#### Early Plans to Tackle Problems with Mosquitoes

Date: 04/24/2017 9pm Duration: 1:15 Clay Loney

It is really hard to tell what kind of mosquito year we are going to have. So the Tulsa County Health Department is wasting no time. Scott Meader with the Tulsa Health Department says staff are being trained this week and mosquito traps will be put out next week—almost a month earlier than normal. With recent rains and more in the forecast, Meader says the mosquito population could explode especially if people do not remove or treat standing water near their homes. Meader says "If it keeps raining there could be more mosquitos and if it's hot and dry there could be a different types of mosquito". The Tulsa Health Department could start spraying for mosquitoes by the end of May. Meader says "last year we encountered some West Nile positive mosquitoes on earlier trapping dates. So we decided to push it earlier".

#### Wind Storm Damage in Mayes County (Pryor, OK)

An EF-1 tornado ripped through Mayes County and knocked a big branch in the side of the Russell Boren's house after, Boren says he was standing in his bedroom when a tree blew over, putting a hole through the side of his house. Boren said "...lived here for 40 years and this is the first anything happened close to home". The tree that actually went through his house was rooted at the front of the property. The top of the tree went through the home. In a few houses over, another tree put a hole on Karen Elgin's home. Elgin said "the wind was horrible". Elgin and her family heard the tree crash but could not tell just how bad it was until this morning. Now, they are sawing the tree into pieces and will cover the roof with a tarp before it can get fixed. So far, FOX23 has not heard of anyone getting hurt or any major damage to homes in the area.

#### Flooding in Muskogee due to Heavy Rain

Roads are now turned to rivers after heavy rain in the Meadows neighborhood. Laura Walker who lives in that neighborhood says "it's been pretty bad". She says the area is usually the first to flood when heavy rain hits. But it never gets easier to watch. She also says "it's hard, it's not fun, you don't want to leave your home, but at the same time you'd rather go somewhere where it's dry". Emergency Management says they helped evacuate a handful of people from the area. They may need to evacuate more if it gets worse where an evacuation shelter is ready for folks who need it. Firefighters had to rescue a family out of a van today after it got stuck in flooding water on 24<sup>th</sup> Street. So far there is no reports of anyone getting hurt, and Emergency Management is working to keep it that way.

#### Heavy Rain Causes Flooding in Tahlequah (Cherokee County)

Homeowners and business owners along the Illinois River basin have had to evacuate ahead of the significant flooding. Mike Jackson came to help a couple families evacuating from Riverville Resort on Saturday. He says the homes had just been repaired after being engulfed with water in 2015. Jackson says "he way it was last time it actually beat the stain plum off of these buildings and the number 3 cabin which is that one right there, it took it off the foundation". FOX23 found a flooded roadway nearby causing problems for those who live on the east side of Combs Bridge. Local folks tell FOX23 because the road is flooded, drivers now have about an hour detour if trying to get to the west side of the river. Business owners have also been preparing for the worst. Business owner Casey Peyton who owns Peyton's Place says "the first time ever it got into this building in 2015, and we just finished modeling it from that flood, and it's going to get us again". They loaded up valuables into rafts to try to protect them from the expected water damage in their store. Many say they are just hoping for the best for everyone impacted.

#### Power Outages across Northeastern Oklahoma due to Wind and Rain

Public Service Company of Oklahoma (PSO) says wind and rain caused several problems for them today. This afternoon a tree fell on a line near 96<sup>th</sup> and Mingo (Tulsa) knocking out power to more than a thousand customers. A tree also fell on a line in Vinita knocking out power of 100 people— homes and businesses. Power is out for some people in the town of Eucha but crews will have to wait for water levels to drop in Spavinaw Creek before they can make the repairs.

### Mosquitos Season in Green Country

Scott Meador with the Tulsa Health Department says "we've seen a few mosquitoes out and about." Soon, you will be slapping, shooing, and shunning the blood-sucking pests as they start to pop up across green country. Meador says "numbers have been low up until now, but they may start creeping up." Meador says the reason is "it's been cooler and it's been rainy, both of those weather events really help to keep the mosquitoes down." That was until recent storms rolled through leaving behind standing water and warmer conditions. 2-ingredients Meador says gets the pests stirring. Meador also says water that sits for 5 to 10 days is ideal, but he says the storms also helps drive some away. Meador says "heavy rains reset the system. They blow everything out of the creeks."

Meador says it is too early to tell what we will see from now until October. Meador states "the types of mosquitoes present tell us what kind of diseases are floating around."

#### House Fire in Bixby Likely Caused by Lightning Strike

FOX3 severe weather coverage continues in Bixby where fire investigator believe a lighting strike sparked a devastating fire that left a family of eight homeless. The fire happened Wednesday night near 121<sup>st</sup> and Mingo. Firefighters say the flames started in attic and quickly spread to other parts the home. The homeowner tells says even though she lost a lot a material items, she is grateful for what she still has.

#### Heat Concerns in Tulsa

Several local organizations are working to keep you and your family cool in this dangerous heat conditions. FOX23 learned that the Center of Hope in downtown Tulsa has activated their cooling station to help you keep cool. Public Service Company of Oklahoma (PSO) says when it reaches more than 100 degrees outside and if you cannot afford to run your air conditioning, they would not send you a cut off notice. Medical officials say they cannot stress enough how important it is to stay hydrated at this time of the year. This evening, Emergency Medical Services Authority (EMSA) issued a medical heat alert. As of 4:45 this evening, they had already responded to 5 heat-related calls.

Paramedics want to remind you to drink plenty of water, and wear light-colored, loose-fitting clothing.

#### Heroin Bust in Coweta

Glen Kerr lives right down the street where the heroin bust took place and saw all of the commotion early Tuesday morning. Kerr says "I got up and looked out and saw the lights flashing down there and I went back inside and locked the doors". He says he is not surprised that criminal activity was going on here. Kerr says "I've been seeing a lot of traffic down there here over the last month or month and a half". Coweta police say the big bust was all thanks to a driver they arrested recently. They say he pointed them to this suspected drug house. That was when Coweta police got in contact with the Tulsa County Sheriff's Office and got a warrant to search the home. Inside, they found cocaine, heroin, numerous amounts of pills they have yet to identify and guns. Officers arrested Nathaniel Horn and Sydney Young. As Kerr works to keep his home and yard looking nice, he says he is so grateful law enforcement is working to keep his neighborhood clean. Both Horn and Young were booked into the Tulsa County jail on a host of complaints. According to the Sheriff's Office, Horn took responsibility for everything.

#### Robbery at Bacone College in Muskogee

A college dorm rooms were robbed at gun point, where according to court papers, two masked men forced their way into these Bacone College dorms back in February. They demanded cash, cell phones, and valuables. A woman works near those dorms asked FOX23 not to show her face. She says "it's not surprising at all, scary rather, but not surprising". She says she wishes she would have learned about the robbery sooner. She also says "you've got people that work here; that come here every day not knowing there's an armed robbery here...that puts those people at risk". Court papers say one suspect stood in the doorway, pointing a gun at the victims. The second suspect identified as Robert Theriot hit one victim in the mouth with brass knuckles causing major dental damage. Theriot also punched the other victims...seven students in total. He is now charged with robbery and police is still searching for the other suspect. Students nearby told FOX23 the victims have since moved out of those dorms.

#### **Violent Crimes in Tulsa**

Tulsa police say they are ramping up their response to violent crime. In a news conference this afternoon, Police Chief Chuck Jordan announced that more than 50 officers participated in a 4-day operation that started on Saturday. Jordan says "the entire TPD (Tulsa Police Department) participation was funded by a grant awarded by the Oklahoma Attorney General's Office".

Jordan says the nearly 75 thousand dollar grant is the first aimed at cutting back on serious crime. Police

Jordan says the nearly 75 thousand dollar grant is the first aimed at cutting back on serious crime. Police say 29 guns were recovered and 92 people were arrested in this operation. They say the FBI, ATF (Alcohol, Tabaco, Firearms and Explosives) and the Tulsa County District Attorney's Office also helped out. Jordan says "police work is getting harder and harder to do. So for these guys to go out and do what they did with what they had to do without using excessive force, I applaud their efforts".

Jordan also says that even though the City is seeing a slight decline in overall crime, it not where it should be. Jordan says "we're going to stop when we feel we have things a little more under control in our City".

#### 2<sup>nd</sup> Grade Teacher Arrested at Holmes Park Elementary School in Sapulpa

Megan Sloan was arrested on Monday morning at Holmes Park Elementary School in Sapulpa. Jen Watkin's son is in Sloan's 2<sup>nd</sup> grade class, and she was stunned to find out his teacher had been arrested. Watkins says "this is a person I send my child to every single day". Emails showed that a concerned citizen alerted the school about Sloan back in 2015. One of them showed a response from now Superintendent Robert Armstrong saying in part "I'm in receipt of a complaint regarding a teacher in our school district and need more information to follow up on this issue". Parents like Watkins want to know why the school did nothing about Sloan if they knew about an issue back in 2015. Watkins says "if someone makes an accusation like that against a teacher in charge of second graders...you give that person a drug test". Watkins says the school just sent out this note saying her son would have a substitute teacher for the rest of the year, but did not say why. Records show a teacher discovered Sloan having an open conversation on Facebook about using and selling heroin. Investigators found syringes, some filled and also meth and heroin in her purse. Sapulpa Public Schools gave us a statement saying in part: "Oklahoma Statutes prohibit a public body from releasing and/or discussing internal personnel investigations, including demotion, discipline, or resignations".

#### Robbery at Walgreens in Broken Arrow

For the fourth time in three years, Broken Arrow police are investigating a robbery at Walgreen Pharmacy Store at Kenosha and Lynn Lane. Officer James Koch says "this type of robbery has become more popular... prescription drugs are widely abused so we are concerned". Koch says the suspect came in just before 10 pm on Tuesday. He says the man was wearing a hoodie with the hood up to hide his face. Koch says he went to the pharmacy and demanded prescription drugs... threatening the clerk by showing a pistol tucked into his waistband. Koch says the suspect got away with an abnormally large amount of prescription drugs compared to past pharmacy robberies. He was reportedly last seen running north of the store. Koch also says he was shocked to hear the robbery happened at this store near Kenosha and Lynn Lane (9<sup>th</sup>), not only because it is consistently busy but it is also within eyesight of the police department, which is right behind this fence. Koch says "we're pretty visible so that tells me it's probably not someone that's familiar with the area".

No injuries were reported from the robbery. Detectives say they are going over surveillance video from the pharmacy and surrounding stores.

#### Aggravated Drug Trafficking in Muskogee

Two pounds of crystal meth are now off the street in Muskogee. Pete Kirk and Katelynn Kay Anderson are now facing aggravated drug dealing charges. Court papers say troopers found the drugs after stopping the couple for speeding on Highway 69, just outside City limits. A K-9 picked up the scent of

drugs so troopers searched the car. After searching the car, troopers found two gallon sized bags full of meth, two pounds in all. Community members that FOX23 spoke with say they are glad the drugs are out of the hands of suspected drug dealers. Brian Hudson says he has had friends and family affected by drug use. He is glad to hear about the arrest. Hudson says "I've had to pick up some buddies late at night, drug house, and it just breaks my heart and I don't want other families to go through that". Others that FOX23 spoke with say drug use is a problem in Muskogee and they hope arrests like these can help it stop.

#### Robbery at KFC Restaurant in Tulsa

Employees at this fast food restaurant were not expecting any orders at 8:30 this morning. But that changed after police say a gunman ducked in behind a delivery guy. Tulsa police say the suspect armed with a pistol forced a worker to open the safe, then locked her and the delivery driver in the restaurant's freezer. Police say the suspect took off in the delivery truck but ditched it just one block away. Kelly Bargas lives just south of the KFC near Admiral and Memorial. Bargas says the stolen delivery truck ended up in his yard still in gear. Police say the suspect was wearing a mask so employees could not give them a good description.

#### **Traffic Stop Turned into a Drug Bust in Sand Springs**

Sand Springs Police made a traffic stop that turned into a drug bust on Friday. An officer found 42 grams of meth, a smoking pipe and marijuana inside the vehicle. A small signal turned in to one of the biggest drug discoveries this year when an officer pulled over Kevin Jameson for simply failing to signal while making a left turn. But this little light of his ended up shining another light on what police say was an unsuspected drug mule. The officers pulled him over for just a minor traffic violation. Tulsa police officer, Jeanne Mackenzie tells FOX23 after police had a K-9 officer smell Jameson's car and they ended up finding 44 pounds of meth. Forty-four pounds and street dollars about five thousand dollars per pound. So we are looking at 220-thousand dollars of methamphetamine. Police say they did not find any bricks of cash as they usually do with drug mules and alleged drug dealers on Jameson, and they believe he was driving through moving the drugs from one state to another but not Oklahoma. Mackenzie says with Jameson being far in to his 50s, almost 60 years old, it just shows that the drug trade can attract people from all walks of life— not just gangsters and thugs who look rough, and everyone should be vigilant.

#### Guns, Drugs and Knives found in Bixby

Guns, drugs and knives found in Bixby. Bixby polic0e arrested Cody Damme after a local gas station cashier helped identify his car. It first got an officer's attention when he noticed a shotgun. When police took a closer look inside, they say they also found around 200 knives and drugs. One local woman says she thinks Tulsa crime is bleeding over into cities like Broken Arrow and Bixby. Danielle Hegdale, a Broken Arrow resident says "I think there is the possibility that the eastern edge of Tulsa has maybe bleed over into other populations." Hegdale also says she moved away from Tulsa a few years ago to

hopefully get away from the crime. Hegdale says "...it just seemed like there was more reports not only one the news, but neighbors would be talking about it." While Hegdale says she has noticed an increase, one Bixby resident thinks differently. Greg Campbell from Bixby says "I haven't seen or heard of any crime...we've lived here for about eight years now so overall it's been a very safe place." Campbell says that arrests like Damme's are not the normal in places like Bixby. Campbell says "Bixby has always been a very safe place."

#### **Development on Riverwalk in Jenks**

Construction is front and center at Riverwalk Crossing in Jenks. It is the progress of three new restaurants set to open in a few months and more on the way. Chamber of Commerce President Josh Driskill says "It's a great time here, a lot of developments underway and in a couple months we'll see a lot more announcements". He also says success from the Flying Tee Golf Center next door has helped bring new life to Riverwalk Crossing. The new businesses will help bring in more tax revenue and more visitors to the area. Driskill says "any time you've got great strong businesses, it means you're going to see more sales tax revenue, the more successful the biz, the more people come". And the Chamber expects many visitors soon with Andolini's opening a new Italian restaurant in about a week. Burn Co BBQ will open its new location here at Riverwalk Crossing in a couple months. And Maryn's Taphouse and Raw Bar will also open soon. There is also a new industrial park underway off Elm Street. The City says a developer is sprucing up the place to bring in new tenant which a trend the Chamber of Commerce hopes will continue.

#### Rezoning Meeting in Bixby

The area of 161st and Memorial has been a hot button for residents and developers alike in the City of Bixby. The property owner wants to sell to developer Rausch Coleman who is hoping to build 525 homes. But many worry with the added traffic and the way the infrastructure is currently, the City will not be able to withstand more houses. Bixby City Manager, Jared Cottle says he believes the added homes would result in an increase in revenue for the City. Cottle says "it is true that retail development follows rooftops and one of the keys we have to expand the services we offer in public safety is to have additional retail". Cottle says Bixby must have more residents to have more retail. To those worried about added traffic to Bixby, Cottle says traffic counts are not as congested in South Bixby. Cottle says "the 30,000 cars are north of the river and a lot of that development has moved forward in that point in time. We have maybe a third of that traffic at 161st and Memorial".

And for those who are concerned about bond money being given to the developer for flood issues. Cottle says "with regards to the drainage, the City cannot give money to a developer with bond funds". Cottle also says if the Council passes the second reading Monday night, then the zoning order goes into effect but this is not a full blown approval for the development. IT is only for zoning action.

### Downtown Plans in Muskogee

Muskogee is looking for ways to improve its downtown core. Students from Oklahoma University (OU) are presenting a plan they have come up with to bring life back to downtown. Bro's Haberdashery sits on the corner of Okmulgee and 2<sup>nd</sup> street in Muskogee. Owner Nick Wilkes opened up shop about six months ago. He says his hometown pride encourages him to invest in Muskogee. Wilkes says "it's my home, my hearts here, I love this place, I love this town". But he admits that downtown Muskogee can use a little TLC (tender loving care). Wilkes says "it's just unsafe to be out on the sidewalk to be honest". A group of Design students from OU hope to help bring downtown Muskogee back to life. They have spent months putting together a plan to bring people back to the City's core. Plans include adding apartments, capitalizing on green space, and making it more bike and pedestrian-friendly. The plan also includes rechanneling the roads, reducing lanes to slow cars down and make it safer for pedestrians. They also want to maintain historic buildings, and increase activity downtown. City leaders will try to use these ideas moving forward.

#### Bixby's Downtown River Corridor Improvement

Bixby City leaders are taking steps to improve the downtown river corridor. The City is looking to upgrade the pedestrian bridge near 146<sup>th</sup> Street and Memorial. They are now doing a survey on the bridge to see how much it can hold. They will use the study to see what kind of upgrades are needed and may even decide to expand the bridge and used it to host events in the future. The City is also working on building a new river access park next to the bridge.

#### Rezoning Fight in Tahlequah

#### **Business Announcement in Broken Arrow**

A local manufacturing company announced today that it is expanding in Broken Arrow. The Swedish company Alfa Laval said it plans to build a new plant right next to its existing plant at 81<sup>st</sup> and Lynn Lane. The City cannot day how many jobs will come to town until the company breaks ground and releases more details this summer. Broken Arrow resident Chelsea Brown says "oh I think it's absolutely wonderful that they're expanding and wanting to bring life to broken arrow and more jobs and people and families really it's a family friendly area." The new plant should be in operation by the end of 2018.

## Development in Owasso's Red Bud District

A big new development is taking shape in Owasso's Red Bud District. Framing is already going up on. The center will have retail and restaurants on the first floor including a smoke restaurant. It will also have office space on the second floor and loft apartments on the third. The project is expected to be finished fall of next year.

#### Special Meeting on Education in Tulsa

In West Tulsa, school may soon be getting out for more than just summer. Tulsa City Councilor Jeannie Cue represents West Tulsa and she is concerned that Ecdc-Porter, Park, and Remington Elementary Schools could sit empty because of budget cutting and consolidation. Cue says "I have hope, but my concerns are Remington and Park because they sit in the neighborhoods. I'll be watching those schools and TPS (Tulsa Public Schools) assures me that the right thing will come if something does come". Earlier this month, two TPS schools were closed in 2011. Neighbors told FOX23 that the shuttered schools are now prime spots for drug dealers, vandals and even prostitutes. Tulsa Schools Superintendent Dr. Deborah Gist assured councilors that any building closed will still be monitored and the property will be maintained. She says there is a chance the District could use the buildings again in the future. Tulsa City Councilor Connie Dodson represents East Tulsa and she tells FOX23 that she is worried if the funding crisis continues, schools could be closed in her District and as seen at Sandberg Elementary near her side of town. Dodson says "we don't know how much will have to be consolidated to make ends meet and that's the problem. We hope State Legislators will realize that they have the keys to fix this".

## Tulsa Public Schools (TPS) Budget Meeting

Teachers Unions are at the Education Services Center to make sure Board members know where they stand on preemptive budget cuts. Nancy Leonard with the American Federation of Teachers Tulsa 6049 says "I know they're trying to pre-plan. But sometimes when you pre-plan you cut your nose off to spite your face". Organizers want TPS to wait until the State budget is finalized before making any major budget decisions like consolidating schools and taking furlough days. The District will take a few more days before finalizing their recommendations but they did make a move to ask the legislature to make

up for some of the anticipated budget shortfall. Leonard says "Oklahoma's run on gas and oil. It always has been". The School Board drafted a resolution to call on the State Legislature to restore the gross production tax to seven percent for all oil producers.

#### **Budget Cuts in Muskogee Schools**

"I was angry, because that's a big change" says Terri Cobb who has twin daughters who are rising seventh graders at Ben Franklin Science Academy. They have just learned this will be their last year at the Magnet School. Cobb says "they were receiving top notch as far as I'm concerned, then to just rip them out like this at the last minute...no notifications". This week, the Muskogee School Board finalized a million dollars in budget cuts for next school year. That Includes eliminating 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grades from the District's science-focused school. Students from Ben Franklin Science Academy will now go here to Alice Robertson Middle School unless their parents decide otherwise. FOX23 spoke to the Superintendent a few weeks ago about this difficult decision where he says this comes after a decade of cuts and a lack of funding from the State. But he assures parents that Alice Robertson Middle School that will be a good substitute for Ben Franklin. Cobb says that she ishoping for a solution from Legislators. Cobb says "it's not really the School Board's fault, it's the Legislators...they're not looking at what these kids are going through". The Cobb family is now weighing their options which includes home schooling; moving out of the District, or the State. But they are trying to stay positive and give the new school a chance while asking State Leaders to help give students the education they deserve.

#### **Crossing Safety in Broken Arrow School District**

Crossing guards stationed at several locations around Broken Arrow are there to keep kids safe. For several years the City has funded the program for the school district. The amount of funding has not increased even though the number of kids walking has. The City has given the district 32 thousand dollars each year since 2015. Parents say they are happy that it is not going to be affected by state education cut but wonder if more are needed. Earlier this school year, FOX23 reported a total of four Broken Arrow students were involved in auto pedestrian accidents on their way to or from schools. Last fall police say they were making a big effort to make school zones safer. Parents say the fact there is not one crossing guard at each school is a little surprising.

#### **Broken Arrow Public School Budget**

Cautiously optimistic...that is how Broken Arrow Public Schools officials are describing their approach to next year's budget. State Superintendent Hofmeister reported that Common Education will get a 1.6 percent increase from last year. Last week FOX23 reported legislators passed the budget proposed to generate 6.8 billion dollars in revenue. The plan adds about 2.4 billion dollars back into the Common Education Formula. District accountant Natalie Enith says that news is a relief but they are still stuck waiting to see where that money will go. Enith says "...'will it go directly all into the formula, will they line item it out for specific activities like text books, ace, PD, RSA, so how will that actual be allocated to us...". The district has already cut 3.8 million dollars from their budget this fiscal year. Enith says right

now they are being told they would receive about the same amount of state funding as they got last year. But Superintendent Janet Dunlop says that is a statement they are taking with caution. Dunlop says "we've heard those words before and what those words equated to in this year and the year prior is then we received midyear cuts."

## **New School in the Union Public School District**

More children ages three and younger will have access to early childhood education this fall. Tulsa's Community Action Project (CAP) was awarded federal dollars. To open a new center in Union's former Briar Glen Elementary near 31<sup>st</sup> and 129<sup>th</sup> East Avenue. And funding to expand its Rosa Parks Center in Tulsa. The George Kaiser Family Foundation is providing a matching grant in helping more than a hundred kids from lower income families get a better start on their education.

#### Tuition Hike at Roger State University in Claremore (Rogers County)

Tuition is going up at universities across Oklahoma including Rogers State University (RSU). RSU's budget proposal for next school year was approved late Tuesday night that includes a tuition increase of 5% for in-state students and 5.2% for out of state. School officials say that adds up to an extra \$165 a semester for in-state students taking 15 hours. It is not just the tuition increase, other cost saving measures include up to 12 unpaid furlough days for all employees, and nine positions that will either be eliminated or unfilled.

#### More Flu Deaths in Tulsa County

The flu has taken the lives of more Oklahomans. The State Health Department reports two more flu deaths in the past week both in Tulsa County. That brings the number of flu deaths Statewide to 92. 22 this season in Tulsa County alone. Since September, more than 2-thousand people in Oklahoma have been hospitalized because of the flu.

#### **Drugs Takeback on Unwanted and Old Medications**

The Tulsa Health Department wants to keep your old medications out of the wrong hands. On the 29<sup>th</sup>, you can get rid of unwanted, unused or expired medications at several locations: Reasor's on 71<sup>st</sup> and Sheridan or 41<sup>st</sup> and Yale. You can also go the MET (Metropolitan Environmental Trust) at 11th and Cincinnati. The Health Department says Tulsa County is 16<sup>th</sup> out of all counties in the country when it comes to deaths from prescription painkillers.

## **Tobacco Products Banned in All Tulsa City Parks**

The Health Department is leading an initiative to ban tobacco products at all Tulsa City Parks. Dr. Bruce Dart with the Health Department says a tobacco ban at the parks would help Tulsa get a Healthy City Certification. Dart says the certification could lead to 275-thousand dollars in grant money for healthy living programs. Mom Ann Bennett says she supports the Health Department's initiative.

### Longer Tick Season Expected this summer in Green Country

"I was out working in the woods and got a tick in February", says Eddie Reese with Tulsa' Oxley Nature Center. He also says tick season is fully underway now, and the deer population is part of the problem. Reese says "some areas it could be increased deer population because they provide a food source for the ticks so you're going to see more ticks". Experts at Oklahoma State University (OSU) say this year is shaping up to be even worse when it comes to the parasites. Justin Talley, Associate Professor in Entomology at OSU says "this is about the time of year we start seeing a lot of tick activity, it just seems we have it a little bit earlier when we have a mild winter, so that means our tick season is longer". FOX23 checked with the Tulsa County Health Department and found out there is two commonly found tick-borne illnesses in our area. Over the last three years, there has been 31 cases of ehrlichiosis and 70 cases of Rocky Mountain spotted fever from a tick bite.

While those illnesses are extremely rare, experts say it is important to use caution. Talley says "if you have pets with you, you need to protect your pets because your pets are probably bringing ticks into your household. If you prepare properly and dress properly, enjoy the woods, it's a great place to be".

#### **Route-66 Coalition Getting Health Grant in Tulsa**

Oklahoma's Route 66 Coalition is getting a big federal grant to help people get healthy and stay that way. The 4-and-a-half million dollars will be used to help more than 75-thousand people with housing and food insecurity, those who need help paying utility bills and need transportation. The Route-66 coalition involves 200 organizations including the Tulsa Health Department.

#### Early Plans to Tackle Problems with Mosquitoes

It is really hard to tell what kind of mosquito year we are going to have. So the Tulsa County Health Department is wasting no time. Scott Meader with the Tulsa Health Department says staff are being trained this week and mosquito traps will be put out next week—almost a month earlier than normal. With recent rains and more in the forecast, Meader says the mosquito population could explode especially if people do not remove or treat standing water near their homes. Meader says "If it keeps raining there could be more mosquitos and if it's hot and dry there could be a different types of mosquito". The Tulsa Health Department could start spraying for mosquitoes by the end of May. Meader says "last year we encountered some West Nile positive mosquitoes on earlier trapping dates. So we decided to push it earlier".

#### Mosquitos Season in Green Country

Scott Meador with the Tulsa Health Department says "we've seen a few mosquitoes out and about." Soon, you will be slapping, shooing, and shunning the blood-sucking pests as they start to pop up across green country. Meador says "numbers have been low up until now, but they may start creeping up." Meador says the reason is "it's been cooler and it's been rainy, both of those weather events really help to keep the mosquitoes down." That was until recent storms rolled through leaving behind standing water and warmer conditions. 2-ingredients Meador says gets the pests stirring. Meador also says water that sits for 5 to 10 days is ideal, but he says the storms also helps drive some away. Meador says "heavy rains reset the system. They blow everything out of the creeks."

Meador says it is too early to tell what we will see from now until October. Meador states "the types of mosquitoes present tell us what kind of diseases are floating around."

#### Bed Bugs at Platt College in Tulsa

In a FOX23 investigation, bed bugs are causing problems at a local college. Someone complained to the Tulsa Health Department on Monday about Platt College at 37<sup>th</sup> and Sheridan. So far, they have closed three classrooms and have pest control working on a solution.

#### West Nile Virus in Tulsa County

It is a sunny, warm Sunday at Reed Park in West Tulsa. As people enjoyed it, some did not even know mosquitoes in the area could be carrying West Nile Virus until FOX23 them. Officials with the Tulsa County Health Department told FOX23 now is the time when they start finding positive traps. For the week of June 19<sup>th</sup> to the 23<sup>rd</sup>, the Tulsa Health Department conducted 47 tests but only two trap samples tested positive. They collected and tested over 1,900 mosquitoes. Earlier this month when they found the first positive trap of the season. Just because they found two new trap samples officials say that does not mean the number of mosquitoes is getting out of control. They tell FOX23 that it actually went down over the last two weeks likely because of the lack of rain during that time. Health officials say anyone can become ill from being bit by an infected mosquito but those over the age of 50 are at greater risk of developing a serious illness.
