Muskogee Preps for Snow

Emergency management crews in Muskogee are preparing for what is forecasted to be a messy couple of days of snow. They have the snow plow hooked up and the spreaders in place for ice and sand. Trisha German, Muskogee County EMS says these measures are in place to hope for the best but prepare for the worst. Residents in Muskogee agree that you can never be too prepared after they faced historic flooding last year. German says every EMS truck has a winter prep box and all the front lines trucks are ready for automatic snow chains. Extra staff are also on call. German says if the weather does get bad, stay in and don't risk it. She said the city's Facebook page is the best way to get updated information from the EMS crews.

Tornado Touches Down in Cherokee County

A confirmed tornado caused storm damage today in Cherokee county. Keys resident Brandie Walker said she was away from her family in Tahlequah when the storm hit, but thankfully they were safe in their below-ground cellar. Walker's daughter Gracee described the experience, saying it got very quiet and then they heard a very loud screaming noise. She could hear metal bending outside, which turned out to be the tornado ripping their carport and flinging it away, and they still have no idea where it landed. Walker isn't sure if she can repair her home, but they are trying to save what is left of it. Other damage in Keys includes power lines down, flooding, and other homes that were hit.

NWS Confirms Rare January Tornado

The National Weather Service says they will be surveying the damage in this area today, but they have already declared last Friday's event a tornado based on radar damage. A home near West 830 Road and Highway 52 had its roof torn off while the resident was inside. Another home had its siding torn off and the deck that was just built last year is gone. The NWS will be surveying the area as soon as this afternoon or later this week. They still need to assess how much damage was done.

ODOT Gears Up for Snow

The Oklahoma Department of Transportation and the Oklahoma Turnpike Authority are already treating roads and preparing to respond to the potential winter weather across the state tomorrow. OTA crews have been treating the turnpikes with a liquid brine solution and they'll be back at 8pm tonight preparing for whatever tomorrow may bring. ODOT officials also have crews coming in at midnight, putting snow plows on standby across the state to treat all highways as needed. Officials remind you to

stay back 150 feet if you see crews on the road and say that if the weather is bad then to just stay home. They say whether it's sleet or significant snowfall, they are fully prepared to keep drivers safe.

Historic Submarine Asks FEMA for Restoration After Flooding

Officials with Muskogee's USS Batfish submarine are working hard to get the sub back open after historic flooding last spring. The executive director for the museum says if FEMA will approve the roughly \$2 million the sub needs, it could be back open to the public later this year. But if FEMA does not approve it. The money is going to have to come from outside sources and will take possibly too much time. The hope to stabilize the submarine where it's currently sitting, putting a cradle system underneath and putting in steel cables that will connect two anchors with a winch on top so that when it floods again, it will loosen up and rise with the water. Option two is to keep it where it was pre-disaster which is not ideal.

Highway Open After Historic Flooding

A section of Highway 10 in Fort Gibson is finally open after last year's historic flooding. It's been 10 months since cars have been able to drive on this part of the highway. Crews held a grand opening last week. They started the project in November. Crews say the retaining wall is used to fill a shoulder of the road after it was destroyed by the flooding last spring. At the height of the flooding, 150 highways were closed either due to standing water or damage to the roads. Transportation crews say all that flooding caused nearly \$20 million in damages to country roads and highways.

Rehabbers with WING IT, volunteers, and the Tulsa Zoo spent hours rescuing pelicans with broken wings and large open wounds using nothing but nets, blankets, and boats. Sadly, some pelicans were so badly injured that they had to be put to sleep but at least 4 are at the Tulsa Zoo, starting their journey back to health. The group is planning another rescue this week and the Tulsa Zoo says they are willing to take in any rescued pelicans any day until 2pm.

TPS Formally Presents Budget Cuts

Tulsa Public Schools superintendent Dr. Deborah Gist formally presented her plan to cut about \$20 million from the 20/21 budget tonight at the Tulsa School Board meeting. The plan has been a long time coming, with several community feedback meetings and public meetings over the past few months on this issue. Dr. Gist said at the meeting that this budget downfall prompts drastic changes to be made, like closing schools. Parents attended the meeting to protest the decision to close 4 elementary schools, but Dr. Gist wants them to understand the district is in a serious deficit and the closings make sense during a time like this.

OSU Names New Agricultural School

Oklahoma State University will name its new agricultural school after two former students who made one of the largest ever donations to the university. OSU says alumni Kayleen and Larry Ferguson donated \$50 million to the school on the Stillwater campus. The entire school is expected to cost \$100 million and could open as early as 2023. It will replace the current agricultural hall which first opened in 1957.

TPS Hosts Lawmakers for Breakfast

The Tulsa Public School District hosted state lawmakers this morning for breakfast at Nathan Hale High School. This annual meeting gives TPS the opportunity to talk directly to legislators about what the district needs, their hopes for the next year, as well as spotlighting some of their successes. One of the positive things Hale Principal Sheila Riley wanted to highlight is the new Hale Beyond program. Another topic of discussion was funding. Superintendent Dr Gist gave a breakdown of how they're trying to cut \$20 million from the budget, which includes reducing district office staff, closing elementary schools, and changes to elementary staffing.

She also says that the bond can help free up more money to be spent on teacher salaries, which will help keep smaller class sizes.

William Franklin has owned Decopolis in downtown Tulsa for seven years, four years at their current location in the Deco district. Franklin is excited to bring something new to Route 66 in Tulsa, in a two-part concept. The first will be called "Decopolis Curiosities and Wonders" which will have lots of science themed items. The second will be "Tulsarama" right next door, which will display Tulsa's history. Franklin plans to use his artistic talent to design the inside of Tulsarama to look like a little town square with art deco displays. He will also sell several books by local authors. They are hoping to open sometime in May.

Claremore Lake Receives Rescue Boat

Claremore is giving us a closer look at a project that would improve safety at one of the city's top recreation spots: Claremore Lake. The city says the lake is a prime spot for visitors and soon three departments will be training with the city's new rescue boat. Claremore city manager Jim Thomas says Parks and Rec is always working to improve Claremore Lake. He says this spring, residents will be able to rent kayaks and the city's new boat will help if there is an emergency. Thomas says the city bought a \$65,000 boat that will be used by park rangers, Claremore Police and Fire. The boat replaces a smaller boat that's 25 years old. The city also re-awarded a bid to build a new boat house where the rescue boat can be easily accessible and ready all year long. Altogether, it's about a \$200,000 project.

Franklin says he would like to see less racial division and acknowledges that these changes can take time but is hopeful that it can be done.

Okmulgee Proposes New Tax District

Tonight in Okmulgee the city council is discussing a proposal for a new tax district in the downtown area in an effort to land a new grocery store. City officials say there's been a lot of progress in Okmulgee over the past few years, but they're now aiming for even bigger growth through some new incentives. Vice Mayor Richard Larabee says they are trying to land a new grocery store in the downtown area, which would bring 75 jobs. That's why city council is looking at possibly creating a TIF district to help pay for infrastructure or other changes to serve as an incentive to draw new businesses in. Larabee says that creating a TIF district here would draw in other landmark retail and presenting the plan before council is just the first step. If the proposal moves forward, city officials hope to finalize the details of the TIF district in the next 3 to 6 months.

Pryor Industrial Park Opens New Center

There's a new center inside Pryor's Mid-American Industrial Park, focused on job training. The Center of Excellence plans to meet companies needs when it comes to training skilled workers. The center has partnered with multiple agencies to create a tailored workforce development program. The \$4 million facility has more than a million dollars' worth of equipment, including CNC machines, 3D printers, and coordinate measurement machinery. The center is also home of the Mayes county robotics team and Pryor High Schools advanced manufacturing program. Mid-America says 60% of area high school students do not go on to 4-year colleges or university, so the center is a place they can learn valuable skills that will get them career ready. Action Group Staffing is also located in the center, helping job seekers get to work after getting their training.

Tulsa Transit Partners with Gathering Place for Shuttle Service

The city of Tulsa, Tulsa Transit, and the Gathering Place have all teamed up to offer a free shuttle service from three downtown locations. Officials say they wanted it to be easier to people to utilize the park during peak hours. The three locations are at Tulsa Community College's Metro Campus, 4th and Denver, and Boston Avenue Methodist Church. Officials with the Gathering Place say there will be an additional 1,000 parking spots and that it was important to keep it free. The effort is a collaboration between the Mayor's office, Tulsa Transit, and the Gathering Place and will run starting today through the end of summer. The shuttle picks up passengers every 15 minutes and takes 10 minutes to arrive at the Gathering Place.

Tulsa Mayor Declares Civil Emergency

Tulsa Mayor GT Bynum signed an executive order today declaring a civil emergency for the city of Tulsa today. For the first time since prohibition and for the first time ever for health reasons, all bars in Tulsa city limits are being shut down until further notice, along with gyms and movie theaters. Come midnight, restaurants will only be allowed to serve patrons at the drive through and for pickup orders. The decision to close comes after hundreds of people across the Tulsa metro continued to go out to eat and drink last weekend after being advised to practice social distancing. Fearing that younger adults felt the virus won't impact them, but they would carry it to someone else, the city has decided to suspend all eating and drinking out until further notice. At midnight, any bar that remains open, and any restaurant that continues to serve people in its dining rooms puts its license to operate at risk of being revoked.

Arrest in Second Homicide of the Year

Tulsa Police have arrested Charles Boaz today in connection with the shooting death of Kim Hayes this week, the second homicide for the city so far this year. Officers say Boaz was meeting his lawyer at the Tulsa Hills shopping center this morning when they arrested him. He is wanted for shooting and killing Kim Hayes in his neighborhood near Virgin and Union in northwest Tulsa. Police were able to get useful information in the first few minutes of the investigation, thanks to physical evidence and plenty of witness on the scene. Officers were unable to determine the exact cause of the shooting but believe it was some sort of drug deal. The victim leaves behind family, including a one-year-old son.

Police Investigate Shooting in Tulsa

Tulsa Police are investigating the shooting death of a 24-year-old today in north Tulsa. Police believe the victim was shot by his own mother in a driveway near 51st St North and Peoria. Officers say the victim, Jamel Barrett, and his mother got into an argument, then she called police, before shooting him from her garage. Barrett died on the scene in her driveway. Neighbors are shocked to hear about the incident, calling the suspect a very nice person and that she cared about her son. Police say the mother was questioned and then released, pending further investigation.

Reward Triples for Killer of McAlester Taxi Driver

The reward money to find the killer of McAlester taxi driver Dustin Parker has tripled by the victim's family, in hopes of finding vital clues and information into what happened. Regina Parker, wife of Dustin, says she and her children were greeted on New Year's Day by police officers explaining their husband and father had been murdered. Working for Rover Cab, Dustin went out on an early morning call to an address that would turn out to be his final destination. Dustin would be found dead in the driver's seat. Dustin's friend and co-worker believes this wasn't a botched robbery and based on the death certificate, says it was a targeted murder. An arrest has yet to be made in the case.

Okfuskee Man Accused of Murder

An Okfuskee man is behind bars tonight accused of murdering a mother and a son and setting their home on fire. Investigators say they believe 29-year-old Josh Green killed a 57-year-old mother and a 22-year-old son in their home east of Okemah and then set the home on fire. They believe Green was staying with the family. Officials say after the fire was set, Green stole one of the victim's cars and drove away. Finding the car was challenging because heavy snowfall covered the tracks after Green went off road and drove through the woods and abandoned it in a creek area. OSBI is helping with the investigation and officials say they are still looking into a possible motive for the crime.

State Agents Investigate Murder Suicide

State agents are investigating a murder-suicide tonight in Washington County, in the town of Dewey. Police say it started with a protective order being served, which led to the suspect shooting another man before turning the gun on himself. Investigators say the suspect died around 11 after he was transported to a hospital in Tulsa in critical condition. The Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigations are still interviewing and gathering evidence, working to determine the relationship of everyone involved.

Home Invasion in North Tulsa

A Tulsa family is safe tonight after an intruder broke into their home near Archer and Lewis. Tulsa Police say the intruder was chased away by the family dog. The mother was home alone with her two young children when she says the suspect came barging in and tried knocking over a table. But between the mom and her protective dog, they chased the man right back out the door. The man went outside and then tried breaking in the windows and tried the front door again. The family dog stepped in to help, barking at the intoxicated man before he left. The victim called police, who found suspect James Ladd Junior walking nearby. Officers arrested him, but this wasn't the first time he's been to jail. Ladd had served 10 years previously due to pleading guilty to robbing a Tulsa bank.

Tulsa police were called to the Waterstone Apartment Complex around 2:20 this morning for a domestic violence situation involving a knife. In just minutes, officers arrived at the complex at 61st and Peoria and found Jerry Gaghins. They said he still had the knife and asked him several times to put it down, but he refused to comply. Lt. Richard Meulenberg with the Tulsa Police Department said at that point, officers and the complex's security guard felt that the use of their firearms was the best way to stop the threat at hand. Gaghins was rushed to the hospital with life threatening injuries after the shooting. He died just after 3 o'clock this morning. Investigators spent more than 5 hours at the complex, photographing evidence, canvassing the area, and talking with residents in the area.

Tulsa County deputies released video of them taking two men into custody following a reported kidnapping yesterday. Deputy Justin Green says the arrest started when deputies were patrolling the Parkview Apartments in west Tulsa when a man came running up to them saying his girlfriend had been kidnapped. The suspects had not taken the girl's phone, so she was able to communicate with her boyfriend. The deputies called the woman, pretending to be someone else, and helped her come up with a plan. The victim told the suspects she needed to go to QuikTrip to pick up something, and once she was inside she told the clerk what was going on. The clerks took her from the front of the store to

the back and locked the door until deputies arrived and arrested the men. Along with the suspects and the victim, there was also another man, a woman, and a 2-year-old child in the car as well. The men were also accused of child endangerment and sexual battery.

Tulsa Mayor GT Bynum signed an order prohibiting all public and private gatherings of any number outside of a family or living unit. Violators could be slapped with a \$100 fine or even spend time in jail. With lots of room for error to make a social distancing mistake, many are concerned. Tulsa Police Lt. Richard Meulenberg says TPD doesn't have the manpower to enforce every trivial rule, but they are being extremely active with the more serious provisions. Any non-essential business that is still operating with big groups of people can get in trouble with the law. TPD is also responding to citizens' calls about more serious social distance violators and business that stayed open when they shouldn't be. Lt. Meulenberg says their first goal is to inform people of the new rules, and if they still won't comply then they will write that person a citation. They won't take someone to jail unless they absolutely have to.

The Novel Coronavirus continues to spread, now topping 45,000 cases around the world. Here in the US, officials are trying to figure out if our system is ready in the event of a major influx of cases. The CDC has screened more than 30,000 people traveling from China at 11 US airports. Dry was a groundskeeper at Oral Roberts University and had not travelled recently. Also serving as proof that the virus is spreading person to person is that Oklahoma now has two children between the ages of 0-47 who contracted the virus from someone else. Tulsa Mayor GT Bynum said he was disturbed that neighboring cities have not yet closed bars, gyms, theaters, and restaurant dining rooms now that community spread is confirmed.
