Rain Ruins Local Produce Crops

FOX23 found one stand with no green beans or okra this year and they expect there might not be as many pumpkins in the fall all thanks to the rain. Farmers are explaining to customers that the rain caused the problem this year. Shoppers say they are noticing the shortage everywhere. The rain flooded the fields in the spring, causing serious damage to the plants.

A Campground Reopens Months After Flood Damage

Crews Finish Fixing Road Washed Out by Spring Storms

In the spring, part of 61st Street in eastern Broken Arrow washed out during the storms. The stretch of road is between County Line Road and 209th East Ave. This morning, crews poured fresh concrete in order to get the road back open for drivers who've had to take a detour for a couple of months now. One of the hurdles the city faced was finding a permanent solution to fix the roadway. "We had to completely rebuild this road from the bottom up," explains city spokeswoman Krista Flasch. The city says the road will be in better shape than it was when it washed out because crews installed eight concrete boxes to create the foundation for the road. Crews also had to remove trees and power lines before work could begin at the start of the month.

Experts report seeing more insects than normal and it's not limited to one kind of bug. It's all because of the rainy start of the summer. Companies report more calls about everything from web worms to fleas, ticks and even bed bugs. Keeping a clean house will also help reduce the amount of bugs in your home, because insects thrive on clutter. Homeowners are warned that once temperatures start dropping, rodents will begin to try to move inside where it's warmer.

Troopers Cleared of Wrongdoing in Shooting Death

Two troopers are cleared of a shooting that killed one man and put his brother behind bars. Brandon and Nehemiah Fischer were trying to get out of flood waters in Okmulgee County in May. Video of the confrontation shows the Oklahoma Highway Patrol troopers clearly identifying themselves and asking the men to get out of the flood waters. The video also shows Nehemiah Fischer pushing one of the troopers out of the screen. The troopers testified that Fischer held Trooper Mark Southall under water and that Southall fired at Fischer, but missed. That's when Trooper Michael Taylor fired two shots killing Fischer. The district attorney ruled that the shooting was justified.

Owasso Police Investigate Death of Owasso Baby

Owasso Police are investigating the death of a 10-month-old baby. Investigators say the baby suffered from a traumatic brain injury and they are waiting on the autopsy results. The child was found unresponsive at an apartment complex in Owasso Saturday. She was taken to an Owasso hospital and then transferred to Tulsa. She died the following day. Deputy Chief Jason Woodruff says they are in a holding pattern while they wait for autopsy results to come in.

Vinita Teacher Arrested for the Second Time for Crimes Against a Child

A former Vinita teacher is arrested for the second time for crimes against a child. According to police, the latest victim came forward to say that Ronald Manners molested her in his second grade classroom. Investigators say a vacation bible school teacher overheard the child telling others what happened. That's when they notified police. This is the second time Manners has been in trouble. The Vinita Public Schools superintendent confirms that Manners has been terminated. He bonded out of jail this afternoon.

911 Call in Bever Murders Will Not be Released

A judge has decided that the 911 calls made on the night a family was attacked and killed will not be released. Police say the call was made by one of two boys who were stabbed to death by Robert Bever, 18, and Michael Bever, 16. The original motion called for a ban on all requested public records, but once in court, lawyers admitted they were most concerned about the 911 call. Lawyers say they believe that the release of the tapes would keep the Bever brothers from getting a fair trial. We are working to determine what will happen with other public records from the investigation.

Walgreens Workers Robbed by Man with Gun

A Walgreens was robbed late this morning. Police are still searching for an armed man near Pine and Lewis. Employees tell FOX23 that it was a very scary moment when the man said he had a gun and he wanted cash from the store. Police say the man told a cashier he had a gun, but never showed it. Once the man got the money, they say he ran out of the store. Customers say they are now very concerned about their safety. The man is described as having a short afro and a mole on his right cheek. He's believed to be between 40 and 50 years old.

Four Men Behind Bars in Death of Muskogee Man

Muskogee County Sheriff's Office investigators believe four people are involved in the murder of Robert Guenther. Deputies arrested Thristan Hunter, Charlisha Logan, Mark Logan and Benrick Carter on kidnapping charges. Now they are working to make the case for murder against the four. According to investigators, it's been a three month process with the help of the FBI Violent Crimes Task Force. "We can prove that they abducted him," says Capt. Richard Slader. According to the medical examiner's report, Guenther was killed from multiple gunshot wounds. Deputies say the investigation is ongoing and the four are currently being held without bond.

Woman Arrested After Five Months on the Run

A Sapulpa woman is behind bars after spending the last five months avoiding officers. Sarah Tiger, 38, is accused of embezzling nearly \$50,000 from a Bixby company. When the owner of the business confronted Tiger, she admitted to stealing the money, but it was five months before she turned herself in. Three police departments were on the lookout for Tiger, but investigators believe family members may have been tipping her off before officers could arrive at her location. Investigators say that over the course of a year, Tiger forged signatures to write checks and used the company credit card for concert tickets.

Explosion Caused By Meth Lab in Tahlequah

In the last two years, they say they served three search warrants at the home.

Thieves Take Copper From Soccer Field Lights

Soccer teams who normally practice at the field will have to move to other fields. Officials believe the thieves didn't get as much copper as they were trying to get. The building next to the fields was hit by copper vandals recently.

Plans for Outlet Mall Still Up in the Air

The company behind the mall, Simon Malls, says they are no longer interested in that area. City officials say the company has said that they are still interested in building along Highway 75. Last May some plans were leaked for a possible site in Jenks, but the city of Jenks says they have nothing to announce in the way of an outlet mall.

They say a committee will further review the proposals and will give developers time to review the area again before they move forward with the process.

City Having Trouble Keeping Up with Grass After Rain

The City of Tulsa says they have a backlog of complaints about people's yards thanks to the rain. Complaints are flooding in from around the city and code enforcement officers say they are having troubles keeping up thanks to the same problem homeowners are having. Too much rain and the grass gets too tall, too fast to keep up. Crews say they don't have time for the regular courtesy notice and are going straight to the two week warnings. Crews tell us they are dealing with about 100 complaints a day. The city is considering adding another mowing contractor to help get the grass cut.

City Settles Gender Discrimination Lawsuit

The Tulsa City Council approved a \$35,000 settlement in a lawsuit filed against the Tulsa Fire Chief. Jessica Chance filed the lawsuit after she says she was denied a job as a firefighter. According to the lawsuit, Chance says Chief Ray Driskoll asked for a picture of her which was then compared to new photos of her from a police officer she used to date. The settlement was approved by a court, but it doesn't mean that the chief is guilty of any wrongdoing. The issue now goes to the Human Resources Department.

What the Latest Downturn in Stocks Means for the City of Tulsa

Energy stocks took a hit today, so FOX23 sat down with Mayor Dewey Bartlett to see how the city is preparing to weather the latest financial storm. According to the mayor, the oil surplus may drop the price at the pump, but if no one buys the extra oil then thousands could be out of a job. "We're almost a victim of our own success," Bartlett says. The city is bracing for the worst and are already being conservative in their budgeting. Bartlett, who is also president of Keener Oil and Gas, says they've already had to make cuts. Across the city, some 200 jobs have already been cut as a result of the lower oil prices.

City Officials and Airport Wrap Up Talks With Bank

Talks started around 8 o'clock this morning as they tried to come up with a new settlement. The lawsuit revolves around money the city loaned Great Plain Airline back in 2001 that was not repaid after the airline failed.

Broken Arrow Firefighters Get Grant

A FEMA grant will now be paying for more firefighters in Broken Arrow. The money will help pay for nine additional firefighters for two years. After that, they are hoping the Vision 2025 tax will be renewed in order to keep those firefighters. In Broken Arrow, the firefighters are also paramedics, so they are constantly running on calls. As the city continues to grow, so do the number of emergency calls. In the last decade, the number of emergency calls has increased by 88%, but the number of firefighters and paramedics has only increased by 22%. According to the chief, if the Vision 2025 tax is passed, they want to hire about a dozen new firefighters and consider building a 7th fire station.

Plans for Outlet Mall in East Tulsa Discussed at Meeting

After a planned outlet mall announced their move to Jenks, Tulsa City Councilors say they are doing what they can to make sure the outlet mall in east Tulsa gets off the ground faster. The Outlet Shoppes at Tulsa has been in the discussion phase for a few years now. Plans for the mall call for 90 stores in phase one that could bring in 1,200 permanent jobs. City leaders are in a hurry to make this mall plan happen. They are discussing a tax increment finance district for the area. According to councilor Connie Dodson, there hasn't been a major retail development in the area for over 30 years.

Residents Fight Plans for Juvenile Detention Center in North Tulsa

People in north Tulsa are saying no thanks to a proposal for a new juvenile detention center in the area. The land is one of three locations that is being considered for the new center, but people say they want

no part of the plan. Voters approved a new \$45 million detention center during a 2014 bond election. On Monday county commissioners entered into an agreement with a company to study the locations. Leaders in north Tulsa say the development would hurt the area's focus on retail and revitalization. There are two nursing homes within a mile of the area and a rehab center right across the street. There is no word on when county leaders will make a decision, but say they plan to begin construction next year.

Tulsa's New Superintendent Celebrates First Day in Office

When we asked her about that she told FOX23 that she will be meeting next week to discuss testing. She spent most of her day greeting students and faculty at Tulsa's summer school sites.

Broken Arrow Schools Vote to Increase Pay to All Staff

The Broken Arrow School Board approved additional money for administrators and staff Monday night. The board voted to increase the district's pay scale by an average of 1.5% across the board. The positions seeing the increase include principals, assistant principals, education coordinators, secretaries, bus drivers and more. The increase will apply to any new employee who starts with the district. Teachers were not included in the raise because they have to go through a different process. The district's chief financial officer says they already came to an agreement on teacher raises.

Tulsa Returns to School With More Certified Teachers

For the first time in several years, Tulsa students will go back to school with a certified teacher in every classroom. Superintendent Dr. Deborah Gist says the teacher shortage is a statewide crisis. To overcome this problem, Tulsa Public Schools recruited earlier, looked everywhere and offered signing bonuses to teachers. They looked around the country and slowly started filling the positions. "Right now there are about 450 new teachers here in training," explains Dr. Gist. Last year, TPS had 80 open positions and now they have only four.

District Issues More Emergency Teacher Certifications

Claremore Public Schools have issued more emergency teacher certifications this year than ever before. Superintendent Michael McClaren says it's all about how the teacher connect with the students. "We're going to deliver the best in educational services," he says. Despite budget cuts and a teacher shortage, the district is hiring six teachers with emergency certifications. According to McClaren, the district normally hires only two teachers with those certificates. Those teacher don't necessarily have to have the teacher prep courses. This is how they can get the emergency certifications, but those teachers will be monitored more closely. In addition to the teacher shortage, McClaren says that their budge was slashed by about \$2 million.

Traffic Troubles for the First Day of School

Some parents opted to walk on the first day, but admit even that can be dangerous. Parents and district officials say the first day of school is always the worst.

Lawmakers Wants to Use Tobacco Money to Pay Teachers

Education Could Get Less Money from State Lottery

The commission has released preliminary estimates for fiscal year 2017, projecting \$55 million for education. That's down from \$57.2 million in the 2016 fiscal year. The reason, they say, is that lottery sales are down.

State Lawmakers Want to Fix Teacher Shortage

Former Employees of Kwikset Believe Conditions There Made Them Sick

Former employees of Kwikset believe conditions at the Bristow plant made them very sick. FOX23's Janna Clark talked to dozens of employees who say too many of them have gotten cancer and dealt with other health problems. Employees say they all had to go on disability in their 40's due to breathing problems attributed to the chemicals in the air. FOX23 did some digging and found complaints filed with the Oklahoma Department of Environmental Quality filed as far back as 1994. The complaints document chemical spills. The primary contaminants listed as chromium and chlorinated hydrocarbons.

Salons Seeing Spike in Lice Cases in Children

Salons across Green Country say they are seeing more cases of lice in children. When they spot lice, they are required to immediately stop and sanitize their station. Stylists we talked to said they've turned away more people in the last month for lice than they have all year. The Tulsa County Health Department says home remedies do more harm than good and suggest getting over the counter chemicals to treat the hair.

New Information on Chemicals Leaked at Bristow Plant

The Oklahoma Department of Environmental Quality says their reports on the Bristow Kwikset plant show that in 1999 they found elevated concentrations of toxic chemicals in the soil. The reports also show that the chemicals contaminated the groundwater at the site and have been moving towards a stream that drains into the Little Deep Fork River. DEQ officials say it has not gotten into the drinking water, but they put a restriction on the groundwater under the site. Several former employees we spoke with are suffering from cancer and other illnesses they believe are connected to the plant.

A Group Fighting for Medical Marijuana Delays Petition

A group pushing to legalize medical marijuana in Oklahoma has decided to delay its petition. Oklahomans for Health initially planned to launch a petition drive this fall, but have delayed that effort until spring so they can keep building momentum. Organizers are planning a town hall meeting on Saturday to explain their decision.

Vaccination Rates For Oklahoma Children are Low

As local kids head back to school, we're learning fewer kids in Oklahoma are getting vaccinated. The CDC says about 90% of Oklahoma children got their measles, mumps and rubella vaccine before starting kindergarten last year. That's a 5% drop from the year before. Doctors say some children with specific medical conditions can't get vaccinated, but some parents claim religious and personal exemptions for their children. "False fears around vaccinations have resulted in many, many parents not getting their kids vaccinated and that's been a real tragedy here, because again, it's a preventable disease," explains Dr. Georges Benjamin of the American Public Health Association.

Health Department Says Pond Slime Not Toxic

The Mayes County Health Department has confirmed that slime found on a Pryor pond is not toxic. The Whitaker Park Pond hasn't been cleaned in at least 15 years. The city drained 80% of the pond to start the clean-up process. City officials say it will take a little over a month to repair leaks and clean the water.

Health Department Develops Bike Trails

The Tulsa County Health Department and INCOG has spent the last two years developing the city's Go Plan. It would connect bike lanes and create new ones that lead to major areas of business to encourage people to ride to work. It also focuses on sidewalks for pedestrians. "It could be a case where we have sidewalks that are discontinued and they need to be continued. And it can be a place too, where there hasn't been a sidewalk ever," says Joani Dotson of the Tulsa Health Department. There's already \$4.5 million set aside from Improve Our Tulsa and they are asking for an additional \$15 million in Vision 2025 money to fund the project.

State Health Department Offers Grants to Prevent Overdose Deaths

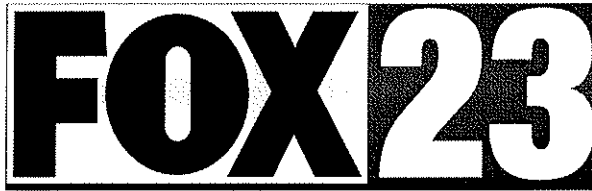
New Health Complex Planned for Glenpool

An empty lot at Highway 75 and 151st Street in Glenpool will soon turn into a \$23 million health complex. St. Francis Health System President and CEO Jake Henry, Jr. says Warren Clinic offices will fill the second floor. He says the 49,000 square foot facility will serve a growing population in southwest Tulsa County, as well as nearby Okmulgee and Creek Counties. It will offer a 24 hour emergency care center, as well as occupational therapy, physical therapy and women's services. Construction is expected to begin later this year.
