EMSA Responds to Calls about Heat

EMSA medics have been working round the clock to provide help for patients in the summer heat. That includes keeping their own crews hydrated. EMSA is fully-staffed for the week and will have extra staff in place for 4th of July events. With record setting heat in May and June, summer hit Oklahoma long before it usually does and EMSA medics want to remind the public to be cautious about how much caffeine and alcohol is consumed. If you start to feel overcome, medics say it's important to quickly get inside out of the heat, use water or a wet towel, and cool off.

Remington Tower Still Struggling to Make Repairs a Year After Tornado

It's been almost a year since an EF-2 tornado ripped through midtown Tulsa, but some homes and businesses are still unable to fully be repaired. Remington Tower was the hardest hit, and neighbors in the area say they are sad to see it still in disrepair. Right now, wooden boards cover what was once glass windows and tarps barely conceal the gaping hole in the side of the building. Other local businesses like Panera Bread and Aspen Dental have been able to make a full comeback, but Remington Tower is still closed, making it an eyesore for the area. Reps for the tower say they still intend on making those repairs, but insurance is slow to make it happen.

Microburst Causes Damage in Sand Springs

A suspected microburst in Sand Springs blew out glass windows at Stanley's Furniture store and it was all caught on camera. The store manager, Jim Zell, showed pictures of shards of glass shattered all over their sofas, floor, and desks. Zell said the wind was so strong, it even blew some of the ceiling tiles out of position. The National Weather Service says the thunderstorms that moved through the area created a downburst or microburst of wind, and it targeted Stanley's. No other store in the area sustained damage. The store is still open for business and plans to have the glass repaired in about a week.

PSO Remembers August Tornado

August 6th is the one-year anniversary of the EF-2 tornado that ripped through midtown Tulsa just before 1:30am that morning. Public Service Company of Oklahoma remembers that night and spoke about how they got the power restored to the city so quickly. Harvey Knecht with PSO said that tornado is something he will never forget. When he saw the damage on 41st street, he knew he had a mess on his hands. Knecht was one of the 445 PSO workers from Tulsa, McAlester, Arkansas, and Missouri who worked 16-18-hour days to restore power to the city. PSO had to work with the fire marshal to make

sure the buildings were safe before turning the power back on. PSO trains for natural disasters and warns people to stay away from disaster zones after a storm.

Storms Cause Damage in Sand Springs

A local church even had the front of their building blow off. The pastor was inside the church when it happened, and said it was the worst storm he's personally witnessed.

Inola Mesonet Site Records Rare Tornado

The Oklahoma Mesonet site just outside Inola usually records measurements of things like temperature, air pressure, and wind. On Sunday afternoon however, the Inola site recorded an actual tornado. This is just the 4th time in 25 years that an Oklahoma Mesonet site has been hit by a tornado. Damage surveys from the Weather Service showed that one of the tornadoes last Sunday developed at or just next to the Inola Mesonet site. The top wind gust recorded was 97.8 MPH. Having valuable data like this recorded every minute can provide clues into the science of tornadoes.

Muskogee Red Cross Volunteer Deploys to Hurricane Florence

Shoemaker is a junior at Northeastern State University in Broken Arrow, and told her professors she needed to put her studies on hold while she rushes to the coast to help those in need after the hurricane. For two weeks, Shoemaker will work at one of the Red Cross's 200 shelters, which are currently housing 20,000 people. The Red Cross is also taking cash donations, which allow volunteers like Shoemaker to be able to buy whatever they need at the scenes they are responding to.

Tulsa City crews spent the day today repairing streets damaged by heavy rains and flooding last week. The National Weather Service reports more than 6 inches of rain fell last Friday near 71st and Mingo. In east Tulsa, roads near 11th and Highway 169 saw more than 2 inches. Officials say the rain put a strain on the city's drainage system. The city encourages anyone who sees worsening road problems since last week's storms to call Tulsa's "Customer Care Line" and they will try to have a crew on site making repairs within 72 hours.

Tulsa Police say a robbery occurred at Bill's Quick Stop at 56th Street North and Peoria Avenue around 10:30pm last night. They say the suspect walked in, acted like he was going to buy a bottle of water, and then pulled a gun on the cashier at the last minute, demanding money. Officers said the suspect got what he wanted and then ran. They brought out the K9 unit to try to find the suspect by tracking his scent. Police say the K9 were unable to track the robbery because of the number of people out last night and the fireworks going off at the time.

Tulsa Police say they spotted a car making quick lane changes and speeding down 71st street on Monday night. Officers pulled the driver over, and he gave them a fake name. When they officers went back to their patrol car to run his information, the driver took off. Police say Justin Baden sped down College, came around a turn, and crashed into a cement wall. Baden then got out of his car and ran on foot through front lawns, and eventually face planted in a yard, allowing officers to handcuff him. He was arrested for eluding arrest and an outstanding warrant.

String of Car Thefts "Unheard Of" for Broken Arrow

Broken Arrow police say thieves stole six cars and broke into six more in just 24 hours. The majority of cars affected were hit in the northern part of Broken Arrow, in a three mile stretch between Kenosha and Omaha streets. Officer James Koch says most of the cars were unlocked and two of the stolen cars even had the keys inside. Many valuables were taken, including a gun. So far, police haven't made any arrests or identified suspects. One victim says that despite what happened to her car, she still feels safe living in Broken Arrow. Police say it's likely these burglaries and thefts are connected but they won't know for sure until they're able to make some arrests. They also remind citizens to keep valuables out of cars and garage and car doors locked.

Thieves Carjack Car with Teen Girl Inside

Tulsa Police say thankfully a 13-year-old girl was not hurt after she was a victim in a south Tulsa carjacking Thursday afternoon. Police say she was waiting alone inside a Honda Civic while her family was shopping inside the Dollar Tree near 95th and Riverside Drive. The girl told police she was sitting there alone when a 15-year-old boy jumped in the driver's seat and drove away. Police say after that, he pulled a gun on her and told her to get out of the car. Once she exited the vehicle, she called 911. About

30 minutes later, officers spotted the car near 51st and Yale and pulled it over. Police arrested the 15-year-old minor and 19-year-old Desiree Crowder. Police also found out the gun was used was stolen in a burglary back in 2016.

Robbery Leads to Standoff

Tulsa Police are happy to close a robbery of a Tulsa area Dollar General store that quickly turned into an intense scene today. Detectives say the armed robbery happened just after 8am Friday morning. An alarm was tripped during the robbery and alerted patrol cars who just happened to be close by. Patrol officers surrounded the building so the suspect had no way to escape. The SWAT team was called in when the suspect refused to come out. A standoff ensued that lasted three hours, and shut down the streets surrounding the Dollar General. The store is closed until further notice, as the suspect set fire to evidence to destroy it during the standoff. The fire caused the sprinkles to go off for several hours and flood the store. Detectives say the suspect admitted to several other Dollar Store robberies, an east Tulsa pawn show break-in, and a few donut shop robberies.

Police Investigate Drive-by Shooting on Lewis

Tulsa Police say a shooting started with a white Chrysler sitting a midtown Tulsa intersection and a gray car pulled up, someone rolled down the windows, and started shooting. A woman heard gunshots and called 9-1-1 after seeing the Chrysler speeding down her street. The door of the Chrysler was riddled with bullet holes and police say the 17-year-old girl who was in the front seat was shot in the hip, but is expected to be okay. Police say when they got to the area of the shooting, they saw the Chrysler speed off. Officers stopped the car two miles away and paramedics rushed the girl to the hospital. Police say they don't know much about a suspect, which makes neighbors in the area nervous.

Stabbing Leads to 3 Hospitalized

Tulsa Police say a man called police when he heard a commotion near his work and found 8 – 10 teens jumping a grown man and picking up rocks and bricks to throw at him. The teens all took off before cops could show up, jumping in three separate cars. The man was able to cut three of the teens in an attempt to defend himself with a knife. None of their injuries are life-threatening. Sgt. Marcus Harper says police are trying to track down the teens involved to get a better idea of what happened. Police say they don't know the exact reason why the teens attacked the man, but the victim told officers they were trying to jump his son instead, so he hopped in the fray to protect his family. The man is not facing any charges at this time.

Shooting Leads to Major Arrest

Tulsa Police say a routine car stop lead to a huge break in a string of thefts and murders. At the time the suspect, Ondriel Smith, was only connected to a theft ring. It wasn't until police searched his car and found two guns that they made the discovery that Smith was responsible for 6 different shootings. Police performed a ballistics test on the guns and tied it to the gun used to kill Muskogee brothers Keith and Glenn Williams on September 5th. It also was reportedly used to shoot two people outside the Incredible Pizza in south Tulsa, not even a week after. Sgt. Brandon Watkins says on top of the gun they also have other evidence linking Smith to another shooting from April and yet another shooting in Sapulpa. The suspect is currently in jail without bond.

Broken Arrow Police Bust Crime Ring

Last September, about a dozen people woke up to learn they had been hit by thieves overnight. One family even said they had video of the criminals using his neighbor's golf cart to carry things they stole. Now a year after the crime spree, three have been charged by a minor detail in a different case. One drop of blood was left in one of the cars, and Cody Carrigan was identified along with Joshua Smith and Christopher Gastos as part of a burglary ring that hit counties across Green Country. Carrigan was identified using the DNA from the blood, and the other two from statements, jail phone calls, and other evidence. All three have criminal histories and were already in jail during this investigation. One suspect told police they made a living burglarizing people and cars. Neighbors say they're glad to finally see some justice done.

Muskogee Elects New Police Chief

The city of Muskogee has elected deputy chief Johnny Teehee as their new Chief of Police. Teehee has served Muskogee as deputy chief for the past three decades and steps up after Chief Rex Eskridge announced his retirement from the department after nearly 50 years with MPD. Teehee has been Eskridge's right-hand man for 15 years and hopes to continue and expand the positive changes seen under Eskridge's leadership. Teehee spent much of his career in the child abuse unit, with stints in the drug and gang unit. He helped bring Muskogee's violent crime numbers down over the past 20 years. He credits the crime drop to more visibility and community policing. Teehee is looking forward to this new opportunity.

Jenks Crossing Development Underway

Jenks Chamber president Josh Driskell said the development has been sorely needed. More than 45,000 cars travel the stretch of Highway 75 and now there is grown between 111th and 121st streets. With Jenks Crossing and other developments including the Simon Outlet Stores, restaurants, and other retail sites at 75 and Main Street, Driskell says Jenks is open for business.

OKPop Museum Closer to Reality

Currently there is just an old parking lot at the corner of Easton and Main, but this fall construction will begin there on OKPop, a flashy museum in the Tulsa Arts District downtown. The museum will sit directly across from Cain's Ballroom, and because of the area, they won't have tradition 9-5 museum hours. Construction and design is partially funded by 25 million dollars in state money, and the museum will include an underground parking garage. OKPop director Jeff Moore calls the design "Grit and Glitz", saying it shows off Oklahoma's hard work and impact on popular culture. Construction will start sometime this fall and the museum is expected to open in the next few years.

Long Time Downtown Business to Close, But Reopen Again

changes. Zenthoefer says she and the original founder are opening two new locations at the Box Yard. They had to downsize and remove the coffee shop, but their customers will still be able to purchase local and eclectic Oklahoma items the store is known for.

Parking Garage Construction for Downtown Underway

Tulsa Creates Truancy Taskforce

It's still summer break, but a taskforce group for Jenks, Union, and Tulsa Public Schools is focused on student attendance. Tulsa City Councilor Karen Gilbert sits on the Tulsa Truancy Taskforce. She says the county court system stopped prosecuting parents of middle and high school students who chronically missed class because of cutbacks. The city is now moving truancy law enforcement under the municipal court system. On Monday the taskforce heard from all three districts in Tulsa about their current plans to fight chronic absences caused by students skipping school and their parents not knowing or caring about it. Over the next month, the taskforce will finalize a plan to tackle the city's truancy rate but until there is more input from teachers, getting something passed at the city level is on hold.

School Districts Determine Rules for Medical Marijuana

Several meetings have been held and now the name change vote is set for August 20th.

Wagoner Schools Work to Improve Security

Lawsuit Brews Over Emergency Rules on Medical Marijuana

Medical marijuana supporters are upset over emergency rules put in place by the Oklahoma State Board of Health governing medical marijuana that were not on the ballot. Those rules include keeping smokable marijuana and its components out of dispensaries, limiting the levels of THC to weak levels, and forcing dispensaries to hire a full-time pharmacist to operate. Chip Paul, the author of SQ 788 says he believes the only way regulators and lawmakers are going to implement 788 the way it was written is through a court order. Paul says the OSBH not only allowed 788's opponents to write new rules, but violated open meetings laws by not showing on it's agenda that it was considering the problematic amendments.

Health Department Investigates Stagnant Pools

The Tulsa County Health Department is investigating a complaint about a neighbor's stagnant pool creating a breeding ground for mosquitos. After the department gave a notice of violation, the owner drained the pool. When asked, the Health Department said they had 110 pool complains for Tulsa this year, one pool even hiding three dead cats. The complaints were mapped and spread out all over the city, and found that even when the pools are drained, the mosquitos don't fly far from them, settling into nearby ditch water to breed.

State Question Focuses on Eye Care

This November, Oklahoma voters will be able to decide if eye doctors can set up shop in retail stores like Walmart and Target. Opponents of state question 793 say allowing optometrist in chain stores could negatively affect the quality of care. But supporters say it would give Oklahomans more choices for their eye care. If passed, Oklahoma would be closer to joining the other 47 states that allow eye exams and prescriptions in major retail stores.

Possible E. Coli Contamination From Local Lake

A vacation on Fort Gibson Lake ended in a nightmare for one local family. Doctors found four family members were suffering from E. Coli infections. Three-year-old Paisley was the first to get sick, but was initially treated with antibiotics. After two weeks passed, Paisley and three more family members were treated for what doctors determined to be E. Coli. Doctors believe it is possible the family contracted E. Coli from the lake. The Army Corps of Engineers oversees the lake and they explained they designate swim areas along the shore, but there is no guaranteeing of safety. While they do monitor the water

quality and remove debris to keep people safe, people are still free to swim anywhere outside of the restricted areas at their own risk.

Medical Marijuana Close to Permanent Rules and Regulations

Proponents of medical marijuana are making great progress on writing permanent rules and regulations with state lawmakers surrounding every aspect of medical cannabis. The current size of the working draft is 201 pages. Chip Paul, who wrote SQ 788, said that lawmakers have been very open to permanently implementing 788 without any tricks up their sleeves. The new rules that address everything from legal definitions and certain fire risks are needed because the emergency rules passed by the Board of Health expire soon. It is not currently clear how the current draft could be passed but it is believed that draft will be in one way or another the final rules that govern medical cannabis in Oklahoma for years to come.
