Proposed Bill Would Allow Parents to Have a Say in Banned Books

Oklahoma Attorney General Will No Longer Investigate Alleged Obscure Books

O'Connor says he began his investigation after receiving several complaints from parents about books in public school libraries. O'Connor recommends that parents take their concerns to the school board instead.

State Representative Calls for Reparation Scholarships for Race Massacre Decedents

Senate Bill 1647, Called the Empowerment Act, Would Give Vouchers to Private Schools

A proposed bill would use taxpayer money to give vouchers to private schools. Senate Bill 1647, also known as "the Empowerment Act," would give private schools \$3,000 per student, if the student transfers from a public school. Advocates for public schools says the bill would hurt public school students. However, supporters say it would help students who would benefit from receiving instruction in a smaller classroom setting.

Parents Concerned, Upset About Mental Health Surveys in Public Schools

Some Green Country parents are upset about a survey their children have filled out at school, and they are calling the questions inappropriate. Questions include their age, grade, and what sex they were assigned at birth. Parents are calling the survey an "invasion of privacy," while school officials say the surveys are a tool to monitor any possible drug use or mental health issues. The surveys are anonymous.

Bond Issues in Bixby

As more students enroll within the Bixby Public Schools district, voters are asked to approve a \$110,000,000 bond that would include construction of a new high school. The district is expected to grow by more than 10,000 students within the next decade. If approved, the bond would provide \$70 million dollars towards the new campus. The bond will not raise taxes for those living in Bixby.

Oklahoma Natural Gas Customers to Pay More Following 2021 Winter Storm

The Oklahoma Corporation Commission has approved a fuel cost recovery plan for Oklahoma Natural Gas after the 2021 winter storm. Millions of dollars will be spread across 25 years, and customers can expect to see a rise of \$7.82 per month. State law allows the plan, and without it, customers could have seen an average of \$15 more per month.

Tulsa Police Department Warns Drivers About Staying in the Left Lane

The left lane is for passing only, and drivers could be fined and ticketed for slowing traffic on the highway. Officers say slow drivers in the left lane could lead to accidents or incidents of road rage.

Hobby Lobby Brings Economic Growth to McAlester

A \$30,000,000 shopping center is scheduled to open next month in McAlester, anchored by a new Hobby Lobby store. The multimillion-dollar shopping center includes stores and restaurants. It's expected to create more than 300 jobs and benefit existing businesses in the area. The grand opening has been delayed due to global supply chain issues.

City Officials Plan to Open New Walking Trial in West Tulsa

The City of Tulsa has announced the creation of a new trail system at Bales Park in West Tulsa. The trail, near 61st and Union, is the result of a \$190,000 donation from community partners. The trail will connect to Lubelle Park and Turkey Mountain and will be 3.4 miles long. The Bike Club of Tulsa selected a company from Arkansas to handle the project. The trail is expected to open in July.

Tulsa Homeowners Could Soon Save Money on Flood Insurance

The City of Tulsa has been categorized by FEMA as a Class 1 City. This means that homeowners will be able to save on specialized flood insurance. If homeowners already have flood insurance, they will receive a 5% discount. Those who are buying flood insurance for the first time will receive a 45% discount. The recognition comes after the City spent years updating draining systems and engineering parks and structures.

Proposed Bill Would Cut Down on Spam Calls in Oklahoma

House Bill 3168, also known as the Telephone Solicitation Act of 2022, passed 91 to 1 in Oklahoma City. The bill would prohibit automated services from dialing random numbers and use a digital voice instead of an actual person. The bill would also prevent using a software that presents someone else's number as their own. It also makes spam calls illegal between 8:01pm and 7:59am.

Tulsa Police Investigate Fourth Homicide of the Year, Three Weeks into 2022

Tulsa Police Recover Stolen Shelby Mustang Worth \$200,000

Investigators say Lewis killed the victims and buried them in a shallow grave in Cherokee County. One person was strangled, another beaten to death, and the third was stabbed. The Cherokee County District Attorney is considering the death penalty in this case.

Tulsa Woman Arrested, Tells Police She Was Returning Drugs to the Dealer

Arkansas Man Arrested, Accused of Opening Fire at the Hard Rock Hotel in Tulsa

An Arkansas man is in custody after police say he fired more than 30 shots outside of Tulsa's Hard Rock Casino and Hotel. David Temple allegedly drove his Tesla to the casino and was charging his car when he pulled out an AR-15 and began firing at random. No one was hit, but a van was struck several times. Grove surrendered peacefully to police. He is facing multiple charges.

Proposed Changes Could Impact Oklahoma's Pardon and Parole Process

A proposed bill that would limit the abilities of the Oklahoma Pardon and Parole Board has passed through a committee. The bill would not allow the Board to grant clemency or pardons for any inmate. Instead, people sentenced to death could request clemency to only the governor. No cases would be overturned. The author of the bill says it's an attempt to prevent mass attention and hearings following the clemency hearing of Julius Jones in November.

Police Search for a Suspect After a Police Chase Enters the Tulsa Area

Latest "TikTok" Challenge Encourages Children to Shoot Strangers with Pellet Guns

Three teenagers are facing assault charges after police say they took part in the latest TikTok challenge, which dares children to shoot strangers with pellet guns. Tulsa police say the teenagers shot a person in the face and a passenger near 41st and Yale. Police were able to track down the driver thanks to the victim's information. Police are warning kids to not take part in the challenge, which could result in jail time if caught.

Tulsa Public Schools Changes Mask Mandate Ahead of the Winter Semester

Officials with Tulsa Public Schools is changing its mask mandate ahead of the winter semester. Some schools are transitioning to virtual learning as more staff members contract the virus. For schools returning to the classroom, all students who are not eligible for the vaccine must wear a mask. Masks are strongly recommended for those who are vaccinated. Students who test positive will isolate for five days before returning to school.

Tulsa Company Offers New Technology to Sanitize Schools During the Pandemic

Tulsa's Service Wing Organic Solutions is manufacturing special machines that allow anyone to create their own cleaning solution. The liquid, HOCL, is a special disinfectant made from electrified salt water. When the solution encounters a pathogen, it explodes the pathogen and protects surfaces from viruses. The disinfectant can be made for 4 cents a gallon. At the height of the pandemic, one gallon of disinfectant was selling for \$80 a gallon. HOCL also has no scent, which is perfect for students.

Green County Jails Struggle to Stay Staffed During the Pandemic

FOX23 has been investigating reports of people going to the hospital for other injuries, testing positive for COVID-19, then being forced to isolate at the facility. OU Health Chief COVID Officer Dr. Dale Bratzler says this is a precaution to protect hospital personnel. Once someone tests positive for COVID – no matter what ailments they have – they are isolated.

Hillcrest Opens Relaxation Rooms for Staff Members

Hillcrest Health Systems has installed new, quiet relaxation suites designed to calm stressed employees. The walls are painted a light, calming color. The floors were planned so employees could do yoga, and there are body massage chairs inside. One nurse said the rooms have boosted morale, especially as health care employees have become exhausted during the pandemic.

Bixby Public Schools Adapts to New National Nutritional Standards

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has passed new nutritional standards for school meals across the country. In response, Bixby Public Schools has shared their changes in the cafeteria. Under the new standards, at least 80% of all the grains must be whole grain. Schools may also offer flavored, low-fat milk. Schools will also need to reduce sodium by 10%, which Bixby's Director of Child Nutrition is anxious

about complying with. She says it will be difficult to find meals to appeal to students. Students will also have to take a fruit or vegetable with their hot lunch.

Coronavirus Cases Begin to Decline in Oklahoma

The Oklahoma State Department of Health has reported nearly 1,400 new cases of coronavirus. Despite the increase, the seven-day average is below 900 for the first time since December. Overall, cases and active cases continue to decline in the Sooner State. However, more than 1,200 deaths have been reported this month so far.

FDA Approves First-Ever Injectable Treatment for Cellulite

The FDA has approved an injectable treatment for cellulite, the first of its kind. QWO is given in three injections, 21 days apart. Fine needles are used, the same needles used in Botox. More than 75 percent of the 200 women included in the initial study reported significant reduction in cellulite. One of the facilities in Tulsa that offers the treatment spoke to FOX23 about the benefits of QWO. Cellulite is not caused by weight gain and can't be treated with diet and exercise.

New Group Home in Owasso Opens, Dedicated to Helping Adults with Disabilities Learn Independence

The Village is a new facility in Owasso that is dedicated to helping adults with disabilities learn how to live independently. It's run by A New Leaf Organization, that works to help those with disabilities succeed. The Village can use up to 60 residents in a college-style dorm setting. The Village is the first of its kind in Oklahoma. The first half of the two-year program will focus on life skills while the second focuses on finding a job.

Pandemic Creates Insomnia in Some People, Doctors Share Sleep Tips

Doctors say one in five Americans suffer from insomnia, and the stress from the pandemic has made it worse for many to get a good night's sleep. FOX23 spoke with a sleep specialist at Saint Francis, who says the issue is caused by more than just depression and anxiety. Stress and increased screen time also play a role. Dr. Richard Bregman suggests putting the phone away an hour before bed and creating a dark environment in your bedroom. He also suggests avoiding caffeine ten hours before bedtime.
