Flood Victims Face FEMA Dilemma

Victims of May's historic flooding in eastern Oklahoma say getting money from FEMA has been a hassle because to keep the money, they must get flood insurance on their properties and finding someone to insure them for a reasonable rate has been difficult. FEMA acknowledged that anyone receiving disaster relief does need to have flood insurance, and if they don't, they will have to give back a portion of the money that was used for the National Flood Insurance Program. Most insurers won't insure flooded property, but FEMA says there are insurance agencies that are participating in the National Flood Insurance Program.

Orchard Thanks Good Weather for Bumper Crop

One week out from the annual Porter Peach Festival, the town is pleased to hear that their peach crops are doing very well. Most, if not all, of the nearly 10,000 trees at Livesay Orchard is filled with peaches, which is a huge improvement from the nearly 90% of the crop that was lost last year due to bad weather. Kent Livesay, co-owner of the orchard, said the late freeze in April 2018 was the kiss of death to his crop, as peaches are very sensitive to cold. Although there have been a few close calls this year, Kent says overall, they got through winter pretty well and he and his family are relieved that things have bounced back. There's still plenty of time left in peach season even after the festival, but Livesay says this year has the potential to be a very good crop.

TFD Calls Increase Due to Heat

With excessive heat today, Tulsa Fire crews have seen an increase in heat related stress calls. Firefighters are encouraging everyone to take some of the same precautions they take while working in the heat. They encourage lots of breaks if working in the heat, as well as the required minimum 2 to 4 ounces of water for every 20 minutes of work. Officials also recommend going indoors where there is air conditioning if you can during breaks. The CDC recommends if you're working in intense heat to drink 8 ounces of water every 15 to 20 minutes. There are several cooling stations open in the Tulsa area for free.

Flood Damage Delays School Start

Students in Webbers Falls were set to go back to school today but repairs still underway at their flood-damaged school have delayed that. Volunteers, school staff, and contractors have been working 12 hour shifts to repair the school before the projected first day on September 3rd. The school has had the dry

wall and ceiling grids replaced, but they still need help putting in the furniture and extra cleaning in the classrooms. The school softball team is holding practice as normal, along with helping clean the field along with their coaches. Students at Bixby Public Schools are back at school today, but it doesn't feel much like fall with temps soaring above 100 degrees. At Bixby North Elementary, staff made the decision not to let the students outside for recess. Bixby Superintendent Rob Miller says the kids play games and do activities in their classrooms or gym for indoor recess, and hopes that in a couple of weeks they won't have to worry about seeing high temps. The elementary plans to hand out water bottles and send messages to parents asking them to send refillable water bottles, especially for students who have sports practices in the afternoon.

Effort Underway to Remove Crashed Barges

Efforts are in the beginning stages to pull the two sunken barges away from the Webbers Falls dam after they broke loose back in the record May flooding and crashed into the dam and sank. When the barges collided with the dam, some of the debris went through the floodgates, but for the most part everything is wrapped around the structure and will take a while to get loose. The barges have been mostly underwater until now, thanks to the reduced water level so crews don't have to fight against the pressure of a full river while they begin recovery operations. Rodney Beard with the US Army Corps of Engineers says the lock and dam is built to withstand impact, but that doesn't mean it's immune from damage. Once the barges are removed, further work on repairing the actual structure will be the next priority in the rush to get the river back open.

Oklahoma Task Force Preps for Hurricane Dorian

The task force left Friday night and arrived in Florida Sunday morning with rescue boats, trailers, emergency gear, and four K9s in tow. Right now, the task force is in the planning stages and preparing for the hurricane which could bring devastation. About 35 firefighters on the task force are from the Tulsa area, and could be there for weeks. The Oklahoma crew is set to be stationed in Orlando and ready to help where and if they are needed.

Heavy rains and flash flooding in the area this morning prompted several cars to stall out, forcing owners to abandon them. The Tulsa Fire Department says that the area near 81st and Elwood is always

very dangerous anytime there is flash flooding and posted a video to their Facebook page earlier today of two cars stuck in flood water on 81st Street South near Airport Way and Elwood Avenue. One car's owner says there are usually barricades up on that street if flooding is an issue, and that crews were putting out barricades right after her car stalled. Andy Little with Tulsa Fire said that road often causes problems and hopes people will take note of how quickly it flooded and stalled cars this morning. All the cars that were stalled out on that road have now been towed and the road is back open.

Officer Involved Shooting in Tulsa

An officer-involved shooting took place today in Tulsa, while police served a search warrant on 58-year-old Donald Berry's home. Deputy Chief Dennis Larsen says officers tried to get Berry to drop a pistol that he was pointing at traffic. Berry's response was to load his gun, so officers decided to fire twice. Berry was hit once and taken to the hospital. While he was recovering, officers have continued their investigation of his home, seizing a handful of guns. Berry is not a felon, but police made the decision to remove the guns from his home following the incident this morning.

Catoosa Police Arrest 7 in Drug Bust

Seven people are now in jail in what started as a routine trespassing call for a man named Bryon Panther. Catoosa Police Officer Brent Colbert said security at the Hard Rock Casino in Catoosa watched Panther enter a hotel room and then never come out. Police found Panther hiding in the bathroom and found four other people in the room with him. Colbert said officers found drugs hidden in pockets, safes, and backpacks, everything from heroin to ecstasy to nearly 90 Xanax bars and almost a pound of meth. They also found about \$23,000 in cash. Despite the bust, guests at the casino said they felt safe and would continue to come back. Catoosa police say this is an example that they continue to be proactive in the casino area.

A Tulsa man who once ran for Governor is in jail again, accused of posting a threat detailing a shooting at the University of Tulsa. Christopher Barnett is already being investigated for shooting a process server outside of his home, and now his bail has been bumped up to a million dollars. Tulsa County DA Steve Kunzwiler says if Barnett can get out of jail, he will be required to wear an ankle monitor. Barnett posted a manifesto to his website on how to carry out a mass shooting at a TU football game and plant the evidence on TU, which prompted police to execute a search warrant at Barnett's home, seizing multiple guns and ammunition and then placing him under arrest for the second time in 24 hours.

Tulsa Police are searching for a suspect this morning after a man was shot in the stomach and his face. Officers say the victim drove to a parking lot near Pine and MLK for help. Police say a crew of Tulsa firefighters happened to be on their way back from another call, passed the parking lot, and heard the victim blaring his truck horn. The crews said the truck was driving slowly around the lot, and when they stopped to help, they found the man had been shot in the face, the stomach, and twice in the arms.

Police so far have had trouble finding the scene because so far they haven't talked to anyone who saw it happen.

Tulsa Police are investigating tonight after two people were shot outside the Meadows Apartments in East Tulsa this afternoon. Officers say a man and a woman were shot outside the complex, in what they are calling an isolated incident. TPD Sergeant Billy White says both victims were sent to the hospital with unknown conditions. Police also don't know what led up to the shooting. Sergeant White said there were at least four or five shots fired when they arrived on scene. White believes the man and the woman were connected but didn't catch their ages. Police cleared the scene after only a couple of hours, and urge anyone with information to call in.

Counterfeit Money Leads to Drug Bust

Broken Arrow Police are warning local businesses to be on the lookout for counterfeit cash. It comes after some employees noticed a fake \$100 bill from a customer. Officers say they arrived after being called by the employees and looked at the surveillance video, showing the suspect handing the phony money to the employee. That video is what helped police find their suspect, Timothy Pfof, later that day. They say Pfof pulled into a driveway near 9th and Wesley and an officer approached him. They found more counterfeit money in his wallet, and a duffel bag in the car containing stolen checks, bags of meth, and liquid fentanyl. Police said Pfof was not only a convicted felon but had two outstanding warrants.

Tulsa Officer Catches Mail Thief in Neighborhood

A Tulsa Police officer caught an unlucky suspect trying to steal mail from his mailbox tonight. The officer said his house has 17 security cameras, and one was placed right on his mailbox, which alerted the officer to motion around 1am. The officer woke up and saw a car, checking mailboxes up and down the street. The car stopped at his mailbox but took off when the driver saw the camera. Officer Hamm says that camera caught the suspect going through all the boxes, but the picture of the face was hard to work with. The shot of the car was clear: a Pontiac Bonneville. A couple of days later, Officer Hamm saw TPD has arrested someone for stealing one and looked up the mugshot. The face matched the one on his camera, and when Hamm popped the trunk, he found several pieces of stolen mail from his own neighborhood.

Wagoner Police pulled over 21-year-old Deandre Hughes on Thursday for swerving and rolling through stop signs near Madison and 6th Street only to find out his license was suspended, so they arrested him.

Officers conducted an inventory check on Hughes' car before it was impounded. Police say they found a fanny pack filled with hundreds of dollars' worth of heroin, scales, and baggies. Hughes was just recently released from prison after being convicted on drug charges. Officer TJ Ponds says the worst part of this arrest is that Hughes operating just steps away from Ellington Elementary School. Hughes faces charges for possession and intent to distribute within 2000 feet of a school.

Homeowner Shoots Suspect in Self Defense

Tulsa Police say they will not be making an arrest in Tulsa's 48th homicide of the year. Officers say it was a homeowner who shot and killed a suspect on in self-defense. Police say the evidence backs up his story. Officers say it started around 9:30 Sunday night, with an aggressive knock on the homeowner's front door, who says he was not expecting company and grabbed his handgun for protection. The homeowner looked out the peephole and saw the suspect was holding a handgun also. That's when Officer Jeannie Pierce said the homeowner fired two shots, one of them hitting the suspect who police identified as 19-year-old Troy Giles who later died at the hospital. Officer Pierce says they did find a gun on Giles, but do not believe he ever fired it. In this case though, Pierce says that doesn't matter because Giles had a firearm in his hand that made the homeowner fear for his life. Police say the two did know each other but for the time being, the homeowner was questioned and released.

Route 66 Sculpture Unveiled

Pinnell is also the Secretary of tourism and said he's working on a marketing campaign to showcase Route 66 across Oklahoma.

New City Pool Opens

The city announced they were extending a special invitation to families and enjoy free admission all opening weekend.

Rogers County Sheriff Office Holds Auction

Walton stressed that all firearm buyers will have to pass all background checks. The auction's profits will go toward funding some much needed equipment at the sheriff's office. Police Department Acquires New Helicopter

The Tulsa Police Department have announced their new helicopter, costing more than four million dollars, as a way to help improve safety in the city. The Air Support Unit says the helicopter is a tool that is beneficial not only for the Tulsa area, but also other surrounding communities. Through the Vision Tulsa program, police chief Chuck Jordan says the chopper will replace the old, outdated one. Jordan says it will not only reduce maintenance costs, but also improve their capabilities during searches, pursuits, and recently, assessing flood damage. The helicopter has updated technology that enable

officers to see clearer images from higher above than ever before. Tactical Flight Officer Jason Busby says the advantage of the new technology adds a whole new perspective. The department said their helicopters average about 700 flight hours a year.

Governor Delivers State of the State Address

Governor Kevin Stitt gave his annual State of the State address today at the Cox Business Center in Tulsa. He spoke to a crowd of about 1300 organized by the Tulsa Regional Chamber. Governor Stitt doubled down on his promise to make Oklahoma a "top 10 state", and says he feels he has the right leadership in place to move the needle in a positive direction. The Governor also said school funding was a must if the state doesn't want to continue to get left behind. Stitt said he wants a better classification between violent and non-violent offenders in the last 6 months. He also said the state plans to continue funding ODOT's 8-year plan with the goal to be in top 10 infrastructure by 2020.

The Tulsa Rapid Transit System is nearing completion, and soon not only will people on Peoria have a new bus stop sheltered from the elements, they won't have to wait as long for the next bus. The new rapid route will go from 54th Street North and Peoria to the 81st Street Walmart. Liann Alfaro with Tulsa Transit says this route will be faster, running every 15 minutes during peak hours and every 20 off peak and will not stop between stations. The system is called the Peoria Aero Bus Rapid Transit Station and gets its name from a nod to Tulsa's aeronautic roots. The design of the station is art deco themed. All Aero buses will have on board WIFI and elevated platforms to make it easier for wheelchair accessibility. Alfaro believes the new buses will have a positive impact on the Peoria area.

Officials say they will be on the lookout for illegal parking, which can result in a \$50 fine and up to a \$500 fine for any property owners who allow illegal parking. Dunbar Middle School Unveils Changes

The lab will eventually have a 3D printer, a drone cage, and other interactive learning stations where students can spend 90 minutes a day over a 9-week period. Finally, they are also providing 15 minutes a day to “social emotional time”, where staff members will have a chance to mentor the kids. Lee hopes all of these changes will greatly enhance the learning experience at Dunbar.

Tulsa Public School officials held a public planned community meeting tonight at Webster High School to discuss the best way to cut twenty million dollars from the school's budget. Many parents, teachers, and

TPS alumni came to the meeting to brainstorm what areas should be prioritized in the face of drastic cuts that will be needed before the next school year. The district has not yet determined what areas will be cut, which is why they are seeking as much feedback as possible. Dr Deborah Gist says unfortunately, after years of seeing a decrease in state funding, the district has already cut everything they could so having to cut an additional 20 million will now no doubt directly impact students next year. The district plans to have additional community meetings this week at Nathan Hale and Booker T Washington high schools, as well as St Francis Xavier church.
