon area, traffic is increasing along North 193rd East Avenue. So Rogers County officials say it is time to widen this street and make it safer. Construction teams are in phase one of the two phase project. They are blasting this hill, paving way for a new North 193rd East Avenue that won't be as steep as the current one. It will have two lanes plus a turning lane. Rogers County Rural Water District 3 Manager, Rick Stull, is heading up this project on top of the hill. Stull said "It's going to be a lot nicer and safer for everybody". Stull says this new 3.5 million dollar water tower is necessary because of the growth his district is seeing. He said "it'll be 160 foot tall. It'll be 2 million gallons". It will also serve as the new pump station. Stull stated "in the event something goes really south, we'll have enough water to serve the entire area for about a 24 hour time frame". He also says the limestone rock has not made construction easy. Stull said "it took about six weeks just to blast out and dig out the hole for this tower". The water tower will be complete in August 2017.

Road Project in Muskogee

Muskogee County Commissioner Ken Doke said a mile long piece of road is now safe for drivers. Doke said "this road back in the flood really took a beating...with the water running across the road we had a lot of potholes and asphalt was coming apart". FOX23 found out that it is not just the road that needed an upgrade. Officials said two bridges were also nearly falling apart. Doke said "those bridges are old they have probably been there fifty years or better and so the load limits keep coming down further and further". Commissioner Doke said even though this area is considered rural it still gets a lot of traffic. Doke said "the school and with all of the houses this is a major artery out here". He says it was a safety concern so the fixes are necessary. He said "there is a three ton limit and a loaded school bus can weigh 20,000 pounds". One of the struggles was getting the money. With State budget cuts trickling down to the County, finding money for projects like these does not come easy. Luckily the Cherokee Nation stepped in to help with this project. The Cherokee Nation gets the money for these types of projects from motor vehicle taxes and the sale of tags. Doke said "if gives us a means to do road work that otherwise might not happen at all".

Downtown Gateway in Muskogee

Construction crews are making progress on Muskogee's Downtown Gateways. The archways were designed after the one that crossed 3rd Street in the early 1900s. It is part of an improvement project that will place a total of 7 gateways at major intersections all across the City. The City says the project should be finished by the end of October.

New Neighborhood in Bixby

This empty field may soon hold hundreds of single family homes. Developers are hoping to bring nearly 600 homes and some commercial businesses to the 144 acre property on the southeast corner of Memorial and 161st. But residents are not on board. Leona Fish lives south of the site on Memorial. She said the addition of hundreds of more drivers is a huge concern. FOX23 timed it and it took 15 minutes to get from 161st to Highway 169 on Memorial and it was not even rush hour. Fish said "traffic is a big deal, we're bottle necked already what's going to happen with 600 more houses". Fish also said flooding and hundreds of more kids in the school district are also a cause for concern. Bixby's Vice Mayor who is also one of the Developments Real Estate Brokers posted some information about it to a public Facebook group on Saturday night. Fish said other than the signs, that is all been released to the public. The post says the development will be done in phases over the next 10-12 years, with 50-60 homes built each year. Fish said ""we just need more information that's what we're waiting for Monday night". The Planning Commission will make a decision on the rezoning requests for the development at a public hearing on Monday evening.

Rezoning Meeting in Bixby

A resident of Bixby voiced his opinion "I'm not against development in Bixby. I'm all for it... but not at the cost of people's homes". It is the message some in Bixby hope City leaders would say to a proposed development. On Saturday, FOX23 reported about the plan that would bring 600-new homes and dozens of businesses to a 144-acre plot at 161st and South Memorial. On Monday night some said no thanks to the idea while others say the development would bring affordable homes, as well as millions in needed revenue. Kyle Richardson, a developer with Raucsh Coleman said "this new development is going to get us one step closer to getting the tax dollars necessary to provide better infrastructure and better education". Officials with developer Raucsh Coleman said the project would be done in phases over the next 10-years...wrapping up in 2026. 50-homes would be built every year. Some say they are not against seeing the City grow. They just say not right now.

Cell Tower Meeting in Owasso

Tim Bowman, President of Timber Gate Homeowner's Association said "wWe're happy about this decision, although we know it's not the end, it's just the first step". A proposed 125-foot cell phone tower that would benefit U.S. Cellular immediately gained opposition from its neighbors. Those wanting to construct the tower did not wish to speak to FOX23 on camera. But they say they have looked at all other options, and the only spot that would not interfere with existing towers is just south of the Timber Gate Neighborhood. They say they need the tower to fill in coverage gaps. But Timber Gate residents say property values would drop. So they are glad the cell phone tower builders have been denied by the board. Keeli Hand-Droege, a local real estate agent said "I'm very pleased with the decision that was made, based on the arguments that we provided, we're very concerned that this tower would decrease property values in the area". Brian McGee, a Timber Gate resident said "If somebody doesn't want to buy those two houses that it's right up against because of a tower, that's going to affect property values". Neighbors are also concerned about possible health risks from the tower, its close location to an

elementary school, and safety issues. The tower was proposed in the landing path of low flying pilots flying into Gundy's airport nearby. That is why many hope even if the board decision is appealed, that the district court will deny it. Bowman said "we're talking about lives and we're talking about families, and we're talking about their investments and their homes, and when you start talking about that; that hits close to home".

Tulsa Major-Elect Bynum Policing in Tulsa

Bridging the gap between the public and police, Tulsa Mayor-Elect GT Bynum said it will be one of his main goals in his upcoming administration. Bynum said "you can't do that if you're sitting inside City Hall, and not meeting with people in the city...my job is to hear the different viewpoints, and through that, find the common ground". Bynum laid out his plans on Monday night on how he plans to do it in an area he received heavy support from in his April victory. Among his plans is recruiting more minorities inside Tulsa police and the Fire Departments, and begin community policing within a year. Bynum says talks are underway for a possible police review board. Bynum touched on the recent incidents involving Terence Crutcher and called the shooting of Khalid Jabara earlier this year as a breakdown. Bynum said "he used all of the resources that our system offers, and he was still killed". William White says Tulsa police does have a good department and likes what Bynum brings to the table. White said "we have a good department, but we have a small number of bad officers, hiding behind the reputation of the good officers...he's making the effort and listening to the people". But White said officer's stats should be made available "until we see that part, transparency is just a word".

Revitalization in Downtown Muskogee

Dick's Sporting Goods, T.J. Maxx, Utla Beauty stores are now open and there are several small shops that about to open in this part of town. This area will add a steakhouse to the growing list of businesses. FOX23 has followed the development of the Cities Urban Renewal Project which is a push to bring more business to this area over the years like how it is now. Carlton Horner lives in Muskogee and is on board with the new addition. Horner said "I think it would be a great thing for Muskogee. This has great potential it has been growing, we have the hotels we have the largest QuikTrip". With these businesses already booming in this heavy traveled area, people in the city feel this would be a great place for a steakhouse. Officials say during construction a portion of 5th Street will be closed but it should not impact day to day traffic. Hundreds participated in a survey asking what they wanted to see come to the City. Gary Garner with the City Planning Commission stated the majority said a nice restaurant. Garner said "and then when they were asked what type of restaurant a steakhouse was number 2 on the list".

Redbud District in Owasso

Things in the Redbud District are moving forward but Owasso City leaders believe they have found a way for the bud to bloom and attract new investors. Owasso Community Development Director Bronce Stephenson believes that tax increment financing (TIF) would be the best way to get outside dollars into the District that is still trying to become a prime place for Owasso residents. Stephenson said "for years

and years we've heard from the public through surveys and other ways that we need that downtown. We're missing that special place. The heart of the community if you will". A TIF can simply be defined as a plan to move tax dollars from their usually recipients and use it to reinvest in the area where the tax revenue is generated. Essentially the tax revenue a builder in their new buildings would make is turned around and spent by City Officials to improve that same area builders just built in for a short period of time...in this case— 15 years. Stephenson said "we hope that through a TIF developers will know that in Owasso downtown is the place to go and the place to spend their money". If approved, the school district and Tulsa County services in Owasso that receive tax dollars are expected to see a dramatic increase in revenue once the TIF fully plays out. Stephenson stated "it's been pretty positive and a lot of people are saying it's about time. We've kind of lost our original downtown and have grown in other areas".

School Configuration in Broken Arrow

With nearly 19 thousand students, Broken Arrow Public Schools (BAPS) is one of the fastest growing Districts in the nation. With no signs of that trend stopping, officials say it is time to talk about the plans to split up the largest high school in the State. FOX23 met with BAPS Superintendent Dr. Jarod Mendenhall on Monday to talk about the high school configuration study. The study started a year ago, to help the district decide how to split up grades 9 through 12. He says they have narrowed it down to three options: multiple high schools, academies and grade centers. Mendenhall said "the most relevance is really what our parents and community want for our kids in broken arrow". Three community forums are scheduled this week to hear what parents, students and staff think about the high school options. Mendenhall says it will be 6 to 8 years before the changes will take effect, so it is important for parents of young students to come out. Mendenhall said "those are the ones who are going to be affected the most, those with high school students will probably not be affected by the decision". The forums are the third phase of four in the study. Mendenhall says he is hoping for it to be complete by May 2017.

Tuberculosis in Jenks High School

In the midst of cold a flu season, parents at Jenks High School are preparing some of their students for a test that has nothing to do with what is in a textbook. On Monday morning, a student tested positive for the contagious respiratory illness tuberculosis (TB) and could have spread it to classmates at school and on the bus the student rode daily. "It is always possible that someone came in contact with someone that was contagious and that is why we do a comprehensive contact investigation", said Donna Durant-Macon who is with the Tulsa County Health Department and specializes in respiratory illness. She told FOX23 that the student has been out of school for three weeks already but just because a classmate seems healthy, that does not mean TB is gone. Donna said "as time goes on something will happen within the immune system and then the individual will have an active disease". She also said the illness can stay dormant on a person's body for years and then out of the blue become active and show symptoms which is why she and her team will be testing students for TB in a small room on Tuesday. Donna says "anyone that tests positive for TB from a skin test after we've measured it, we'll do chest X-rays and follow it up". Donna told FOX23 that preventative care now will most likely get rid of the disease so it does not show up later. She said "preventative therapy is 93 to 95 percent effective".

Rally for Reading in North Tulsa

50 percent of Tulsa's third graders are reading at below level but there is a new volunteer push here in Tulsa that is trying to change that. Reading Partners, a group that helps students around the country with reading is looking for volunteers. 2000 here in Tulsa, to be exact. Today at a Rally for Reading at Rudisill Regional Library, Mayor-Elect GT Bynum issued a challenge. Bynum said "sign up for just one hour a week to spend time with a kid". 2000 volunteers for one hour a week. Mayor-Elect Bynum explained that his wife has been a volunteer, and he was the first one to sign up today. Bynum said "that third grade reading efficiency is one of the greatest indicators of whether or not they will stay in school through high school and that then has an impact on their earning power for their whole lives". Also making the commitment today is Tulsa Public Schools Superintendent Dr. Deborah Gist. She has seen the impact of volunteering firsthand. Gist said "children love when their reading partner comes... they feel very special... it's a wonderful one-on-one relationship that children really need". Deborah Brands Vereecke is the Executive Director of Reading Partners Tulsa explained just how big of a reading leap a student can make in a short time, with the right guidance. Vereecke said "this is really tremendous, when we think about kids who are two-and-a-half years behind... and with a volunteer commitment of at least one hour a week, that these students end the year reading on grade level". One of those volunteers, Latasha Lucas told FOX23 the impact is one that goes both ways. Lucas said "it would say it's very rewarding. I would say it would make a difference in someone's life, yours and theirs. I would say there's no better way to spend an hour a day".

2nd Case of Tuberculosis in Jenks High School

Jenks High School is dealing with the second case of tuberculosis (TB) in a week. After the first case was confirmed, a select number of students were tested. Officials said a small number students got blood tests after their skin tests came back positive. Rob Loeber, Director of Communications at Jenks Public

School said they found out about it Wednesday night and sent an email to parents on Thursday morning. He said ""through that testing they were able to identify one other student who has a confirmed case of tuberculosis". He said they are working closely with the Tulsa County Health Department in what is called an intensive contact investigation. Loeber said tuberculosis is typically transmitted through close prolonged contact with someone who is contagious, so not all students are at risk. Loeber also said "it's not something that can be transmitted by touching the same surface, it's not something that can be caught by being at the same football game as somebody". Loeber stated that out of the 2600 students at Jenks High School, only those who rode the bus or were in the same class with the two infected students will be tested". Loeber said "for those kids who do not receive a letter, the general high school population. We feel the risk is extremely low".

Education Meeting with Tulsa Major GT Bynum

Tulsa Major GT Bynum stated "on my first full day in office the most important the most important discussion I can have is with our educators on what the city could do to become a more proactive partner with them moving forward". With a new administration, City and school leaders hope they can brainstorm new ideas, to improve Tulsa's education system. On Tuesday, leaders from those institutions met with Mayor GT Bynum up on the fifteenth floor of City Hall. They came up with a draft. Bynum said "advocacy for funding, volunteer opportunities, really teacher recruitment and retention". Tulsa Public School Superintendent Dr. Deborah Gist said the biggest, and most challenging issue is funding. Gist said "everyone from early childhood all the way through higher education". Gist also said "to support our teachers so I think everyone in Oklahoma I hope is aware that our teachers are essentially the lowest paid teachers in the country and that has to change". It has been about a month since voters rejected State Question 779, which would have provided, in part, a raise for teachers. Gist said "I'm encouraged like I said it's been a hard fall, the failure of state question 779 is difficult our teachers are struggling and we are struggling with them". Bynum stated "we need some time to do our homework and have specific initiatives that we can bring forward".

School Boundaries in Broken Arrow Public Schools District

The need for more space in Broken Arrow Public Schools means nearly one thousand students could see a switch in their school next year. New boundaries proposed will take effect next year to fill the District's 15th elementary building. Joselyn Gonzalez who lives in one of the neighborhoods affected by the change said she is happy about it. Gonzales said "it's easier and faster to get my daughter there eventually and I guess for people in the neighborhood, we won't have to deal with traffic trying to get to Liberty". The new school will hold 600 students. Some parents talked to FOX23 off camera said they do not want to switch and move their kids away from friends and a comfortable environment. Gonzalez said the population growth in the City is not slowing down and this is just one of the growing pains. She said "it's going to keep happening so I don't feel like it's a bad thing at all". The District is also moving to geographic boundaries for each of its four early childhood centers to balance enrollment at each site.

New Partnership in Tulsa Public School in North Tulsa

Cheers from many who live in North Tulsa as they believe the first hurdle was crossed to improve schools in their side of town. On Monday, the Tulsa Public Schools Board approved a charter school like Partnership with the Metropolitan Baptist Church to launch a new way of teaching inner city children that has been proven to work in other states. The school will start with its first batch of pre-k through first grade students next fall and will add on grades from there. Pastor Ray Qwens with Metropolitan Baptists said a partnership of this kind where a non-profit uses public school dollars to teach children will be so popular that there could be a lottery for future families wanting their children in the program. Owens said "we are about to turn the tide of education when it comes to African American kids in North Tulsa. And they believe when it comes to appearances and performance, at least one North Tulsa Elementary School will be just as desirable as those in other parts of town. Owens said "this is a monumental day in Tulsa Oklahoma. I think it's one of those red letter days where we can look back and see that this was a day that changed how we did schooling in our city".

Meth Arrest in Bixby

A concerned driver called 911 to report a man driving recklessly and who later appeared to be passed out in his vehicle. When Bixby police arrived, they found a man, Richard Washburn disoriented and confused. After doing a field sobriety test he was arrested, and they found 3.3 grams of crystal meth on him. It happened here along 131st between Mingo and Memorial. The news was extremely concerning for Paula Sheridan. She says her family knows firsthand what drugs can do to you. Sheridan said "they see the effects because they are all adopted and their biological father is in prison and their biological brother whom I've adopted is in a rehab right now". She says their brother struggled with meth and it is important her children learn how devastating it can be. Sheridan said ""my kids see the effect and when they hear about crystal meth and people driving around and stuff like that I'm hoping they are learning from what they see and not just what I say". She says she hopes her children can learn from other's mistakes. Sheridan said "hopefully, not only what i say but what they see and hear and having extended family being affected by it, all kinds of drugs but especially the meth, hopefully they learn and don't even try it".

Mental Health in Tulsa Area

Nearly one in four Oklahomans suffers from mental health issues. Today, City leaders announced a plan, to try and reverse those numbers. 985,000 people in Oklahoma report mental illness or substance abuse. And of that number, only 35,000 actually find health services for what they need. Today, we learned about a plan bringing together City leaders, mental health professionals and the Zarrow Foundation. A study that will result in a 10-year plan to try and meet the needs of those in the Tulsa metro area with mental illness. Tulsa University's President-Elect, Dr. Gerard Clancy told FOX23 that it is a difficult problem to solve, but it must be addressed. Clancy said "we will come together as a community over the next 10 years, these are the things that we want to do". He also said "sometimes when the numbers are so bad people walk away and say... it's just too big a problem. But if we don't address this, we'll continue to have suffering after suffering after suffering".

Dr Jeffrey Alderman, an Internist explained the areas where Tulsa is lacking. Dr. Alderman said "we don't have enough Psychiatrists, enough social workers, enough therapists, enough counselors in our community". Dr. Alderman stated that that lack of care often leads to trouble. An estimated 8000 people with mental illness are jailed each year, right here in Tulsa. Dr. Alderman said "the jail is probably the biggest repository of people with mental illness in our community and that needs to change". Treatment costs less than incarceration, so there is also a financial benefit. Dr Clancy also discussed the moral obligation of doctors—to help others. He said "with great care... with great attention to it, people can do so much better and in doing so much better with their symptoms, can actually live a life that is so much different than where they might be right now".

Chicken Recalled in Owasso

An Owasso food distributor, National Steak and Poultry is recalling more than 17,000 pounds of ready to eat chicken products. National Steak and Poultry said the chicken could be undercooked which could allow dangerous bacteria to survive. No reports of any illness. The recalled products include 5-pound bags that were packaged on October 4th and 5th.

The Importance of Carbon Monoxide in Your Home

It is "odorless, colorless, and it can kill you." Today in Tulsa, EMSA stressed the importance of having a working carbon monoxide detector in your home. This is just one day after EMSA responded to a scene where five people showed signs of carbon monoxide poisoning. The symptoms are often described as flu-like. For your protection, the CDC says your heating system, water heater, and any other gas, oil, or coal burning appliance should be serviced by a qualified technician every year.

Meat Recall in Green Country (Owasso)

It is a nationwide recall stemming from National Steak and Poultry's headquarters right here in Green Country. This week, the Owasso based company announced a voluntary recall expansion of "it's ready to eat" chicken products. In November, the company recalled more than 17,000 pounds of chicken. Now, the recall includes nearly two million pounds of pre-cooked chicken over concerns that it is undercooked. The USDA has rated this a class one recall which is highest priority. Company Spokesman, Lyle Qrwig, said the products have not been sold directly to consumers.

Instead, they sell their products to food service locations, such as chain restaurants in all 50 states. He said the recall is "simply out of an abundance of caution we wanted to make sure that any product that would still be out there is brought back". He also said "we're re-evaluating and re-checking all of our processes and working closely with AFSIS and USDA in order to makes sure that we are following all the proper procedures". He stated that employees are being re-trained and they are inspecting all of the machines. Affected products include ready-to-eat Hormel chicken strips, Hormel fajita chicken and the list goes on.

Flu Risk in Tulsa

This week's flu numbers from the Oklahoma State Department of Health are about halfway between last year's numbers and the year before. Ellen Niemitalo of the Tulsa Health Department told FOX23 that overall hospitalizations jumped by 12 this week. While the numbers are on the rise, she said we still have yet to reach the peak of the season. Ellen said "there are, so far, 54 hospitalizations in Oklahoma,

11 of those in Tulsa County. It normally doesn't peak until the end of January, beginning of February, but it certainly starts to increase". The holidays of course, mean those family gatherings and travel and that can impact how much of a chance you have of catching the flu. And of course, there are those old standbys. The things that they tell you year after year that you need to do, to try and prevent it. Ellen said "you can still come in and get the flu vaccine... other than that, of course... careful, meticulous, consistent hand-washing and hand-sanitizing is very important. Cover your cough". Jacob Gonzalez, who lives in Tulsa, echoed those sentiments. Gonzales said ""we try to keep hand soap, sanitizer, anything we can in the car, the house, anywhere we can". While it is impossible to predict how bad the season will be, Ellen is hoping for a repeat of last year. She said

"last year was thankfully a very mild flu season. We're hoping this year is a mild season, too".
