Pawnee County Deals with Flash Flooding

While there are fires expected in the fall, experts say it tends to get worse in the spring before everything begins to turn green again. The region averages about 350 fires a year.

Wildfire Started by Semi Truck Spreads Quickly

A semi truck with a blown tire sparked an 8 mile wildfire in Okfuskee County. At least nine fire crews worked to contain the blaze. The fire went along I-40. "We're so dry that what little rain we get isn't going to last long. We're just going to have to be very careful the rest of this winter," he said. Crews are concerned about winds picking up and fires rekindling thanks to the moving air.

Two people arrested in Tulsa County for fake checks could have a national impact. The Tulsa County Sheriff's Office says there are more than 30 victims in the case. It started with a traffic stop. A deputy pulled over the two suspects and found "an absolute mother-load of what we think are stolen checks." Investigators say many were taken from mailboxes and some may even be counterfeit. In addition to the checks, they found what appears to be meth and drug paraphernalia. The suspects were booked into the Tulsa County jail.

Juvenile Crime Laws Scrutinized After Teacher Killed

Deonte Green was charged with nine felonies including murder in the death of a Broken Arrow teacher. The district attorney's office says the reason he was out of juvenile detention was simple. His crimes weren't bad enough to keep him in there longer. The crimes he's charged with now are by far the most violent. Juvenile documents show that Green was considered to be a high risk repeat offender, but prosecutors say their hands are tied.

Domestic Dispute Turned Deadly

Keia Beaver has been arrested, suspected of shooting and killing her partner Jeremy Fagile. She told investigators the two of them got into a fight Tuesday morning, claiming Fagile tried to strangle her, bit her, and wouldn't let her leave the house. Then he went to his vehicle, got a gun, and threatened her with it. Undersheriff Jason Chennault said after Fagile got his gun, Beaver went inside and grabbed another gun. She told deputies she fired a warning shot to scare him, but ended up shooting him instead. Deputies say the couple has a history of domestic violence.

Owasso Burglary Ring

Five people are in custody, accused of leading Owasso Police on a chase. It started after they shoplifted nearly three thousand dollars' worth of merchandise from a children's clothing store and a sporting goods store. Police say suspects then took off onto Highway 169. An officer tried to make a traffic stop, but the suspects exited at 76th Street North and even tried to ram a police car to get away. Officers were able to use stop sticks near 76th Street North and Cedar Street to take the suspects into custody. Everything they stole was still inside the car.

Muskogee Rapist Solicited Teen Girl from Inside Prison

A convicted rapist admitted to having a cellphone at Jess Dunn Correctional Center and was using it to send explicit pictures to an underage girl. According to officers at the prison, cell phones are a major problem. Officers say it started when a man called saying his 17-year-old granddaughter was communicating with Jesse Lee McFadden, who was serving time for a 2003 rape in Pittsburg county. Officers then found McFadden with a phone hiding under a notebook that he used to send and receive inappropriate pictures. DOC officials say that it is not just the inmates that can face charges for having a contraband cell phone; the person who smuggles it in can also face charges.

Broken Arrow Police are looking for a man they say told a clerk at a Kum-N-Go convenience store that he was a police officer and tried to get special treatment. The clerk knew he was fake because he had come in to the store the night before claiming to be a firefighter and trying to get free gas. Broken Arrow Police officer James Koch said the man flashed the clerk a badge and said that he worked for a federal agency. The man then tried to return some electronics without a receipt, and became angry when the clerk said he couldn't make the return. He tried to return the items to another Kum-N-Go, at which point the employees called the police. Officers say it's concerning when someone impersonates them, because they want to maintain a level of trust with their communities.

The Tulsa Police Department said he is a possible suspect in at least two other sexual assault cases reported on campus this year. Martin has been dismissed by the University.

The study is being paid for by Tulsa's Vision package. The study will take about 8 months to complete.

Owasso Public Schools Votes on School Bond

Voters have five days left to decide to pass a bond that would build a ninth elementary school and bring upgrades to schools across the district. The bond issue is also proposing turf replacement, facility and classroom upgrades, and the replacement of old textbooks and school buses. The vote is October 10th.

This all comes after Bixby police started investigation reports of football players sexually assaulting a teammate at Wood's home. After the resignation was approved parents and community members became upset, hoping for termination instead. Along with Woods, three other administrators were accused in covering up the assault.

Tahlequah Domestic Violence Prevention Program to Close

A program to help victims of child abuse and domestic violence in Tahlequah has been forced to close after thirty years due to budget cuts to mental health programs. The "Helping U Grow", or HUG Program, at Help In Crisis in Tahlequah is a preventative home visitation program that provides a variety of resources to at risk families in Cherokee County. The program found out that they are set to lose their \$200,000 contract due to budget cuts. Directors at Help In Crisis hope that something may change to be able to bring the HUG Program back one day, and they're concerned about the future of Oklahoma should these types of drastic cuts to mental health continue. The Tahlequah employees are just four of the nearly 8,500 people across the state expected to lose their jobs from this new round of cuts.

Federal Help To Combat Opioid Abuse in Oklahoma

There has been a significant increase in opioid abuse in Oklahoma in the past five years. Doctor Aaron Lane is an ER doctor and says dealing with opioid overdoses is their unfortunate reality. Of the more than 3,000 unintentional overdose deaths in Oklahoma between 2007 and 2011, 81% involved at least one prescribed drug. Lane says another factor is that doctors are feeling pressure to make sure patients aren't in any pain. Now doctors can rely on a state database to make sure patients aren't abusing medications. The database tells doctors all of the controlled medications a patient has been prescribed in the last year.

Tulsa Mental Health Clinics Prep to Work Through More Budget Cuts

Mental health advocates across Tulsa are preparing for another four million dollars in cuts as the state moves to fund prisons over mental health care. Some agencies are seeing further cutbacks in order for state lawmakers to try to keep current funding going to education and public safety. In the newly revised budget, mental health and substance abuse programs will get an additional four million in cuts. The CEO of the Oklahoma Mental Health Association said that while mental health advocates are glad education is being spared, spending more money on prisons and less on mental health is just setting the state up for more people who need help behind bars.

Oklahoma Group Pushes For Medical Marijuana

Flu Deaths Reported in Oklahoma

State health officials confirmed two people have died of the flu in Oklahoma. The victims were in Johnston and McClain counties, both described as 65 or older. More than one hundred people have been hospitalized in Oklahoma already this season with the flu. The CDC says Oklahoma and Louisiana are the two states the flu is widespread.

First Flu-related Death Reported in Tulsa County

The flu bug continues to spread across Oklahoma, hospitalizing 179 people and killing four. One person from Tulsa County died within the past week. Leanne Stephens with the Tulsa Health Department said the first flu-related death is a sad milestone but nothing to panic about. In 2016, 116 Oklahomans died from the flu, most of which were over the age of 55 and had weak immune systems. The CDC has labeled Oklahoma as one of 6 states to show that the virus is having a widespread impact and will likely increase over the next two months. The Tulsa Health Department is advising everyone to get vaccinated.

Governor Calls Special Session for Health Care

Governor Mary Fallin issued an executive order for a special session with lawmakers to address the budget issues facing the state health care authority. Fallin recommended lawmakers look at funding to avoid provider rate cuts for the current fiscal year, which lasts through next June.

Tulsa Non-Profit Geared Toward Sickle Cell Research and Treatment

A grassroots team dedicated to awareness, the Supporters of Families with Sickle Cell Disease are the first organization of their kind in the state of Oklahoma. Founders Jeremiah and Velvet Watts started the foundation when state funding for Sickle Cell education ceased. According to the CDC, Sickle Cell is an inherited blood disorder causing red blood cells to become crescent shaped which restricts blood flow and in some cases, can cause death. The Watts mission became personal after their child was born with the disease. Oklahoma didn't start mandatory testing for Sickle Cell until 1991, which the Watts say resulted in uninformed families across the state. The Supporters of Families with Sickle Cell Disease are contracted with the Oklahoma Healthcare Authority, but receive minimum state funding and rely mostly on donations. They have helped hundreds of families since 2004 and do not intend to stop any time soon.
